

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
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### Map of West Michigan Race Tracks



#### Lee's Ramblings on Racing

want to use this space to just ramble on a bit about racing from my perspective. Since 1950 when racing found me, racing has made leaps and bounds of changes. Many old time racing fans still look fondly on those early days of racing.

I remember racing in its early days, and I miss some things that were prevalent at that time and are now gone. For example, I remember the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department that patrolled the race track grounds at Berlin Raceway on horseback to make sure that everything was in order. I recall winners of the races would pick up the checkered flag from the flagman and slowly make a victory lap holding the checkered flag. In those days, racers hauled their cars on open trailers going to the track. It was an opportunity for fans and especially children to get excited seeing the trailered race cars on the road. Nowadays race cars are all transported in covered haulers.

When it comes to the race drivers I have often pondered what it takes to make racers get into a potentially dangerous business. They could just as well be in a sport like tennis or golfing. People who deliberately put themselves in harm's way are aware of the consequences. Every racer has his own reasons for getting behind the wheel of a race car. Some racers are out there strictly to win. To them, even finishing second is losing and they can't bear losing. They want to be superstars in the racing community. Other racers find that they just enjoy the rush of driving a race car. Some of them may come up with a win occasionally, and there are some who have never won a feature race.

We approached each racer by telling them that we would not put our personal viewpoint in their bios. We tried very hard to stay neutral with the racers. Each racer was also told that it was up to them how much text ended up in their bio. In other words, we would use whatever they shared with us and that we would not add any personal thoughts regarding their career. So if you think some of the bios are too lengthy and some too short, we could only write the information they each gave us.

Bear with us as we share with you, the reader, what our experiences have been in publishing this book. First of all, it took forever to dig up the historical data. Finding usable photos was difficult. In the early days of racing, a lot of the photos were snapshots taken by the family and for printing they were questionable. So we had to work with what we could get. We were fortunate to know the early drivers personally. I interviewed them because I worshipped them as my idols at the time and never thought that someday those interviews would be published. Whether a driver had tons of victories or was just into racing because he enjoyed it never mattered to me. We treated them all with the same respect. It is not for us to judge their performance.

We designed this book so that if the reader wants to follow-up on a particular driver, he/she can do so. This book contains the media releases sent out by race tracks covering the race results. We also put the finishing positions of the races so the reader can see in detail how each racing program went. Then we put together the points that every driver had each season and followed that up with pages that combined a certain number of years in each particular division so the reader could see who was hot over that time frame. It was impossible for us to come up with the point system they had at various times. So we simply set up points in feature races counting the top five finishers. The winner received 5 points with second 4, third 3, fourth 2, and fifth 1.

We then put in the biographies of the participants, not only drivers, but car owners, crew chiefs, etc. because all of them were responsible for the victories. Included also are bios of track promoters and officials.

et's put the late 1940's racing world in perspective as we look at Berlin Raceway's birth and growth. Auto racing was halted during World War II because of the armed services' need of gasoline and rubber. The veterans returned home in 1945 when the war ended. Business was good and families had money to spend. The auto factories were building cars as fast as possible to replenish the automobile buying market that had been closed down during the war. Houses were selling as they could be built. Families had enough money to spend on entertainment and they were hungry for places to go and things to do for recreation.

Most auto racing in pre-WWII had been limited to fairground tracks featuring big cars. The big cars were opened wheeled cars very similar to the cars running at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway at that time. Each fairground had one week for their annual fair where big car racing was the highlight of fair week.

The car owners and drivers came from long distances to compete at the fair dates and were looked upon as sports heroes to the spectators in the grandstands. They would be representing states from all over the nation. Many of these race drivers were full-time racers, which meant that auto racing provided them their sole livelihood. They were true profes-

sionals. It was tough living for the crews of the big cars, because they were on the road so much and we have to remember that in those days there were no expressways, just two-lane roads leading from one city to the next. It was a tough business for racers back then.

Then in the mid 1930's, something happened in auto racing that changed the sport completely. In California, new and smaller race cars were introduced. They were simply called midgets, as opposed to big cars. They were smaller, but kept much of the standard design of the big cars, with open wheels and no top.

One reason for the popularity of this new class of cars was that in the beginning, they were built in each racer's shop at a fraction of the cost of a big car. Secondly, if someone wanted to promote midget racing, all they had to do was construct a small fifthmile or quarter-mile track. They no longer had to depend on fairground tracks.

The first race track built specifically for auto racing in Michigan was VFW Speedway, later renamed Motor City Speedway. Don and Carson Zeiter, brothers, built a dirt half-mile track in Detroit in 1932, the track was built for the big cars and many well-known racers competed there.

By the mid-1930's, the midgets had grown in popularity. They were racing all across the nation and the Zeiter brothers quickly saw an opportunity to expand their racing programs at Motor City Speedway. They constructed a quarter-mile dirt track inside the half-mile track and brought the midgets to Motor City Speedway.

Midget auto racing became so popular after World War II, from 1946 through 1948; a team could race seven nights a week, racing at different tracks. Michigan saw fifth-mile and quarter-mile tracks built all around the state. Then two things happened starting in 1949. Opportunities for entertainment opened up

for families across the state, such as drive-in movies and the mass production of television sets.

When midgets first came out they were home-built by individual owners. But when their popularity increased Frank Kurtis, of California, began building midgets on a virtual assembly line. His Kurtis-Kraft cars coupled with an Offenhauser racing engine were unbeatable. The bad news was that the Kurtis-Kraft midget combinations with the Offy engine were so closely matched that racing became follow-the-leader shows with little or no passing. Fans soon began to lose interest and the mighty midgets lost their popularity. Midget racing was dying out.

Since World War II had ended, the auto manufacturers had built so many new cars that people who still owned the old 1930's models found that they no longer had any resale value. They were simply parked somewhere and left to rust. So there was a glut of old cars available by the late 40's, and now promoters found a new class of race cars to promote. They were called jalopy stock cars.

They were called jalopy stock cars and just like midget racing they became so popular that race tracks appeared all over Michigan. Some were simply bulldozed in a field and inexpensive wooden grandstands were thrown together. The best part of racing stock cars at that time was the low cost of getting into the sport. A person could buy an old junker and a flat-head engine to drop into the car with less than \$200 invested. The engine could be left stock and run that way until the driver had some track experience. Then, if he was committed to staying in the sport, he could order some racing parts to 'soup' up the engine and get serious about racing.

Did it cost much to prepare the car for racing once the engine was installed? Not really. All of the glass was removed from the windows; a safety belt was installed for driver safety. The doors were welded or strapped shut so the doors would not fly open and expose the driver to possible injury in an accident.

Finally the car was painted a flashy color. If a team could not afford a professional sign painter to letter and number the car, it would be done with a big paint brush. Because all of the cars of the 1930's were painted black at the factory, the North Michigan Stock Car Club had a stipulation in their rule

book stating that a stock car could not compete if it was painted black. (See separate article on stock car rules in 1950 put out by the North Michigan Stock Car Club).

The driver or car owner would go out and try to find a sponsor that would assist them in some way with their cost of racing. A few teams could locate sponsors that would fund the team in a big way, but most went to smaller sponsors that would contribute to some of the racing costs of the team. If you drove around West Michigan in the early 1950's, you would notice that numerous gasoline stations had a stock car bearing the station's name and address. Their only contribution was to supply the stock car with fuel each week. If the gas station owner liked the driver or car owner, he would allow them to park the car at the station and pull it into the garage to work on it during the week.

We all know how big a part sponsorship plays in racing today. Back in the jalopy era, it seemed that everybody wanted to sponsor a stock car, such as motels, bars, radio stations, automotive garages and used car lots. Some teams abused their sponsors when, after picking up their sponsorship money, they would get involved in a racing accident that totaled out their car. The team would build a new car and go out and find new sponsors for the cost of building a new car. If the original sponsor complained, they'd say, "Well, the car was wrecked beyond repair and we couldn't race it anymore. We needed a new sponsor to build another stock car." Finally some of the sponsors got wise to that game and they would say, "All right, we'll give you half the money at the beginning

of the racing season and the other half towards the end of the season if you complete the racing season."

Chet Mysliwiec, a native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, had been active in auto racing most of his life and owned a big car back in the 1930's. He hired a driver and they raced at the Kalamazoo Fairgrounds and the West Michigan Fairgrounds in Grand Rapids. When the midgets became so popular after World War II, Chet owned one of the hottest Ford 60's in the Midwest. In 1949, when the bottom fell out of midget auto racing, he sold his midget.

Mysliwiec saw that jalopy stock car racing was coming on the scene. He and Hank Russ, who had been racing midgets, formed the North Michigan Stock Car Racing Club. They held meetings with racers, organized them and signed them up for their club. An interesting side note: when a stock car team signed up for the club, they were issued car numbers. So when you check out the car numbers in the early 1950's you can tell who signed up right from the beginning.

At the same time, in 1949, construction began on the new Grand Rapids Speedrome which opened up in 1950. O.C. Hall, the promoter at the Speedrome, signed up with the North Michigan Stock Car Racing Club to sanction the racing, which meant that Mysliwiec would supply the cars and drivers for their races. As part of the contract, Mysliwiec was being paid a sanctioning fee for each racing program

at the 'Drome,' as it was nicknamed, for supplying the cars and drivers for the track. So on top of the normal racing purse that the Drome paid to the racing teams participating, Hall also had to pay Chet Mysliwiec the sanctioning fee.

By late August in 1950, the Speedrome management decided that they no longer needed to pay Mysliwiec the sanctioning fee. They believed that enough of the cars and drivers would stay and race with them without Mysliwiec and his sanctioning fee. So one night when Chet pulled into the Drome, he was told that he was no longer welcome and the track would be racing without him and his sanctioning fee.

What the Speedrome promoter, O.C. Hall, was not aware of was that Chet Mysliwiec never ran away from a fight and never gave up the battle. It was a fatal decision for the Drome and its future. Chet promptly contacted the car owners and drivers in his North Michigan Stock Car Racing Club and informed them that he had rented the paved quarter-mile track at Nunica Speedway which was located near Nunica, Michigan, halfway between Grand Rapids and Muskegon. He finished the balance of the 1950 season at Nunica.

What O.C. Hall, the Speedrome promoter, did not realize was this would be the beginning of a fight between the Drome and Berlin Raceway for the next sixteen years for race cars, drivers, and fans. The two

tracks, approximately ten miles apart, would be racing on the same day of the week, Saturday, so the participants and fans had to make a choice between the two tracks. The Speedrome management suffered the most between the two tracks. They were unable to promote the track successfully. In fact, they did so poorly that Chet Mysliwiec leased the track from them in 1953.

After Chet Mysliwiec finished out 1950 at Nunica Speedway, he met with the Berlin Fair Board and put together a lease of the fairgrounds property in Marne, Michigan. The small town had originally been named Berlin, Michigan until World War I. In 1919, the townspeople made a patriotic decision to change the town's name to Marne, which was where the surrender of the war was held ending World War I. At that time, the fairgrounds had a half-mile dirt track which held horse racing during fair week. The Berlin Fair has been held annually since 1855.

An interesting side note is that former General Motors President, Ed Cole, was born and raised near the Berlin Fairgrounds. Cole co-headed a team that developed the 1949 Cadillac V8 engine. He became the chief engineer of the Chevrolet Division of General Motors in 1952. Cole then went on to replace the old stove-bolt six cylinder engines. The new engine was the famous 1955 small block V8 which has become the engine of choice of racers ever since. Cole retired from General Motors in 1970 to become CEO of Checker Motors Company of Kalamazoo, Michigan. Unfortunately, Cole was fatally injured in a light plane crash before taking control of the company. He was flying solo in rain and fog on his approach to an airport in Mendon, Michigan, near Kalamazoo.

The Berlin Fairgrounds covers a total of thirty-five acres of land. In 1951, it had a covered grandstand seating about eight hundred fans. The only negative aspect of the layout was that the grandstand faced to the west directly into the setting sun. Before auto racing came to the Berlin Fairgrounds, the horse racing events were held during daylight hours thus there had been no reason to consider the issue of fans having to look directly into the setting sun to watch auto racing.

It should be mentioned that prior to Chet Mysliwiec's opening of Berlin Raceway in 1951, the fairgrounds had been used for auto racing in 1947 and 1948 by the Trackmasters Racing Club. The Trackmasters had used the existing dirt half-mile track that existed from the horse racing days.

Mysliwiec decided that racing the jalopy stock cars on the dirt half-mile track was not wise for two reasons: one, that the construction of the cars made them unsafe for the high speeds gained on the big track, and secondly, it would be too easy for the cars to get spread out on the big track and fans would find that aspect too boring.

As soon as winter was over and the ground had thawed out in 1951, Chet had earth-moving equipment at the track with trucks delivering the clay with which he built a new fifth-mile dirt track directly in front of the grandstand.

Bob Bagin, who had been involved with Berlin Raceway all of his life, working with Mysliwiec, said, "I was at the Berlin Fairgrounds playing baseball with some other guys. We were playing in the fourth turn of the old horse racing track. All of a sudden dump trucks started rolling in and dumping dirt in front of the grandstands. I walked over to see what was going on and met Chet and Rose Mysliwiec for the first time. They were telling the trucks where to dump the dirt and then directed a bulldozer where to move it around as they constructed the fifth-mile track."

The track was laid out to use the front straight-away of the old half-mile track and the infield held the scoring and announcing posts. There already existed a large infield platform for use as a stage for acts during the Berlin Fair. The pits were located near the fourth turn of the half-mile track. Lighting equipment was installed for evening racing and the first program was held on Saturday, April 28, 1951, with Gene Farber, from Muskegon, winning the feature in a 1932 Ford coupe stock car powered by a flat-head engine. Berlin Raceway was born.

The period of racing between 1951 and 1957 was probably the most fun time of racing for the competitors because the cost of racing was so low. The cost of getting into racing at that time was somewhere between \$200 and \$500.

In the beginning, Chet Mysliwiec handled the job of directing pit operations and the line-ups of the cars for the various races. Later, Forrest House took over that position.

One person who helped give us the history of Berlin during the 1950's was Mrs. Allen, who kept track of the finishes of the races and the points the racers scored.

The first track announcer was Noel Black, who was a college student at the time.

Hank Heald took over the mike later on that year and held the announcing post till 1958. Hank was at his best when groups of traveling racers visited Berlin Raceway because he followed many of the big car and midget racing groups around to other tracks where he was also the track announcer at those events. So when those teams appeared at Berlin, he could talk about each driver as they appeared on the track. Heald could tell the fans which of the teams were hot and who were not. He also could point out who had had bad luck recently and crashed and what injuries the driver suffered.

The next announcer at Berlin was John Shipman, who took over in 1958 and stayed as Berlin's announcer till he retired in 1998.

The first flagman at Berlin was Ben Crampton who had been involved in auto racing for many years. Crampton had tried racing big cars before World War II, but soon determined he was better off as a car owner, hiring drivers for his car. After the war ended, Ben sold off his racing equipment and began his career as a flagman. He was a professional at his job of flagging races and was well liked by the racers. Gordy VanderLaan said of the well-liked Crampton. "Ben just had a certain way of handling the flags. I could look at him and see how he was snapping the green flag between his hands to tell whether he was going to throw the green flag on that lap." Crampton retired to Arkansas eventually. We kept in contact by mail until one day I received a letter from his wife telling me that Ben had passed away.

