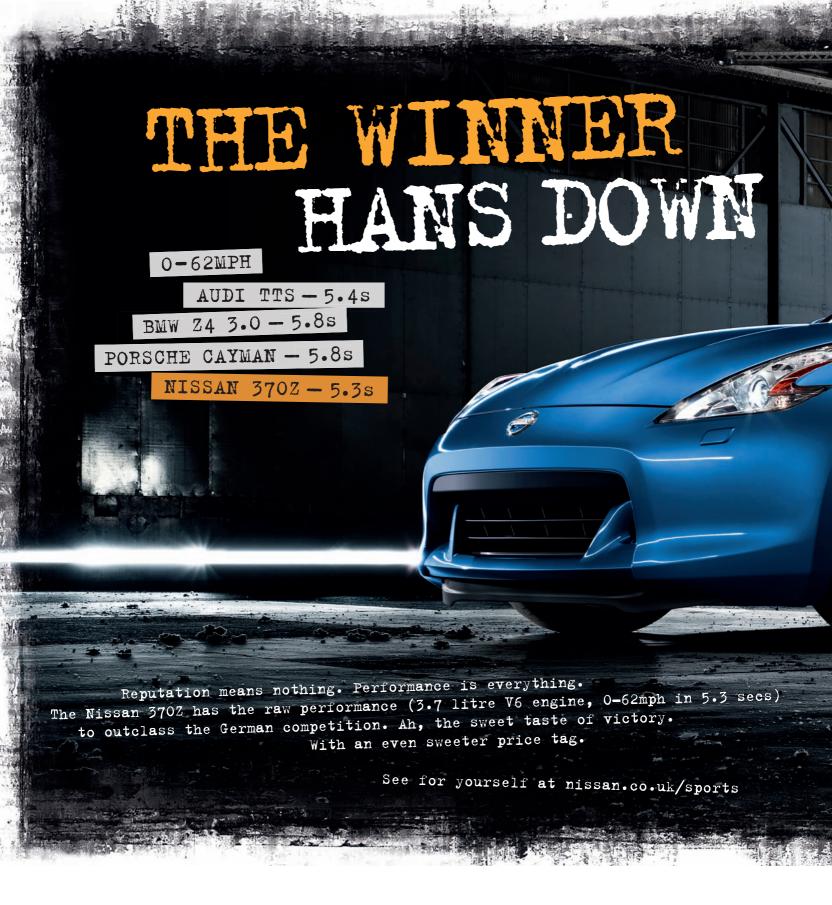

It's Mansell, Piquet, Prost all over again



I CAN REMEMBER it as if it was yesterday. Waking up in the middle of the night and joining my dad downstairs to watch the thrilling climax to the season.

It was 1986 and Nigel Mansell needed only a third place in the Australian Grand Prix to defeat Alain Prost and Nelson Piquet to win his first world championship. It was the most dramatic and tense race I'd ever seen.

The way the race played out — Keke

Rosberg disappearing into the distance in his final GP before retiring and, of course, Mansell's spectacular blow-out - ensured its status as one of the greatest title deciders of all time.

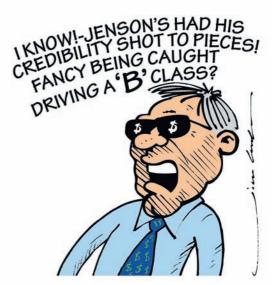
That year Williams stuck to its guns and let its embittered team-mates fight to the death, and that ultimately allowed Prost in the inferior McLaren to win the title. Red Bull finds itself in a similar situation and, outwardly at least, shows no signs of having learned from Williams' error.

It means the Abu Dhabi finale should be a cracker, with Mark Webber and Sebastian Vettel fighting each other in the best car, while Ferrari's Fernando Alonso keeps a watching brief knowing that second place will be enough regardless of what happens.

F1 SHOWDOWN Webber fears he's on his own

Mark Webber reckons he may have to go it alone, with no help from Red Bull team-mate Sebastian Vettel, if he is to beat Fernando Alonso to the title. By EDD STRAW

ark Webber heads into Sunday's four-way world championship showdown in Abu Dhabi fearing that Red Bull team-mate Sebastian Vettel will not help him to seal the crown.

The Australian claimed before practice at last weekend's Brazilian Grand Prix that Red Bull will not use team orders under any circumstances, saying "if it hasn't happened by now, it's never going to happen." He appeared unhappy after the race, in which he finished

second behind Vettel, that the team had not taken action.

The 34-year-old trails Ferrari's Fernando Alonso by eight points, meaning that he must win in Abu Dhabi with the Spaniard below second place to be sure of winning the title. Vettel would not say after the Brazilian GP whether he would be prepared to let Webber past in Abu Dhabi if the points situation demanded it, while team principal Christian Horner insists that he will not issue team orders.

Had Vettel let the Australian past in Brazil – a move that would be permitted because of the FIA's long-standing acceptance of team orders in the championship run-in Webber would be going to Abu Dhabi only one point behind.

"It helps, but it's not in the team's philosophy," Webber said when asked by AUTOSPORT whether the team should have

ordered Vettel to move over in Brazil. "I think the team's position has always been on the sporting side and that's how it is.

"Obviously Fernando got some points in Hockenheim [when Felipe Massa slowed to let him past], which has happened in the past and will happen again in the future. Everyone has different ideas – that's how it is at the moment."

WEBBER WARNED

Although Webber stopped short of criticising the team, his post-race comparison of Red Bull's and Ferrari's tactics suggests that he was unimpressed by the team's failure to order Vettel aside.

He had already been warned to stay 'on message' after accusing Red Bull of favouring Vettel in the build-up to the weekend. He held extended talks with Horner after his comments, and AUTOSPORT understands that team owner Dietrich Mateschitz was furious with his remarks claiming team favouritism towards Vettel.

When asked whether the team was fully behind him, Webber emphasised that "technically, everything has been very very good." But when asked what he thought about the personal side, he replied: "It's obvious, isn't it?"

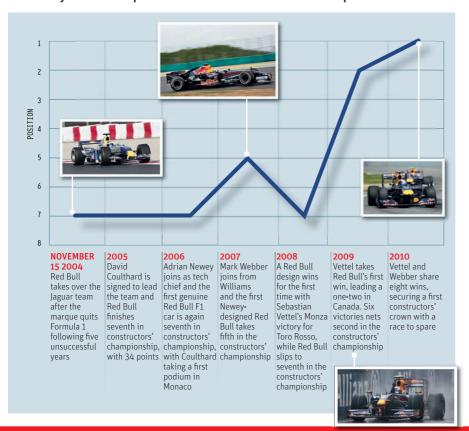
WILL VETTEL GIVE WAY?

Although the relationship between Webber and Vettel is strained, it would be wrong to characterise their partnership as being one of outright hostility. It is likely that the German would give way if absolutely necessary.

Vettel is 15 points behind Alonso

RED BULL ON THE RAMPAGE

RED BULL wrapped up its first constructors' world championship on Sunday, just six years after it took over the Jaguar F1 team (nee Stewart Grand Prix). The recruitment of Adrian Newey and a fresh set of rules for 2009 helped turn the Milton Keynes-based squad from midfielder into a world champion



in the world championship and needs the Spaniard to finish outside the top four to enable him to take the title with victory. Should Vettel, a long-term Red Bull-supported driver, be leading Webber and Alonso in the closing stages, the team does expect him to cede.

But Vettel is not willing to do this until the dying seconds of the race, in case Alonso hits trouble.

Red Bull chief technical officer Adrian Newey said after the race that he expects Vettel to be "magnanimous" should the situation arise, while Horner insists that it must be a "driver decision".

CAUTION ON TEAM ORDERS

Red Bull is cautious of admitting to planning team orders because of Ferrari's simmering anger about being found guilty of breaking the team-order ban in the German Grand Prix.

The FIA has said in the past that team orders are permitted at the end of a season, and Ferrari itself switched Felipe Massa and Kimi Raikkonen at the 2007 Brazilian GP



to ensure that the Finn won the title. But Red Bull fears that Ferrari could protest if team orders are invoked to deny Alonso the crown. Although the precedent is set, there is no provision actually written in the rules allowing team orders to be used in any circumstances.

This would explain why all team-orders discussions — which AUTOSPORT understands have taken place within Red Bull — are being held behind closed doors.

ark Webber has made the controlled outburst an art form this season. After the Istanbul Red Bull wipeout and the Silverstone front-wing-swap controversy, he made his thoughts very clear. And it worked, galvanising his crew, earning him the sympathy of the world and raising him to ever-higher levels of performance.

He tried again at Interlagos last Thursday, but all he achieved was to wind up Christian Horner and Dietrich Mateschitz and amuse Sebastian Vettel. In Abu Dhabi, he needs to keep it simple and avoid such verbal games.

Red Bull could have placed the title destiny entirely in Webber's hands had it ordered Vettel to 'understand a message' in Brazil. And you can make a strong, but not watertight, argument that it should have. But given that Webber can't do much to influence Alonso's race, it wouldn't have changed his Abu Dhabi task a great deal.

To put it simply, he must dominate, as he did in Spain and Monaco, removing any doubts about Vettel's cooperation. And if Alonso is second, Webber could have done no more.

For all his mental toughness, Webber still

has to convince the world that he has the fortitude to triumph in a world title fight. If he pulls it off in Abu Dhabi, he will richly deserve the title.

Alonso buoyant for finale

Ferrari hero reckons he can split the Red Bulls in Abu Dhabi and claim third title

ernando Alonso is "one hundred per cent" confident of clinching his third world championship in this weekend's Abu Dhabi Grand Prix.

The Spaniard needs only to finish first or second in his Ferrari to guarantee the title. The Red Bulls of main rivals Mark Webber and Sebastian Vettel are expected to have a slight edge at the Yas Marina track, but Alonso believes it will be possible to finish between them.

"I just need to finish second," he

said. "It doesn't matter who wins in Abu Dhabi if I finish second. So the main goal for us is to be on pole and to win the race. If we cannot do that because we are not quick enough, we try to be second."

Red Bull is on the verge of equalling the record for 15 pole positions in an F1 season — set by McLaren in 1988 — but Alonso says he will try to deny that accolade.

"We will see if we can be in front of them in Abu Dhabi," he said. "If not, probably the start will be our next opportunity. But if I'm fifth and Sebastian [Vettel] wins, he is world champion, so it's not clear for Red Bull either."

Although Ferrari has taken only two poles so far this year, Alonso did set comparable lap times to the Red Bull during the Brazilian GP. Ferrari believes that this suggests Alonso could have challenged Webber for second had he not lost 10 seconds behind polesitter Nico Hulkenberg early in the race.

Ferrari team principal Stefano

Domenicali admitted that he expects the Red Bull to be fast, but believes that being able to win the title without necessarily winning the race potentially gives the Italian team an edge.

"We know Red Bull is very strong — it was very strong [at Abu Dhabi] last year," he said. "I think it will be very challenging.

"We have to make sure that we are fast, do a perfect qualifying and we need to wait until the last metre, because reliability is a big point that everyone will be worried about — not only with the engine but everything."

Fernandes drops Lotus

Lotus cars deal with Renault prompts Air Asia boss to rethink team name

otus Racing is set to drop the iconic name in 2011 as Group Lotus is on the verge of acquiring a minority stake in Renault's Formula 1 team.

Lotus Racing team principal Tony Fernandes is currently competing under a one-year licence to use the name, but planned to run as Team Lotus next season after acquiring the famous name from long-time custodian David Hunt. But despite having no doubts about the legal right to use the name, it is



understood that he is not willing to jeopardise his team's future with lengthy and costly legal battles. With Renault F1 set to carry the Lotus name as a sponsor next season in a deal that is likely to be announced in Abu Dhabi, there is also a realisation that having two Lotus teams on the same grid could harm Fernandes's outfit commercially. It is also understood that pressure has been brought to bear by the Malaysian government to resolve the dispute amicably.

A NEW NAME

If Fernandes does, as expected, drop the Lotus name, it is not clear what identity the team will assume. The company's trading name, 1 Malaysia Racing, will not be used while it is possible that the Team Air Asia moniker, which Fernandes is bringing into GP2, could be chosen. However, Fernandes is well-known for his marketing nous and could choose to create a whole new brand,

possibly incorporating Air Asia as what is effectively a sponsor.

Fernandes was unavailable for comment, and team personnel in Brazil refused to discuss the issue. But the Lotus Racing team boss did comment on social networking site Twitter on November 6, saying that it "makes sense for racing team and group to be reunited. How and whether it will and in what form will form discussions over the next few months."

It is not clear whether Fernandes will keep hold of the Team Lotus name, with Group Lotus believed to be keen to acquire it. It is also possible that Fernandes will retain Team Lotus Ventures Ltd for possible use in F1 in the future.

Despite fears about the team's financial future if it ceases to operate as Lotus, AUTOSPORT understands it will be allowed to keep constructors' championship money earned as Lotus Racing and no sponsorship deals will suffer.

RENAULT MOVING OUT OF F1

Renault remains committed to F1 as an engine supplier, confirming last week that it will supply Renault F1, Red Bull and the current Lotus Racing outfit with engines in 2011.

Hulk stakes F1 claim with pole

NICO HULKENBERG'S stunning pole position for Williams in last weekend's Brazilian **Grand Prix has** boosted his chances of remaining in Formula 1 next season.

The 23-year-old is unsure of whether he will race for the British squad next year, with the team evaluating

GP2 champion Pastor Maldonado, who could potentially bring a significant sponsorship package worth over €10 million. However, to drop a driver who has crowned an impressive rookie season with such a remarkable performance outpacing the

field by over one second on slicks in tricky conditions to land the team's first pole in 100 races could raise question marks over the team's long-term ambition to run the best drivers.

"Talent should come ahead of money in F1, but with the economy having some trouble

it has become a valid point and may change some things," said Hulkenberg. "But I still hope things can go the right way. Rubens [Barrichello] and I are the perfect driver combination."

The team has hailed Hulkenberg as a future world champion and also credits Barrichello with being the strongest development driver it has run since Damon Hill in 1996. The Brazilian is widely expected to stay with the team, but it is understood that a financial package has yet to be finalised. Despite this, it is very unlikely that he will be dropped.

"I'm talking deeply with Williams and nobody else," said Barrichello. "My feeling is that I will be here next year."



Despite this commitment, it is expected to sell its 25 per cent stake in its works F1 team to Group Lotus. The team would then likely be called Lotus Renault for the next two seasons, taking it to the end of the current Concorde Agreement, with majority owner Genii Capital continuing to run the operation in that time. A full buyout in 2013 could also be on the cards.

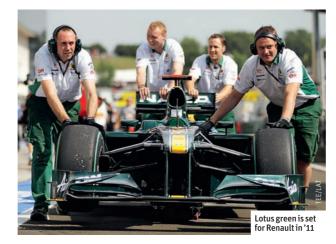
Renault chairman Carlos Ghosn said last weekend that Renault is not walking away from F1, but did not rule out selling its stake.

"I'm not going to give direct reports of discussions which we have or haven't had," he said. "We are not in F1 to own a team, we are in F1 to promote the Renault name and Renault technology. We will do whatever is necessary to do so at a lower cost and with less investment. We are not going to put more resources than necessary into achieving that aim."

He also confirmed that a name change was possible, provided the Renault name remained in F1 in some form.

Lotus has not had an active involvement in motorsport for over



a decade, but its interest has been sparked by the arrival of Danny Behar as CEO.

Behar has a background in motor sport, first working as Red Bull Racing owner Dietrich Mateschitz's right-hand man and later for Ferrari. He is known to see F1 as a strong marketing platform for the Lotus brand. Despite the publicity offered by the current Lotus Racing team, he is keen to have greater control over the way the brand is used in F1 and was not working for the marque when the original licence to use the name was granted.



THIS WEEK IN F1



McLAREN Jenson Button and his entourage escaped a potential car-jacking attempt on Saturday evening in Sao Paulo while leaving the track. Their car was confronted by an estimated six armed would-be assailants.



MERCEDES Nico Rosberg says that Red Bull's Mark Webber has apologised to him for putting his Mercedes out of the Korean Grand Prix after bouncing across the track. Webber denied suggestions that he did it deliberately.



RED BULL Adrian Newey has recommitted his future to Red Bull. "I will be at Red Bull for a while to come," he said when asked about his future by AUTOSPORT.



FERRARI Team principal Stefano Domenicali believes that F1 must consider moving lapped cars behind cars on the lead lap while under safety-car conditions. "It is something that we need to discuss for the future," he said.



WILLIAMS Director of engineer Patrick Head believes that the Williams-Cosworth package is becoming increasingly competitive in terms of straightline speed: "We're more competitive on the straight than we have been recently."



RENAULT The French manufacturer has renewed its engine supply deal with the Red Bull team for 2011. The Red Bull-Renault combination sealed the constructors' championship in Brazil.



ORCE INDIA Adrian Sutil expects to stay at Force India next season with options at Renault and Williams fading. "The direction is towards Force India at the moment," he said.



TORO ROSSO The Faenza-based team again tried its f-duct during Friday practice for the Brazilian Grand Prix. It has yet to race the system, which is banned in F1 for 2011.



LOTUS The team is on the brink of securing 10th in the constructors' championship, its main target for the season for the potential financial benefits. "We are now one race away from 10th," said driver Heikki Kovalainen.



IRT Christian Klien returned for a second outing of the season in place of Sakon Yamamoto in Brazil, notching up his first finish. As AUTOSPORT closed for press, it was unclear whether he would continue in Abu Dhabi.



SAUBER Nick Heidfeld believes that he will show improved form in the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix because he will race a fresher engine. He will race the unit used by Pedro de la Rosa on the Saturday of the Belgian Grand Prix.



IRGIN Lucas di Grassi hopes to remain with the team despite it appearing increasingly likely that he will have to move to stay in F1. The natural progression would be to stay with the team," he said.



Fernando Alonso

It's been a great season for Fernando, whether he wins or loses the F1 championship this coming Sunday. There's also good news for diecast collectors, as the 1:18 replica of his 2010 Ferrari F10 has just been released. Fresh talent gearing up for rookie test days

F1 hopefuls prepare for a crack at the big time in Abu Dhabi young-driver test

raft of up-and-coming talents are gearing up for Formula 1 trials in next week's young-driver test, which follows the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix.

The two-day test, held on November 16-17, will be attended by all 12 F1 teams and is open to any driver who has not started a grand prix. Among the drivers taking part are GP2 runner-up Sergio Perez, who begins on-track preparations ahead of his race debut with Sauber next season, and GP2 champion Pastor Maldonado, who is chasing

a Williams seat. As well as running for Williams on the second day of the test, Maldonado will drive for HRT on the opening day.

Drivers making their first proper appearances in F1 include GP2 race winner Sam Bird, who is driving for Mercedes on both days, and British Formula 3 champion Jean-Eric Vergne at Toro Rosso. Superleague Formula ace Yelmer Buurman is tipped to test for Force India.

Several drivers will also be running as prizes for their performances during 2010.

As well as assessing drivers, teams can also use the test for development work. McLaren is set to use regular test driver Gary Paffett for both days — although it has not ruled out calling up



another driver to join him.

The young-driver test will be the last time that Bridgestones are used in F1. It will be run using the same tyre compound allocation as the race weekend, making a direct comparison with regular drivers competing in the Abu Dhabi GP possible.

Teams will use tyres from their 100-set tyre allocation, meaning that there is likely to be plenty of running given the rubber available.



Van der Garde joins Virgin scrap

DUTCHMAN GIEDO van der Garde has emerged as a rival to fellow GP2 racer Jerome d'Ambrosio for a 2011 Virgin seat.

Gravity Sport Management driver d'Ambrosio was on the verge of signing for the team last week, but van der Garde is understood to be offering double the sponsorship money.

The team is keen to take on d'Ambrosio because it considers him to be a better prospect after running him during Friday practice four times this season, but Virgin Racing co-owner Lloyds Development Capital is believed to be keen to take van der Garde's money.

With Timo Glock likely to stay on in the absence of other offers, the team hopes to take a decision on its remaining seat soon.

Straight talk David Coulthard

Still Britain's all-time leading F1 points scorer

DC knows what it's like to be in the middle of intrateam tactical warfare, so he's well qualified to offer a few suggestions on the dilemma facing Red Bull in Abu Dhabi this weekend

The Brazilian Grand Prix confirmed what we already thought — that even after a year-long development war, Red Bull still has the fastest car in Formula 1. And the team wrapping up the constructors' championship is a fair and just reward for six years of hard work.

With one title in its pocket, Red Bull heads to the grand finale with the single goal of lifting the drivers' championship as well. There are lots of different scenarios that can lead to either Mark Webber or Sebastian Vettel being crowned champion, and with the focus on in Red Bull winning it as a non-car manufacturer. But the big one to win is the drivers' championship, and right now Fernando Alonso is the man with the advantage there.

GETTING TACTICAL

There's been a lot of talk about what Red Bull will do regarding team tactics. Every contract I ever had said that the driver had to follow the reasonable instructions of the team principal — then it was just a case of debating what was reasonable!

But Sebastian was very clear on Saturday when he said that both drivers will do whatever is required of them as they are paid by the team. I don't doubt for one moment that if Sebastian can't win the championship, but his actions can help Mark to be world champion, then he will do the right thing. The big question is if they are in that position, when is the right time to switch? There are always a lot of unknowns in a grand prix. As we've seen this year, there have been right up until the last lap.

And let's not forget, Fernando's points haul in the second half of this season hasn't been luck. He and Ferrari have done that by performing, and there have been races this year where the F10 has been setting the pace. Fernando will be hoping that Abu Dhabi is another race where he can fight for the win, but Red Bull was very strong there last year.

If it's anything like Brazil, then it's just a case of which Red Bull driver wins the race.

FEELING THE LOVE

In a team with two drivers there can only be one winner. There's always going to be friction, and none of us on the outside can relate to the pressure these guys are under. It was just unfortunate that Mark's comments about feeling equal in the team were treated in the way they were. Not for one moment was he talking about the guys that build and operate his car, it's obviously how he feels in terms of senior individuals inside the Red Bull organisation.

When I felt in a similar way at McLaren, I don't recall ever saying anything in public. But that was a different generation. The team bosses back then were old enough to be our dads, which is not the case anymore. But I used to have lengthy conversations with Ron Dennis about how I felt. The classic example was if Mika would take pole from me, and the McLaren pitwall would erupt. You sit in the car, looking out at that, and it's very difficult not to read something into it. They might be doing exactly the same thing when it's the other way around, but you don't see that because you're on track.

These little things can have an effect on you. You can't tell people not to have feelings, and I don't know any racing drivers who are totally devoid of emotion. It is Mark's right to feel however he wants, just like it's the team's right to remind him who pays the bills.

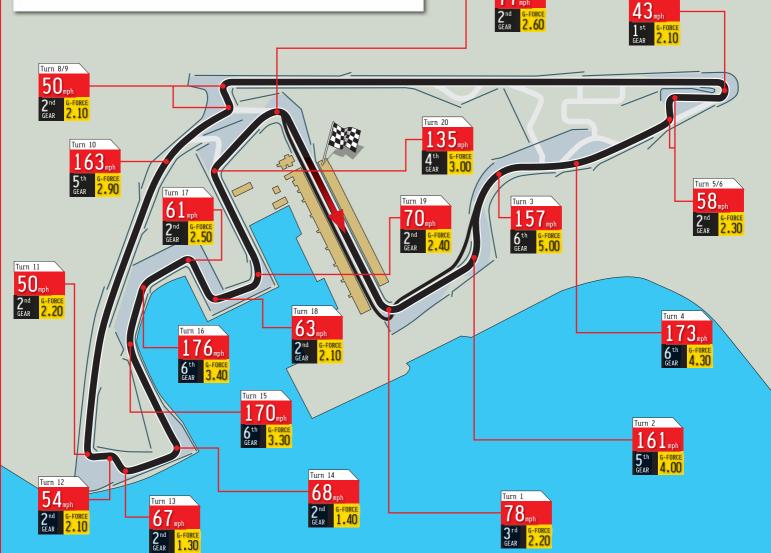
really enjoyed the first Abu Dhabi Grand Prix last year. People said it was boring, but remember that the cars are so highly developed and it's not easy to overtake on a brand new track. The fact that the race runs through dusk is unusual and helps to make it a good event. I would prefer to finish the season in Brazil but apart from that I very much like Abu Dhabi!



OVERTAKING

Even though there is a long back straight, you are still relying on the driver ahead making a small mistake if you want to overtake – although if you are the likes of Kamui Kobayashi you are going to try anyway and it might work or it might not! It isn't so easy to overtake here.





THE TWILIGHT ZONE

Last year was the first time I had driven in these light conditions. You cannot race in the dark with the medium-tinted visor that you need for the start of the race, so you prepare an overvisor. You can take it off and have a clear one for when it gets dark. It was a completely new experience last year – it was funny because as soon as I tore off my tinted visor they turned on the lights. It was amazing!









FLAT OUT - JUST

Last year, Turns 2 and 3 were tough to run at full throttle, and this year with 150kg of fuel on board it's going to be even more difficult.



THE RUSH TO ABU DHABI

Running Brazil and Abu Dhabi back-to-back makes it tremendously tiring at the end of a busy season – we need to bunch up some of the other events to make it easier. But apart from having to get there so quickly, I very much like Abu Dhabi, and we are there for a while because there is the tyre test afterwards.



SET-UP

It's not easy to set up the car in Abu Dhabi. It's a bit bumpy in some areas and last year we had a problem with the car hopping because of the wheels bouncing. It's also very tough on the brakes.

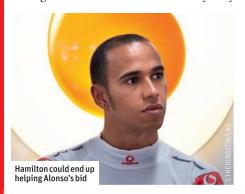

ABU DHABI GP PREVIEW

One of the most thrilling title showdowns in recent years reaches its zenith in Abu Dhabi

lthough the points numbers heavily favour Fernando Alonso - there are more ways for him to win the title than there are for Mark Webber, and vastly more than there are for Sebastian Vettel the most realistic scenario for a Webber championship is a Red Bull 1-2.

That's a perfectly feasible result. Alonso was making much of the fact that it was only early



traffic in Brazil that had prevented him mixing it with the RB6s, but the evidence doesn't bear him out on that. The Red Bulls were in cruise mode for much of the race.

But Alonso's best friend in Abu Dhabi may in fact be Lewis Hamilton. Recall his devastating form there in qualifying last year. He was 0.7sec clear of the field, most of that margin coming in the final sector where he was uniquely at ease with oversteer that helped the car change direction, then skimmed the walls with breathtaking audacity. It was a section of race track that might have been designed specially for him.

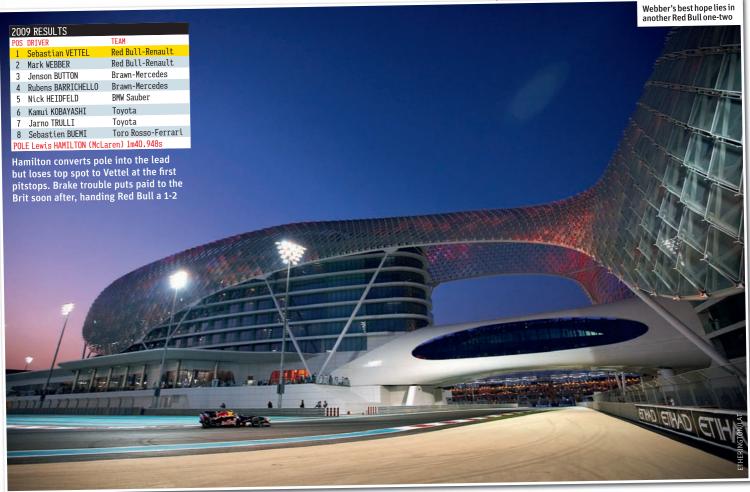
The McLaren has definitely been only the third fastest car for quite some time now, but there's a chance that Lewis may be able to overturn the deficit - and if he can win the race, that makes it extremely difficult for Webber, let alone Vettel. That of course is on the assumption that Alonso finishes the race. Might that marginal engine situation finally tell?

Key questions

What the Abu Dhabi GP will tell us

- Can Red Bull find a way to win the drivers' title?
- Could Alonso's chances be hurt by his engine situation?
- Will Hamilton's pace influence the championship battle?







SET-UP GUIDE

The Yas Marina circuit has some very slow sections that require a lot of kerb usage, and there is also some camber change through the corners, so a mechanically compliant set-up is required. But, as with any circuit, downforce equals grip, and grip equals Red Bull - if they can get off the line, little can touch them. There are two long straights with slow corners leading onto and off them, so cars with a fullyfunctioning f-duct can overtake.

AUTOSPORT grand prix editor

The story of how the little guy from Sao Paulo becomes a giant of the sport makes compelling and epic cinema viewing. Senna is unmissable

n the beautiful new film Senna
out in UK cinemas in June
Ayrton ponders, after being
denied the chance of winning at
Monaco '84, that when you're a
small guy you will be the victim of
the politics of the establishment. On
that occasion he meekly accepted it
and, among the unearthed treasures
of footage, there is some of him
walking with his second-place
trophy, giving a shy smile then
a fist of delight. It had, after all,
been a sensational performance.

It's just one of many revealing snippets in what is a wonderful piece of work. The typical reaction of those in the media who saw it was 'what about this incident, what about that one?' and it's true that we could all probably happily watch five hours or more of this subject matter. But to confine the many wonders of his career within the 100 minutes required for cinema, many reluctant calls had to be made about what to cut, and, as the film's creators explained at the screening in Senna's home town of Morumbi, these decisions were often dictated by the

need to maintain a narrative to carry the film. The storyline picked out is just one of many possible, but the portrayal of the little guy at the mercy of the establishment who breaks through and *becomes* the establishment by the force of his personality, righteous belief and spellbinding talent works pretty well.

Alain Prost is cast as a key part of 'the establishment', the guy whose power and influence had the race at Monaco stopped before he suffered the embarrassment of being overtaken by the rookie in the Toleman. Later, as they are teamed together at McLaren, it's Prost's relationship with FISA president Jean Marie Balestre that is portrayed as frustrating Senna's greater driving skills from being rewarded with commensurate success.

The events of Suzuka '89 are used as a fulcrum in the story, where - using footage taken by a fan, of Prost heading for the stewards room the moment he alighted from his car – the establishment forces conspire to cheat Senna of his due. In this we are reminded how unfairly Senna was treated: the moving of pole to the disadvantageous side after he'd set it, his disqualification from the race for a spurious 'offence'. It was blatantly wrong and given someone of Senna's hair-trigger emotion and fundamentalist outlook, it explains without excusing – his actions there one year later. Prost is cast in a slightly villainous role, but then this is the story from Senna's perspective. It isn't intended to be a Senna/Prost documentary, and is all the better for that subjective take.

Like any cinematic storyline, it's a

simplified version of what happened. In real life there are ambiguities and incidents that are inconveniently out-of-sequence with a narrative. But if you suspend that, watch it only as a compelling story, you feel its beauty wrapping itself around you; in turns poignant, turbulent, powerful, violent, spiritual. The Sao Paulo street scenes as his body is returned home, hundreds of thousands lining the route, the testimony of the people as they are asked what Ayrton meant to them; these are powerful reminders of how totally he transcended the sport.

Once he'd broken through to become the sport's standard-bearer, he was not shy about throwing his weight around and there's a creeping element of spoilt brattishness about him as the film's chronology unfolds. His rant about being prevented (by Prost) from being able to transfer to Williams in '93 now it had the fastest car leaves you thinking: 'Tough. That's the game. Deal with it.' It's projecting a very different attitude to the young Toleman driver with the shy smile. It's a pity there isn't footage of him using his status to try messing with Michael Schumacher's head by ranting at him at Magny-Cours '93 or later the same year at Hockenheim testing.

But one of the great things about this film is the unearthing of rarely or never-before seen footage. We see him, for example, standing on the bank at Aida with Gerhard Berger, animatedly pointing out something about Schumacher's Benetton — presumably its uncanny traction. And so the final tragic pieces of the story begin to slot into place. Mr

he new Ford Focus is set to make its race debut in next year's British Touring Car Championship.

The manufacturer announced at last week's SEMA industry show in Las Vegas that the machine, released earlier this year, will form the platform for a 'global touring car' that it intends to race for the first time in Britain in 2011.

Although plans for the Focus touring car have received factory blessing, Ford intends to work with a number of its privateer teams during the winter to create a base touring car, which will conform to FIA Super 2000 regulations. The

machine will be adaptable to different rules sets, such as the BTCC's new NGTC specification.

Jost Capito, Ford's director of global performance vehicles and motorsports business development, said: "There has been tremendous interest from the racing world in the new Focus, and it's the perfect fit for a global touring car," he said. "By working with private race teams, we're ensuring the Focus has the support it needs to win."

A tie-up with Arena Motorsport, which won both the BTCC independent drivers' and teams' championships this year with a pair of LPG-powered Focuses under the Team Aon banner, would be a logical start. However, Arena team principal Mike Earle said that no decision had been made by Ford.

"We'd love to be a part of it, but I'm sure most of the other teams in the paddock with similar capabilities to us would say the same," Earle told AUTOSPORT.

"We've been consulted about it, but there's been no decision taken by Ford yet — certainly nothing we've been informed of anyway. I'd expect a decision from them within the next 10 days."

Ford has also targeted the Nurburgring 24 Hours as a potential event for the car and admitted an interest in seeing the car in the Chinese Touring Car Championship.

• Earle confirmed that Arena is in discussions with Tom Chilton about retaining the independents' champion for 2011. "We'd love him to stay, but he's still got to make the decision himself," he said.

Gow lands FIA touring car top job

BRITISH TOURING Car Championship supremo Alan Gow has insisted that his new FIA role will not affect his commitment to the BTCC.

The 55-year-old Australian was named as the new president of the FIA Touring Car Commission last Friday, replacing Jonathan Ashman, who has become president of the Rallies Commission.

"The Touring Car Commission is

responsible for both the sporting and technical aspects [of FIA-sanctioned touring car series]," he said. "Its aim is to support, grow and sustain touring car racing, just as the FIA does for the sport.

"While my new role at the FIA is going to take up more of my time, it will not reduce my focus or commitment to the BTCC as it enters the next exciting chapter of its illustrious history."

Former CART CEO Andrew Craig was named as the Commission's vice-president to Gow, who will also retain his role as chairman of the FIA Touring Car Committee.

Gow announced at the BTCC's annual awards ceremony last weekend that TOCA, of which he is chairman, will continue to run the championship for at least three more years.

Larbre choses Chevrolet for ILMC bid



MULTIPLE title-winning sportscar team Larbre Competition will fly the flag for Chevrolet in the Intercontinental Le Mans Cup next year.

Larbre, which has won seven titles in the FIA GT Championship and the Le Mans Series since 2000, will run a single Chevrolet Corvette C6.R in the GT Endurance class. It hopes to take up both its guaranteed entries and field two Corvettes in the Le Mans 24 Hours in June.

Larbre team boss Jack Leconte said: "The Chevrolet is a dream car to run and we have chosen that car because we know there are a lot of developments on the way for next year."

Leconte explained that he had chosen to run in the seven-round ILMC rather than the Le Mans Series in Europe because "Larbre is a top team that should race at the highest level".

The team's full-time driver line up will comprise former FIA GT Champion Gabriele Gardel, Julien Canal and gentleman driver Patrick Bornhauser.

Larbre hasn't ruled out continuing to run the Saleen S7R with which it took GT1 honours in the ILMC and LMS this season in next year's FIA GT1 World Championship. Leconte said that it could field its two cars if an entry slot became available, but admitted that he had "no partners" willing to finance a programme at present.

The clouds are parting, and the rays of light are starting to peek through. That's right — whisper it — motorsport is becoming an appealing activity for manufacturers again.

'Manufacturer' became a dirty word in racing, as many of them pulled the rug from underneath various championships as the financial world collapsed. But there's been a trend on the pages of AUTOSPORT as 2010 has progressed, and now that dirty word is rediscovering its appeal. In this week's issue alone, we have Ford upping its interest in touring cars (p26), the FIA working to get more engine manufacturers into Formula 3 (p28), and talk of GM eyeing an IndyCar comeback (p29). The fact that GM is known to be interested in the DTM and BTCC as well, shows that even the worst-hit of the car makers are keen to get back to racing.

Manufacturers do add prestige to our sport. But lessons have to be taken from the past decade, where these powerhouses came, spent as they wished, and left a massive hole behind when they got cold feet. Now, they should return quietly to the arenas they left behind, and play ball with those that have spent the past couple of years repairing the damage.

GATEWAY CLOSES

Gateway International Raceway has been closed. The track, which had hosted CART, IRL and NASCAR races since opening in 1997, could not be operated with "an acceptable return" according to its owners.

SPECIAL TUNING EXPANDS

Special Tuning UK is set to expand to a two-car line-up for next year's British Touring Car Championship. The team, which ran Tom Boardman to ninth place in the independents' championship this year, is also switching to NGTC-spec engines for 2011.

PLATO FOR RoC

British Touring Car champion Jason Plato is the latest driver to sign up for the Race of Champions in Dusseldorf. He will partner Andy Priaulx in the Team GB line-up in the Nations' Cup.

BUENOS AIRES DROPPED

Buenos Aires has been dropped from next year's World Touring Car Championship calendar over fears that work needed to re-homologate the track for international racing would not be completed on time. Zolder in Belgium has replaced it.