There were several photographers at Berlin who produced some very professional photos during this time period. Louis Branch of Muskegon, along with Leon Borucki and Marv Laninga, who worked as photographers for the Grand Rapids Press, teamed up to produce outstanding racing photos.

Don and Margie Sollenberger did the scoring for Berlin from 1951 up through 1967 when they were forced to leave because of a serious illness which prevented Don from carrying on his job as scorer. When the Sollenbergers first began scoring at Berlin in 1951, they were working under the di-


rection of Clare Stader of Stader Timing Service, so they were not only scoring Berlin but also several other tracks in Michigan. Chet Mysliwiec finally hired them directly to work only his track, so from then on they worked directly for Mysliwiec. Diane Mysliwiec, who married Bill Mysliwiec, the son of Chet and Rose Mysliwiec, is a daughter of Don and Margie Sollenberger. Moore's Hobby Shop handled the sound system for Berlin when the track opened in 1951. Later on, George Volkema took over the sound system.

At one point an issue arose concerning the amount of purse money Berlin paid out. Traditionally, racers felt that race track promoters in general were not paying a fair purse to the race teams. The racers decided to push the envelope by signing a paper indicating that unless their demands were met they would not race at Berlin. Of course, Chet said, "Fine, do what you gotta do." We have included a copy of the signatures of the drivers in the protest. Some of the names that stand out are: Bob Knight, Glen Rockey, Jack Smith, Mort Anderson, Dick Carter, Lee France, Jackie Lindhoudt, Bob Clover, Norm Brown, Bill Sherman, Bill Wiltse, Jack Sanborn, Ray Flannery, Harold Ende, Jack Beduhn, George Roberts, Jimmy Rinner, and Johnny Johnson.

So how did the organized effort of the racers do in their attempt to force Chet to up the ante? The Saturday evening of the strike, some of the ring leaders pulled their trucks and trailers to the track and parked on the shoulder of Berlin Fair Drive in front of the track. However, more and more of the racers

turned into the track's entrance intending to race. When the ringleaders realized that the strike had

failed, they gave in and raced and no more was heard about the issue.

In that era, there were some cars and drivers who stood out. One of the best looking cars was the #C1, owned by Ed Krupp and Bob Marz, sponsored by Junior Hosford, who owned Mutual Auto Parts. The car was a 1932 Ford two-door sedan, painted blue with a professional painter doing the lettering and numbering in yellow and the interior painted aluminum. The car was driven primarily by Jimmy "Ping-Pong" Rinner, along with a host of other front-runner drivers.

Jack Cummiford, who raced the blue and grey #24, had a used truck lot on South Division Avenue in Grand Rapids. You couldn't miss his location because he had placed one of his stock cars on the roof of his office. The business was entitled 'Truck City' and, for a while, Cummiford had track announcer, Hank Heald, as a business partner.

A stock car that stood out was the car owned and driven by Roger Joneson from Muskegon. It was a 1932 Ford coupe that was chopped and channeled. Joneson had set a large bucket, filled with nuts and bolts, in the trunk area. Roger would use the bucket to adjust the weight around on the rear of the car by either adding to or subtracting from the contents of the bucket.

Another personality at the track was Bob Whitcomb, who went by his Polish name of 'Jasiu.' He was a part-time announcer at Berlin, but his real job was at radio station WGRD, where he was a disk jockey. He had a weekly program called "Polka Time." Because of his love of racing, he gave a lot of free air time talking about Berlin Raceway.

The racers of that time came with all kinds of personalities. Gordy VanderLaan, with his good looks and feature-winning ways, was cocky, but in a good way. Gordy has the distinction of winning the longest short-track race in Michigan when he took the checkered at the Ionia Fairgrounds in the 500-lap stock car race on the one-half mile dirt track in 1951.


Willy Wik was a veteran of racing across the nation. He always had interesting stories to tell about the month-long activities at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway where he crewed for several teams in the 1950's. He was crewing for Bob Sweikert when the team won the Indianapolis 500 in 1955.

Johnny Johnson had a sparkling personality. His real last name was Briel. Like many other racers of that time, he used an assumed name to race, so his family wouldn't know that he was driving a race car. Racers in those days led a rough life and racing was frowned upon by some people. Not only did Johnny do well at Berlin, but he was also a standout midget and sprint car driver. Johnson was a talker, and especially loved to talk about racing. He always flashed a big smile for fans.

Wally Sanders had a long and successful career beginning in the early 1950's. He was racing the red #12 supermodified for Jerry Rose at the end of his career. Rose had been a car owner since the early 1950's. He had great success with Gordy Vander-Laan, until Vander-Laan was injured and could no longer race. Sanders picked up right where Gordy left off and continued to pile up feature wins in the tough supermodified division. In the mid 1960's, the team made a decision together that they had had enough racing and retired.

Glen Rockey was always the proverbial hard-charger. He only knew one way to race and that was to stand on it and go full-bore racing. Rockey had an outgoing personality and was a happy-go-lucky kind of guy. He mostly drove his own equipment and might have had a brighter career if he had hooked up with an affluent car owner who had better equipment. Glen also raced sprint cars, again in his own equipment and competed in several "Little 500's." I personally witnessed his tragic death in 1959 when, driving Lefty TerHaar's supermodified, when he slammed into the fourth turn wall at Berlin.

"Wild" Bill Wiltse acquired his nickname from announcer Hank Heald. He was a very determined racer and was at his best on smaller tracks. Wiltse drove for Lefty TerHaar toward the end of his career. In 1959, the team split. Bill continued his racing career at the Grand Rapids Speedrome after leaving TerHaar.

Jimmy "Ping Pong" Rinner was well-liked by fans. He did his best racing while in the #C1, a 1932 Ford sedan sponsored by 'Mutual Auto Parts.' Later in his career, Rinner drove for Lefty TerHaar in

his supermodified, bringing the Mutual Auto Parts sponsorship with him. For a while "Ping Pong," as he was called, was in the U.S. Army. Before he shipped out to Korea, he would come back weekly to race at Berlin and used the assumed name of Art Rinner. I would guess that maybe the Army frowned on his racing while on leave.

Bob Knight had a stellar racing career and for a good deal of his racing career drove for Chet Mysliwiec in the yellow #1. Bob 'Smokey' Steele was listed as the car owner because Chet didn't want the fans to know that the track promoter owned the best car at the track. Smokey built the cars and maintained them. Knight was very popular with the fans; unfortunately his racing career was cut short with medical problems.


"Tailspin" Tommy Lane, from Muskegon, began racing right after World War II ended. Small in stature, Tommy looked just like a kid but he had a heavy foot. His car owner, Irv Finkler, spent a ton of money on the supermodified cars that Lane drove for him. In 1955, when the Chevy small block V8 came out, Finkler spent over \$10,000 trying to get his cars into victory lane. That was a lot of money in those days.

Eddie VanderLaan came into racing a few years after his brother Gordy. Eddie had a strong racing career starting with the jalopies, modifieds, supermodifieds, and then late models. He had one of the longest careers of Berlin Raceway drivers. Eddie was one of the few drivers who raced on the fifth-mile, the half-mile and the paved .438 mile tracks.

Bill Rider was an easy-going racer who was one of the smoothest drivers at Berlin. He never took unnecessary risks, never drove erratically on the race track. A bad crash on Berlin's

big half-mile convinced Bill to hang up his helmet. On the one-fifth mile track, Rider was a master.

Mort Anderson was a well-liked racer at Berlin. Always smiling, Anderson ran up front of the pack. I will share a personal story about Mort Anderson: It was 1957 and I had just started racing that year. I drove at Berlin, the Grand Rapids Speedrome, the Ionia Fairgrounds and a couple of other tracks. I had been racing on the fifth-mile and then Chet opened up the half-mile for a few shows. Being a rookie, I qualified poorly and started the B feature near the front. I got by the cars in front of me and, wow, I was leading! I heard a car coming up on me and when I got to the third turn, I slid up the track somewhat and Mort Anderson slipped under me to take the lead. I knew that Mort was a good driver and then

remembering what I had always heard veteran drivers say to rookies, "Find a good, fast driver and follow him and do what he does and learn from him." I put this advice to work immediately after he passed me. I got right behind him as we approached the treacherous fourth turn. I thought to myself, I won't back off the throttle till he does. We went into the turn all bent for hell when, all of a sudden, Anderson did something I had not envisioned. He stood on the binders and in that instant I was heading for him at full throttle. By then it was too late to hit my brakes and I instinctively pulled out to the right instead of just hitting him in the rear of his car. From that point on it was all a blur to me, till I found myself sitting in the middle of the track facing the wrong way. I had come close to making it between Mort and the wall, but unfortunately my right rear wheel took the brunt force of the crash. Obviously, the veterans had forgotten to tell me, "the rookie", about brake checking.

Jack Beduhn was a typical racer who built and owned his own racing equipment. Beduhn was not at Berlin to compete with the front running cars owned by owners who had excess money to dump into racing. That kind of money was just not available to Jack and he single-handedly struggled, working on his car all by himself both to build it and then to race it. But Jack loved racing and hung in there. He finally won a Berlin Raceway supermodified feature on August 30, 1957. I remember that night well because I was crewing for Jack and he and I went to a bar after leaving the track to spend his winnings. After that I was cheering for Beduhn to win the feature every week.



When Johnny Roberts brought his newly-built supermodified to Berlin in 1957, he changed the direction of racing at the track. It was the first true supermodified race car at Berlin and soon all of the modifieds were being rebuilt into supermodifieds. The beautiful yellow #1 had a radically scaled down Crosley body with an overhead Studebaker V8 engine. Roberts brought the supermodified era to Berlin single-handedly, which would change the looks and performance of the cars and cause Chet to open up the large, fast, dirt half-mile.

In this part of the Berlin Raceway, we are taking you from April 28, 1951 to October 12, 1957. Chet saw the writing on the wall when Roberts pulled in with his radical new race car and watched other car owners frantically rebuilding their modifieds to supermodifieds. Mysliwiec knew that the speeds of the newly reconfigured cars were beyond the limits of the small fifth-mile track. He began working on the half-mile track and on July 27, 1957 he opened up the big track for competition. The big track was perfect for the faster supermodifieds. Both the drivers and fans loved the fast and wild action-and the die was cast. The supermodifieds ran the halfmile on occasional shows in 1957 when Chet ran the supermodifieds early in the show before the sun went down and finished the program with the other classes on the fifth-mile track under the track lights. Mysliwiec bought the lighting system from the defunct Bigelow Field track to install on the half-mile in time for the opening of the 1958 season.

When jalopy stock car racing began in West Michigan in the late 1940's and early 1950's the cars were really stock. Except for gutting the interior, removing headlights, fenders, and glass windows, there wasn't much more that could be done with the car. Engines, transmissions, and rear ends had to be stock. The flathead engine could not be larger than 251.5 cubic inches and the bore could only be .080 over stock. One stock carburetor was allowed, but no magneto, special camshaft, or special pistons were allowed. Slowly, year by year, the specs were changed and by the mid 1950's the name of the division went from jalopy stock car to modified stock car. The flathead engine became so powerful that alcohol was burned instead of gasoline. The stock bodies were undergoing changes also, as they were chopped and channeled. As overhead V8 engines came out of Detroit on new cars, the racers replaced their flathead engines with the new overhead V8's along with fuel injection. From 1957 on, the race cars at Berlin made a giant leap in evolution when the supermodifieds appeared. These cars were specially built from the frame on up instead of starting with a stock car.

It became the era of "Run what ya brung."

#### Berlin Racing Gets Off To A Good Start

Dick Stoddard and Don Green had the fastest qualifying time, tying at 17 13/100 seconds for the fifth-mile track. Gene Farber was victorious in the 30-lap feature, with Dick Peoples placing second and Bill Sherman third. Additional heat race winners were Farber, Green and Willy Wik.

#### Cummiford Stock Race Victor

May 5, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Cowboy Jack Cummiford, Grand Rapids' neck-risking stock car racer, gulped up the main share of racing victories this weekend as three scattered tracks ran events in Western Michigan.

First Cummiford won the 30-lap feature event at the Berlin Raceway in Marne Saturday night. Then Sunday he followed with a 35-lap feature triumph in Nunica.

Bob Knight won the 25- lap feature race at Big Rapids where Willie Wik, Don Nicholson and Dick Peoples won heat races. Nicholson set a new track record at Marne Saturday, roaring around the one fifth mile oval in 16.30. Ernie Stick set a new mark at Nunica with 16.92. An estimated 3,359 persons saw the three programs.

#### Dick Peoples Notches Berlin Feature

May 9, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Dick Peoples from Muskegon grabbed the 50-lap jalopy feature at Berlin Raceway. Art Ayers won the pursuit race while Don Green, Ed Krupp, Wally Sanders, and Dick Peoples were heat race winners.

# Berlin Win to Wally Sanders

May 16, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Wally Sanders won the feature race at Berlin Raceway Wednesday night. Bob Knight broke the track record in qualifying by setting a 16.25 time on the dirt fifth mile track.

#### Gordy VanderLaan Wins Feature

May 19, 1951 - Berlin Raceway - Gordy VanderLaan was victorious in the 30-lap feature race at the

Berlin Raceway Saturday night as the largest crowd of the season, 1,887 attended. Dick Peoples of Muskegon broke the track record of: 16.25 held by Bob Knight as he qualified in the time of: 16.20. Dick Stoddard came home the winner in the pursuit race.

At Big Rapids Sunday night Willie Wik captured the honors in the feature, with VanderLaan and Wally Sanders in the second and third positions. VanderLaan took the pursuit and Johnny Johnson the four-car dash.

#### Wik Captures Win

May 23, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Willie Wik took the 25-lap feature win at Berlin Raceway Wednesday night with Gene Farber and Glen Rockey trailing him.

#### VanderLaan Memorial Day Victor At Berlin Raceway

May 28, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Gordy VanderLaan held off Gene Farber and Leon Bockheim for the

25-lap feature win on Memorial Day at Berlin Raceway. Dick Peoples set fast time for the night of 16.20, which matched his track record of two weeks ago, while Dick Stoddard won the pursuit race.

#### VanderLaan Winner At Berlin Raceway

June 9, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Gordy VanderLaan won the 30-lap feature stock car race at Berlin Raceway Saturday, passing Gene Farber and Leon Bockheim who took second and third.

#### Feature Honors To Cummiford

June 16, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Berlin's 30-lap feature race honors Saturday night went to Jack Cummiford while Kenny Knoll proved to be another big winner with a win in the heat race and another in the fast-car dash.

On Sunday Bob Knight led the pack at Big Rapids, winning the feature. Willie Wik took the fast-car dash and had a third in the feature.

Heat race winners included Sanders, Ed Krupp and Gordy VanderLaan. Johnny Johnson was second in the feature with Don Green third.

#### Flannery Three In A Row At Berlin

June 30, 1951- Berlin Raceway-Ray Flannery wheeled to victory in the 30-lap feature Saturday night before a crowd of 1,657 Berlin Raceway stock car fans. Second was Bill Sherman followed by Jack Cummiford. Don Nicholson won the pursuit race and Sherman also copped the semi-final.

July 11, 1951 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Sherman of Marne dashed across the finish line the winner in a "blanket windup" to the mid-season championship 100-lap race at Berlin Raceway Wednesday night, beating out Johnny Johnson of Grand Rapids by a margin just better than two car lengths. Gordy VanderLaan also of Grand Rapids was a half car length back of Johnson in the third spot.

The event was biggest of the season to date at the track which drew a crowd of 2,007 and carried a total purse of \$1,167, was hotly contested all the way. Sherman took the lead away from Willie Wik in the 56th lap when the latter's entry was eliminated by a broken axle. Johnson then forged ahead on the 67th lap and was in front until Sherman again took over for the last nine laps.

Bob Bockheim of Grand Rapids was victorious in the semi-final feature, with Kenny Knoll of Muskegon the runner up.

#### Ionia Fairgrounds 500-Lap Race August 26, 1951

het Mysliwiec had opened up Berlin Raceway in April of 1951, but he considered other racing ventures. One such venture was when he promoted a 500-lap stock car race at the Ionia Fairgrounds on August 26, 1951.

The Ionia Fairgrounds was a full half-mile dirt track which had been built for horse-racing in 1914, and was actually a 9/16 mile track, so it was big. A short history of auto racing at this track began with big cars first showing up in 1924. Among the entries were Jack Murray and his "Wisconsin Special," along with Earl King and his Stutz and Fred Honey with a Miller.

In 1925, Marian Martin, a woman race driver, put her Bugatti through the fence. The following year, Joan LaCosta broke the track record at 1.08 and redeemed the female's place in racing.

1937 found Barney Oldfield at the track putting on exhibition runs.

IMCA began sanctioning big car racing beginning in the mid-thirties until World War II put a halt to racing. 1946 saw the IMCA big cars racing at the Ionia Fairground annually through 1949.

Some well-known racers from Michigan raced at Ionia—Joe Bisacky, Ralph Donaldson, Norm Rust, Dick Carter, and Jim Murphy among others. ARCA ran a stock car race on July 17, 1960 which was won by Nelson Stacy.

This race has been the longest short track race in Michigan history. It is a wonder that the race was successful. The cars were made up of mostly 1932-34 cars in which the drivers competed weekly at tracks such as Berlin Raceway's dirt fifth-mile track in features of usually 25 laps. So this race was a giant leap not only in track size, but in the length of the race.

Qualifying was held on Saturday, the day before the race. The fastest thirty-three cars would start the race. The teams were allowed to have a backup car in their pit area, so if their original starting car was wrecked or had mechanical problems, the driver could jump into his backup stock car and continue racing.

There were seventy-eight entries for the race, with fifty-two of that number attempting qualifying. Some of the others were used as back up cars in the race.

When race day arrived, so did the rain clouds, leaving enough moisture on the dirt track to hold up the show for two hours. Racing was scheduled for 1:30 pm but the green flag didn't drop until 3:30 pm. Six thousand fans filled the stands for an exciting day of racing never seen before or since.

Yes, there were crashes and some teams had to improvise to keep their car running. One example was a driver who had a case of oil in his car with each can punched open. When he sensed that the engine was low on oil, he would pick up a can of oil,

and pour it into a rigged-up funnel hooked up to the engine.

Gordy VanderLaan, the eventual winner, had Jack Cummiford as his hottest competitor for the win. Then Cummiford's car went sour on him and he pulled into the pits and jumped into his backup car to run VanderLaan down for the win. However, the car he returned to the race with was not up to par in speed with the stock car he started the race with and he held onto second place but could not catch VanderLaan.

Because of the late start, impending darkness forced the race to end after 420 laps.

Gordy VanderLaan won \$1,000. Jack Cummiford was second for \$500. Flip Thompson third for \$400. Willie Wik, fourth for \$300. Bob Knight, fifth for \$200. Leon Bockheim sixth for \$100. Wally Sanders was seventh, Neil Adgate eighth, Ray Flannery ninth, and Elmer Lovett tenth.

# Wiltse Breaks Track Record – Cummiford Wins Race

April 26, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Two track records broken with veteran Jack Cummiford winning the 20-lap feature race in a roaring start to the 1952 stock car racing season at Berlin Raceway Saturday night. A capacity crowd of approximately 3,000 racing fans saw Wild Bill Wiltse whirl around the oval in 15.04 seconds, a single-lap record, in the time trials.

Then in the first heat Glen Rockey piloted his stock car in 2:02.92, new 10-lap standard. Other heat race winners were Harold Ende, who passed the entire field and Kenny Knoll, who had to circumvent a three-car pile-up on the third turn.

Dick Stoddard, one of three finishers in a 14 car field, won the pursuit race. Wally Sanders finished second to Cummiford in the feature and Rockey was third.

# Farber Breaks Track Record – Wiltse Wins Feature

May 3, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Wild Bill Wiltse, roared around 25-laps in a record 5:23.46, to win the feature race of the stock-car program before 2,840 at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Wiltse, king-pin of Grand Rapids stock car daredevils, cut more than a minute off the track record of 6:53.46 held by Jack Cummiford. Cummiford finished third in Saturday's race. Jim Rinner was second.

Wiltse also won the pursuit race in which just two of 14 cars finished. Ray Flannery and Wiltse passed each of the other entries.

The consolation race, marked by a spectacular but comparatively harmless accident, was won by Glenn Smith. On the 12<sup>th</sup> lap Burr Krupp's car broke a wheel on the fourth turn, spun around, flipped over twice and landed on its side. One car hit him, but Krupp crawled out without a scratch.

Rinner won the fast-car dash and Gene Farber, who set a new track record of 14.61 seconds in the time trials, was second.

#### Wiltse Repeats As Berlin Feature Winner

May 10, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Wild Bill Wiltse won his second stock car feature of the young season Saturday night at Berlin Raceway. He took the lead on the 16th lap of the 20-lap race to finish ahead of Gene Farber and Bob Knight.

A crowd of 1,593 saw Knight win the pursuit and first heat race. Flip Thompson and Harold Ende were also heat winners while Jack Cummiford took the fast-car dash.

Thompson won the consolation with Clarence Haan taking the hooligan event.

#### Wiltse Continues Winning At Berlin

May 17, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Wild Bill Wiltse guided his # 22 around 20-laps in 6:29.25, to win the thrilling feature race of the stock car program before 1,800 at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Wiltse finished ahead of Jimmy Rinner, Gene Farber, and Johnny Roberts. The quartet was never more than three-car lengths apart during the race. Wiltse also won the fast-car dash and pursuit race. Bob Knight won the consolation.

#### Wiltse Again At Berlin

May 31, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — The second consecutive evening of competition at Berlin Raceway near Marne was scheduled Saturday after an extra-capacity crowd turned out Memorial Day to witness a tripleheader attraction featuring the regular stock cars, Crosleys and antique automobiles. Saturday's racing was to be topped by a 50-lap feature event, with the time trials at 7:00 pm and first race at 8:30.

Gordy Vander Laan, Gene Farber and Bill Wiltse waged a hot duel for the honors in Friday's feature, Wiltse coming through to a car-length victory over Farber and Vander Laan taking down third spot.

In the pursuit race, Bob Knight was the winner with VanderLaan second. Len Smith took the fast-car dash opening the evening's racing. Heat races were won by Farber, Burr Krupp, Glen Rockey and Knight. In the third heat race, Jack Shear's car was demolished as it rolled over twice, and then upended. The driver escaped without serious injury.

#### Bob Knight Wins Four Berlin Races

June 4, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bob Knight, celebrating a new baby boy in his household, Wednesday night went all out to gain the 25-lap feature, pursuit, and first and third heat races at the Berlin Raceway.

In taking the four events, Knight by far was the big winner of the night. Other winners were Len Smith in the fast-car dash; Dick Stoddard, second heat; Leon Bockheim, fourth heat; Tar Galor, consolation. Finishing second in the feature was Gene Farber

## Gene Farber Wins Fifty-Lap Feature

June 7, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Husky Gene Farber, who drives for a living, guided his 1932 Chevrolet to victory in the 50-lap feature race of Berlin Raceway's stock car program Saturday night.

A crowd of 2,710 spectators watched Farber take the lead in the sixth-lap and hold it for his second feature victory of the season. Wild Bill Wiltse was second and Jimmy Rinner third.

Wiltse also won the fast-car dash. Kenny Knoll won the pursuit and Ken Merlington the consolation.

Glen Rockey, Dick Stoddard, Lynn Smith and Bill Sherman were heat race victors.

Tony Siciliano suffered face cuts when his car crashed into the retaining wall during time trials.

## Rider Takes Berlin Race

June 14, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bill Rider roared to victory in the 25-lap feature event on Saturday night's stock-car racing program before 2,912 fans at Berlin Raceway. Trailing Rider, were Len Smith and Bill Wiltse.

Wiltse and Smith had won heat races, along with Bob Knight and Bob Zomerhuis, whose heat triumph was his second victory in three years of racing.

Other winners were: Gene Farber, fast-car dash race; Ray Flannery, pursuit; Jack Cummiford, consolation race; and Joe Wiedenfelder, the "hooligan" event.

## Wiltse Cops Feature At Berlin Raceway

June 18, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bill Wiltse was a two-time winner Wednesday night at Marne's Berlin Raceway. In addition to copping the fast-car dash he came home the winner in the 25-lap feature race of the evening. His time was 6:19.45.

Ray Flannery, who won the fourth heat and the pursuit race, also registered a new record for the track when he won the 15-lap consolation race in 3:58.15. Gene Farber was second and Len Smith third in the main feature, Flip Thompson, Wayne Kelly and Bob Zomerhuis were the other heat winners.

## Wiltse Continues To Win At Berlin Raceway

June 21, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bill Wiltse won another feature Saturday night on Berlin Raceway's stock-car program.

Second in the feature was Jimmy Rinner. Kenny Knoll took the consolation race and won a heat race. Other heat winners were Wally Sanders, Gene Farber, and Gordy VanderLaan.

Wiltse, far back in the field, seized the lead in the pursuit when eight cars were involved in a fender-wrecking crash. A crowd of 1,940 saw the races.

In qualifying time trials, Gene Farber set a new track record of 14.45

## Wiltse Takes Top Honors At Berlin

June 25, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bill Wiltse and Gene Farber shared winner honors at the Berlin Raceway Wednesday night, each of the veteran drivers winning two events.

Wiltse copped the 25-lap feature event of the night with Farber trailing in second and Jasper Stykstra third. Farber previously had won the pursuit race. Jack Cummiford was the consolation victor.

Wiltse's other triumph came in the first heat race. Gordy Vander-Laan, Farber and Leon Bockheim won other heats. Bud Lindeman took first in a special two car sports car event, with Bob Wickstrom coming in second best.

Wiltse, one of West Michigan's outstanding stock car pilots, won Wednesday's feature in dramatic fashion. Trailing Jack Cummiford into the final lap, he whipped his car to the front by squeezing inside Cummiford on one of the turns.

Wiltse will be battling a big, desperate field of drivers Saturday night. The 75-lap classic is the midseason championship race.

Trailing Wiltse and Cummiford across the finish line before 1,000 fans Wednesday was Gene Farber. Cummiford won the pursuit and one heat race in addition to his second in the feature.

Other heat winners were Jasper Stykstra, Len Smith and Tom Daley. Stykstra won the consolation race.

### Wiltse Captures Mid-Season Test At Berlin Track

July 12, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — A crowd of 4,345 saw Wild Bill Wiltse win the Berlin Raceway mid-season championship Saturday night.

The 75-lap triumph was another feature victory for Wiltse. Gordy VanderLaan was second.

Wayne Kelly won the pursuit race, Glen Rockey took the consolation and Ray Flannery, Bob Knight, Len Smith and Willie Wik copped heat races. The fast-car dash was won by Chuck Phillips.

## Flannery Beats Wiltse

July 16, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Bill Wiltse, veteran stock car driver, lost his feature racing king crown Wednesday night at the Berlin Raceway, when he placed third behind Ray Flannery of Spring Lake, and Woody Wood of Grand Rapids in a 30-lap affair. It was Flannery's first feature victory of the current season.

Wiltse suffered a wrenched shoulder earlier in the evening when his No. 22 absorbed a rather stiff racing bump, and it was not until after 20-laps that the former champ began to regain his usual racing posture.

July 19, 1952 — Berlin Raceway – Ray Flannery, the Spring Lake stock car pilot, who cracked Wild Bill

Wiltse's grip on the Berlin Raceway feature events, nosed out Wiltse in Saturday night's 30-lap event here before 2,200 fans.

Flannery and Wiltse stuck together for most of the race which had to be restarted when nine cars piled up on the first turn in the first try. Len Smith led for 18 laps, but his hopes were crushed when his radiator blew up, allowing Wiltse and Flannery to take over.

Less than a car length separated the two speedsters when they flashed across the finish line.

Smith and Bob Knight, who finished third in the feature, were two of the heat race winners. Others were Willie Wik and Burr Krupp.

Wally Sanders won the pursuit race and Jasper Stykstra, the consolation event.

## VanderLaan Takes First 1952 Feature At Berlin Raceway

July 26, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Gordy VanderLaan won his first feature of the season Saturday night before 3,100 fans at Berlin Raceway in Marne.

Second to VanderLaan was the consistent Ray Flannery with Jack Cummiford placing third.

Len Smith won the pursuit while Glen Rockey took the consolation race.

## VanderLaan Wins Two Features In A Row

July 30, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Gordy VanderLaan of Grand Rapids zoomed past Jack Cummiford on the 25th lap to win the 30-lap feature stock car race at the Berlin raceway by a quarter of a lap Wednesday night.

The race was re-started after being stopped in the fourth lap when Del Wiersma of Holland flipped over "six or seven" times on the far corner. He was treated for bruises at Butterworth Hospital and released.

VanderLaan who was in ninth position at the start moved steadily past the leaders until the 20<sup>th</sup> lap when he fought past Cummiford, who had led from the start. Johnny Johnson came in third.

Frank VerDuim won the pursuit race and Burr Krupp won the 15-lap semi-feature.

Ray Flannery won the first heat race after avoiding a pileup that occurred when a car driven by Elmer Lovett hurtled over two other cars and smashed in its radiator.

Frank VerDuim won the second heat and Jack Cummiford the third heat. Bill Wiltse won the fast-car dash.

# VanderLaan Captures Third Feature In A Row At Berlin

August 2, 1952 — Berlin Raceway — Gordy VanderLaan weaved through heavy "traffic" at the Berlin Raceway Saturday night and flashed past the checkered flag with his third feature triumph of the season in the 30-lap main stock car event before an estimated 3,000 fans.

VanderLaan, who started in sixth position moved up in the field in the early stages of the race and at the tenth lap, was running third. He wheeled past Jack Cummiford and on the 18th lap roared into the lead overtaking Jim Rinner.