IDAFAR STEPS UP

Reigning British Formula 3 National Class Champion Menasheh Idafar



will graduate to the main class in 2011 after confirming a deal to continue with race-winning team T-Sport. The British-born Bahraini (above) has tested extensively with the Brackley squad since the end of the 2010 season and drove at Donington Park last week alongside Chinese driver Adderly Fong.

WRATHALL FOR BTCC

Frank Wrathall will step up to the BTCC next year with his family-run Dynojet team. The Ginetta G50 champion will drive an NGTC-spec Toyota Avensis, but has yet to confirm what engine he would use.

MOUNTUNE BUILDS LMP2

Mountune Racing is producing an engine built to the new cost-capped LMP2 regulations. The two-litre turbo, based on the Ford Duratec engine, builds on the firm's experience with this unit in the British Touring Car Championship with the Arena Ford team.

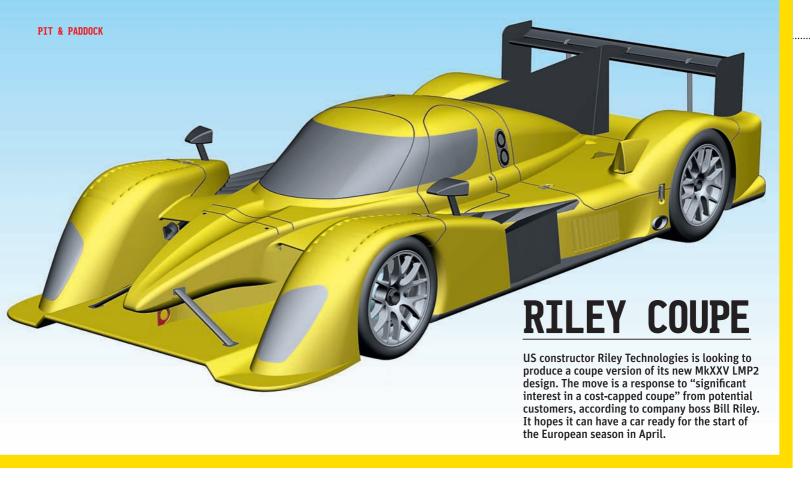
The next forum will take place in the Asia-Pacific region in April 2011 while a further event is planned for later in the same year in the Middle East.

FORMULA 3

Manufacturer target for F3

Details of FIA's plan to safeguard the category are based around attracting more engine builders

The FIA is hoping more manufacturers will be enticed into Formula 3 when it introduces a new engine formula and cost-cutting measures for 2012.

The category will introduce standardised aerodynamic parts and a more-powerful engine when the next generation of chassis comes into force.

Development of front aerodynamics, once cars have been homologated, will be limited, while the new engines will be based around the FIA's new 'world engine' concept.

The moves were agreed at a recent FIA World Motor Sport Council meeting. They are the result of two years of talks by the single-seater working group, which includes representatives of manufacturers, championships and governing bodies from around the world.

British F3 teams spokesman Peter Briggs, who has been involved in the discussions, said the new engine "could have been a 1.6-litre turbo, but we thought it would be better to have a normally-aspirated two-litre."

He said this new engine will be "50 per cent cheaper than current engines, with approximately 10 per cent more power" and would share many components with the FIA's new 1.6-litre turbocharged world engine, due to be introduced into World Touring Cars and the World Rally Championship in 2012. He said the FIA hoped this would open the door for other engine

manufacturers to join Volkswagen and Mercedes in F3.

"People doing WTCC and WRC will have many components that can be used [for F3]," said Briggs. "We hope it will bring more manufacturers into F3. It gives Ford an opportunity, BMW could do an F3 engine, Citroen and Chevy, or somebody could buy standard components, such as blocks, heads and sumps, from them and build their own."

The FIA will require constructors to homologate certain parts of their new cars' front aerodynamics, including the profile of the front wing. It hopes this will contain spiralling wind-tunnel costs without completely restricting development.

"It will restrict aero development to a certain extent but not completely," added Briggs. "We're trying to contain costs without reducing the technical inputs of race engineers.

"We don't want it to become a series where you have to have millions of pounds behind you to improve your car."





SUPERLEAGUE

Superleague secure for two years

THE FUTURE of Superleague Formula has been secured for the next two years.

The European-based series, which added two Chinese flyaway events for the first time this year, has had its business plan signed off by its major shareholder, a Luxembourg-based private-equity fund. A 2011 calendar is

expected to be revealed in the next few weeks, and is likely to feature more flyaway rounds.

Superleague CEO Alfredo Brisac told AUTOSPORT: "We have a good forecast for next year, and we are financially solid. We are committed for the next two years and we're

optimistic we'll move forward."

Brisac said the aim for next year was to break even for the first time, while its €5 million prize fund is set to be retained.



IN BRIEF



TOKAI EYES HYBRID

The Tokai University squad is aiming to run its Courage-ORECA LC70 LMP1 in hybrid configuration next year. The student-run team is working with Japanese battery company Nidec and is designing a normally-aspirated 3.4-litre powerplant based on its existing twin-turbo YGK V8.

HONDA F1 HYBRID FOR LMP1

The technology developed for the Honda Formula 1 team's stillborn hybrid system will race in an LMP1 prototype in the Intercontinental Le Mans Cup next year. The Swiss Hope PoleVision team will run the British Flybrid system in an ORECA chassis powered by a new Lehmanndeveloped four-cylinder turbo engine.

PETIT NOT CONFIRMED ON ILMC

Petit Le Mans has yet to be confirmed on the Intercontinental Le Mans Cup schedule for next year. That should happen in early December once the date for the Chinese event is firmed up. The planned race in Japan at Fuji looks unlikely and there will instead be an extra race in Europe in July.

NO ILMC DRIVERS' CROWN

It has been decided not to introduce a drivers' title for the ILMC in 2011. The decision follows discussions with the manufacturers, according to the ACO.

LE MANS TEST DAY IN APRIL

The Le Mans Test Day, which is returning next year after a two-year absence, will take place on April 24.

F2 JOINS GT OPEN

The Formula 2 championship will partner with International GT Open next year after splitting with the World Touring Car Championship last week. The series released an eight-round calendar last week, featuring five current grand prix circuits.

BRIT STEPS UP WITH ATECH

British driver Nick Yelloly has joined Atech CRS for the 2011 GP3 season. The 19-yearold won one round of the 2010 Formula Renault UK series (below) with Atech.





GM weighing up IndyCar comeback

GENERAL MOTORS has been linked to a return to the IndvCar Series.

The manufacturer, which left the series in 2005, is rumoured to be close to announcing its return to

compete against Honda.

IndyCar boss Randy Bernard did not refute the speculation entirely, opting instead to describe it as "premature".

Multiple championship-

winning IndyCar team Chip Ganassi Racing is understood to be central to GM's plans. The team had been eyeing a switch to Ford in NASCAR, but it is now set to stick with GM as part of a tie-up that

will also include IndyCar.

GM has fielded Chevroletbadged engines in Indycar racing from 1988-93, and 1997-2005. Its last Indy 500 win came with Helio Castroneves in 2002.

INDYCAR

Indy eyes extra race in Canada



THE INDYCAR Series is working to find a new Canadian race for its 2011 schedule following the shock news that Edmonton will no longer host a race.

The announcement came last week, when it was revealed that a dispute had broken out regarding funding for changes to the track. These had been requested to allow the airport where the race is held to keep one of its runways open.

Series boss Randy Bernard is keen to retain a presence in Canada, which currently only has the Toronto race on the 2011 schedule.

"My immediate thought is that we want to keep two events in Canada because we have such a solid fan base," said Bernard. "It was a shot out of the blue and I'm extremely disappointed, but we'll see what we can do.'

It is understood that the Edmonton race promoter is working on putting something together in Quebec, a project in which Bernard has expressed interest.

RS Spyder to stop racing



THE DOOR has been closed on Porsche's RS Spyder LMP2 prototype continuing its competition career next season.

Team CytoSport, a race winner in the American Le Mans Series with the RS Spyder in 2010, had been hoping to run the car in LMP1, and at least one other team had expressed interest in fielding a car in North America. Now Porsche has decided that the stock of spare parts necessary to allow the car to continue to race will not be manufactured.

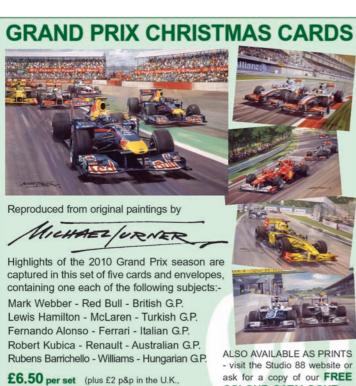
Porsche motorsport boss Hartmut Kristen said: "I cannot go to my board and argue the case for €10 million of parts to be put on the shelf. Therefore the

RS Spyder will not race again at a professional level."

CytoSport had been close to reaching an agreement with the ALMS organiser to run its RS Spyder in the LMP1 class in 2011. It would not have upgraded to the bigger wheels and tyres allowed in P1 and would have run below the 900kg minimum weight limit.

Romain Dumas, who won the ALMS LMP2 title in a Penske-run Spyder in 2007-08, described the Porsche as "a great car" and "my favourite prototype".

CytoSport driver Klaus Graf explained that team boss Greg Pickett was still considering his options for 2011.

ormula 3 Euro Series
champion Edoardo Mortara
had his first taste of a DTM
car last month in the

Championship as part of his bid to
land a drive with Audi for 2011.

As part of his prize for winning the Euro Series, the Volkswagenaffiliated driver will be part of Audi's young driver evaluation test this winter. And he was offered the chance to drive an older-spec Audi in the six-hour race at Brno because several of the yet-to-be-named drivers he will be up against at the test will already have experience of DTM machinery.

"It was a great opportunity because I'm really looking to enter the DTM next year," Mortara told



AUTOSPORT. "It's a big option for me, so to drive the car was good. I know Audi tries to find the top young drivers, so I will try to impress these people. It's a big opportunity for me to be a professional driver, and you don't get chances like that every year."

Mortara, who will defend his crown at the Macau Formula 3 Grand Prix later this month, added that he was surprised by the level of performance in the DTM car.

"I was thinking that a DTM car is just a big touring car, so a bit like a road car," he added. "But it's very particular, more like a formula car. It's weird, because what they have achieved with these cars is really impressive. It has so much grip, the brakes work really well, and you can feel the downforce.

"A six-hour race was not ideal, because in an endurance race it is not about showing the pace you are capable of. But it was good to avoid making mistakes and get some confidence with the car so that I can be on the same level as the guys who have driven DTM cars before."

AF Corse eyes LMP2

THE CRACK AF Corse GT squad is on course to expand into the prototype ranks next season.

The Italian team, which claimed a hat-trick of FIA GT drivers' crowns in 2006-08, has "quite definite" plans to graduate to LMP2 in 2011, according to team boss Amato Ferrari. He said that the team had "an opportunity to do LMP2 in the Le Mans Series with a client".

Ferrari said he was reviewing a number of chassis/engine combinations for the potential move,

including the Lola-Judd/BMW package. He explained that he would be heading to the UK this month to talk to chassis and engine producers before making a final decision.

Speculation that the team could use a Ferrari V8 engine, either from the existing 430 or next year's 458, was dismissed by the AF boss.

AF will continue to represent Ferrari in the LMS with its new 458 GT Endurance contender. Formula 1 test driver Giancarlo Fisichella is likely to remain part of the team.







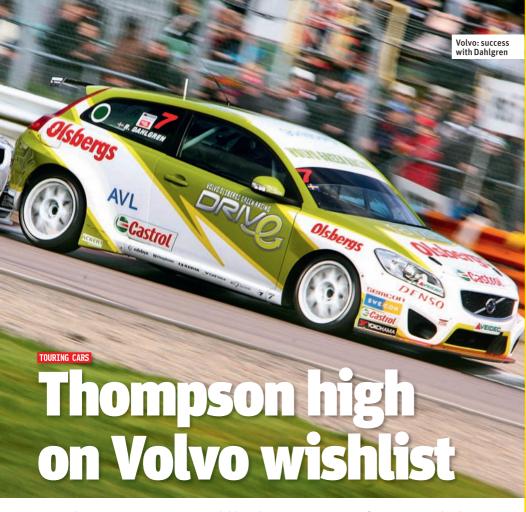

Scandinavian campaign could lead to WTCC return for ex-British champion

uropean Touring Car Cup champion James Thompson is high on Volvo's wanted list for next year's Scandinavian tin-top series.

The Polestar Engineeringrun team, which ran Robert Dahlgren to this year's Scandinavian crown and won the 2009 Swedish title with Tommy Rustad, has targeted two-time British champion Thompson as it seeks a more international driver line-up.

Team principal Christian Dahl told AUTOSPORT: "We



have spoken to a couple of drivers about the Scandinavian Touring Car Cup in 2011 and James is one of them. He is clearly very good and someone we would love to have in our team."

Dahl, whose squad will run a one-car works World Touring Car effort next year for Dahlgren in addition to its STCC commitments, said Thompson could form part of an expanded line-up on the world stage in future.

"It is our intention, if the WTCC programme is successful, to run three cars in the WTCC in 2012, and I don't think we would be allowed [by Volvo] to run just Scandinavian drivers," he added. It would be good to have a British guy with a big experience in touring cars." Thompson has raced sporadically in Scandinavia for the past three years and only missed out on the 2009 Danish Touring Car title when he skipped the last two rounds due to prior commitments in the Australian V8 Supercar series.

The 36-year-old, who has raced in both the ETC and in Denmark for the Hartmann Honda squad this year, is excited by Volvo's plans.

Thompson said: "I've always said I want to be involved with a manufacturer programme that has legs. And Volvo certainly looks that way.

"Christian and I had some good talks and we get on well as people, so we'll see how things progress. It certainly interests me." NASCA

RPM fights on

TROUBLED NASCAR team Richard Petty Motorsports is set to complete the remaining races of the 2010 season.

The four-car squad's future is in serious doubt following financial woes triggered by team owner George Gillett's recent sale of Liverpool Football Club for a much smaller amount than he was hoping for.

The team's vice-president of competition Robbie Loomis confirmed last weekend that it will keep racing to the end of the 2010 season thanks to help from Ford and rival team owners such as chassis supplier Jack Roush.

Minority owner Richard Petty continues to work on saving the team in the long-term, and he described plans to downscale to a two-car team in 2011 as "still in limbo".

"We thought it was done last week," Petty said. "And last week we thought it was done the week before. I don't know what we've got to do to make it work."

Busch gets in finger trouble

NASCAR COULD take action against Kyle Busch after the Sprint Cup star made a rude gesture to an official at Texas Speedway last Sunday.

The 25-year-old was livid when he was penalised for speeding in the pits as he tried to rejoin the track in front of the pace car. Busch was brought into the pits to be held for a lap, and was caught on camera making the gesture to the official, who was stood in front of his car.

Busch's team boss JD Gibbs acknowledged that his driver needs to calm down, but he also hopes that the matter is finished with.

"When things don't go well in the car, there's a frustration there," said Gibbs. "He's matured in a lot of areas, and that's something he's going to have to continue to work on. I think he knows that. I'd be surprised if there's any more penalties coming."



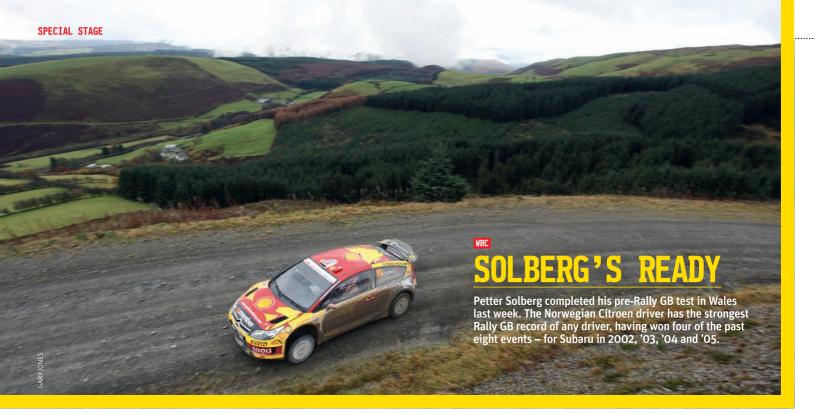

Hirvonen: I need Rally GB result

Ford WRC ace wants to finish the 2010 season – his worst for five years – with a strong performance in Wales finale

ord's Mikko Hirvonen is chasing a return to form on this week's Rally GB, following the Finn's worst WRC season in five years.

The 30-year-old, who came within a point of beating Sebastien Loeb to last year's drivers' title, is 137 points adrift of the Frenchman in sixth place in the standings ahead of the Cardiff-based finale. Hirvonen, who hasn't finished lower than third in the championship since 2005, has only been on the podium twice so far this year, and not since the Rally of Turkey in April.

"I'm definitely looking forward to seeing the end of this season," he said. "Rally GB is an event I like and it's a good chance for me to be fighting again and to go into the closed season in a really good frame of mind. I'm definitely fighting for the win and if I can't win, I want to be fighting at the front all of the time."

Hirvonen admits that victory this weekend will be a special target for several drivers, as it is the last event of the two-litre World Rally Car era.

"Everybody will want to win this one," he said. "I will start from number six on the road, which is not the best place. But I'm determined to be fighting. Sometimes, no matter how hard I tried, I just couldn't do good enough times this year. Everything just worked out [in 2009], but this time I haven't been so relaxed, I've been frustrated and then pushing

too hard and over-driving. Now I'm going to put all of that behind me and focus on Rally GB."

Hirvonen added that, despite his place on the road, he was hoping for traditional Rally GB weather.

"I remember when we did Rally GB and there was dust," he said. "That's not right, I didn't like that. This is Rally GB, we need the mud and the rain and the fog, that's what this event is all about and it's what we expect."

Hirvonen's team principal Malcolm Wilson has backed the 12-time rally winner to find his form again in Wales.

"Mikko is so mentally strong," said Wilson, "there's no doubt he'll be back. His year has been totally out of character with his career

path with us. Some of the problems have been brought on by us maybe not being as competitive as we should have been. And some of it's been down to him. But he's known as iceman in the team and he will be back."

Mikkelsen said: "We have no deal done for next year, but we are looking at Ford and Skoda. Which Skoda team is not yet certain, but either way it looks like we'll be in a very good car for next year."

Skoda UK declined to



comment on its driver line-up for next year's IRC, but MSA performance director Robert Reid admitted he would be disappointed if Mikkelsen got the Skoda UK seat instead

of a British driver.