Don Wood, who was injured when he lost control of his car on the third turn of the 15th lap in the feature race, was released from St. Mary's Hospital a few hours after admittance.

He was thrown from the car and at first believed seriously hurt. The races drew a crowd of 2,150.

## Sherman Ends Victory 'Famine' At Berlin

June 13, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Sherman won his first feature in two years with his victory in the accident blemished climax of Saturday night's stock car program before 2,200 at Berlin Raceway.

A spectacular five-car pile-up on the 17th lap of the feature event, started when Bob Knight's racer flipped and was struck while in the air by Bill Wiltse's car, stopping the race at that point, from where it was restarted.

Jack Cummiford, Gordy Vander-Laan, and Johnny Roberts were the other three drivers in the big crash.

Following Sherman across the finish line were Glen Rockey and Gene Farber. Sherman, Eddie VanderLaan, Ray Flannery and Gordy VanderLaan won heat races.

Wiltse captured the fast-car dash; Flip Thompson, pursuit race, and Wally Sanders, semi-final event.

### Rookie Wins In Berlin Feature Run

June 17, 1953 - Berlin Raceway

 Eddie VanderLaan, 24-year-old younger brother of veteran driver Gordy VanderLaan, won the 30-lap feature stock car race at the Berlin Raceway Wednesday night before 1,342 spectators.

A rookie driver, VanderLaan edged past Marv Eppink, to take the lead on the 15<sup>th</sup> lap and hung on for the victory. Tommy Lane of Muskegon came in second and Eppink finished third.

Jack Cummiford won the 15-lap semi-feature, Gene Farber the pursuit race, and Len Smith the fast-car dash.

Heat race winners were Lane, Farber and Bill Rider.

## Gordy VanderLaan Captures His Third Feature

June 20, 1953 – Berlin Raceway

 Gordy VanderLaan, powered to a half-lap lead with his 'new' alcoholgasoline fuel mixture, won the rainshortened feature at Berlin Raceway before 1,300 fans here Saturday night.

The feature race went 17 laps before a quick, short storm made the track too slick for further competition. Second was Glen Rockey, followed by Tommy Lane.

Bill Wiltse, Flip Thompson and Bob Knight were heat race winners. Bill Rider won the fast- car dash; Rockey, the pursuit, and Wally Sanders, the semi-feature.

## Tommy Lane Wins First Feature Of Season

June 24, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Winless so far in 1953, Tommy Lane picked up his first Berlin Raceway feature Wednesday night as he captured the 30-lap feature. Glen Rockey picked up a heat race win and the fast-car dash race. Ray Flannery and Tommy Lane won heat races. The pursuit race was taken by Wally Sanders and Len Smith took the semi-feature.

### Lane & Rockey Both Win Features

June 27, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Rider fought it out virtually bumper-to-bumper with Tommy Lane of Muskegon for the last 15 laps of one section of the double-feature racing Saturday night at Berlin Raceway but Rider was never quite able to edge ahead of Lane. Glen Rockey, also of Muskegon, was the victor in the other feature, Bill Rider finished second while Ray Flannery was third in both events.

Sanders, however, had a big evening in capturing both the pursuit and 15-lap semi-feature, while Rockey added the fast-car dash to his feature triumph. Heat races were won by Jack Cummiford, Ray Flannery, and Bob Knight. A crowd of 1,600 was on hand despite threatening weather.

Bad feelings which had been building up between Bill Wiltse and Bill Sherman, both engaging in shoving on the track, flared up in the pits when the drivers squared off against each other and sheriff's deputies had to step in to break up the ruckus.

## It's Wiltse By Bumper Over Knight

July 4, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Wild Bill Wiltse, giving a spectacular driving exhibition won the 50-lap stock-car feature at Berlin Raceway Saturday night by a bumper.

It took a judge's decision to determine whether Wiltse, who led all the way after starting on the pole, or Bob Knight was the winner.

Third behind Knight, was Glen Rockey of Muskegon, followed by Bill Rider and Marv Eppink.

A holiday crowd of approximately 4,000 persons saw the big show.

Len Smith took the semi which saw 11 cars spin out. Tommy Lane crashed into the guard wall in the feature. He was not injured.

Heat-race winners included Gene Farber, Jim Walker, Marv Eppink and Len Smith. Eppink took the fast-car dash and Jack Cummiford won the pursuit.

The victory marked Wiltse's first feature win of the season.

### Rockey Wins 100-Lap Berlin Race

July 11, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Glen Rockey of Muskegon won the 100-lap mid-season championship at Berlin Raceway Saturday night by half a lap over Bob Knight before an estimated 5,000 people.

Rockey and Knight fought bumper to bumper until the 25<sup>th</sup> lap when Rockey took the lead, but the battle was still on until the 85<sup>th</sup> lap when Knight swerved off the track after a minor collision.

He lost ground that he could never regain by the time he was back on the track. Knight took second, Wally Sanders third, Johnny Johnson fourth, Ray Flannery fifth, Tommy Lane sixth, Bill Rider seventh, Bill Wiltse eighth, Flip Thompson ninth and Ed Anible tenth.

Bob Knight set fast time for the night. Heat winners were Glen Rockey, Ed Anible, and Tar Galen. Marv Eppink captured the pursuit race with Tommy Lane winning the semi-feature.

## VanderLaan's Victory Cracks Jinx

July 18, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Gordy VanderLaan won his fourth stock car feature of the season and broke a jinx Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

VanderLaan seriously injured a few weeks ago, wrecked the "jinx" which says drivers involved in serious crack-ups are through for the season.

Gordy, driving the "Deuce," won going away after taking the lead on the 23rd lap.

A crowd of approximately 3,000 persons saw Glen Rockey lead for

four laps. Then Marv Eppink took over and was later passed by Gordy.

Eppink finished second, Gene Farber third Jack Cummiford fourth, Glen Rockey fifth.

Eddie VanderLaan, Gordy's brother, took the pursuit, while Kenny Knoll, Jimmy 'Ping-Pong' Rinner, Bob VanderMyde and Jack Sanborn won the heat races.

Rinner, driving his last race before leaving for overseas duty in the Army – probably in Korea, also won the consolation. The fast-car dash went to Wally Sanders.

## Rockey Wins In 'Run-Away'

July 25, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Glen Rockey "ran away" from the field to register his first feature triumph in his new car, #8, before 3,700 stock car racing fans at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Rockey, who ran out of gas as he crossed the finish line, seized the lead on the seventh lap and held it the rest of the way. Bill Wiltse was second with Tommy Lane third and Gene Farber fourth.

Wally Sanders, new driver of car C-1, Berlin's big money winner, failed

to finish again, although he won the fast-car dash before a pile-up broke a front axle and ripped off a door.

Heat race winners were Farber, Wiltse, Ray Wright, Bob Shoemaker, and Ed Anible, who survived a rugged race which claimed seven of the ten starters.

Bob Knight won the pursuit race, and Jack Cummiford took the semi-final.

## Two In A Row For Rockey At Berlin

August 1, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Glen Rockey in his #8 won the 30-lap feature race at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

"I think of only one thing during a race, getting in front and staying there," said Tailspin Tommy Lane, an outstanding young stock car driver from Muskegon. "But before and after the race I get 'butterflies' in my stomach." Lane, who has won one feature at Berlin Raceway and one at Whiskey Ridge, had been wheeling stock cars since he was 16.

He's 24 now and has split approximately \$2,000 in winnings this season with Ervin Finkler, owner of his car. Finkler, a cement contractor considers stock car racing as "my sport and diversion." How did Tailspin pick up his nickname? After winning nine straight features last year at Nunica Speedway he spun out of the season championship while in the lead. The spin was a beaut and the moniker was a natural.

### Cummiford Builds New Car And Wins

August 15, 1953 — Berlin Raceway — Jack Cummiford, who didn't have time to paint his new stock car, won his first feature of the season Saturday night at Berlin Raceway in Marne.

A big winner in 1951 when he was North Michigan Stock Car Club champion, Cummiford's luck this year has been mediocre.

Finally he decided to change cars. The gamble worked as Jack won the first time out.

Cummiford grabbed the checkered flag before a crowd of approximately 2,800 fans after a duel with Len Smith who finished second. Cummiford pulled into the lead on the 23rd lap.

Wally Sanders finished third in the 30 lap event. Bob Knight finished fourth in the feature. Bill Wiltse copped the pursuit, the semi-final and one heat race.

Other heat race winners included Bud Meyering, and Bill Sherman. Eddie VanderLaan won the fast-car dash.

## Bob Knight Has Big Night At Berlin

August 22, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight jockeyed his sparkling red #1 racer to three outstanding victories, including the 30-lap feature, in the stock-car program at Berlin Raceway before 3,400 here Saturday night.

Knight, who seized the lead in the feature on the seventh lap and clung to it the rest of the way, won going away over Bill Rider, Gene Farber and Bill Wiltse.

In addition, he won the first heat race of the evening and thrilled the crowd with a fine performance to cop the fast-car dash.

Other heat winners were Art Ayers, who also won the semifeature; Ray Flannery, Bud Meyering and Elmer Lovett. Wally Sanders won the pursuit race.

## Knight Wins Second Straight Feature

August 29, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight swept through a field marred with minor accidents to win his second successive stock car feature race at the Berlin Raceway Saturday night before an estimated 2,100 spectators.

His victory marked the first time that a driver has repeated as a feature winner since Glen Rockey won two in a row earlier in the season.

Knight edged past Kenny Knoll on the 11<sup>th</sup> lap and held that lead to win by three-quarters of a lap over second placer Wild Bill Wiltse. Jack Cummiford was third and Len Smith fourth.

Heat race winners were Eddie VanderLaan, Jack Nelson, and Ed Anible. Smith won the fast- car dash and Bill Rider won the pursuit race. Bob Clover won the 20-lap semifeature.

## Gordy VanderLaan Wins With New Car

August 31, 1953 — Berlin Raceway — Gordy VanderLaan driving a new car scored his first stock car victory, since recent destruction of his own regular entry by fire, when he captured the 30-lap feature race on the Marne layout Monday night topping a program planned for opening day of the Berlin fair. Bob Knight was the runner up and Bill Wiltse finished third.

In the 20-lap semi-feature, Glen Rockey gained the winner's laurels as he was followed across the finish line by Kenny Knoll and Jack Nelson. Art Ayers triumphed in the pursuit and heat race wins were taken by Tommy Lane, Flip Thompson, Rockey and Al Witt.

## Len Smith Returns To Victory Lane At Berlin

September 5, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Len Smith cracked a jinx that has extended over two seasons by wheeling to victory in the 30-lap feature of the stock car racing program at Berlin Raceway here Saturday night. It was Smith's first feature victory in two years.

A crowd of 1,800 watched the Grand Rapids racer push into the lead at the seventh lap and cling to it throughout to beat Gordy Vander-Laan, Eddie Vander-Laan, Bill Wiltse and Bill Rider to the checkered flag.

Heat race winners were Bruce Anderson of Greenville, Kenny Knoll of Muskegon and Wayne Kelly. Eddie VanderLaan won the fast-car dash; Jack Cummiford the pursuit race and the 20-lap semi-feature.

## Bud Meyering Scores First Feature Of The Season

September 7, 1953 – Berlin Raceway – Bud Meyering captured his first stock car feature victory of the season Monday at Berlin Raceway, beating out Bob Knight for the honors in the 50-lap Labor Day event at the Marne oval. Knight, however, added important points to his season championship total, by his runner up finish, as the title battling neared its final stages Eddie VanderLaan was third in the event.

The fast- car dash provided one of the program's thrillers as Bill Wiltse and Bill Rider fought it out on even terms with Wiltse getting the decision in a virtual dead-heat finish. Bill Nelson of Hastings was the winner of the pursuit and Wayne Kelly took the 20-lap semi-feature.

Victors in the heat races were Jasper Stylkstra, Eddie VanderLaan, Flip Thompson, Bill Nelson and Gordy VanderLaan.

### Lane Captures Last Race Of Season At Berlin



Bill Rider won the fast-car dash and set fast qualifying time.

Bob Brecken, a newcomer, took the first heat race. Other heat winners were Wally Sanders, Elmer Lovett and Dick Reese, who was making his first start at the Marne track.

Laverne Peterson romped home first in the colorful pursuit race. Marv Eppink was awarded an opening night award for the "most beautiful car."

## Jack Nelson Leads Green To Checkered

May 8, 1954 — Berlin Raceway — Jack Nelson grabbed the pole position and held it all the way to win the 25-lap class A stock car feature event at Berlin Raceway here Saturday night before 1,300 persons.

Six of the 18 starters were eliminated in the race, with Jack Cummiford finishing second after two of the front runners had dropped out. Bob Knight was third with Bob Brecken fourth and Johnny Roberts fifth.

Gordy VanderLaan won the 15-

lap class B event, finishing ahead of Bill Rider and Johnny Johnson. Glen Rockey won the fast-car dash along with setting fast time in the time trials. Johnson took the pursuit race. Heat race winners were Bud Meyering, Nelson and Johnny Roberts.

### Bill Rider Big Winner At Berlin

May 15, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Rider climaxed an evening of spin-outs and mishaps with an exhibition of steady driving to win the class A 25-lap feature at Berlin Raceway before approximately 3,500 persons Saturday night.

Jack Cummiford finished second for the second time this season, followed by Bill Arnold of South Bend, Indiana.

Gordy VanderLaan won the B feature – which had to be restarted following a traffic snarl. Bill Schippers was second and Eddie VanderLaan, third.

Kenny Knoll of Muskegon won the rough fast-car dash in a tight duel with Tommy Lane after early leader Glen Rockey had been forced off the track just a lap from the finish. Knoll had also set fast time in the time trials.

Eddie VanderLaan won the pursuit race and heat race honors were shared by Cummiford, Gordy VanderLaan and Johnny Johnson. Pile-ups marked two of the three heat races.

## Wiltse Picks Off His First Feature Of Season

May 22, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Wiltse seized the lead on the fifth lap and protected it in a rough race to win the 25-lap class A stock car feature event at Berlin Raceway

here Saturday night before approximately 3,600 persons.

Jack Cummiford was second for the third time this season and Bob Knight, who established a new lap record in the qualifying trials of 14.22 seconds, was third.

Knight won the fast-car dash and Kenny Knoll captured honors in the pursuit race. Heat race winners were Wiltse, Sam Ash (his first checkered flag), Bill Schippers and Al Dryer.

Ed Anible, Sam Ash and Elmer Lovett finished in that order in the class B event.

## Tommy Lane Wins Accident-Shortened Feature

May 29, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Tommy Lane of Muskegon won the feature race at Berlin Raceway Saturday night in a contest halted during the 15<sup>th</sup> lap when a racer driven by Howard Newland flipped in the air after a collision and overturned on the track. Newland was taken to the hospital but was not seriously hurt.

The victory for Lane, the 1953 Berlin Raceway champ, was his first this year. Bill Rider took second, Bob Knight third, Bill Sherman fourth, and Gordy VanderLaan fifth. Lane was a quarter of a lap ahead of the field when the scheduled 25-lap race was called on lap 15.

A crowd of approximately 2,000 persons witnessed Saturday night's racing schedule.

Heat race winners were Vander-Laan, Johnny Johnson, Sanders, Elmer Lovett and Jack Beduhn. Knight finished first in the fast-car dash and Ken Knoll won the pursuit. Bill Rider had the fastest lap in qualifying.

Flip Thompson of Belding won the class B feature with Wally Sanders of Grand Rapids taking second. Clarence Haan placed third.

### Knight Sixth Different Feature Winner

June 5, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight became the sixth different stock car driver of the season to win a Berlin Raceway feature race Saturday night in a contest delayed on the tenth lap when a racer driven by Johnny Johnson spiraled out of control and overturned on the track.

Johnson was not injured seriously and was given emergency first aid. The 25-lap race featured five previous winners who were bidding to register the first repeat victory of the season.

This wasn't accomplished however, when Knight crossed the finish line ahead of Jack Nelson, Jack Cummiford finished third, followed by Gordy VanderLaan, Bill Wiltse and Don Wood.

VanderLaan broke the track record in his qualifying run. He toured the Berlin Raceway oval in 14:15 to replace the old mark of 14:22.

Bill Sherman won the pursuit event in 2:27.15 and VanderLaan took top honors in the fast- car dash.

Heat race winners were Jack Cummiford, Art Ayers, Wally Sanders and Ed Krupp.

Wally Sanders won the B feature in another crash-filled contest. The event had to be stopped twice to remove litter from the track, Art Ayers finished second, Clarence Haan third, and Flip Thompson fourth.

## Eddie VanderLaan Wins Non-Ford Stock Race

June 10, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Eddie VanderLaan swept to victory in the first special non-Ford 25-lap race at Berlin Raceway Thursday night before approximately 1,000 racing fans.

Willie Wik was second in the "strictly stock" race. Bud Fonger was third, Ed Horton fourth with Kenny Knoll fifth. Heat winners

were Fonger, Bob Dickens and Sam Ash. Willie Barron won the fast-car dash and Don Keenan was first in the pursuit race.

Sam Ash won the semi-feature.

## Rockey First Two Time Winner At Berlin

June 12, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Glen Rockey broke the 'one-victory' only habit at the Berlin Raceway by winning his second class A modified stock car feature of the season before an estimated 3,000 spectators Saturday night.

It was the first time this season a driver won his second feature. Rockey had also won the season opener. The class A feature was restarted after four laps when Tom Hill of Battle Creek, locked wheels with Bob Knight, causing a six-car pileup.

Knight was disqualified because his pit crew changed a tire during the lull after the field was given a red flag, which is a stop signal.

Jack Cummiford continued his second place persistence in the class A feature. It marked the sixth time in seven races that Cummiford placed second, Eddie VanderLaan was third, and Gene Farber fourth.

Flip Thompson took the class B feature and Knight won the fast-car dash, setting a record of 57.59.

## Willie Wik Victor At Berlin

June 17, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Willie Wik won the 25-lap Novice Night feature at the Berlin Raceway Thursday night before an estimated 800 fans. Willie Baron, who finished second, also copped the fast-car dash. Hank Kramer took the 15-lap semi-feature event.

Heat race winners were Ed Anible, Don Zanburg, Dan Bone, and Ed Horton. Jack Cummiford won the pursuit race.

## Wiltse Takes Second Berlin Feature

June 19, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Wiltse became the second double-winner of the season at Berlin Raceway here Saturday night, sweeping from second place on the 12<sup>th</sup> lap to the lead and eventual victory in the 25-lap class A stock car feature.

Approximately 1,200 persons watched as Wiltse joined Glen Rockey as the only drivers who have won two main events at the Raceway this season. Jack Cummiford, who started in 13th place, finished second to Wiltse, the fifth time this season Cummiford has trailed the winner to the finish line.

A blocked track when Gordy VanderLaan, Kenny Knoll and Don Wood tangled in the second turn forced a restart after the fifth lap. The three drivers were unable to continue in the race.

Following Wiltse and Cummiford were Bob Knight, and Bill Rider.

Heat race winners were Wiltse, Cummiford, Ayers, and Bill Stebbins. Eddie VanderLaan won the fast-car dash and the pursuit winner was Wood. Fast qualifying time was set by Eddie VanderLaan.

to victory in the Thursday night 25lap novice feature at Berlin Raceway in a crash-filled contest which was halted at the end of 20-laps when the track became too littered for the race to continue.

Wally Sanders finished second and Bob Horton third. Approximately 1,500 persons watched the event. Heat race winners were Bill Rider, Eddie VanderLaan, who also won the pursuit race, Jack Sanborn and Lane. Sanders was the fast-car dash victor and Elmer Lovett the winner of the 20-lap semi-feature.

### Brecken & Knight Berlin Winners

June 26, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Bob Knight beat Jack Nelson by approximately one foot to win the special 15-lap "Feature Winner" before an estimated 3,000 stock car fans at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Only Knight and Nelson finished the special race, staged for this season's 25-lap class A feature winners to date. Four other drivers and cars, Tommy Lane, Bill Wiltse, Glen Rockey and Bill Rider, failed to finish.

Knight received the Capital Airlines Trophy Award from pretty hostess Shirley Tibbetts of Toronto.

Bob Brecken roared home to win his first 25-lap class A feature. Glen Rockey nipped Jack Cummiford for second place and Gordy VanderLaan, who led for 15-laps, finished fourth, ahead of Flip Roberts.

Bill Sherman copped the thrilling pursuit as Bob Brecken, who was leading, spun out near the finish line.

Heat winners were VanderLaan, Johnny Johnson, Ed Anible and Del Wiersmea. Rockey won the fast-car dash.

Newcomer Jim Martins took the class B feature after the race was restarted. Bob Clover was second and Anible third.

## Eddie VanderLaan — All The Way

The win was the first feature victory of the year for VanderLaan who became the eighth driver to crack the victory circle in a main contest this year at the Raceway. Bob Knight was second with Glen Rockey and Jack Cummiford finishing close behind the leaders.

Jack Cummiford won the fastcar dash race and Bill Rider set fast time for the evening. Heat race winners were Bob Brecken, Jack Nelson, Ed Anible and Mort Anderson.

The 25-lap class B feature was won by Jack Sanborn. Ed Horton crossed the finish line first in the strictly stock contest.

## Wally Sanders Captures Second Stock Feature

July 8, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Wally Sanders won his second 25-lap Class A strictly stock feature event of the season Thursday night before an estimated 1,200 persons at Berlin Raceway in a "strictly stock' car program marred by an accident that sent another driver to the hospital.

Kenny Knoll, 29, who has been racing stock cars in the West Michigan area for five years, was taken to St. Mary's Hospital after he was involved in an unusual two-car crash.

Knoll spun out in the second ten lap heat race, flipped and rolled over twice, crushing his car's roof. A second car turned over in mid-air and landed on Knoll's car.

A hospital attendant said Knoll incurred arm scratches and was "shaken up." He was released after treatment.

In addition to the feature, Sanders also took the fast-car dash. Sunny Dubois placed second and Gene Gillette third in the feature.

Ed Bartlett roared to victory in the semi-feature. Dave Vandermale copped the popular pursuit race. Heat winners were Art Ayers, Ray Orzchaski, Ralph Baker, and Dick Keenen.

## Brecken Captures Berlin From Last Place

July 10, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Brecken threaded his way "through the pack" from 20th place to win the Class A feature at Berlin Raceway Saturday night after officials postponed the Midseason Championship event to next Saturday because of the slick condition of the track.

Brecken and Gordy VanderLaan, winner of the semi-feature, staged outstanding driving exhibitions before the estimated 2,100 persons for their victories.

Brecken moved from last place in the feature to nose out Bill Wiltse and Jack Cummiford. Gordy Vander-Laan was fourth and Johnny Purwin fifth.

Brecken is the third double winner at Berlin. Brecken, Wiltse and Glen Rockey have each won two feature events this season.

Heat winners were Eddie Vander-Laan; his brother Gordy, who was released from the hospital to drive in Saturday's program; Wally Sanders and Bill Wiltse. Wayne Kelly captured honors in the pursuit race.

VanderLaan out-sped Bud Meyering in the semi-feature.

## Sanders First In Four Events At Raceway

July 15, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Wally Sanders "cleaned house" roaring home first in four events before approximately 1,300 stock-car fans at the Berlin Raceway Thursday night.

Sanders started his sweep, which is a rarity at the Berlin oval, by copping the fast qualifying time then he won every race he entered, except for the pursuit race.

He grabbed the checkered flag in the first heat race, fast-car dash and climaxed his night's work with a 25lap feature victory.

Gus Bray was second and Bill Rider, who won the pursuit, third in the final feature. Elmer Lovett. who earlier took a heat race, grabbed top money in the semifeature ahead of Jack Robinson and Wayne Bennett.

Keith Middleton and Cliff Half

won the other heats.

## Rider Takes Midseason Title Race

July 17, 1954 - Berlin Raceway - Bill Rider took command on the 41st lap of the 50-lap midseason championship race for class A stock cars at Berlin Raceway Saturday night and went on to capture the prize laurels. Tommy Lane, who had set the pace to that point, had to settle for third place behind Eddie VanderLaan who had been a sharp contender throughout and got the runner-up spot.

On the fifth lap of the 50-lap title affair, Glen Rockey and Jack Cummiford were involved in a crash and Bill Sherman and Gordy VanderLaan piled in, the latter being unable to continue after the cars were untangled. The mishap forced a restart

on the fifth lap.

Wally Sanders took the 50-lap championship honors for class B, followed by Ray Flannery and Sam Ash. The "to-the-finish" pursuit, a special event which went 32-laps, Bob Brecken was the final survivor. Last to go out had been Cummiford and Lane.

Dick Obies also of Grand Rapids is one-up on Bartz. Obies won in the first race of his career Thursday night. He took the checkered flag in the semi-feature. Bob Dickens was second across the finish line, followed by Ray Sloane and Ray VanDyke.

Sanders also roared home first in the fast-car dash and "newcomer" Bartz took the crowd-pleasing pursuit. Heat race winners were Dale Vandermale, Gus Bray, Al Gepner and Whitey Tania.

### Rider On Win Streak

July 24, 1954 - Berlin Raceway

- Bill Rider Saturday night became the first Berlin Raceway driver this season to capture three feature events as he swept to the victory in the evening's class A headliner. By taking the checkered flag he also scored another "first", coming back after last week's big win in the midseason championships and thereby gaining a special award posted by the management.

Eddie VanderLaan was the runner-up to Rider, with Wayne Kelly third, Bob Knight fourth, and Jack Cummiford fifth.

Bob Brecken was victorious in the fast-car dash and Knight in the pursuit. Heat race wins went to Rider. Rockey and Art Avers. Johnny Johnson won the semi-feature and Bob Knight took the consolation race.

Heat race winners were Gus Bray, Elmer Lovett, Morris Horton and Jim Sloane. Sanders won the fast-car dash, with Bray copping the pursuit. Jim Larson was first in the semi-final event. Sanders also set fast time during time trials.

## Wiltse Wins Wild Berlin Stock Feature

July 31, 1954 - Berlin Raceway - Bill Wiltse took the lead on the 20th lap and roared to his third victory of the season in the 25-lap class A feature, which produced three crashes at the Berlin Raceway Saturday night before an estimated 2,500 stock-car spectators.

The feature was restarted after Bill Rider, Kenny Knoll and Tommy Lane crashed into the grandstand concrete wall on the fourth turn. On the first lap after the restart. Brecken crashed into Rider and Jack Cummiford. Brecken and Cummiford did not continue.

Gordy VanderLaan spun into the concrete retaining wall on the 19<sup>th</sup> lap, demolishing his new car.

Eddie VanderLaan captured second, and Gene Farber of Muskegon, who led for 18 laps, finished third ahead of Jack Nelson and Mort Anderson both from Greenville.

He was bruised.

The class A feature was restarted after five cars piled up on the 14<sup>th</sup> lap, in addition to Gapner's accident. Ted Otten, leading the race at the time, crashed into the concrete wall.

Wally Sanders of Grand Rapids won his fifth straight class A feature, followed by Willy Barron and Gus Bray. Ed Anible took the class B race, Bill Vantween second and Bill Robinson third. Only seven cars finished out of 23 starters in the class B event, which also had a five-car pileup.

August 12, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Wally Sanders, # 1 target of the strictly stock feature at the Berlin Raceway, surged into the lead in the 16th lap and coasted in for his sixth straight victory Thursday night before approximately 3,000 persons.

Sanders, who carried an additional \$50 reward if he was beaten, also copped the fast-car dash and set fast qualifying time. Joe Norwood raced to a class B feature victory.

Heat winners were Dick Sieperida, Fred Carr, Jack Roerig and Willie Barron. Don Vantinen won the pursuit race.

## Slowest Qualifier Wins AAA Midget Feature

August 19, 1954 - Berlin Raceway - Thirty-seven-year-old Potsy Goacher of Anderson, Indiana, a veteran of Indianapolis Speedway competition, drove the slowest qualifier in the field to victory in the fifty-lap, AAA - (American Automobile Association) midget race feature before 7,500 at Berlin Raceway Thursday night.

Goacher led the field of 18 starters from the eighth lap on and was never seriously challenged.

Goacher, who started on the pole, lost the lead to Mike Nazaruk on the first lap, and then took it back when Nazaruk spun out on his eighth whirl around the fifth-mile track.

Second to Goacher was John Fedrick, who battled Shorty Templeman all the way. Rex Easton finished fifth.

Only two of the 18 starters failed to finish, Nazaruk and Chuck Rode, who spun out on the 18th lap. Goacher's time was seven minutes and 12 seconds. Goacher, Nazaruk, Rodee and Rex Easton won heat races before the crowd, largest of the season for West Michigan racing. Joe Barzda won the pursuit race.

## Cummiford Wins 100 Lap Berlin Race

August 21, 1954 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford cracked the jinx that's dogged his racing all season Saturday night by winning the 100-lap stock feature event of the Michigan Auto Sweepstakes before an estimated 5,500 persons at Berlin Raceway.

And for a while it appeared that Cummiford, who had finished second

on numerous occasions, would trail across the line again. He ran second to Eddie VanderLaan for 67-laps, then took the lead and held it.

Bill Rider finished second when VanderLaan was forced out on the 97<sup>th</sup> lap with a blown tire. Trailing were Jack Nelson, Ray Flannery, Dick Nielson and Bob Clover.

Wally Sanders continued his blistering victory pace in the 50-lap strictly stock feature, posting his seventh strictly stock triumph. He beat out Gus Bray and Dick Sieperda with Willie Wik and Jack Stempler in fourth and fifth.

Kenny Knoll of Muskegon was the winner of the 75-lap class B event, with Sanders and Jack Sanborn finishing second and third.

Wally Sanders continued to dominate the strictly stock car class with another feature win. He was followed in the 50-lap race by Gus Bray, Dick Sieperda, Willie Wik, and Jack Stempler.