"I don't know the ins and outs of the deal, if it's true it's a big blow," said Reid. "We have guys like Alister [McRae] and Mark [Higgins] at the top of their careers,

then we have guvs like **Alastair Fisher and Adam** Gould pretty much ready for the drive and some really talented guys like Elfyn [Evans] and John MacCrone on the lower rungs of the ladder."

That's right, Ford's current lead driver has scored 12 WRC wins — the same as Marcus Gronholm, but he has more runner-up spots than the elder of the two Finns.

And, in Wales this week, Hirvonen will live up to that mantle. He is an enormously proud Ford driver and he understands the weight of expectation that comes with his name at the top of a list featuring his heroes.

If Hirvonen doesn't deliver in Wales, he could be in for a long and very discontented winter. But the signs are good. By his own admission, he's seen the tougher side of the sport this season and he's ready to come out fighting in Cardiff. It's his last chance to beat Sebastien Loeb in a two-litre car. Can he do it? We'll see on Sunday.

The other big story this week is the news that Skoda UK is expected to sign Andreas Mikkelsen for its IRC programme. There will be understandable outrage at a British driver missing out but, just to play devil's advocate, Skoda UK is not beholden to anybody in British motorsport. It simply wants a Union Flag on the flanks of the winning Fabia in Monte Carlo. And if King Harald of Norway's invasion of 1066 had been more successful, Mikkelsen might have ticked all the boxes...

QUALIFYING

Superb Hulkenberg takes advantage of unique set of circumstances - and delivers

"Well, he made us all look pretty average there today," said Mark Webber of Nico Hulkenberg's sensational pole position lap, Williams's first in five years. "He found a different racetrack to the rest of us."

Even had Hulkenberg not completed his final lap, the one that was 1.1s better than anyone else's, he'd have still been on pole. He's always been a superb wet-weather performer, but he was aided further here by a Williams that was consistently strong in such green track conditions. Only with five minutes to go in Q3 was there a dry line amid the damp - so the surface was as green as it could be. The FW32 has repeatedly shown strongly in such conditions through the year and it's only as the track rubbers in that its balance tends to fall away. That didn't get to happen and Hulkenberg – using much more wing than team-mate Rubens Barrichello - took full advantage, making the switch to slicks that crucial half-lap later than Rubens, who had been the first to try it. Parts of the track were still crazily slippery and Barrichello lost 17s on his out-lap compared to Hulkenberg through being trapped in traffic and then sliding off. "I couldn't get the tyres back up to temperature after that," shrugged Rubens with a smile after qualifying sixth, 1.7s slower. "But I am genuinely delighted for Nico. He's an excellent driver and really deserves his place in F1."

"Yeah, they're all happy for me today," smiled Hulkenberg, "But they'll be trying to destroy me tomorrow." He was the next to try slicks - the softer option tyre - after his team-mate, and with hindsight it was the perfect moment, not quite so slippery on the out-lap as for Rubens, but early enough that he got in an extra lap over those who changed subsequently. "They didn't tell me that I was already on pole as I began the last lap," he beamed, "just that my times were good. So I just set about maximising everything on that last lap." It was a monster of a lap, super-aggressive, dancing improvisation and totally committed. In the annals of Williams history it's right up there with Keke Rosberg, Silverstone 1985.

In between the two Williamses lay the four realistic title contenders in the order of Sebastian Vettel, Webber, Lewis Hamilton and Fernando Alonso. The Red Bull drivers were separated by a tenth, possibly the difference between Webber being baulked on his previous lap by Felipe Massa's Ferrari and not therefore having a safe banker lap before he began his final one. Vettel fell a little foul of traffic too, but both were relieved to have at least avoided the obvious potential for disaster as the track was on the margins for inters at the start of Q1 and with that tricky crossover in Q3.





Hamilton felt his tyres were not fully up to temperature as he began his crucial final lap and was, if anything, relieved not to have ended up further back than fourth: "I was one of the earliest to begin my final lap and as the track was improving fast, that was a bit of a disadvantage. I think second or third was achieveable had it not been for that, but no way could I have done Hulkenberg's time."

Alonso's Ferrari was 0.4s adrift of Vettel, slightly disappointing after its practice form. The Ferrari was just not in its element in a situation that demanded it get its tyres quickly up to temperature. "It wasn't a great lap," admitted Alonso. "I got out of the dry line at one place and lost a lot of time. It could have been worse though." Felipe Massa is invariably even more adversely afflicted than his team-mate when getting the tyres up to temperature is

critical – and he duly struggled, after having been every bit as fast as Alonso in dry practice. He only just scraped into Q3 and proceeded to qualify ninth.

The Renault R3O's f-duct was working extremely well in the long slog from Juncao to the Senna Esses, consistently the fastest in the final sector. It was less happy through the twisty bits, but this was enough for both cars to make it to Q3, where Robert Kubica went seventh, three places and 1.1s ahead of Vitaly Petrov. "It was hard to get temperature in the tyres," said Robert, "and our [low] downforce level didn't help." Petrov failed to improve his inters time when he switched to slicks.

Michael Schumacher was the only Mercedes driver to make it through to the run-off, Nico Rosberg victim of being baulked in Q2 by Sebastien Buemi's Toro Rosso when his inters were at their best. Michael, eighth fastest, was a little mystified as to why he suddenly dropped further away from the frontrunning pace on the Q3 final lap. "I can only assume that as I moved over for the Red Bulls the lap before, my tyres lost temperature," he said.

Jenson Button had a fairly disastrous day, failing to make Q3 and starting 11th. Tyre and brake temperature was again his bugbear in a continuation of his Korea race. He was still experimenting with an innovation connected with how the brake bias changes as the speed bleeds off, in its progression from front-biased at high speed, migrating rearwards as the speed and downforce reduce. Having loved the feel of it in the McLaren simulator when working as it should, he was determined to try and make the system work, though it was still proving problematic here.

Kamui Kobayashi's Sauber, Rosberg's delayed Mercedes, the Toro Rossos of Jaime Alguersuari and Sebastien Buemi, Nick Heidfeld's Sauber and Tonio Liuzzi's Force India filled out the Q2 mid-grid, with Buemi taking a five-place penalty for his race incident in Korea.









After rain in qualifying, the race was held with ambient temperatures in the mid-20s and track temperatures of around 50 degrees.

he day in Sao Paulo dawned sunny, the skies stayed blue and, despite the promise of incident suggested by the grid and championship dynamics, what played out at Interlagos was a pure expression of performance.

There was nothing to complicate a resounding Red Bull one-two, Sebastian Vettel ahead of Mark Webber. It was the appropriate way for the team to clinch its first constructors' world championship. Anything less than that with such a car would have been unjust.

The other podium finisher, Fernando Alonso, afterwards reasoned that his Ferrari was comparably quick, and only denied a crack at the Red Bull pair through losing 10 seconds early on passing Lewis Hamilton's McLaren and Nico Hulkenberg's Williams. But that was just championship propaganda talk.

Yes, the Ferrari set a faster race lap than either Red Bull, as Alonso tried putting some late pressure on Webber, but it was a false picture. The lap came late in the race with the track at its fastest when the Red Bulls were playing safe. Webber's engine was running hot — low water pressure – and he was nursing it. Ahead, Vettel just needed to measure his pace to Webber.

When they were all running in clear air earlier in the race, the RB6s had around 0.5s on the Ferrari. Webber and Vettel were only fourth and sixth in the fastest-race-lap list with bests of 1m14.0s, but extrapolate that early race pace to the faster track and they could surely have lapped in the low 1m13s. Realistically it was the fastest car by a substantial margin around Interlagos, fast enough that the required one-two result in Abu Dhabi - Webber ahead if Alonso finishes third - for the drivers' championship looks quite feasible, even if the numbers do appear to heavily favour Alonso.

Fastest car or no, Vettel and Webber still needed to clear the pole-position Williams of Nico Hulkenberg sooner rather than later. When Hulkenberg got a little too much wheelspin at the start, Vettel was upon him immediately. He thrust the Red Bull to the left, Nico squeezing him towards the pit wall, Seb coming through regardless, into

the lead through the Senna Esses.

Webber had his hands full fending off Hamilton. The McLaren was actually ahead on the outside, but tucked back in quite early – a meek action by Hamilton standards, and one that left Webber free to get a run on Hulkenberg's second place down to Turn 4. Mark induced Nico into braking just a little too late by dummying an attempt on the corner's entry. Instead, he then lined himself up for the exit so that as the Williams ran a little wide, Webber was through as they dived down the hill. It was a beautifully executed

move, old hand against young gun.

Hamilton wasn't liking the messages he was getting from the McLaren and it looked a gripless handful, reluctant to turn in. Then, when the fronts did grip, so the sudden turn-in would upset the rear. Understeer in, oversteer mid-corner, Lewis looking like a sitting duck to the following Alonso, who tried getting inside at Turn 5 as the McLaren twitched, obliging Lewis to brave it out on the exit – which he did. He was safe from attack through the no-passing zone of the twisty middle section, but

He did it repeatedly until on the seventh lap the Williams, with much the same handling traits as Hamilton's car, twitched evilly on the entry to T4 and Alonso was through to third. He crossed the line at the end of that lap 9.5s off Vettel's lead, 7s adrift of Webber. In free air now,

we'd see what the Ferrari might have. Answer: no better than mid-1m17s at a time when the Red Bulls were about to break into the 1m16s.

It's not that the Red Bulls were at full stretch in these early laps either. "I was being careful not to take too much out of the tyres," said Vettel, "because you never know when a safety car can take your gap away and you need to have some rubber left." Webber was running at much the same pace, once Seb had established a 2.5s gap in the first five laps. Vettel was right to be watchful of the rubber for, with a track temperature nudging 50-deg C, the super-soft almost everyone was on at this stage was a little fragile. Get it too hot and the grip would fade quite dramatically.

Hamilton's car was gradually improving and he was able to start hustling Hulkenberg in much the same way Alonso had, but this time there were no holes in Nico's defence. Stuck behind the Williams, Hamilton was losing touch with Alonso, the Ferrari pulling away from the dicing pair at around 1s per lap.

Back in 10th place after being passed on lap three by Michael Schumacher, Jenson Button gave every sign of being able to go faster than the cars immediately ahead of him – but he was trapped. McLaren took a strategy gamble and brought Button in at the end of the 11th lap, seemingly committing him to a 60-lap stint on the mediums. Ross Brawn and the Mercedes crew looked on and debated whether to make a reaction stop with Schumacher, but decided against it. "We thought Jenson would be held up in traffic," said Brawn, "so we chose not to respond." It was a mistake, for Button dropped into a nice 5s cushion of clear air and was able to use the few laps of new-tyre boost to lap significantly quicker than Schuey, enough for Jenson to subsequently leapfrog ahead when Michael stopped on lap 20.

Felipe Massa's Ferrari crew had also watched Button's early stop with interest and, unlike Mercedes, decided to respond. Massa, who had been running eighth behind Robert Kubica (Renault) and Rubens Barrichello (Williams), came in on the next lap and got underway again on a new set of mediums, stationary for just 3.3s and getting out still just ahead of the McLaren. It was a mighty quick stop, perhaps too much so, for the right-front wheelnut had been cross-threaded. Immediately feeling the loose wheel, Massa was back in on the next lap. The second stop left him fighting with the likes of Sebastien Buemi in the lower reaches, his day ruined.

Next in the cascade of stops triggered was Barrichello, the Williams pitting in response to Massa's original stop. Rubens too suffered a cross-threaded nut — in this case on the right-rear, but it was spotted, the car held stationary while a replacement was fitted. This lost him around 8s, dropping him behind Button. He'd later be forced to pit again, dropping out of contention after puncturing a tyre against Jaime Alguersuari's Toro Rosso. They were dropping like flies ahead of Button,

Hulkenberg's pitting finally put Hamilton in clear air. He began lapping just a couple of tenths slower than Alonso, but those laps behind the Williams had left him 11s adrift of the Ferrari. They had also potentially put him on course to be leapfrogged by Button, a tricky situation for McLaren to manage.

On the 17th lap Button suddenly dropped over 1s off his earlier pace,

before then resuming lapping just as quickly as Hamilton up ahead. That brief easing-off had the effect of creating just enough of a margin to bring Hamilton in on the 20th lap without being leapfrogged by his team-mate. With the championship situation as it was, that was important – for Hamilton still had a chance, Button realistically did not.

Alonso came in on the 24th lap, resuming without losing his third place, the leader Vettel on the 25th, Webber on the 26th. The Red Bulls resumed still less than 3s apart. Ten seconds behind Alonso ran Hamilton and Button. Staying out long had worked for Nico Rosberg, the Merc emerging ahead of team-mate Schumacher and the Hulkenberg/Kubica train that was delayed firstly by emerging behind Kubica's yet-to-stop team mate Vitaly Petrov, then by the longrunning Force India of Adrian Sutil.

Kamui Kobayashi and Sutil had each started the race on the harder tyre - the only ones to do so - and accordingly did very long first stints, temporarily putting them in the points places. The Sauber stayed out until lap 48, forcing Hamilton and Button to pass it, while Sutil's slow pace ruined the strategies of Hulkenberg and Kubica, allowing Rosberg to leapfrog them. Rosberg also emerged from his stop ahead of team-mate Schumacher and, with the stops all done, the Mercs were in sixth and seventh. Hulkenberg in eighth continued to endure difficult handling and also now a fairly serious vibration. Kubica was potentially much quicker, but was running out of revs very early into the straight, having guessed too short on his top gear ratio, and was

therefore unable to pass.

Up front, the Red Bulls looked locked into a stalemate. Webber had received a worrying call: turn the engine down, it's running too hot.

The telemetry was also showing a significant drop in the water pressure. Mark complied and, as such, Vettel judged his pace back to his team-mate. This was still enough to extend the gap over Alonso. On lap 37 they began to lap backmarkers, Bruno Senna's HRT holding up both Red Bulls in turn, causing the gap between them to fluctuate. Webber was sensing an opportunity as they then caught a big gaggle of cars and, low engine setting notwithstanding, he began pushing hard. By lap 45 he had the gap down to just 1.5s and he was getting messages that his front tyres were beginning to run hot. If he could just pass his team-mate here, it would make his task in Abu Dhabi vastly easier. But it wasn't to be. That was as close as he got.

On lap 49 some sort of front suspension failure sent Tonio Liuzzi's Force India hard into the barriers at the bottom of the Senna Esses. "The car just suddenly sat down on the left," he reported. The wrecked machine, minus its

The timing of it left the fourth and fifth-place McLarens with a big gap over the two Mercs, and there was no downside to bringing Hamilton in for a new set of tyres, ready to attack Alonso on the restart. It was done without losing a place. Mercedes brought Rosberg in too, in readiness to attack Button on the restart. But there was a radio communication problem between engineer Jock Clear and the mechanics over which tyres Rosberg should go on: the Merc boys readied mediums, not the super-softs Clear had requested. Under the safety car, and with the gap they had, they were able to refit the old tyres, send him on his way and ready the super-softs while he did another lap before pitting again for the correct tyres. This lost him a place only to team-mate Schumacher - and Michael would kindly wave him through once racing resumed. On the downside, Rosberg's change was neutralised by McLaren bringing in Button in response for a similar change to fresh super-softs, Jenson getting out without losing his fifth place.

Unfortunately, all the potentially interesting restart contests - Vettel v Webber, Alonso v Hamilton in particular – were spoilt by having lapped cars between them. So Vettel easily maintained his lead over Webber, Alonso, Hamilton and Button. The pace of the first three was massively faster than it had been before the safety car, this rather foiling McLaren's plan to have an advantage from its new tyres. "The new-tyre boost was hardly any bigger than how much faster the old cooled tyres were than when they were hot," lamented the team's Paddy Lowe. It was enough though in combination with the Red Bulls' cruise mode when the track was at its fastest – for Hamilton to set the race's fastest lap, precisely

0.004s quicker than Alonso's best.

"Everyone's tyres were probably running too hot before the safety car," said Bridgestone's Hirohide Hamashima, "and running slowly will have cooled them into a better temperature range. Also during that time the track temperature was falling."

The Red Bulls cantered away, aided by the seven lapped cars between Webber and Alonso. By the time the Ferrari had dealt with them, Webber was 7s clear and Red Bull had an easy one-two. In not swapping Vettel and Webber around, had Red Bull just handed the title to Alonso? On the other hand, if the team had switched them, could post-Abu Dhabi hindsight reveal that to have been the thing that prevented Vettel from beating Alonso to the world championship? For the time being there is no way of knowing what the right thing to have done will turn out to be. As Webber said: "Today was all about the team."

So, Red Bull is a world champion team in just its sixth season. Young though the squad is, Vettel was still a Red Bull-backed kid on the sport's nursery slopes when the entity embarked upon its F1 adventure. "I remember my first trip to the factory," he said. "I had just got my drivers' licence and I drove to England, to Milton Keynes, and if I compare the place back then to now it is massive progress. I was a little boy. Someone showed me around and I was fascinated, sparks in my eyes. Looking up to Formula 1 and now to be part of the team and part of the driver line-up to give them their first championship is incredible."

Watching an emotional Christian Horner and Adrian Newey hugging each other, knowing the huge strains placed upon the team this year, it was impossible to disagree. The best car has won. Just one contest left to settle... 30

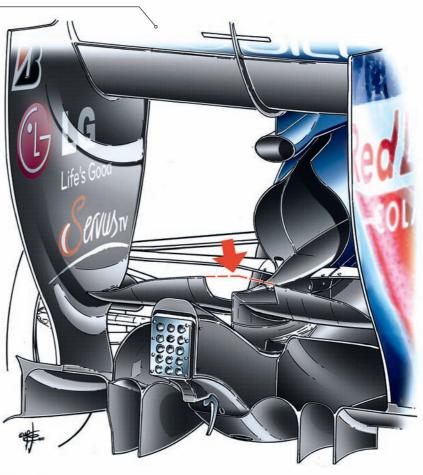


Gary Anderson, Mark Hughes and Giorgio Piola reveal some of the tweaks made by Red Bull, Ferrari and Williams in Brazil

RED BULL REAR WING

Red Bull experimented on Friday with a rear beam wing on Vettel's car that featured a cut area in the delta section. It was discarded and the conventional component was used on both cars for the rest of the weekend.

GARY ANDERSON: This section is also behind the large rearward-facing hole in the engine cover that is used as the exit for the hot air from the radiators. Every team searches around its cars to optimise the aerodynamic efficiency for any given circuit and I would imagine that since Interlagos is not a maximum-downforce circuit Red Bull was experimenting to see if this was the best compromise between downforce to drag level and cooling.



WILLIAMS REAR BRAKE DUCT

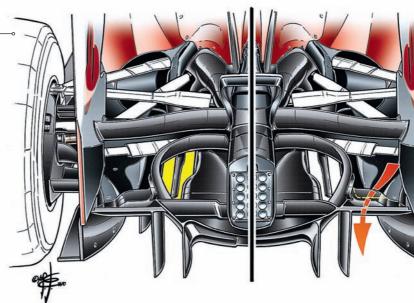
The Williams FW32 featured extra downforce-producing devices on its rear brake ducts.