Sanders bid for number seven was spoiled when a car spun out ahead of him on the last lap. He hesitated and Bray swept to the finish line. Third was Jack Cummiford, followed by Ray Flannery, and Sonny DuBois.

Glen Rockey won the class B event with Bud Meyering second and Jim Walker third. Heat race winners were Don VanTinen, Ed DeVries, Ken Crane and Ed Carr. Sam Ash took the pursuit race and Al Kamp was the semi-feature winner.

## Kazoo Driver Jimmy Born Wins Berlin Opener

April 16, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Jimmy Born of Kalamazoo won opening night honors in the modified stock car races at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Born, winning his first feature race at the Marne track, seized the lead early in the race, then lost it to Johnny Johnson. Born regained the lead and withstood the challenge of Ralph Baker for victory.

#### Nielson Wins Feature At Berlin

April 23, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Dick Nielson of Trufant, a sophomore in stock racing circles, won the first feature event of his young career Saturday night by copping honors in the 25-lap grind at Berlin Raceway.

Nielson seized the lead on the fifth lap and held it in a bumper-to-bumper duel with three other drivers to thrill an estimated 3,600 fans who watched the first program of the season at the Berlin track.

Trailing Nielson, and second place winner Eddie VanderLaan were Bob Knight, Bill Wiltse and Jack Cummiford. Art Ayers and Elmer Lovett shared honors in the two 15-lap semi-finals, and Muskegon's Tommy Lane beat Flannery and Cummiford in the Australian pursuit.

Bill Rider won the fast-car dash, with Knight and Wiltse trailing. Heat race winners were Eddie Vander-Laan, Ayers, Sam Ash and Bud Meyering.

Wiltse established a new track record in the qualifying trails turning one lap in 13.89 seconds. The old record of 14.12 was held by Knight.

### Cummiford Wins Berlin Feature

April 30, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford broke through the field on the fifteenth lap and clung to the lead for victory in the modified stock car racing feature at Berlin Raceway Saturday night. Approximately 3,400 watched the program.

Bob Brecken led throughout the early stages with Bob Knight and Eddie VanderLaan challenging. Knight and VanderLaan went out after seven laps with flat tires and Cummiford and Bill Wiltse took over. Wiltse finished second followed by Brecken, Bill Rider, Johnny Roberts, and Bill Sherman.

Glen Rockey of Muskegon won the Class B feature, another 25 lap event, with Calving Gage second. Other winners were Brecken, Burr Krupp, Art Ayers and Don Drier. Heat races Wiltse, fast car dash and Dick Nielson, Australian pursuit.

## Flannery Back In Winner's Circle

May 7, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Muskegon's Ray Flannery, who had trouble winning features since he copped the Berlin Raceway scoring crown in 1952, stepped into the track's winning circle for the first time in two years Saturday.

After trading the lead with Jimmy "Ping Pong" Rinner in a thrilling all-out finish, he surged ahead to stay in a stretch duel before 2,500 racing fans in the 25-lap feature event.

Jack Cummiford, who also closed with a rush, was judged the winner over Rinner for runner-up honors. Bob Knight and Bill Wiltse followed.

Another Muskegon driver, Glen Rockey, won his second straight Class B feature, seizing the lead early to lap the field. Flannery, Bud Meyering, Flip Thompson, and Calvin Gage won heat races. Wiltse took in the fast car dash and Tommy Lane captured the Australian pursuit. Owen Foor was the consolation race victor.

## Flannery Wins Second Berlin Feature In A Row

May 14, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Muskegon's Ray Flannery roared to his second straight Berlin Class A stock car feature triumph Saturday night before an estimated 3,000 spectators.

Flannery won the 25-lap final event ahead of Bud Meyering and Jack Cummiford. Art Ayers took his second 25-lap Class B race of the season. Johnny Johnson finished second and Ed Krupp third.

Heat race winners were Meyering, Johnny Roberts, Ayers and Eddie Streck. Streck also copped the rough Australian pursuit race. Bill Wiltse, fastest qualifier, took the checkered flag in the fast car dash.

### Bob Brecken Wins Feature

May 21, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Determined Bob Brecken made up for a costly spin in the 15<sup>th</sup> lap with a fast surge at the finish to win the Class A feature race at Berlin Raceway Saturday night before some 3,6000 racing fans.

Brecken and Ping Pong Rinner spun out of control while fighting for the lead at the stretch turn. Rinner spun out of control again two laps later and had to withdraw from the race.

Johnny Roberts, of Saginaw, led for four laps until Brecken and Rinner took over. Jack Cummiford, who took second place, seventeen times last season, copped his second runner-up finish of the year. Bob Knight was third and Tom Laze fourth. Ray Flannery was running third but a costly spin dropped him to seventh.

Chuck Shepherd won the "B" feature. Heat winners were Rinner, Knight, Mort Anderson, Jerry Little and Tommy Lane. Knight also won the Australian pursuit.

#### Knight Wins Berlin Race

May 30, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight swept across the finish line three times Monday night before 4,750 fans at Berlin Raceway, wining three stock car events including the 40-lap Class A feature.

Knight won the first heat race and the Australian pursuit in addition. Following him in the feature were Jack Cummiford, Jack Nelson, Ping Pong Rinner and Bill Sherman.

Elmer Lovett beat out Art Ayers and Jerry Little in the 40-lap Class B event. Other winners included Tommy Lane; fast car dash and Bob Brecken, Lovett and Chum Lewett for heat races.

## Cummiford Wins Berlin Feature

June 3, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford and John Murray were winners of feature races in an accident-marred strictly stock car program at Berlin Raceway Friday night. An estimated 1,600 person attended.

Ray Rahn of Muskegon was shaken up when his car crashed into a light post on the thirteenth lap of the Class B feature race.

Cummiford won his first victory of the season in capturing the Class A event. Second was Wally sanders, followed by Clarence Haan. Murray won the B feature with Ken Sutton second. Glen Rockey won the fast-car dash and Sanders took the Australian pursuit. Heat race victors were Ted Otten, Bob Knight, Sanders and Sutton.

## Lane Leads All The Way At Berlin

June 4, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – Tommy Lane, of Muskegon, grabbed the lead on the first lap and staved off continued surges from Jack Cummiford to win the feature race at Berlin Raceway of Saturday night.

Bob Knight was third and Bob Brecken fourth. For Cummiford, his runner-up fish marked the fifth time this year he has finished second.

Jack Nelson, of Greenville, won the Class B feature. Heat winners were Brecken, Eddie Streck, Mort Anderson and Eddie Krupp. Lane won the fast-car dash and Dick Nielson took the Australian pursuit.

## Three Duel To Close Finish At Berlin

June 10, 1955 – Berlin Raceway – An estimated 2,000 spectators watched one of the closest feature races in Berlin Raceway's history Friday night.

Approximately three inches separated the first three drivers in the 25-lap strictly stock car windup. Jimmy "Ping Pong" Rinner, 23, who was released from the Army duty last spring, nipped Wally Sanders and Jack Cummiford for his second triumph in three weeks.

Harry Obie and Johnny Johnson both grabbed checkered flags in the 15-lap semi-features. Rinner added the fast-car dash to his winnings. Art Ayers roared home first in the Australian pursuit. Heat race victors were Glen Rockey. Chuck Rounds, Sam Ash and Jack Cummiford.

## 2,000 Watch Rockey Win Berlin Race

June 17, 1955 –Berlin Raceway – Glen Rockey, of Muskegon roared to his second strictly stock car feature victory of the season after winning the popular fast-car dash before an estimated 2,000 spectators at the Berlin Raceway in Marne, on Friday night.

Art Ayers, who also took a heat race, placed second in the Class A feature ahead of Jimmy Rinner. Fred Wiltse took the Class B checkered flag. Fred Carr was second and Olie Johnson placed third.

Jerry Fitzgerald took the Class B feature, followed by Sam Ash and Bob Clover. Heat victors were Rider, Wiltse, Ash and Bud Meyering.

Elmer Lovett captured the Class B feature ahead of Art Ayers and Flip Thompson. Heat victors were Cummiford, Jack Nelson, Elmer Lovett and Frank Stevvins.

## Rinner Posts Berlin Stock Car Triumph

Flip Thompson won the Class B race which was marred by an accident. Dale Fisher flipped over in his racer and required medical attention when he collapsed while walking away from the wreck.

## Roberts Wins Berlin Opener

April 21, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Johnny Roberts won the season opening modified stock car feature race before approximately 3,100 spectators at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Roberts wrestled the lead from Eddie VanderLaan on the eighth lap of the 30-lap event and won by a half-lap margin. He was chased across the finish line by VanderLaan, Bill Rider, Jimmy Rinner and Dick Carter, in that order.

Muskegon's Glen Rockey outdueled Bob Brecken to win the first 12-lap heat race. Flip Thompson of Belding, took the second heat, and Nolan Johncock of Hastings captured the third heat race.

Brecken won the fast-car dash and VanderLaan took the pursuit race. The 15-lap semi-feature was won by Sam Ash with Ed Rider and Jack Beduhn trailing.

Feature information not available.

## Fast Time to VanderLaan

May 12, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Eddie VanderLaan picked up fast time of the night with a time of 14.72. Tommy Lane of Muskegon took the pursuit race while Bud Meyering, Tommy Lane and Elmer Smith won the heat races. Flip Thompson captured the B feature.

May 16, 1956 - Berlin Raceway - Wally Sanders set fast qualifying time with a lap at 14.26. Jack Cummiford picked up the win in the

fast-car dash race. Heat race winners were Bud Meyering, Bill Rider, and Johnny Roberts. The feature race was rained out when hard showers hit the track. It will be run on Saturday, May 19<sup>th</sup>.

## VanderLaan And Cummiford Take Features

May 19, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – An estimated 3,000 people watched the modified stock car racing program at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Gordy VanderLaan won the class A feature, followed by Jack Cummiford and Eddie VanderLaan. Top class B feature money went to Elmer Lovett with Dale McCullough and Art Ayers trailing.

In addition to setting fast time of 14.16, Bill Wiltse went on to win the fast- car dash. Glen Rockey picked up the win in the pursuit race, while heat races were won by Gordy VanderLaan, Tommy Lane, Flip Thompson and Glen Rockey.

In a makeup of the class A feature, rained out from May 16th, Jack Cummiford won with Gordy Vander-Laan and Glen Rockey in that order.

## Rain Washes Out Berlin Feature

May 30, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – More than 5,000 witnessed the Memorial Day modified stock car program at the Berlin Raceway.

Jack Cummiford won the fastcar dash after setting fast qualifying time of 14.12. Heat race winners were Sam Ash, Flip Thompson, Eddie VanderLaan and Bill Wiltse. Dick Nielson captured the B feature.

Rain washed out the class A feature race and "Wreck'em Derby" and will be run Saturday night in addition to the regular events.

## Flannery/ VanderLaan Berlin Feature Winners

June 2, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Over 3,000 fans witnessed the accident marred modified stock car race program Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway. The caution flag was waved in all three feature races.

In the running of the rained out Memorial Day 50-lap main event, Ray Flannery emerged the winner after a head-on collision eliminated early pacesetter and apparent winner, Eddie VanderLaan. Gordy VanderLaan and Jack Cummiford followed Flannery across the finish line. Bob Brecken escaped serious injury in this event when his car left the track and rolled over.

After a seven-car pileup, Gordy VanderLaan won the 30-lap class A feature race, followed by Dick Seymour of Kalamazoo and Bill Wiltse.

The fast-car dash race went to Bill Wiltse and the heat race winners were Jack Nelson, Jack Cummiford, Eddie VanderLaan and Dick Nielson. Jack Cummiford set fast time of 14.33. Nielson won the class B feature but had to forfeit the triumph to Mort Anderson after passing another car on the yellow flag.

## Gordy VanderLaan Wins Third Feature At Berlin

June 9, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Gordy VanderLaan out-dueled Bob Knight to win the grueling 25-lap class A feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway before an estimated 3,350 fans. Knight led for 17 laps but couldn't stave off VanderLaan's second consecutive feature triumph. Wally Sanders and Jimmy Rinner followed the pair across the finish line.

The class B feature was halted on the 17th lap of the 25-lap event when a two car accident hospitalized Ross Furgeson of Muskegon. Ralph Dewey escaped injury when his racer catapulted into the one driven by Furgeson. The Muskegon driver was treated for cuts and released. Dick Nielson was judged the winner of the event.

Heat race winners were Jack Beduhn, Art Ayers, Bob Knight and Gordy VanderLaan. Laverne Peterson of Belding captured the pursuit race. Jack Cummiford, the night's fastest qualifier with 16:08 seconds, won the fast-car dash event.

## Despite Early Injury, Amick Tops USAC Midget Field

June 14, 1956 –Berlin Raceway – George Amick, 33 year old daredevil from Los Angeles California, bounced back from an early crackup and despite arm and leg burns drove a sensational race to win the USAC (United States Auto Club) 50-lap midget feature Thursday night.

A roaring crowd of more than 4,000 watched the track veteran outdistance the field studded with "500" notables to climax the Flag Day event.

Amick had to stave off a determined last-lap threat by Rex Easton for the big victory. Easton surged from 17<sup>th</sup> to second and finished only three lengths behind the winner. Eddie Sachs was third.

Amick was hurt in the fourth heat when his midget went into a spin and was struck by Sachs' car. Sachs' front wheel pinned him to the cockpit but he escaped with only minor arm and leg burns.

Heat race winners were Johnny Tolan, Easton, Andy Linden and Shorty Tempelman. Hank Nykaza won the semi-feature race. Jack Turner was the fastest qualifier with a 13.05 lap.

## Cummiford Wins On Last Lap

June 16, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford "cleaned house" Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway, winning all three stock car events he entered.

He copped the third heat race, the pursuit and grabbed the lead from Bill Sherman on the last lap of the grueling 30-lap feature event to gain the triumph before 3,100.

The feature lead see-sawed between Tony Sullivan, Johnny Johnson, Bud Meyering and Bill Sherman until Cummiford gained the advantage. Bill Sherman, Jimmy Rinner, Bill Wiltse and Dick Nielson followed the winner across the finish line.

Heat race winners were Bob Terpstra, Burr Krupp and Wally Sanders with Glen Rockey of Muskegon victorious in the class B feature event. Fast time of the qualifying time trials was set at 16.33 by Bill Wiltse.

## Cummiford Wins Third Feature At Berlin Track

June 20, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford gunned his way into the lead in the final few feet of the race to capture his third feature race of the season in the stock car racing program at the Berlin Raceway Wednesday night.

Cummiford passed Eddie VanderLaan in the thrilling finish of the first night of midweek action at the Marne oval. Jack Beduhn finished third. Approximately 1,000 attended.

VanderLaan and Cummiford who battled all the way to the feature, shared honors Wednesday. Cummiford won the fast-car dash.

Heat race winners were Bill Sherman, Jack Beduhn, John Dantuma and Art Ayers.

Eddie VanderLaan took the pursuit race and Cummiford had fast qualifying time of the night at 14.17.