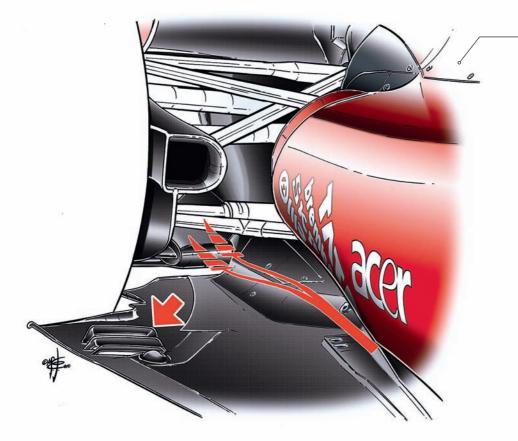
GARY ANDERSON: Williams has pioneered brake-duct downforce gizmos. This has become very intricate but I have to ask the question: when is a brake duct a brake duct? The regulations state that all bodywork, aerodynamic devices etc must be mounted on the sprung mass of the car, that is other than the brake ducts, which are allowed to be located both front and rear in a certain-size box area. What they look like and what they do aside from cooling the brakes is then up to the teams. The air comes in through a small opening at the front of the duct, passes through the disc and calliper area – the barrel-shaped device around the brake disc is there to force the hot air through the outside of the wheel. Perfect, and in my book that's called brake cooling. However, the multitude of turning vanes mounted on the inside of the brake-duct surface are downforce-producing devices, working in conjunction with the outer section of the diffuser. The aerodynamic force they create goes directly into the tyre as opposed to other aerodynamic devices that must be mounted on the sprung mass. The force from these ducts, being unsprung, goes directly through the suspension system to the tyres.

FERRARI DIFFUSER

Ferrari continues apace with its diffuser development. The left side shows how it used to be, the right side as it was configured in Brazil. The top of the side channel had been extended, the trailing edge of the central section was further incorporated and the small plate on the outer wall was removed. Plans to bring a main plane blown version of the f-duct system were canned.

GARY ANDERSON: The outer side channels where Giorgio has very neatly indicated the direction of the airflow with a red arrow is where the exhaust gas is trained upon. Having the high-speed gasses working on the under surface of this section of the diffuser increases the downforce especially at high rear ride heights (ie in slow corners or under braking). This gives the car more rear-end stability under braking. This section has been extended, the yellow line showing the original length. More surface area means that little bit more downforce. This picture is actually a very good illustration of how the complete double-diffuser system and the turning vanes on the inner surface of the rear brake ducts all work together in conjunction with the lower beam wing.





FERRARI FLOOR LOUVRES

Ferrari introduced a third louvre to the floor ahead of the rear tyre.

GARY ANDERSON: As the airflow is displaced by the rear-tyre contact patch it is forced around the sides of the tyre. This is quite high-speed/high-energy airflow and these louvres in the floor surface allow flow from the top of the floor through to the under surface. The flow through the radiused, leading edge of each one of these louvres will create a low-pressure area under this small area of the floor creating more overall downforce. Developments like this give a very small return but to keep up with the Joneses – or in this case Red Bull – Ferrari knows it will have to push in every area that it can to find improvement.

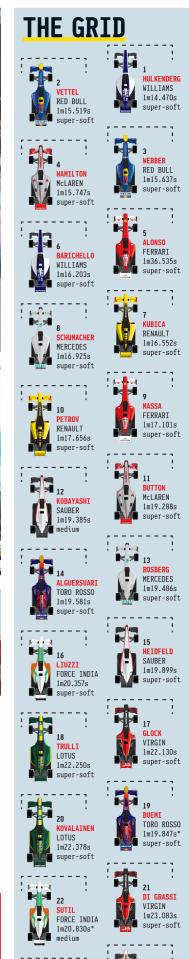

The silence is broken by an engine stuttering against a pitlane limiter, then around the turn comes Webber (mood of blue), sun glinting off polished surfaces, a practice start from the end of the pitlane, rev-limited engine double echoing around the bowl. Then Vettel (orange) calm and smooth, Hamilton (red), blips of throttle to control the understeer even when still in the pit exit. Alonso (bright green circle of a laser-gun sight) and Massa (sunny yellow, happy to be at home) follow in short order.

Peugeot won the Intercontinental Le Mans Cup with victory at Zhuhai - but only after a bit of intra-team gamesmanship

eugeot won the final round of the inaugural Intercontinental Le Mans Cup at Zhuhai. Fact.
But did the French marque deserve to win in China last weekend? That's a more complicated question, because Peugeot was hit by misfortune and received a slice of good fortune all at the same time.

Franck Montagny and Stephane Sarrazin needed a helping hand twice over to beat the Audi R15-plus TDI driven by Tom Kristensen and Allan McNish to claim a narrow victory in China. And the first of those was a byproduct of an incident that put the car that was on course to win out of contention.

That car, the second Peugeot 908 HDi driven by Sebastien Bourdais, still had a major role to play in the Zhuhai 1000Km. It backed up Kristensen — inadvertently if you believe the French team — before, during and after Sarrazin's last pitstop.

Bourdais and co-driver Simon Pagenaud looked set to win on Sunday. Their 908 was slower than that of their team-mates, but by design. They were on a different strategy to Montagny and Sarrazin, one that would have allowed them to complete the race with one fewer pitstops than the other turbodiesels.

Bourdais was 16 seconds behind Kristensen and closing when he went for the outside of Martin Ragginger in the second of the Felbermayr-Proton Porsches at Zhuhai's left-right chicane. The Porsche sideswipped the Pug and then thumped it hard in the left rear as Ragginger spun.

Ragginger admitted he'd been caught by surprise by the 908, suggesting that it would have been more normal to overtake on the inside. Bourdais said he couldn't believe the Porsche driver hadn't seen him because he'd "flashed him a million times".

No matter whose fault it was, it was an error of judgement by Bourdais. One that probably cost him and Pagenaud victory and suddenly allowed Sarrazin and Montagny back in.

Sarrazin and Montagny, the Peugeot pairing on the more aggressive strategy, were in the lead for much of the first two thirds of the race. A superfast final third of a triple stint from McNish leapfrogged the best of the Audis ahead of this Peugeot and then an off-track excursion by Montagny left the car just

over half a minute behind when the yellow flags came out in the wake of the Bourdais incident.

It was a confused period with two safety cars, hardly necessary around the 2.68-mile Zhuhai, but the end result was a reduction of Kristensen's advantage to just 13sec. The Audi stopped first, with 25 laps to go, whereas the Peugeot would make its final stop, just a splash-and-dash, with a dozen laps left.

Sarrazin just made it out of the pits ahead of the Audi, by two seconds in fact. Or about the same amount that Kristensen had lost behind Bourdais on the previous lap. It wasn't a quick lap by the former grand prix driver,

who Peugeot claimed was suffering from an overheating problem.

Bourdais, engine problem or not, then upped his pace just enough to keep Kristensen behind, at least until Sarrazin was five seconds up the road. He then let the Dane past, but by then the race was over.

McNish wasn't happy.

"Whoever was ahead after the final pitstops was going to win," said McNish. "Tom had to maximise everything to do it, but we never to got to find out."

It was another superlative performance from Audi, the Joest team and the drivers. They'd looked out of it after Kristensen's first double stint, but a change in strategy turned the best of the German cars into at least a match for the 908s.

Audi opted against continuing to double-stint its tyres and switched to single runs on the mediumcompound Michelin.

"It meant we didn't have to try to look after our tyres," explained McNish, "and could be much more aggressive."

There was no doubt that it worked, a least on his car. Rinaldo Capello and Romain Dumas were running a significantly different set-up and couldn't extract the same

BMW beats Ferrari and Porsche in final class war

The Schnitzer BMW team hadn't had a great season racing to Le Mans rules in 2010 prior to last weekend, but everything came together in Zhuhai. Jorg Muller and Dirk Werner led most of the way aboard their V8-engined M3 to take a clear GT2 victory.

Muller and Werner admittedly had it easy: their two major rivals, the lead Felbermayr-Proton Porsche and the AF Corse Ferrari, ran into problems early on. But the Schnitzer M3 was at its most competitive this year and even Felbermayr-Proton engineer Norbert Singer reckoned it would have been hard to beat.

Muller felt that the team's Dunlop tyres were crucial in the Zhuhai victory.

"The tyre worked well from the first lap to the last," he said. "That gave us the pace and for once we had a trouble-free weekend."

Felbermayr-Proton drivers Marc Lieb and Richard Lietz were out of contention before the lights turned green. Lieb made contact with Gianmaria Bruni's AF Ferrari at the end of the formation lap, the resulting puncture leaving him a minute behind.

The Porsche ended up second, three laps up on the Ferrari in third. Bruni, Toni Vilander and Jaime Melo lost



time with refuelling, brake and radiator issues.

The entire GT2 field was beaten by Porsche's experimental-class 911 GT3-R Hybrid. So economical was the car in the hands of Jorg Bergmeister and Patrick Long that it came within two laps of completing the race on three tankfuls of fuel.

performance from their R15, single stints or not.

The Zhuhai 1000Km, held in the biggest car market in the world, was all about Peugeot and Audi. The only other decent LMP1, the Drayson Lola-Judd, lost 90 minutes to a wiring-loom change, which allowed the only LMP2 in the field, OAK Racing's Pescarolo-Judd, to claim fifth overall. The race at the front should have gone to the wire. McNish reckoned it was "a bitter pill to swallow". It just wasn't, he said, "the right way to end a great season of racing".

Hamlin wins Texas spitefest



enny Hamlin has moved into the NASCAR Sprint Cup points lead following victory in an ill-tempered race at Texas Motor Speedway.

The Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota driver started way back in 28th, but steadily worked his way through the field. He made the decisive move to the front following the final restart with three laps to go, and held off a determined attack by Matt Kenseth to claim his eighth win of the season.

The result leaves Hamlin with a 33-point lead over defending champion Jimmie Johnson and 59 ahead of Kevin Harvick heading into the final two races. Johnson had a fast car in the opening stages of the race, but was losing places with slow

pitstops. So when Hendrick team-mate Jeff Gordon was wrecked in bizarre circumstances under yellow by Childress driver Jeff Burton, the decision was made to switch pit crews.

Gordon was so angered by Burton's move that he stormed down the track to attack his fellow Chevy driver, a pair of burly NASCAR officials having to break them up. But Gordon's crew did a great job for Johnson, who came home ninth. Harvick brushed his Chevy up against the wall in the closing stages, but it survived for him to claim sixth.

Greg Biffle was the star of the race, quickly usurping surprise poleman Elliott Sadler to take the lead. He remained out in front for

the vast majority of the race, and was particularly stellar at restarts. But on his final green-flag pitstop his Roush Ford broke second gear, making it impossible to get up to speed quickly. Nevertheless he still came home fifth.

Team-mate Kenseth came from a lap down to get within a whisker of victory, while it was a great return to form for series veteran Mark Martin, who opted against a late tyre change to take track position at the head of the field. He didn't quite have a winning pace, but third was a good result for the Hendrick Chevy veteran.

Joey Logano was arguably Biffle's closest challenger, but the Gibbs Toyota man lost track position in the

final stop and took fourth. It was a strong series debut for Wood Brothers driver Trevor Bayne, who kept his Ford on the lead lap to finish 17th.

Ford victory in Cyprus comin' Attiyah

ith the series' regular grandee drivers and teams skipping this curtain closer in Cyprus, multiple Middle-Eastern champion Nasser Al-Attivah scored a maiden IRC win in his Ford Fiesta.

The fifty-fifty gravel/ asphalt rally, run on the punishing mountain roads of the Mediterranean island nation, was blown wide open once event favourite Andreas Mikkelsen's Fiesta engine failed on a road section to the first proper stage on Friday morning.

That opened the door for Czech driver Martin Prokop in another Fiesta, but his rally had already started

badly when he broke a driveshaft in Thursday night's superspecial, and he incurred a 20s penalty for leaving service late to fix it on Friday. Leader Al-Attiyah then picked up his own 10sec penalty for a jumped start on SS6, and two punctures on the opening day's penultimate test allowed Prokop to lead.

Prokop extended his lead on Saturday morning to over 23s, Al-Attivah struggling on his choice of full-gravel tyre as the opener was a full-asphalt test, but then another driveshaft failure struck Prokop. Although Al-Attiyah lost time running in



Prokop's dust, during which he admitted to "almost going off the road three times", he eventually got ahead when Prokop spun.

Al-Attivah finished over 30s clear of Lebanon's Roger Feghali, who was driving his Skoda Fabia for only the second time. Feghali bent his left-rear suspension on the Thursday superspecial, but soldiered on and finished clear of Prokop,

whose troubled event almost ended with a huge spin on the final stage.

Prokop's team-mate Jaromir Tarabus finished fourth, ahead of Roman Kresta's Mitsubishi Lancer.

Expected frontrunner Bryan Bouffier broke the front-right suspension of his Peugeot on the first proper stage, but then set four fastest stage times.

De Oliveira seals title

oao Paulo de Oliveira secured the Nippon title in dramatic style. The Brazilian won the final race of the season in his Impul Swift-Toyota (run by Japanese legend Kazuyoshi Hoshino) at Suzuka to put himself clear of his three rivals.

The race began with just 4.5 points covering the four title contenders. The quartet had headed the first race, with Loic Duval (Dandelion Swift-Honda) winning from pole ahead of Takashi Kogure, Andre Lotterer and de Oliveira.

Polesitter de Oliveira started the second race just o.5 points clear of TOM'S driver Lotterer, but the script went out of the window early on when the Nakajima Swift-Honda of Kogure found a way past him at the start of the second lap and pulled away

to create a 9s lead in time for the pitstops.

Disaster struck for the Japanese driver when he stalled, allowing de Oliveira and Lotterer to get past.

This time, de Oliveira managed to hold on to his lead and was 2.5s clear of Lotterer when they crossed the finish line, with Kogure completing the podium in third and rueing what might have been.

Werner initially led from pole, but a drive-through penalty for a jumped start handed the advantage to Ardusso. Early pressure from Emiliano Spataro's Fiat

was alleviated by a blown tyre, but that only brought Llaver, Norberto Fontana (Ford Focus) and Yvan Muller (Chevy Vectra) into the frame. When Ardusso and Canapino were delayed by a seatbelt problem, Gialombardo – who had taken over from Llaver swept into the lead.

Fontana's co-driver Ricardo Mauricio ran third before his pace faded and their Ford fell to sixth behind Guerrieri, the Honda of Nestor Girolami/Matias Russo and the Christian Ledesma/Muller Chevrolet.

Muller aside, it was a tough day for Europeans. Alain Menu was ninth in a Chevy and Nicolas Minassian 19th in a Peugeot 307, but Stefan Johansson's Fiat and Gabriele Tarquini's Honda both retired.

Two-litre World Rally cars make their final appearance on the world stage in Wales this weekend. That's reason enough to go down to the woods, says DAVID EVANS

s far as Google Maps is concerned this doesn't exist. It's just a big white space. Actually, it's green. Dark green. Pine green. The whistling wind carries the sound of launch control, followed – 10 seconds later – by the incessant audio of engine revs and gravel on metal. It sounds like November. Minutes later and Sebastien Loeb's Citroen C4 WRC squirms beneath him as he tries to slow it down for the

hairpin left. It looks like November. And finally, the mud on the exhaust blended with the already red-hot brakes mean it smells like November.

It is November.

It is Wales Rally Great Britain.

The above scenario will be played out at junction 8 (car park B) in Hafren at just after half-nine tomorrow (Friday) morning. If you're not going, you must be mad.

There were worries that Loeb's

securing of a seventh straight drivers' title in France last month would ruin the rest of the world championship year. Forget it. It's revived it.

Loeb says: "I want to win in Wales. That's why I'm going. I drive to win."

The Frenchman's blistering win on the previous round in Catalunya is proof enough that there's no chance of his right foot lifting. As far as he's concerned, a 94th career podium would be nice; a 25th second place would be worth turning up for, but why have 61 world rally championship wins when you can have 62?

And the best bit is, those numbers don't really mean much to the big, little man.

His boss Olivier Quesnel (the one who calls Loeb 'the boss') says: "Sometimes I ask him, 'Hey, Seb, how many times have you won?' and, you know, he really can't remember.

Incredible. He is just incredible."

And this week he'll be incredible for you and me, in front of our very eyes.

With titles done and dusted, here's what to look out for this week.

SEBASTIEN VERSUS SEBASTIEN

You'll have read on these pages how those involved have tried to defuse the developing edge between Loeb and his team-mate Sebastien Ogier. Forget it. Ogier's desperate — desperate — to put one over on Loeb come Cardiff on Sunday night; there would be no better way for the younger of the two Sebs to go into the closed season. And, on pure gravel rallies, Ogier hasn't lost to Loeb since Turkey back in April.

Some of those results, Finland and Japan in particular, can be explained by the ever so slightly conservative approach a prospective seventh championship commands. In Portugal in May, Ogier beat Loeb fair and square. Prior to that, in New Zealand, Ford's Jari-Matti Latvala won an event forever remembered for Loeb's near-unbelievable pace through day two. He'd whacked a bridge on day one and dropped to seventh. But then came fastest time after fastest time; Loeb was almost a second per mile faster than anybody else.

While jaws dropped, Ogier's shoulders shrugged as he pointed to his rival's favourable road position.

Not long afterwards, Loeb suggested Ogier might like to jump ship and drive for rivals Ford.

Make no mistake, there's definitely

needle between the two Citroendriving Frenchmen two. Enjoy the fight.

SORDO'S C4 SWANSONG

In an added twist to Citroen's tale of two Sebs, there's a Spaniard in there who's going to be fighting for his life in the WRC from tomorrow morning. Despite having started 71 rounds of the WRC in potentially rally-winning machinery, Dani Sordo's still hamstrung by a horrible, glaring zero in the column that counts. He's been replaced by Ogier for next year (the Frenchman has taken Sordo's Citroen Total WRT seat for the last three gravel rounds of the series) and, right now, Loeb's hugely likeable sidekick for the past four years is out of a drive for next year. Sordo's been accused of lacking the killer instinct a world-beater needs; if he's going to find gainful employment in the series next year, Sordo better show a matador-like mettle during the next three days.

The one thing Sordo can, sensibly speaking, be relied upon to do is to beat the man in the sister Citroen Junior Team C4 WRC: Kimi Raikkonen. The former Ferrari Formula 1 world champion will be contesting Rally GB for the first time and will, therefore, be gathering more experience rather than worrying Sordo and his mates.