## Cummiford Grabs Fourth Berlin Feature Win

June 23, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford powered his Ford Thunderbird modified stock car around Bill Rider on the 11th lap and staved off hard-charging Eddie VanderLaan to win the 25-lap class A feature race by a car length Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

Cummiford now leads Gordy VanderLaan 4 to 3 in a tight duel for feature victories. Gordy VanderLaan running third suffered a gear failure on the last lap and finished sixth.

A large crowd of 3,000 fans witnessed the slam-bang program.

New track records were established by Dick Seymour in the pursuit, Gordy VanderLaan in the dash event, Roger Joneson in the second heat, and Mort Anderson in the class B main.

Other heat race winners were Sam Ash, Elmer Lovett and Gordy VanderLaan. Tommy Lane set the qualifying fast time of 14.28.

## Rodee Wins Accident Marred Midget Race

June 28, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Chuck Rodee of Chicago roared from out of the pack to win the accident-marred 100-lap feature of the USAC (United States Auto Club) midget race program at Berlin Raceway Thursday night before approximately 4,000 spectators.

Two drivers, Rex Easton and Leroy Warriner, were injured in a spectactular mishap on the first lap of the 100-lap race. Easton's racer rolled over four times after it was bumped in the fourth turn and had slammed into Warriner's car. Easton was pinned under his racer when it came to rest. Both suffered wrist injuries.

The race was restarted and Rodee broke up a thrilling duel between Roy Graham and Gene Hartley, seizing the lead midway in the race and pulling away from there on to the finish.

The race was run under the caution flag from lap 37 to the 40<sup>th</sup> lap, after Shorty Templeman and Jimmy Davies were involved in an accident. Neither was injured.

Rodee also won the pursuit and the fourth heat race. Other heat race victors were Hartley, Don Branson, and Wally Hostettler. Hartley finished second in the feature, with Johnny Tolan third. Tolan also set fast time at 13.09.

## Cummiford Gains Fifth Berlin Feature Truimph

June 30, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Approximately 3,000 people watched Jack Cummiford roar across the finish line to win the 30-lap modified stock car feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway. The win was Cummiford's fourth in a row and fifth of the season.

Cummiford won by default after running third behind pacesetter Tommy Lane of Muskegon and Eddie VanderLaan who had dueled for the lead the entire race, collided with each other, spinning off the track and out of contention on the last lap.

Fastest qualifier (14.01) Roger Joneson of Muskegon was second followed by Gordy VanderLaan and Bob Knight.

Fast-car dash winner was Cummiford. Bill Rider won the pursuit race and the first semi-feature. The second semi-feature went to Sam Ash. Heat race winners were John Dantuma, Elmer Lovett, Tommy Lane and Bill Sherman.

## Gordy VanderLaan Breaks Cummiford Winning Streak

July 4, 1956 -Berlin Raceway - Gordy VanderLaan battled off the challenges of Jack Cummiford for the first 20-laps Wednesday, then sped to victory in the 40-lap stock car racing feature at Berlin Raceway when his chief threat spun out at the midpoint of the event.

Roger Joneson of Muskegon swept in to second place after Cummiford's bid was nipped by the spinout. Jimmy Rinner was third. A crowd of approximately 3,800 watched the Independence Day program.

Burr Krupp won the first semifeature event, a 15-lap race. Sam Ash copped honors in the second semi, another 15-lap event.

Heat race winners were Mort Anderson, Dick Nielson and Cummiford. Cummiford also won the pursuit race. Gordy VanderLaan captured the fast-car dash, and qualifying fastest at 16.61.

## Mid-Season Championship Gordy Vanderlaan Captures

July 7, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Gordy VanderLaan drove the race of his career Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway to win the 75-lap modified stock car mid-season championship over a field of 25-cars. The victory was worth \$300.

A crowd of 3,300 fans saw Gordy take the lead on the second lap from Jack Cummiford and proceeded to lap the field.

The race was halted on the 73<sup>rd</sup> lap because of an accident involving Bud Rider and Dick Seymour's car. Rider was taken to the hospital. He incurred broken ribs.

Cummiford finished second with the third and fourth positions going to Muskegon drivers Tommy Lane and Roger Joneson. Heat race winners were Bob Knight, Bill Sherman, Mort Anderson, Burt Jones and Kenny Knoll of Muskegon.

## Gordy VanderLaan Cops Sixth Feature Win At Berlin

July 14, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – A crowd of 3,000 fans saw Gordy VanderLaan win the crash-filled modified stock car feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

The 30-lap event saw the race leaders Mort Anderson, Bob Knight, Eddie VanderLaan and Jack Cummiford spin out of contention. Gordy VanderLaan took over on the 26th lap. He was followed by Mort Anderson and Bill Rider.

The victory gave VanderLaan his sixth feature win and a ten-point advantage over Cummiford.

Heat race winners were Bob Clover, John Dantuma, Roger Joneson and Jerry Little.

Dick Nielson won the pursuit event and the night's fastest qualifier Marv Eppink (14.13) won the fast-car dash.

First place in the class B feature went to Bud Rider.

## Wiltse Breaks Cummiford-VanderLaan Domination

July 21, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Bill Wiltse ended the Jack Cummiford – Gordy VanderLaan feature win domination at nine straight Saturday night by winning the 30-lap modified stock car main event at Berlin Raceway before 3,000 fans.

Cummiford won four straight and then VanderLaan took five in a row before Wiltse's victory.

Tommy Lane finished second with Ray Flannery of Muskegon in

the third spot. Bob Knight won the class B feature followed by Wally Sanders and Art Ayers. Heat race winners were VanderLaan, Wiltse, Bob Clover and John Dantuma of Muskegon.

Cummiford set fast time of the evening at 14.48 and went on to win the fast car dash.

Bud Rider took the pursuit race while Bob Knight captured the semi-feature.

## Cleveland Driver First In Berlin Midget Feature

July 27, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Jim Florian of Cleveland won the thrilling 30-lap feature in the season's third midget auto racing program at Berlin Raceway, on Friday night before 2,400 fans.

Tooling an Offenhauser, Florian, who also took an earlier heat victory, finished the feature ahead of Pontiac's Russ Jacobson and Larry McCloskey of Saginaw. Florian also set fast time of 13.10 in qualifying.

Bob Zomerhuis won the 15-lap semi-feature and the popular pursuit race. Johnny Johnson took the fastcar dash win. Heat race victors were Kenny Gloar, Johnny Johnson and Jim Florian.

## Glen Rockey Wins First Berlin Feature Of Season

July 28, 1956 – Berlin Raceway Muskegon's Glen Rockey held off Ray Flannery and Tommy Lane for the 30-lap feature win at Berlin Raceway. Lane started off the evening by setting fast qualifying time in time trials of 14.37 and captured the fast-car dash.

Bill Wiltse won the pursuit race. Heat winners were John Dantuma, Bill Wiltse and Eddie VanderLaan. The B feature was taken by Roger Joneson.

### Bob Knight Cops First Berlin Feature Of Season

August 4, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – A crowd estimated at 4,500 people saw Bob Knight stave off hard charging Bill Wiltse and Roger Joneson of Muskegon and roar across the finish line to win the accident marred 30-lap class A modified stock car feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

The main event was halted on the first lap when the cars of Bill Rider and Glen Rockey rolled end over end and a three car collision between Bob Terpstra, Wally Sanders and Burt Jones blocked the track. Rider's racer was demolished but all drivers escaped serious injury.

The win was Knight's first triumph of the season. Heat race winners were Bob Clover of Muskegon, Mort Anderson of Greenville, and Knight with Burr Krupp victorious in the pursuit event. The night's fastest qualifier Roger Joneson of Muskegon 14.19 won the fast-car dash. Bud Meyering was victorious in the B feature.

## Knight Outduels Rockey In Berlin Feature

August 11, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight roared into the lead in the ninth lap and out-dueled Glen Rockey of Muskegon to win the accident marred feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway. Wally Sanders placed third and Roger Joneson fourth. The main event was halted on the first lap when Jerry little and Dick Nielson hit the concrete wall head on, demolishing their cars. Both drivers escaped injury.

Heat race winners were Johnny Johnson, Burt Jones and Sanders, with the pursuit race captured by Flip Thompson.

Semi-feature honors went to Dick Nielson and Dick Seymour of Kalamazoo. The evening's fastest qualifier 14.13, Bill Wiltse was victorious in the dash event.

## Rinner's Late Surge Wins Michigan Sweepstakes

August 18, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Jimmy "Ping Pong" Rinner, Berlin Raceway's top point getter, passed Bill Wiltse on the 65th lap and went on to win the 75-lap Michigan Motor Sweepstakes, Saturday night at the Marne oval.

A crowd of 2,800 fans watched the lead change hands seven times. Mort Anderson led the field of 22 cars for the first six laps; Jack Cummiford held the first spot until the tenth lap when Rinner took the lead for two laps.

Wiltse took over on the 12<sup>th</sup> lap and led all the way until the 65<sup>th</sup>, except for the 33<sup>rd</sup> lap that Glen Rockey of Muskegon headed. Rinner paced the field from lap 65 to the checkered flag.

Bob Knight finished second, followed closely by Tommy Lane of Muskegon. Anderson captured the fourth spot.

Heat race winners were Bob Clover of Muskegon, Rockey and Wiltse. Tommy Lane won the pursuit race and the first consolation and Art Ayers the second consolation. The night's fastest qualifier, Roger Joneson 16.40 of Muskegon won the fast-car dash.

## Flannery Cops Berlin Anniversary Feature

August 25, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Surging into the lead on the eighth lap, Ray Flannery staved off Glen Rockey's last lap bid to win the 30-lap class A feature race for modified stock cars Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

Approximately 3,500 fans were on hand as a strong Muskegon contingent celebrated the Raceway's sixth anniversary program by sweeping the first five positions of the main event. Tommy Lane, Roger Joneson and Kenny Knoll followed front runners Flannery and Rockey, across the finish line.

The class B main, won by Bob Clover of Muskegon, was halted on the 23<sup>rd</sup> lap as Flip Thompson rolled over with his racer blocking the track. Thompson escaped serious injury.

Johnny Johnson escaped injury when his car struck a light pole, putting a portion of the lighting system out for the night.

Heat race winners were John Dantuma, Lane, Flip Thompson, and Dick Seymour of Kalamazoo. Pursuit honors were captured by Eddie VanderLaan with Jack Cummiford out driving Wally Sanders, Bill Wiltse and Jimmy Rinner to win the fast-car dash event. Fast qualifying time was set by Jack Cummiford at 14.00.

## Rockey Cops Accident Marred Berlin Feature

September 1, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – Glen Rockey of Muskegon warmed up for the big Labor Day program by roaring to victory in the accident—marred class A feature race for modified stock cars Saturday night at Berlin Raceway, before an estimated 3,000 fans.

Elmer Lovett escaped serous injury when his racer rolled over several times forcing the main event to be restarted. The Capital Airlines Speed Trophy was captured by Gordy Vander-Laan who edged Ray Flannery in the modified stock car special race.

Heat race winners were Bud Rider, Roger Joneson, John Dantuma and Sam Ash. Jimmy Rinner captured the pursuit and Art Ayers the class B main event. Tommy Lane set fast qualifying time of 13.92 and won the fast-car dash.

## Sherman And Rinner Winners At Labor Day Race

September 3, 1956 – Berlin Raceway – On a new twist, Berlin Raceway ran two racing programs Monday. In the afternoon they raced on the one-half track that had not been raced on since 1948. Glen Rockey, who had raced on the dirt half-mile back in 1948, set a track record of 29.05, then continued his winning ways by winning a special match race against Tommy Lane and also won a heat race. Bill Wiltse won the other heat race while Kenny Knoll picked up the win in the fast-car dash.

The nine lap feature which had been scheduled for twenty laps went to Bill Sherman followed by Mort Anderson and Bud Meyering.

The reason for the shortened race happened as the cars were coming out of turn four on the ninth lap. Glen Rockey's car broke a spindle and he crashed coming out of turn four. Bob Clover was running behind Rockey and could not avoid him and hit him square-on. Clover's car went up in the air and tore down the PA system, along with three wheels off his car.

At that point Chet Mysliwiec, the track promoter, called the race complete at nine laps.

The evening program was run on the regular dirt fifth-mile track. Roger Joneson set fast time of 14.49 and went on to win the fast-car dash.

Heat race winners were; Flip Thompson, John Dantuma, Wally Sanders and Jimmy Rinner, who also went on to win the pursuit race.

Dick Nielson was the victor of the B feature.

Rinner continued his winning ways by winning the 30-lap feature, following by Ray Flannery and Tommy Lane.

(This is the first time Berlin Raceway raced on the dirt half-mile track. Because of a hard crash on lap 9, the race was called official at that point.)

Lane set fast time of the night at 13.96 and went on to win the fast-car dash. Pursuit winner was Eddie VanderLaan. Heat race winners were George Folk, Bob Knight, Bill Sherman and Dick Nielson.

John Dantuma took the B feature win.

## Cummiford & Rinner Tie At Berlin Raceway

September 15, 1956 Berlin Raceway – Jack Cummiford chased pacesetter Jimmy Rinner for 99-laps, drawing abreast of him on the last lap for a photo finish on the 100th lap modified stock car championship race Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway, with Cummiford and Rinner sharing the victory. The winners were followed across the finish line by Wally Sanders, Roger Joneson and Bob Knight.

Heat race winners were Roger Joneson, Jack Beduhn, Dick Nielson, Johnny Johnson, Burt Jones and Wally Sanders.

## Cummiford Takes 7th Berlin Feature





The fast-car dash win went to Gordy VanderLaan.

Jimmy Rinner out-dueled Sanders, Cummiford and Anderson to win the coveted Capital Airlines Trophy Dash.

#### Roberts Conquers Berlin Feature

July 13, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Johnny Roberts held off Jimmy Rinner and Ray Flannery to win the 75-lap feature race for modified stock cars at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Heat race winners were Bob Terpstra, Tommy Lane, and Jack Smith. Smith also won the semifeature race on the fifth-mile track.

In the strictly stock car division, Jim Kestner won the pursuit race while Sam Ash took the heat race. Fast qualifier was Duane Knoll with 15.61. (There was no information on the feature race results.)

## Hartley USAC Midget Victor

July 19, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Gene Hartley of Roanoke, Indiana out-dueled George Amick of Los Angeles, California Friday night at the Berlin Raceway in the 30-lap midget auto feature race on the half-mile track. USAC (United States Auto Club) sanctioned the racing program. A crowd of approximately 6,000 watched Hartley come from behind on the 25th lap of the 30-lap event to nip the midget champion from California. Len Sutton finished third.

Hartley established a new track record for Marne's half mile track in the time trials with a mark of 24.73 seconds and missed the world standard by 1.05 seconds.

Heat race winners were Bill Homier of Houston, Texas, Chuck Rodee of Chicago, Illinois, Freddie Johns of Detroit, Michigan, Don Branson of Champaign, Illinois, and Gays Biro of Toledo, Ohio. Biro also won the semi-feature.