FOR RED, READ BLUE

In the same way that Britain's political hues have shifted in the last 12 months, so Ford's Mikko Hirvonen and Jari-Matti Latvala will be looking to

1960 AND ALL THAT...

EVERYBODY'S HEARD OF Colin McRae. But few have heard of Jack Kemsley. There's a strong argument for suggesting McRae would never have become world champion had it not been for the intuition and dogged determination of Kemsley.

It was Kemsley who, as clerk of the course, included special stages into the route of the 1960 RAC Rally. The first of the four stages was known as Monument Hill, a flowing two-mile test on forestry commission roads near Dalmally in Scotland. You'll notice this year's itinerary includes a similarly named test on Saturday. This year's Monument Hill is a new stage, so called to mark the 50th anniversary of Kemsley's foresight.

Swede Erik Carlsson won the 1960 event in a Saab 96. Britain's Stuart Turner navigated him to a flawless win. Turner recalls: "Prior to 1960 the RAC had been a series of driving and navigation tests, but when Jack [Kemsley] got us into the forests, that's when things really changed. I don't think it's an exaggeration to say that Colin McRae wouldn't have done what he did if Jack hadn't changed British rallying."

Carlsson and Turner were the only crew to beat the three-

minute target time for Monument Hill, despite his Saab giving away bags of power to the various Austin-Healeys ranged against it. The difference was that Carlsson had grown up on the loose and he knew how hard you could push on the dirt.

The other three stages were all closed-road stages in the west of Scotland.

From 1960 onwards, the event that would become Britain's round of the world rally championship never looked back, with more and more forestry-commission stages included year on year. Ironically, this year's event includes a greater asphalt element than in previous seasons, with the Monument Hill and Four Ways Crychan stages running on sealed surfaces as well as gravel.

DAY ONE'S top tip has to be Sweet Lamb (SS3/6). You can see the cars for miles and, while it's not the most challenging of stages for the drivers (although it did catch out Mikko Hirvonen in '08, above), the jumps and watersplashes make it a gem. There's full PA commentary, too.

For those of you coming from outside Wales, Saturday's opener (SS8/12) in Radnor is a good option. It's the first time this stage has been used for years and it's the most easterly of them all - meaning easier access than most. After that, keep heading south-west and don't stop until the sea - in Cardiff. And when you're there, settle down on the dock in the Bay and watch the inaugural Cardiff Bay superspecial. Arrive there at about 1630 and you'll have an extra treat: a demo run of six of

Richard Burns's rally cars.

There's more easy access on Sunday, with the Margam Park (SS18/20) stage running closer to the M4 than any other. There's lots of great viewing to be had - and if the result goes down to the wire, you'll be ideally placed for the last-stage action.

Aside from the stages, service is also well worth a visit. It's a remote service in Builth Wells on Friday and Saturday. This means the crews can only use what they carry in the car, but they are allowed to take tyres and water from the teams. If there's a morning drama for anybody on Friday and Saturday, Builth's the place to see the drivers using their ingenuity to solve a problem. Service on Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday lunchtime is in Cardiff Bay, where there'll be loads going on outside the Millennium Centre.

Ticket prices vary from individual forest-stage access at £20 (children £1) or single-day passes for £30 (Friday and Saturday) or £20 on Sunday, to the World Rally Pass (£99) that gives access to all stages, services and superspecials.

end Citroen's two-year winning run on Rally GB. They want Cardiff painted blue, not red. And, on current form, Latvala's the man to do it. For much of the season, the younger of Ford's two Finns has had the edge over Hirvonen, the man who came within one point of beating Loeb to last year's title.

Mikko's lost his mojo for the moment, but his team-mate's certainly found his feet. The contrasting fortunes of the pair made for a stark contrast at home in Ivvaskyla. Hirvonen endured one of the biggest crashes of his life and Latvala won. Latvala's been on it ever since and Hirvonen needs to get back on it in Wales this week. He's won before, in 2007, and beating the Citroens this time would be a massive psychological boost after he was trounced in Crychan and Halfway by Loeb 12 months ago.

SOLBERG: A NORWEGIAN AT HOME

It's not very often that you ask a question beginning: "Which rally driver has been most successful..." and get an answer that doesn't contain Loeb's name. But, enquiring about a current WRC driver with the best record on Rally GB brings Petter Solberg into play. Solberg has won four of the past eight events and knows better than most what's needed to succeed in these woods. Allied to that, he has top British co-driver Chris Patterson alongside him. He drove this rally in the Citroen C4 WRC last year, so he has useable set-up data available to him - and after 12 starts on Rally GB (along with Finland, the event in which he has the most exprerience) the 2003 world champion is well versed on how to read the ever-changing grip levels when the weather turns Welsh.

A FOND FAREWELL

Ogier has flown on gravel in 2010. Keep an eye out...

And don't forget, for those of you hooked on displacement, bores, strokes and cubic capacities, this is the last time we'll be seeing World Rally Cars powered by engines offering 2000ccs. After 13 years, the current era of the WRC will be over after Rally GB. So, you'll never see Citroen's C4, Ford's Focus or Subaru's Impreza WRC at this level again, which is another reason to make sure you absolutely don't miss out on the year's best motorsport action. And, if there is anybody out there still not totally convinced, imagine Cardiff on Saturday night after Shane Williams has run in the winning try against world champions South Africa in the Millennium Stadium a few hours previously...

Or maybe that's a reason to stay away from Wales this weekend.

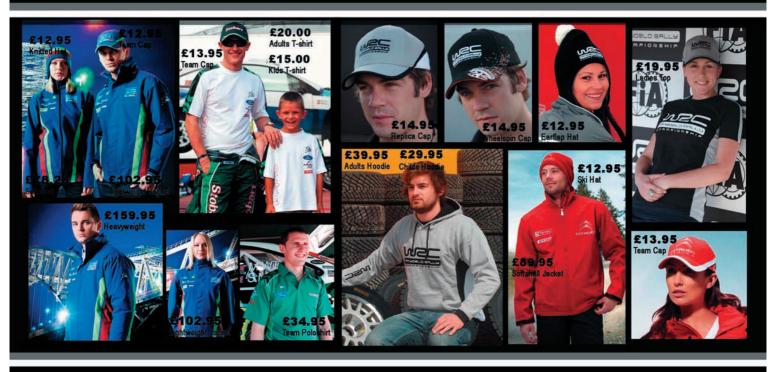

RIGONTO BE CHEERFUL

After a second title in three years, can the Italian use it to springboard to F1? CHARLES B

hen evaluating whether a driver has potential to succeed in F1, there is a long checklist that needs to be ticked off. Of course, outright speed is number one, followed by toughness of character, anticipation, reaction time and a host of other must-haves. One key indicator, certainly since Michael Schumacher raised the bar, is mental capacity: the ability to identify a problem and quickly react with a solution in the heat of the moment.

Italy's Davide Rigon this year won his second title in Superleague Formula — the 750bhp, football club-themed single-seater series — and certainly proved his cognitive skills as well as his speed. With the championship in the balance in the final round at Navarra, his Anderlecht car was punted into a spin by the team-mate of his closest rival. His engine stalled. What should he do? Panic? Give up?

No. When it wouldn't restart, he had the immense presence of mind to select gearbox manual mode, snick it into reverse, and use the gradient of the run-off area to bump-start his car backwards. "In those seconds that followed the spin, he was so smart to do that," says his Azerti team boss Wim Coekelbergs. "To use the momentum — going backwards — to help start the car was something that only happens maybe once in a lifetime."

The 24-year-old's quick wits helped

him win the title by just two points, and there was the small matter of a cool €1 million riding on the outcome... "To win the title again is fantastic,"

"To win the title again is fantastic," says Rigon. "It's unbelievable to win all that money. I have to thank the team so much, because they have been there for me and worked hard all season.

"The year started badly at Silverstone but the guys worked so hard and since mid-season we were quick every weekend. And it has also been a pleasure to drive for Anderlecht."

That Silverstone season opener was another example of his damage-limitation abilities. His throttle was sticking open at 10 per cent under hard braking (despite copious use of WD40 between sessions), yet he still managed to salvage two top-10 finishes.

By round two at Assen in Holland he bounced back with pole and victories in race one and the €100,000 super final. Only at Jarama, where his engine blew in practice, and in the non-points event at Beijing did he truly struggle again. By the second half of the season, his momentum proved unstoppable.

Race engineer Gabriele Tredozi, who worked with Fernando Alonso and Mark Webber in his time with the Minardi F1 team, is quick to pay tribute: "Davide is a very strong driver who doesn't make mistakes. He's intelligent and always thinks about optimising the final result. I hope that his talent doesn't go to waste."

€335,000 6 Chris van der Drift €325,000 Former team boss Giancarlo Minardi, who gave Rigon his sole F1 test in 2005 and whose son Giovanni now manages him, echoes those sentiments.

"What I wish for Rigon is a serious offer of an F1 opportunity — I would say that he deserves a chance," says Minardi. "I hope that he receives the call that I gave him five years ago."

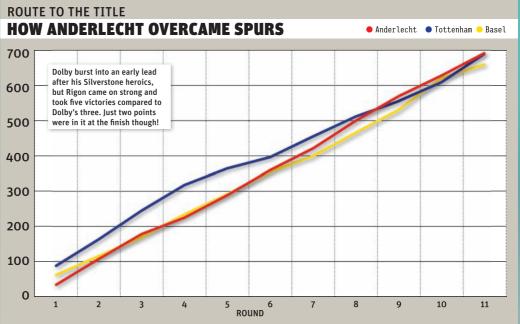
Coekelbergs is also keen that his 2010 charge gets his big break: "Davide is F1 material; he feels every click of a damper and knows how to develop a car. Every lap, without fail, he's within a tenth of the last one. He's done a lot of work in the Ferrari F1 simulator, and I've heard they're very happy with him. I'd love to see him in a decent F1 team."

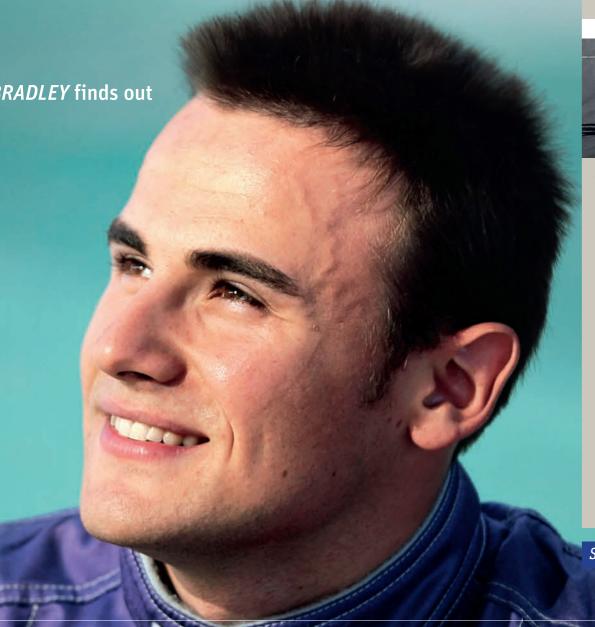
Work is going on to try and find him a seat in the Abu Dhabi F1 rookie test, but he's not from a wealthy background and his career has been underfunded until now. With Rigon having won a small fortune in prize money for Azerti, Coekelbergs is doing all he can to help.

"There was a sum of money for him and a sum for us," he says of the €1.68 million they won. "I'm willing to spend my share on him if it means he gets a place in F1. We have other sponsors interested, but we don't have the many millions like some others."

You can't say Rigon hasn't earned his shot at it. M

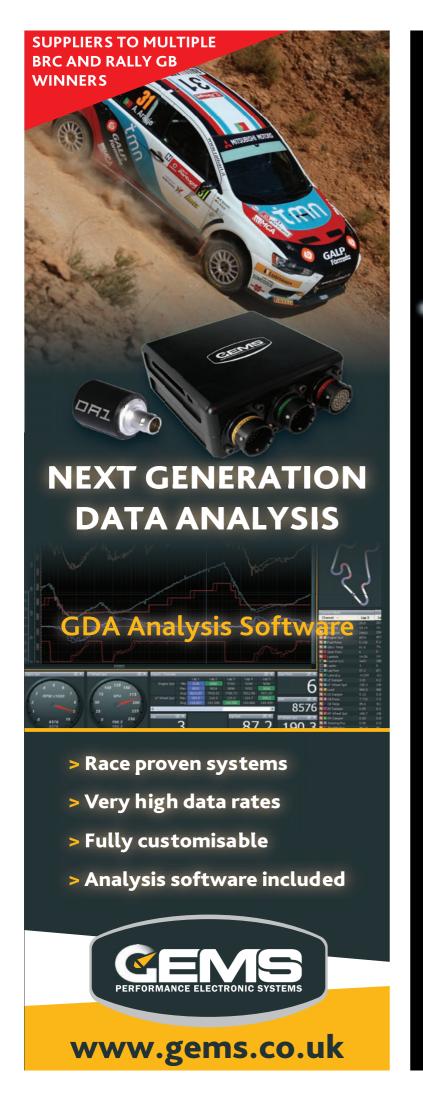

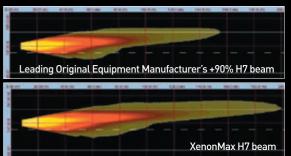

- ...Yelmer Buurman hadn't hit him and given him a puncture at Adria?
- ...he hadn't spun in race one and lost front wing in race two at Algarve?
- ...Adrian Valles hadn't moved over on him, causing him to spin at Ordos?
- ...the Beijing round (where he won) had counted for points?

Although he was as sick as a parrot to miss out again, he says: "I matured a lot this year, and take a lot of positives from it. Little things just didn't go my way. Hopefully I'll be back and go one place better next year."

LEAGUE GETS GLOBAL STAGE

Cynics said it wouldn't last, but Superleague seems to be thriving. By CHARLES BRADLEY

his third season was a crucial one for Superleague Formula, as it expanded its calendar from six-round mini-series to a substantial 12 events. Not only did its schedule double in size – two rounds of which were flyaways in China that created their own logistical headaches but the organisation also underwent a major mid-season restructure as the worldwide economic recession bit hard.

Underwriting it all was the bountiful prize fund from title sponsor Sonangol - the series itself is owned by a Luxembourg-based private-equity firm. A total of €5 million, one of the biggest prizes in motorsport, never ceased to drop the jaw of anyone who ventured the commonly asked question: "How does it keep going where A1GP failed?"

Another answer to that question is Superleague's far-cheaper overheads: its 76-strong team underwent a major mid-season cull following the resignation of series boss Alex Andreu in May. The loss of his visionary force could have spelt doom, but the installation of new CEO Alfredo Brisac alongside long-time competitions director Robin Webb ensured its ship staved on course. Brisac and Webb are both adamant that the next two years of Superleague are assured.

"This year was very important for us to consolidate our championship," says

Brisac. "Next year we want to increase the support of our followers, so we will focus a lot of effort towards the spectators to entertain them even more."

Brisac insists the company remains committed to the football club theme. "It is working, they're committed and we're committed to them," he says. "For us, they provide all their followers. We're not looking to change that."

The Chinese flyaways were a big step forward, and proved the series could take its show on the road to a new market. "It was an extraordinary adventure for all of us," says Brisac.

'We put on two fantastic race weekends under very difficult circumstances - it was the first time those circuits had run races. It was a huge challenge, but absolutely worth it. The clubs were happy we were taking their names to somewhere they have new marketing activities."

It's a voyage he is keen to repeat next year, with China set to be joined by more flyaway events. "We want to have

> a significant number of races in Europe. in what we call heritage venues, but then we want to have 30 per cent of the races overseas - away from Europe," he adds. "We're not only looking at Asia, but South America and the Middle East."

Despite the internal upheaval this year, Brisac feels the series has ridden the storm: "We have had a very successful season. We've got a good forecast for next year, and we are financially solid. We are committed for the next two years and we're optimistic we'll move forward."

IF YOU'RE a racing purist, my advice is you shouldn't try to pigeonhole Superleague Formula. In fact, don't even attempt to make sense out of it.

The best explanation I can offer is that it's a cross between Champ Cars and Formula 5000 – a full-blooded, high-powered single-seater with a sonorous V12 that has its soul in the Jaguar Le Mans cars of the late 1980s.

It's not meant to be a feeder formula, but that's not to say that talents such as Davide Rigon, Craig Dolby and Chris van der Drift can't use it as a platform to greater things. No bad thing.

Its detractors, quick to scoff at the football theme, should consider it provides a living for a pitlane-full of race teams. The quality of racing is outstanding, easily putting an IndyCar Series road-course race in the shade.

Ex-Formula 1 drivers who have tried it have found it a little agricultural. Yet as F1 gets ever-more sanitised, Superleague has haphazard rolling starts, temperamental reliability and races at old-school GP venues.

When you think of it this way, what's not to like?

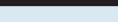

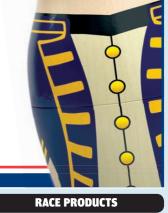

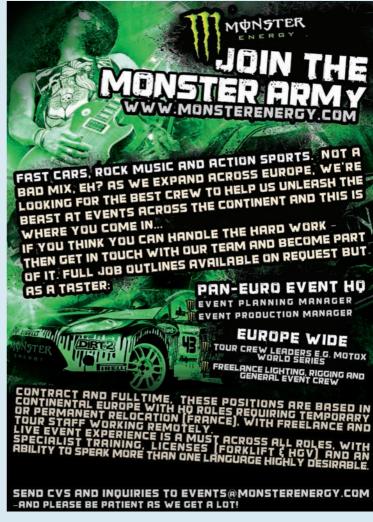

Fielding topped a tough G40 scholarship contest

Sennan Fielding wins inaugural Ginetta Junior Scholarship for 2011 prize drive

FORMER CADET karting champion Sennan Fielding has earned a free drive in the 2011 Ginetta Junior championship by winning the inaugural Ginetta Junior Scholarship.

Teenagers from around the country contested the £60,000 scholarship, which took place over three days at Leicestershire's Bruntingthorpe Proving Ground last month.

The 60 hopefuls all sampled an 1800cc Ford Zetec-engined Ginetta G40, before 12 were invited back to take part in a grand final. A panel of judges, which included Ginetta boss Lawrence Tomlinson, racers Stewart Linn, Mike Simpson and Fulvio Mussi, and ITV4 commentator Simon Hill, assessed the finalists based on driving ability, flair, fitness and media skills.

The judges called a dead heat between British KF3 karting frontrunner Fielding, 2010 Saxmax rookie champion Myles Collins and British KF2 karting champion Callum Bowyer. All three completed three extra laps, with Tomlinson riding shotgun, to decide the winner.

"I was absolutely staggered by the level of driving talent of the 12 finalists and picking a winner was the hardest job I've ever had to do," said Tomlinson. "We had no choice but to do a final shootout between Myles, Callum and Sennan. All of them were exceptional but on the day it was Sennan who demonstrated the utmost in sheer driving capability and I think he will do very well next season.

"We will aim to familiarise him in the car over the winter and see how he gets on in his first competitive outing next April at Brands Hatch. It's a big step up from karting to the G40, but I am confident we have a new superstar on our hands."

Fielding, 14, started karting aged eight and won the Lincolnshire Kart Racing Club Cadet championship at Fulbeck in 2005 before progressing through the British junior karting ranks.

"I just can't believe it — it's like a dream come true for me to think I will be out on the grid in the Ginetta Junior championship next year," he said.

"I've been following the Juniors on ITV4 all season but never imagined I'd be competing myself.

"It was a thrill just to drive the G40 on the first day and when I got through to the final I was pleased, but to win is just out of this world."

what is it about Peter Dempsey and the Walter Hayes Trophy? The Irishman has always been quick, but knock-out events and, indeed, championship fights haven't often shown his attacking style to best effect. Just look at his Festival record...

But the Silverstone event brings out the best in him. His second in 2005 was followed by wins in '06-'07. He was fourth in '08, having worked his way through the last-chance races, then he won last weekend.

The ease with which cars can slipstream and overtake on Silverstone's National layout probably plays its part in Dempsey's success, allowing his tough fighting ability to be put to good use, where a twisty Brands Hatch Indy circuit can frustrate it and force mistakes.

Being part of father Cliff's team has obviously helped too. CDR Rays have now won the past five WHTs, despite the return – in a new Van Diemen – of Wayne Boyd this year.

Peter Dempsey's career has, thus far, failed to reach the levels his talent deserves, partly due to a lack of funds. That's nothing new, you might think, and you'd be right. Which is why it's great the prize fund for the McLaren AUTOSPORT BRDC Award has been increased (see p84), and we hope to go further in future. It won't help Dempsey, but hopefully things like that and the RSF can reduce the likelihood of talented drivers falling through the net.

THE PRIZE for this year's McLaren AUTOSPORT BRDC Award has been increased from £50,000 to £100,000.

The winner of the 22nd running of the award, which will be announced at the AUTOSPORT Awards in December, was already set to receive a McLaren F1 test drive, full BRDC membership, Puma racewear for a year, and an exclusive TW Steel watch. Now the cash prize has been doubled by McLaren and the BRDC to aid the winner's progression up the motorsport ladder.

BRDC director Derek Warwick, who is also the chairman of the judging panel this year, said: "Between McLaren, AUTOSPORT and the BRDC we have made a massive commitment to increase the prize fund to £100k.

"From a BRDC perspective, we are able to do this on account of our Patrons' Scheme, which helps create sponsorship opportunities for young drivers.

"We believe the prize fund will help underline the credibility of the Award."

AUTOSPORT publisher Rob Aherne added: "The increased prize fund is a huge boost to the programme in its 22nd vear. We are extremely grateful to our partners for their outstanding support."

It has not vet been confirmed whether the increased prize will be continued into future years, but it is part of a push to provide bigger financial support for Award winners, who are often looking at

Formula 3, F2 and GP3 deals for the following season.

This year's finalists – Formula Renault aces Tom Blomqvist, Luciana Bacheta and Lewis Williamson, Formula BMW Europe runner-up Jack Harvey, British Formula Ford runner-up Scott Malvern and Formula Palmer Audi champion Nigel Moore - completed their tests in F2 and Mercedes DTM machinery last week. They were due to be interviewed at McLaren's Technology Centre this week.

THE PORSCHE Carrera Cup GB will expand its capacity grid from 28 to 32 cars for next season.

The single-make GT3 category will switch to the latest-spec 911 GT3 Cup car for next year and has sold out of spaces on its grid five months before the start of the 2011 campaign. The move to 32 cars, the maximum allowed at a BTCC event, will ensure that no registered driver will be unable to qualify.

BTCC powerhouse teams Triple Eight and Team Dynamics have now been confirmed as 2011 Carrera Cup entries

(see AUTOSPORT, September 23).

Trackspeed, which ran David Ashburn to this year's British GT3 title, and brand-new race team 2XP Racing have also signed up.

Championship manager Marion Barnaby said: "We knew interest was running high, but this response has broken records and exceeded even our most ambitious targets."

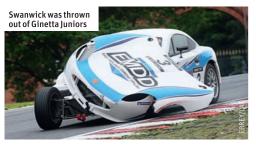

Lotus 1000km back to Brands

THE LOTUS Elise Trophy 1000km race will return next season after a successful inaugural running at Brands Hatch last weekend.

Eventual winners Paul O'Neill, Paul McNeilly and BJ Chong took eight hours and 47 minutes to win the race, making it one of the longest events in the circuit's history.

Six-hour and 1000km races were a regular feature at Brands through the 1960s. '70s and '80s. The last 1000km race at Brands Hatch before last weekend, which was held in 1988 and was for Group C Sportscars. lasted five hours and 33 minutes.

Event director David Scott of MSVR confirmed the event would return in 2011. "This race has been so well received by competitors and marshals alike," he said, "I can confirm it will take place again next year."

ix shootout rookies, each with a dedicated single-seater for the first time - courtesy of Jonathan Palmer's Formula 2 initiative - made this year's McLaren **AUTOSPORT BRDC Award testing** phase at Silverstone the most interesting yet. And arguably the closest fought.

Having been a judge for all but one of the 21 years in which a run-off has decided the winner (inaugural champion David Coulthard was simply named and lauded in 1989), I've seen the competition evolve, with circuit trials keeping pace with the sport.

Last Thursday's announcement - by 146-time Grand Prix starter. 1992 World Sportscar champion and Le Mans 24 Hours winner Derek Warwick, who chaired the judging panel on behalf of the BRDC - that the winner's prize was to be doubled to £100,000 brought a stunned silence to the candidates during dinner at Whittlebury Hall.

It sharpened their focus another click the following morning, when Luciano Bacheta, Tom Blomqvist, Jack Harvey, Scott Malvern, Nigel Moore and Lewis Williamson tackled a now-soggy Southern Circuit. The cars looked spectacular in the garages, from whence they were run by a strong team of engineers and mechanics to ensure a level playing field.

The Williams-designed chassis, with their turbocharged Audi-based engines and advanced technical

specification, are impressive tools in any conditions. With two seasons behind the FIA-sanctioned series, running budgets undercutting top-line F3 by half and a British champion in [former Award finalist] Dean Stoneman, F2 looks great value too. I wouldn't be surprised to see two or three of our elite squad contesting the 2011 title race.

Comparing their strengths as they climb the single-seater ladder is an illuminating exercise, but it is also fascinating to see what the nominees make of a bellowing DTM Mercedes-Benz. Often, at least one - Susie Stoddart (in hideous conditions at Silverstone) and Alexander Sims at Snetterton stand out for me - flags up hidden talent to team scouts.

That's why five Award winners -Gary Paffett (1999), Jamie Green (2002), Paul di Resta ('04), Oliver Jarvis ('05) and Coulthard - are on the DTM grid this year, alongside Stoddart. And HWA's engineer certainly returned to Germany with new ideas this time around.

Talking of inspiration, the track's sensational new F1 pits complex progressed before our very eyes over the two test days. Once the building site has melded with its green surroundings it will be an incredible facility and asset to British motorsport. I'm looking forward to the 2011 GP, and a dramatic

Foust wins inaugural **US Rallycross crown**

American ace takes title as European invaders score race wins



LOCAL ACE Tanner Foust secured the inaugural US Rallycross championship with two podiums in the season finale

at New Jersey Motorsports Park last weekend.

Ford Fiesta driver Foust, who won the opening two rounds of the four-event series, scored a third and a second to clinch the crown, while European Rallycross champion Sverre Isachsen and Finnish champion Toomas Heikkinen took the wins.

Isachsen won Saturday's event comfortably, leading home Heikkinen and Foust, but hit trouble on Sunday when the engine in his Ford Focus blew up in the first heat. The Norwegian was gifted a place in the C final, which he won before crashing out of the B final. That

race was eventually won by Subaru driver Travis Pastrana, who took second in the standings.

Heikkinen's Eklund Motorsport Saab team, which has not been a frontrunner in the ERC this year, spotted that the fuel regulations were open and ran the car on ethanol to boost power. He won on Sunday after Isachsen's crash.

British star Liam Doran had a mixed weekend. He took eighth after a torrid Saturday, before recovering to start the Sunday A final from pole. But he then clashed with Heikkinen and slipped back to third.

The two-wheel-drive category was won by John Tancredi in a Mazda MX5 on Saturday, while Matthew Johnson took the honours on Sunday, his second win of the series, in the unlikely Ford Fairmont Station Wagon. Walter Hayes Trophy

Dempsey avoids disaster to take win

WALTER HAYES Trophy winner Peter Dempsey almost missed the Grand Final of the knockout FF1600 event at Silverstone last weekend because of engine overheating problems.

The Irishman went on to equal Joey Foster's tally of three WHT triumphs, adding to his 2006 and '07 wins, after father Cliff's CDR team managed to resolve the issues with his Rav GRS05 - borrowed from former Classic FF1600 champion Paul Walton.

"We were struggling all weekend so just making the final was a bonus.' said Dempsey. "To be

able to get my head down and pull away from Wayne [Boyd] and Ivor [McCullough] is something I never expected to do."

The 2009 Star Mazda title contender has vowed to return which could allow him to move ahead of Foster and take his fourth win.

"It isn't about beating records, it's about having fun," added Dempsey, 24. "Even if I hadn't won I would have had a great weekend. This and the Festival are great events."

Cliff Dempsey's crack squad has not been defeated in the WHT since 2005.

New Lotus series set for 2011

A NEW series for Lotus racers will appear next season.

The Lotus Cup UK will be run by the Lotus on Track Racing Drivers Club, which already runs the successful Elise Trophy and Lotus Cup Europe, and MotorSport Vision Racing.

It will cater for 2-Elevens, Exiges and Evoras, and there will be an Open Class for other selected Lotus machines. Regulations will be the same as for Lotus Cup Europe.

The provisional calendar includes visits to Snetterton 300, Silverstone GP, Brands Hatch GP, Spa and Brands Indy. There will be eight races across the six meetings, with races ranging from 20 to 60 minutes in duration.

Exclusion for silhouette racer after red-flag shunt at Brands

SILHOUETTE RACER Chris Ayling was excluded from the second Intermarque race at Brands Hatch last weekend following a bizarre high-speed accident under red flags.

Having failed to spot the signals, Ayling (VW Corrado) ploughed into Jonathan Hoggarth's slowing Pontiac Coupe on the approach to Surtees.

Hoggarth suffered a stiff neck, but climbed unaided from his battered

car, while Ayling, whose car ended up on the other side of the track, had to be helped from his damaged machine.

Ayling was later called before officials. They rejected his plea that he failed to see red flags because of the low sun. CCTV footage showed several drivers ahead had slowed.

As well as his exclusion from fourth place, Ayling was given four penalty points on his licence.

Le Mans support race unveiled

Cars of the 1950s and 1960s will provide historic flavour at La Sarthe in 2011

THE HISTORIC support race to the 2011 Le Mans 24 Hours will be for cars of the 1949-1965 period.

The event, which takes place on the Saturday morning before the main race, was run for Group C cars last year. But the 2011 Le Mans Legends race will be for machines that were eligible at La Sarthe between 1949, the first post-WW2 Le Mans and won by then-new marque Ferrari, and 1965.

which marked Ferrari's last victory.

The period last supported the 24 Hours in 2009 and was won by Ferrari driver Carlos Monteverde. To keep the grid competitive, event organiser Motor Racing Legends will not allow Ford GT40s, which dominated the races marking the same period at the 2010 Le Mans Classic, in the 45-minute event.

MRL's Duncan Wiltshire said: "The 1950s and early '60s is, for many

people, perhaps the most emotionally charged period of motor racing history – a genuine golden era, when the cars were not only beautiful, but also highly distinctive and instantly recognisable.

"For spectators, this makes the racing even more enthralling, as you don't need a wealth of historical knowledge to get excited by the sight of a Ferrari 250LM or Jaguar D-type flat-out on a race track."

Brighton to London Future Car Challenge

F1 designer is a winner in first Future Car Challenge



FORMER F1 designer Gordon Murray was among the winners on the inaugural RAC Brighton to London Future Car Challenge last weekend.

The event aims to encourage the development of electric, hybrid and low-emissions vehicles.

Murray's T.25 City Car won the Most Economical Small Passenger Internal Combustion Engine Vehicle, and Most Economical and Environmentally Friendly Small Passenger Internal Combustion Engine Vehicle categories.

PETER DEMPSEY made it five successive Walter Hayes Trophy wins for his father's Cliff Dempsey Racing team and notched up his third personal triumph - to add to those in 2006 and 2007 - as he saw off what was regarded as the strongest field yet for the Silverstone FF1600 showpiece last weekend.

The grid for the final re-kindled memories of the 2007 Kent Brands Hatch Festival final, with Dempsey and Wayne Boyd sharing the front row. While that race ended with both in the Druids gravel trap, this contest proved much less controversial.

Although Boyd (Van Diemen LA10) won the faster semi-final, pole position was on the unfavoured outside of the track and he couldn't cut

across in time to prevent Dempsey's Ray leading into Copse. Spencer Pigot (Ray GRSo8) grabbed third, but Ivor McCullough (Van Diemen RFoo) drove around the outside of him at Brooklands on lap one.

Two tours later, Festival winner Neville Smyth (Ray GRSo7) arrived at Brooklands just ahead of Pigot in fourth, but lost the back end of the car and tagged the young American as he spun. Pigot tangled with another rapid Irishman, Noel Dunne (Mygale SJo8), at Luffield four laps later, so did well to come home seventh.

By this time ex-F₃ man McCullough had relieved the much-fancied Boyd of second at Becketts and set off in pursuit of Dempsey. It was a challenge that was hampered by Boyd's dogged, but unsuccessful,

attempts to get back into contention. Had both worked together, they might have caught Dempsey but instead he was able to maintain the gap consistently at one second, coming home to take a fifth victory for Ray.

Fourth position went the way of the other Team USA racer, Felix Serralles (Ray GRSo8). He passed the vastly experienced Michael Vergers (Reynard 88FF) on lap six to do so, having earlier gained ground in the Smyth/Pigot incident. Former Combe champion Ben Norton broke the Ray/ Van Diemen stranglehold with sixth for Spectrum.

Behind Pigot, Josh Fisher was nonplussed by his lack of pace in the final after a promising run-in, while Adrian Campfield and Carnival victor Rob Hall completed the top 10.

Strong drives came from Hall's fellow Combe regulars Adam Higgins (11th), Nathan Ward (18th) and Luke Cooper (21st), while Smyth and Dunne recovered to 12th and 14th respectively. Glynn Geddie was the top Scot, climbing to 17th from the back row.

The first semi-final marked the end of the road for a number of podium contenders. Matthew Parr and Jordan Skinner tangled while scrapping for fifth and collected the hapless Stuart Gough, who made his second airborne exit from a WHT semi in two years. Parr continued with little in the way of brakes and was knocked out, while Skinner retired. James Tucker was also spun out by Jonathan Hoad.

Boyd made that race look very easy, but Fisher defended hard for second until Smyth made a bold move around the outside at Brooklands on the last lap that resulted in contact. Pigot and Serralles seized

the chance to complete the podium, while Smyth won the race for fourth.

A fine second semi was won by Dempsey, who brilliantly dived through on the inside of McCullough at Luffield on the final lap. Earlier, Dunne had climbed to the front and was pulling away when he spun on his own at Brooklands; he would fight back to sixth. A four-way fight for third lost David Grady (broken gearbox) on the final lap, leaving Campfield to beat Vergers and Norton.

A notable non-finisher was Morgan Dempsey, T-boned by Simon Kinsey at Luffield, having been the only one of Saturday's non-finishers to make it to the semis. He, Felix Fisher, Ed Moore and Josh Barnett made it out of the Progression race, but Fisher (2009 runner-up) broke an upright in the Last Chance thrash, while Moore (by 0.002sec!) and Barnett just missed the top six.

SILVERSTONE WHT HEATS November 6 Close racing fails to reveal final favourite

Parr and Boyd star as first aces fall

THERE WAS little to help onlookers predict the likely WHT winner in Saturday's six heats, save for the inevitable failure of a few of the fancied runners.

Castle Combe winner Felix Fisher retired from fourth in the first heat with a snapped crank, but a borrowed engine meant he would return on Sunday. Morgan Dempsev was in second in heat two when he made a dramatic exit - a loose pipe sprayed oil over the exhaust, but he stopped before more damage was done to his Van Diemen.

Thruxton Cup victor Josh Barnett didn't set a time in qualifying due to a broken ignition wire, and having started from the back of heat four he was caught out by the early braking for Becketts of less accomplished rivals and collided with the back of one. Mike Gardner was assaulted by a flying John Ferguson and limped to the

pits, to be joined a lap later by Ed Moore, whose Ray had coated the track with oil on the installation lap.

Of those that did make the semis, Matthew Parr and Wayne Boyd turned in the most impressive drives at either end of the day. Parr dropped back to fifth on the opening lap of heat one, but charged to the fore passing both Spencer Pigot and James Tucker at Copse on lap four before sprinting clear. Boyd had the toughest heat (six), but was always on top of what was sometimes a four-car lead battle.

The other winners were Noel Dunne (despite a spin on Dempsey's oil), Neville Smyth (having squeezed back ahead of Jordan Skinner into Brooklands on the last lap), Peter Dempsey (ahead of David Grady, who set the fastest time of the day) and Ivor McCullough (who enjoyed a great fight with Adrian Campfield's Spectrum).

Kemp and Ivey win from LMP man Roberts

AN ECLECTIC selection of machinery featured in two hotly contested Allcomers Closed Wheel races, which brought wins for Charlie Kemp and Jon-Paul Ivey.

Kemp's Lola T210 built up a good lead in the opener, with Ivey's more modern Radical PR6 heading the chase, after taking Jeff Wilson's Lotus Elise silhouette into Brooklands on lap two. But backmarkers didn't fall kindly for Kemp and although he retained his lead, Ivey was right on his tail at the flag. Mike Roberts' Lola EX257 was a distant third, from a

pitlane start, while Wilson settled in fifth behind Oliver Bryant's Lola T70.

Ivey had to find his way past Wilson again in the second race, which he did into Brooklands on lap four. Kemp had made a break but on this occasion Ivev closed and hit the front into Brooklands with a lap go. Roberts also closed in and took Kemp for second, while Ivey just held onto the victory.

The Open Wheel HSCC race was totally dominated by Lee Dwyer. His March 742 lapped the whole field twice, while John Rand's Lola T460 finally outdragged Wil Arif's Royale RP30 through

Woodcote on the fifth lap for second. James Ledamun's Reynard SF84/86 was a solitary fourth, after polesitter Paul McMorran - coming back from a spin at Becketts on the opening lap – blew his Crossle 22F's engine.

IN STRAITENED financial times, the sight of 25 cars lining up for the first round of the Formula Renault Winter Cup was a welcome fillip. It was also an upbeat send-off for Snetterton's current layout, which is set to be replaced by a new one for next season.

A storming start launched 2010 Graduate Cup winner Alex Lynn into the lead for the opening skirmish. Once ahead of polesitter Jack Hawksworth (who had snatched top spot in the final seconds of a drying qualifying) into Riches, the seemingly unflappable Fortec Motorsport-run Lynn earned his maiden carracing victory. Not even a brief safety-car period could knock him off course.

Karting star Hawksworth was further demoted on

lap eight by a flying Ollie Millroy (up from sixth on the grid) who briefly closed onto Lynn's rear wing, but couldn't keep the leader in sight. A rapid Richie Stanaway charted a similar course, bursting through from eighth to deprive Hawksworth of a podium. Nevertheless, fourth marked an impressive car-racing debut for the Bradford-based driver.

Behind him, BARC series ace Luke Wright edged Formula BMW race winner Carlos Sainz Jr for fifth.

Meanwhile, Josh Hill marked a successful conversion from Formula Ford. He sealed seventh when the pursuing Joni Wiman spun at Coram.

It was a case of zero to hero and then back to zero for Russian rising star Daniil Kvyat in race two.

Having slid out of

contention early in the damp first race, the Formula BMW graduate had the perfect chance to make amends by starting from pole for the sequel.

He grasped it with both hands, leading into the first corner ahead of fellow Red Bull-backed Koiranen-run driver Sainz, whose hopes of a decent finish were undone by a drive-through for jumping the start, and a later crash at Coram.

Kvyat consolidated his position in the early going to open a five-second gap by lap five. But his mettle was soon tested as the rapid Millroy (after starting eighth) surged onto his tail.

A safety car bunched the field, giving Millroy a great chance to challenge, but

Kvvat put backmarker Evelin Frank between himself and Millrov, before reclaiming the initiative at the restart and extending his lead to three seconds.

It proved just enough to resist Millroy's late charge, but both of the top two were handed 5s penalties for passing Frank under the safety car. This dropped them to third and fourth and promoted Lynn to the status of double winner, and Wright to second on the debut weekend for MGR Motorsport.

All this meant Hill might have taken a win on his first weekend in Formula Renault, having put in a great drive to battle his way to third before the caution period only for electrical gremlins to force him out. Meanwhile, Stanaway had to watch from the sidelines after an early off dropped him out of second.

Contact between leader

Spencer Horgan and Jon Mortimer proved the defining moment of the first Caterham Academy outing. The pair had taken over at the front after pacesetter Nick Powell fell off at Riches. They swept together into the Esses where, although Horgan looked to have done enough to lead into the right-hand part, they collided, sending Horgan into a spin. As Mortimer escaped to victory, a frustrated Horgan recovered to third, but couldn't dislodge David Szymanski from second.

Having moved past Szymanski, Mortimer eased clear to complete a brace of wins in the sequel. A late spin into Russell dropped Szymanski out of the close battle for second, leaving Powell to beat Horgan to runner-up spot by a couple of tenths.

The team's pitstops weren't the quickest, but the reliable and rapid O'Neill put in two lengthy stints before leaving to attend a BTCC awards ceremony. McNeilly and Chong both staged admirable drives and victory was reward for a fine all-round performance.

In a race that lasted eight and three-quarter hours and had more twists than an Agatha Christie novel, they were two laps clear of the Hoffmans 2 team Europa, which lost time at around half-distance with a trip to the Paddock Hill gravel trap.

Father/son duo Nick and Chris Randall, plus Ben Pitch (the latter entrusted to bring the car home in the dark) staged a super fightback. Pitch must eat plenty of carrots, for the car's candle-like headlights hardly helped him!

Third overall and best of the Elise Trophy runners was the Track-Club.com entry driven by series regulars Marcus Jewell and Greg Noble, together with FPA race winner Ramon Pineiro.

Next up, albeit four laps adrift of Track-Club.com, was the Perrys outfit, which had seen both its cars take knocks to put wheels out of alignment. A late fuel pick-up problem forced Eugene O'Brien (quickest on this team) to come in and hand over to Ken Savage.

Hard luck story of the race

came from the GWS
Motorsport outfit, which
was nine laps clear of the
eventual winners when its
sole Exige went bang as
British GT G4 champion
Jamie Stanley swept through
Surtees for the 307th time.

Guy Fawkes celebrations took place on Friday night, but Jon Walker's 2-Eleven clearly felt that Saturday morning wasn't too late to join in. Just 11 laps into the race, it suffered some kind of engine-bay failure that caused it to catch fire.

Walker stopped in the far end of the pit lane, the rear of the car well ablaze. Such was the ferocity, as fast as the flames were doused they flared up again. By the time the fire was out, parts of the circuit were barely visible through the white haze!

On Sunday, attention turned to the fourth running

of the Victor Meldrew Trophy and, with the *One* Foot In The Grave theme tune played on the PA before each of the three races, there was plenty of atmosphere.

After Escort RS2000 racer Nigel Craig had just got the better of Scirocco man James Hebditch in race one, Mrs Hebditch (aka Tamsin Fisher) restored family honour with a runaway win in her MG in race two thanks to a generous handicap.

Seeing the error of their ways, the handicapping team quickly reassessed Fisher prior to race three. With Tamsin suitably time bound, James ensured that a second Meldrew win went back home to Hampshire.

Hebditch later came up just short against Danny Cassar (Proton) in the Team Handicap race, while Richard Brent beat fellow Peugeot 205GTi driver David Cox to win both of the Tin Top Challenge encounters.

The battling Rod Birley and Steve Hall shared BARC Intermarque honours. Birley went for a full-wet set-up for the later race, but the track dried out so he gave up on an unequal struggle.

Nick Porter kept Henry Wright at arms length in the BMW v VW race, while the M3 of Matt Seldon overcame 'problems' to win the closing Allcomers race.

ithin a few seconds of the start of the Formula Renault UK season, the two front-row men for the first race — Tom Blomqvist and Lewis Williamson — had collided at Thruxton's first corner. Both finished, but their clash allowed Tamas Pal Kiss to take the maiden win of the series' new era.

Six months later, Anglo-Swedo-Kiwi Blomqvist and Scottish Highlander Williamson battled hard — and cleanly — for the title off the startline at the Brands Hatch finale, with Hungarian Kiss fervently hoping they took each other off! While Williamson won that salvo, Blomqvist won the war.

For most of the season, English hopes Will Stevens and Harry Tincknell had been very much in the fight too. The fact that this top quintet represented four teams — Fortec Motorsport (Blomqvist), Manor Competition (Williamson and Stevens), Atech GP (Kiss) and CRS Racing (Tincknell) — indicated that the series was in rude health in this, its first year after switching from the old Tatuus warhorse to the new Barazi-Epsilon designed machine.

There were inevitably teething problems, but what really annoyed the teams was the much-increased cost of spare parts, and their unavailability —

a situation that has still not entirely resolved itself even now.

While there were criticisms of the build quality of the chassis, most reckoned the design wasn't too far off. It has more front-end grip and overall downforce than the Tatuus, meaning that category rookies will probably take longer to make the most of it. Although grids had between 15 and 20 cars, the intensity of competition was very high and there were 10 race winners from the 20 FRUK races. This led some to suggest there was no-one quite at the same level as Dean Smith and James Calado were in 2009 – and this was borne out by bigger teams, who usually found that different drivers were quicker in different corners.

But remember that the top trio of Blomqvist, Williamson and Kiss — all graduates of relatively low-level karting scenes (New Zealand, UK gearbox karting and Eastern Europe respectively) — were further down their learning curves than Smith and Calado were in 2009, and arguably all have extreme long-term potential.

Kiss — a man whose christian names had enough erroneous apostrophes thrown at them to suggest that a convention of market-stall signwriter's (sic) had taken over the championship — was the initial form man. He much

preferred the Barazi-Epsilon to the Tatuus, found a good set-up with Atech's ex-BAR F1 engineer Steve Farrell, and won three races in the first half of the season. He won no more...

There would have been much soul-searching at Atech had not team-mates Nick Yelloly and Marlon Stockinger, both vastly-improved, found the winner's circle. Kiss did have budget worries, and this possibly combined with the pressure from leading the table through the long mid-season break, exacerbated by the attendant interest from figures further up the sport. The killer blow came in the penultimate round at Silverstone — at the only meeting where one qualifying session counted for both races, he hit engine





problems at the crucial moment.

By this stage Blomqvist had taken three wins in a row - and they would remain his only victories of the season. Fortec had an inexperienced driver line-up, and felt the need to change its structure mid-season. Team manager Dave Moore – who had pushed ultra-hard to get Blomqvist on board in the first place – departed to join another team, while Fortec F3 boss Mick Kouros stepped down to run the Renault show, and brought ex-F3 race winner Riki Christodoulou along for the ride.

'Christo' initially struggled to get good results (although he did win the Brands finale), but during his time at the team it is no coincidence that Blomqvist became a winner, while the promising Alex Lynn gained enormously in confidence to become a podium finisher.

At the Manor team of Tony and Sarah Shaw, Williamson (engineered by Mrs S) won more races than anyone else – five. While team-mate Stevens suffered a spiralling loss of form in the end-of-season races, Williamson seemed unfazed by anything, although he occasionally struggled in qualifying. Rival Blomqvist did sometimes go over the limit in qualifying, but usually banged in a good lap too, something that Williamson – equally committed to the naked eye - could not always do. It didn't look like overdriving, but some wondered whether his forcefulness on brand-new Michelins was causing

problems in that area.

Manor was justifiably proud that all four of its drivers (including Snetterton winner Ollie Millroy and Thomas Hylkema) scored a pole position. The impressive Millroy flourished after his move from Fortec (horses for courses...) and should just edge Lynn and Robert Foster-Jones as 2011 title favourite.

CRS Racing had the most unpredictable form of the 'big four' teams. When Tincknell was on it he was excellent, but like Blomqvist he found himself surrounded by inexperienced team-mates. Chris Gorne was drafted in from CRS's GT team to help out on engineering, and this coincided with a great win for rookie Foster-Jones at Knockhill. Tincknell felt he was back on the right track by the Brands finale and then he stalled on the grid! Team-mate Michael Lyons, meanwhile, peaked with a fastest lap at Snetterton.

From the other teams, Fabio Gamberini looked much better with Mark Burdett Motorsport in FR than he had in Ford, due in no small part to driver coach Robbie Kerr and ex-Stewart GP engineer Andy Miller. Scorpio Motorsport was always going to struggle with just a single car for novice Joe Crook, while Firstair showed flashes of form with Richard Singleton, Luciano Bacheta and David McDonald: what might have been had the plan to field Dean Stoneman in a parallel programme to his F2 campaign come off...?

6 Riki Christodoulou

New FR has more downforce than old, but still this ex-F3 ace took time to adapt after being thrown back into the saddle at mid-season. Late-season results were excellent, and his contribution arguably helped Blomqvist to the title.

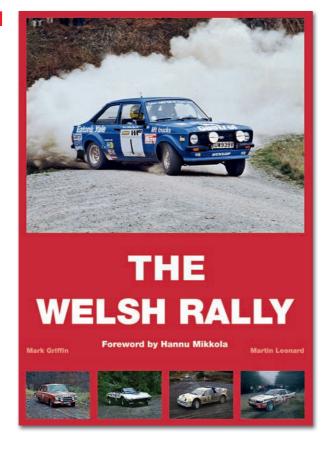

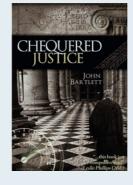

REVVED UP OVER WHAT'S ON THE BOX

We cast a critical eye over the best and worst of this week's TV coverage



THE EXCITEMENT about the Senna movie has been quite literally Twitterific, especially since its screening in Ayrton's home town of Morumbi last week.

The buzz surrounding the forthcoming release of The Iceman (search on YouTube for 'Iceman Documentary Teaser'), a behind-the-scenes documentary charting Kimi Raikkonen's, ahem, foray into world rallying, would struggle to illuminate a 5-watt bulb.

The thought of watching a driver once considered the fastest in the world struggle to match the pace of Matthew Wilson through the stages is as likely to set the heart racing as the prospect of watching him drop off the road repeatedly on his way to another underwhelming eighth place. But despite the dearth of quality performances, the trailer is surprisingly enjoyable.

In fact, where sporting documentaries are concerned, it's the ones that chart the glorious failures that stand the test of time. Whether it's Graham Taylor telling the linesman that the ref has just got him the sack in The Impossible Job, or the late Malcolm Allison actually getting the boot as a big-money investor attempts to turn

Man City around in City! It's the window into

the unravelling of failure that makes for genuinely memorable viewing.

The ridiculous amount of Red Bull branding aside - if they like him so much, why aren't they paying for him to drive a works car next year? - it's a very watchable series of sub-Jackass japery from the 2007 world champion.

When he isn't jumping off something high into water, he's being face-planted into the water on a wake board, or hanging it out on a jetski or skidoo.

There's a pumping rockabilly soundtrack by The Greasers, which

would certainly grate if it was any longer than the 2m21s the clip lasts for.

There's some great rally footage, of course, with Kimi getting some serious air through a Finnish gravel stage, while testing footage shows him pushing the car to the edge - he probably crashed at the next corner though!

If the whole film glosses over his abject failures like this, it will have failed, but as a glimpse into a different world, one of playboy indulgencies and fast machines, it's much more of a success than Kimi's 2010 season. Revved Up

FROM THE ARCHIVE

Nick Heidfeld and Alex Ribeiro, Brazilian GP, 2002



IT'S A sight that you might witness on any crowded street on a given day – a door of a parked car is thrown open and collected by a hapless driver. Yet Nick Heidfeld describes just such a moment - from the race-morning warm-up for the 2002 Brazilian Grand Prix - as "the strangest accident of my career".

It all started with Enrique Bernoldi shunting at the bottom of the Senna S. The Mercedes medical car, driven by sometime Hesketh, March and Fittipaldi Formula 1 driver Alex Ribeiro, took to the track and parked on the kerb close to the flaming Arrows.

Heidfeld, then driving for Sauber, arrived when the red flag had just been thrown. Seeing the medical car late, he opted to thread his way between it and the barrier. Then Ribeiro opened his door and Heidfeld clattered into it.

"I've watched the footage a few times on YouTube since! I remember the moment that the door opened – it was one of those moments that happens in slow motion," says Heidfeld. "There would have $been \, just \, enough \, room \, for \, me \, to \, get \, through \, had$ the door not opened."

Fortunately, Ribeiro paused before getting out

into the firing line. Now a preacher, Ribeiro, who used to race with 'Jesus Saves' on his car, ascribes his narrow escape to an act of God.

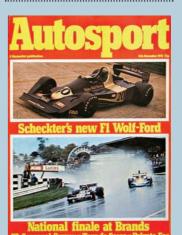
"I didn't see Nick," recalls the Brazilian. "What stopped me jumping out of the car was the fact that it was rolling down the hill, so I had to shift it to parking mode and put on the handbrake. I don't believe in luck. I was saved by another one of those acts of God.'

He doesn't blame Heidfeld for the accident, and the German was exonerated after stewards accepted that the transition from yellow to red flags had left him unwarned at the crucial moment.

Ribeiro has been criticised in some quarters for getting out of the car, but given the fact that the red flag was out he was doing his job as instructed. Despite urban legend having it that he was banned from the role, he was back again the next year in the same capacity.

"It's not true that I wasn't allowed to drive again," says Ribeiro. "According to my job assignment, defined by Professor Watkins, I was supposed to turn off the master switch, take off the steering wheel and the head-and-neck-support foam from a car. I drove again the following year."

WOLF UNVEILED its first Formula 1 car (above), with which South African Jody Scheckter and perennially unlucky Kiwi Chris Amon were expected to contest the 1977 season.

The Harvey Postlethwaite-designed WR1 featured a pronounced wedge bodyshape, wide track, and Ford Cosworth DFV power.

'There are two ways you can go in design today," said Postlethwaite. "Either you go the radical six-wheel route or you stay with a conventional design and whittle away at it. That's the way I've treated the new Wolf.'

The other half of our cover showed David Purley's Chevron defeating Derek Bell's Penske to win the final round of the Shellsport 5000 championship at a sodden Brands Hatch. Also on the bill was the Formula Ford Festival, won by Irish Hawke driver Derek Daly (below).

WHEN I heard about Francois Delecour's road accident in a Ferrari F40, I had no idea that it would make the difference to my career that it did. Ford contacted me and asked if I would drive the car on the 1000 Lakes Rally. It was not a difficult question to answer!

I had done the event seven times already — including one time with the Nissan factory team. My best result until then had been fourth the previous year in a Group A Lancia Delta — but I'd also been fifth in a Mazda 323, so my record was good for a young driver.

When I got the Ford drive, I felt comfortable in the car straight away and I was straight into the middle of a big fight with Juha [Kankkunen]. I expected this fight to go all the way, because Juha is, you know, the star for Finland — he had won 1000 Lakes many times. But it didn't last so long.

Juha went off. I don't remember which stage he went off on, but I had been equal with him and making very good times. But when he went, suddenly I had a good lead. But then I had turbo problem

and I lost the lead to Didier Auriol.

Actually, for once, I was very lucky with this problem. The turbo pipe came off completely. We were out on the stages around Jamsa, but we had no power from the

engine at all. I got out after the stage and had a look under the bonnet: okay, turbo pipe is gone, but we can make it to service. How lucky! You know, most times you come out of the stage with a

problem and have to go straight into the next stage. But this time, the boys could fix the car in service, so we could carry on without dropping too much time.

We took the lead again after that and won by 22 seconds from Auriol. It was incredible and also good that I had set some fastest times [14 from 35 stages]. I was happy with the result. Very happy!

Winning at home is a special feeling. There's nothing like it. This was the best one for me. There were so many people out watching on the stages, it was incredible. I think that win was probably more special than my first world title. Wo Tommi Makinen was talking to David Evans

IN PROFILE



TOMMI MAKINEN made his WRC debut in 1987 – in the 1000 Lakes at the wheel of a privately run Group N Lancia. Bit-part campaigns in Britain and in the WRC were followed by a big – and lucky – break in 1994 for Ford. Victory in Finland helped him secure a works Mitsubishi drive for '95. He stayed with the British-based team for seven years, taking 22 wins and winning four straight titles. His final two years, in 2002-03, were spent at Subaru for whom he took his 24th and final win. Makinen, 46, now runs his own rally team supplying cars and parts.