#### Meyering Victor In Crash-Filled Feature

July 20, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Bud Meyering gained his first modified stock car main event victory by threading through a field of 18 cars in the hectic 35-lap event on the fifth-mile track Saturday night at the Berlin raceway near Marne.

The accident-marred, grueling feature race was restarted on the 20th lap after race leaders Johnny Johnson and Jack Cummiford spun from contention and touched off a series of five accidents that blocked the track. Meyering roared into the lead on the 31st lap when pacesetter Eddie VanderLaan spun from the race and staved off Gordy VanderLaan and Ray Flannery of Muskegon for the win.

Winners of the crash-filled heat races were Mort Anderson, Bill Sherman, Wally Sanders and Bob Clover, with Flannery taking the fast-car dash event, Bob Knight the pursuit honors and Sam Ash the semifeature. Gordy VanderLaan set a new one-lap record covering the oval in a 13:62 seconds dash.

In the strictly stock division Duane Knoll set fast time at 15.62. Heat race winner was Sam Ash. Bob Clover captured both the semifeature and the 15-lap feature.

### Holland Driver Tops Berlin Feature

July 27, 1957 - Berlin Raceway - Harold Ende of Holland roared to victory in the 20-lap modified stock

car main event Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway before a crowd estimated at 4,000 people.

Ende chased race leader Bill Rider until he forged his Mercury-powered racer into the lead on the 18th lap. He was trailed across the finish line by Silas Thompson of Belding, Rider, Jack Beduhn, Mort Anderson and Gordy VanderLaan.

Heat race winners on the halfmile track were Curly Moody; Roger Joneson of Muskegon, and Sam Ash. Pursuit honors went to Joneson with Dick Carter of Breckenridge copping the fast-car dash.

Ash also won the semi-feature and Glen Rockey of Muskegon grabbed the class B feature.

VanderLaan was the program's fastest qualifier turning the oval in 26.47 seconds which is a new track record.

Jack Smith of Muskegon was admitted to Butterworth Hospital after he was involved in a three-car heat-race crash. He is suffering with a wrenched back.

In the strictly stock action on the fifth-mile track, Dick Peck set fast time at 15.82. Doug Lang won the heat race while Sam Ash took the semi-feature. (*There was no infor*mation on the feature race.)

Tommy Lane of Muskegon won the class B feature. Jack Beduhn won the pursuit race while Thompson copped the fast-car dash. Gordy VanderLaan set fast time of 13.65. Heat race winners were Kenny Knoll of Muskegon, Art Ayers, Tommy Lane and Cummiford.

In the strictly stock car division, Doug Lang set fast time at 15.89 while Art Ayers won both the heat race and the semi-feature. (*There* was no information on the feature race results.)

#### Jack Beduhn Wins First Career Feature

Heat race winners were Bill Sherman, John Dantuna and Roberts. Jack Cummiford won the dash event and Art Ayers took the semifeature.

In the strictly stock car division, Ed Patrick won the heat race while Bob Clover took the win in the semifeature. Wally Simmons had fast time of 15.31. (*There was no information* on feature results.)

## Roberts Takes Win At AARC Race

#### Harold Ende Takes Berlin Feature

August 17, 1957 — Berlin Raceway — Hard-driving Harold Ende of Holland established himself as the man to beat in next week's title race at the Berlin Raceway by gunning his way to the modified stock car feature victory Saturday in the 30-lap race.

A crowd of approximately 3,200 watched Saturday's 30-lap race on the half-mile track at Berlin.

Ende pushed himself past the early pace-setter Bob Knight on the 15th lap, and then withstood the challenges of Knight, Gordy VanderLaan and Dick Carter of Breckenridge. Ende finished just a car's length ahead of Carter, while Knight was third and VanderLaan fourth.

The accident-marred heat races, in which Don Ward and Duane Knoll, of Muskegon, were hospitalized, were won by Bill Sherman, Jack Beduhn, and Art Ayers. Both Ward and Knoll were released after treatment.

Mort Anderson and Carter won honors in the semi-features, with the evening's top qualifier, Glen Rockey, with a lap of 26.57, of Muskegon, winning the dash event.

Bob Clover was the fast qualifier for the strictly stock division on the fifth-mile track. Steve Sutton was the heat race winner and Joe Crain took the semi-feature. (*There were no* results for the feature race.)

## Ende Wins Berlin Championship Race

August 24, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Harold Ende proved he is

master of the half mile track at Berlin Raceway again Saturday night. Following Ende in the feature was Jack Nelson and Jack Beduhn.

The Holland driver roared home first before approximately 5,000 spectators to win Berlin Raceway's State Championship Modified stock car feature.

The race, scheduled for 50 laps, was halted on the 45<sup>th</sup> lap after Bill Rider's car caromed off the retaining wall and blocked the track. Jack Nelson had fast qualifying time of the evening at 26.68.

Heat race winners were Mort Anderson, Bill Sherman and Roger Joneson. Sherman and Roberts won semi-features.

Art Ayers won the strictly stock feature and in addition he set fast time of 17.37. Duane Knoll and Art Umlor finished behind Ayers in the 25-lap feature.

The strictly stock cars ran on the fifth-mile with Doug Lang winning the 25-lap feature followed by Sam Ash and Johnny Johnson. Dick Peck ran the fastest lap in qualifying with a time of 15.71 with Johnny Johnson taking the fast-car dash. Heat winners were Doug Lang, Bob Clover and Flip Thompson.

September 6, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver art Ayers picked up Berlin Raceway's strictly stock car 50-lap feature race Friday night. He was followed by Duane Knoll and Gary Priest in the 50-lap race. Bob Clover started the night off with a fast qualifying time of 15.20

Heat race winners were Mort Anderson, Bud Meyering, Jerry Little and Bob Clover. Gary Priest picked up the win in the pursuit race with Mort Anderson and Ken Sutton winning the semi-features.

#### Carter Laps Field In Feature Win

September 7, 1957 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Dick Carter roared to victory in the 100-lap season championship feature race on the fifth-mile track Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway before an estimated 5,000 fans.

The Breckenridge racer piloted his Cadillac-powered modified stock car around pacesetter Jimmy Rinner and Jack Cummiford who had set a sizzling pace, on the 51st lap and then proceeded to lap the entire 24-car field. Following the winner across the finish line were Cummiford, Johnny Roberts, Rinner, Gordy VanderLaan, Mort Anderson and Tommy Lane.

Heat winners were Ralph Baker of Saugatuck, Don Ward and Cummiford. Semi-feature race honors went to Bill Wiltse and Bud Meyering with Bob Knight eliminating the entire field to capture the pursuit event.

By virtue of his win, Carter established himself as the leading threat to Harold Ende, Marne's one-half mile track king, in Saturday's 120-lap National Cup race to be run in Monza style of three, 40-lap legs.

## Wiltse Point Winner In Berlin Cup Race

September 14, 1957 — Berlin Raceway — Johnny Roberts, Harold Ende of Holland, and Bill Wiltse were section winners with Wiltse gaining the most points to win the accident marred 118-lap, Monza style, National Cup race for modified stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway. It was scheduled for 120-laps but the first race was halted two laps short so it went from 120 to 118 laps.

A crowd of 5,000 fans saw Wiltse score a third, fourth, and a win in the third 20-mile section to be awarded the title trophy by Congressman Gerald Ford.

Roberts out-dueled Ende to win the first 40-lap leg on the one-half mile track that was halted on the 38th lap when Bud Meyering crashed through the concrete retaining wall.

Pace-setters Ende and Roberts, running bumper to bumper approaching the finish line on the last lap of the second section, crashed into the wall when Glen Rockey's car spun, blocking the track.

The event was halted with Ende suffering facial cuts and abrasions, with his car totally demolished. Ende was awarded the win. Roberts partially repaired his car to compete in the third leg but was never in contention although he scored enough points to place second in the overall standings.

Jack Beduhn scored the third largest amount of points followed by Jimmy Rinner, Eddie VanderLaan, Don Clawson of Kalamazoo, Lee France of Grand Blanc, Chuck Grano, Bob Knight and Ende.

Johnny Roberts had set fast qualifying time of 26.49. Al Newbree won the consolation race.

## Bill Sherman Ends Dry Spell At Berlin With Win

Semi-feature race victories were scored by Jack Beduhn and Jack Sanborn. Heat race winners were Ed Scott, Bud Meyering and Sanborn. Bill Wiltse set fast time in qualifying with a time of 17.87.

With top competition made impossible by a slick track, the 50-lap 25-mile Michigan Motor Sweepstakes race was reset for next Saturday night.

#### Johnny Roberts Laps Field For Win

September 28, 1957 — Berlin Raceway — Johnny Roberts won the 25-mile Michigan Motor Sweepstakes for modified stock cars Saturday on the half-mile track at Berlin Raceway before an estimated crowd of 3,000.

Roberts passed pace setter Jimmy Nelson of Flint on the 25<sup>th</sup> lap of the 50-lap race and lapped the field to win on the big half-mile track. Jack Nelson finished third.

Jack Nelson set fast time of 26.77. Bud Meyering, Don Delduca and Flip Thompson were heat race winners. Semi-feature winners were Ray Flannery and Bob Terpstra.

The title event was marked by a spectacular three-car accident that demolished the cars of Bill Rider, Mort Anderson, and Jack Beduhn, with Beduhn hospitalized for observation.

### Era of Supermodifieds — Dirt Half-Mile Track

n the late 1950's another form of race car appeared. By combining jalopy stock cars, roadsters, and sprint cars all into one car, the new hybrid was called a supermodified. As cut-down versions of the jalopies, they kept the safety of a four-post roll cage, but used smaller cut down bodies like many of the roadsters. To conserve weight, the starter and battery were removed, and the cars had to be pushed to be started, like sprint cars. It wasn't long before the cut down jalopy bodies gave way to homemade bodies and eventually to sprint car bodies. A sprint car could be converted to a supermodified by just adding a roll cage. Many sprint car owners made the cage detachable with bolts, so the car could still run in sprint car races, where it was taboo to run the cages. The roll cage is a series of tubular bars that surround the driver's cockpit and protects him in case the car should turn over.

Sprint cars, by design, are top-heavy and can easily get "get upside-down".

Chet Mysliwiec saw the writing on the wall when Johnny Roberts pulled into Berlin Raceway in 1957 with his radical new race car. Chet watched other car owners frantically rebuilding their modifieds into supermodifieds.

Mysliwiec knew that the speeds of the newly reconfigured cars were beyond the limits of the small fifth-mile track. He began working on the half-mile track for action and on September 3, 1956 he opened up the big track for competition.

This was the first time that Berlin ran the dirt half-mile track. The feature was scheduled to run 20 laps. The race was just getting into the tenth lap when Glen Rockey broke a spindle, got into the wall, and was trying to get his car into the pits. Bob clover was running the outside of the track and when he

got through turn four Rockey was sitting right there in the groove that Clover was running and Bob hit him square. Clover's car went up into the air and torn down the PA system wiring along with three wheels off of his car. At that point the race was officially called complete at nine laps. Bill Sherman was the feature winner.

The big track was perfect for the faster supermodifieds. Both the drivers and the fans loved the fast and wild action and the die was cast. The supermodifieds ran the half-mile on occasional shows in 1957 when Chet ran the supermodifieds early in the evening before darkness set in. Then he ran the stock cars on the lighted fifth-mile. Before the 1958 season began, Chet bought the lighting system that had been used at Bigelow Field.

The supermodifieds saw their peak years from the late 1950's until the mid-sixties for a variety of reasons; including the fact that short track late model stock car had become increasingly popular at lower cost. By late 1960's, supermodified racing was facing two problems. First of all, the fans were looking for a new style of racing. Secondly, the promoters were looking for a class of cars that didn't cost so much. Much as the midgets had died out in the late 1940's, the supermodifieds were facing the same fate in the late 1960's.

One new aspect in supermodified racing was the wings that were installed on top of the roll cage. The wings not only gave added down pressure on the rear wheels for better traction, but they also gave better stability in the turns. Wings also tend to decrease the risk of injury in case of a serious accident (as stated by Allan E. Brown in his book *The History of America's Speedways—Past and Present*).

Audie Swartz won the first feature with a wing on September 4, 1961—which was his third attempt. Ken Fry, Mishawaka, Indiana, who was the Indiana State Champion appeared with a wing on top of his supermodified on August 13, 1960. Fry crashed in his heat race and could not make the feature.

In 1958, Berlin Raceway introduced the supermodifieds. This stemmed from 1957 when Johnny Roberts came to Berlin with his #1, yellow, cut down Crosley bodied car, with an overhead Studebaker V8

engine. His success with his supermodified caused other car owners to turn to this new supermodified version, along with unlimited engines.

At the same time Chet Mysliwiec soon realized that the powerful and fast supermodifieds were too fast for the small fifth-mile dirt track that they had been using since 1951. He began working on the larger half-mile dirt track that had lain dormant since the end of the 1948 season when the Track-masters Racing Club had raced on it.

Chet used the half-mile track for a few races in 1957 on holidays when Chet could schedule the races at a late afternoon time so they could complete their racing before dark. He was now intent on running both the half-mile with the supermodifieds and the fifth-mile for stock cars. Mysliwiec bought the lighting system from the now defunct Bigelow Field race track and installed the system on his dirt half-mile track.

The names of the racers who ran with the supermodifieds are legendary in Michigan auto racing. Johnny Roberts, Dick Carter, Bob Knight, Glen Rockey, Nolan Johncock, Johnny Logan, Ralph Baker, Norm Brown, Gordy VanderLaan, Eddie VanderLaan, Jimmy Nelson, Bill Wiltse, Johnny Johnson, Duane Knoll, and Tommy Lane. Each of these racers has been inducted into the Michigan Motor Sports Hall of Fame. A.J. Foyt, Parnelli Jones, and Mario Andretti were Indianapolis 500 winners and have competed on the large track.

The big one-half mile dirt track also brought the end of the careers of Glen Rockey, Dick Carter, and Wally Galeski who were all fatality injured at the track.

In 1961, Audie Swartz, from Indiana, brought his winged supermodified to Berlin Raceway. Swartz won a feature on his third attempt. It did not take long for the regular Berlin competitors to realize the benefits of installing a wing on their cars and soon they all spouted wings.

When Berlin paved the track in 1966, pavement supermodifieds took to the track. After a couple of years, Chet realized that if he dropped the supermodifieds, he could save a lot of money and so he did.

### **Berlin Raceway Media 1958**

### Carter Breaks Track Record; Roberts Takes Opening Feature

April 12, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Hard charging by Johnny Roberts of Wheeler celebrated the opening of the super- modified racing season by roaring to victory in the 25-lap feature race Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

New track records were set in the 6, 12, and 30 lap distances. Dick Carter of Breckenridge set a new one lap record of 13.06 on the fifth-mile track and also copped the fast-car dash.

An estimated 3,000 fans saw Roberts drive his Studebaker V-8 powered supermodified around pacesetter, Frank Fuhr of Hastings on the sixth lap of the main event and hold off Dick Carter of Breckenridge, Nolan Johncock of Hastings, Bill Rider of Grand Rapids and Johnny Logan of Charlotte and Dale Vischer of Holland for the victory.

Heat race winners were Logan, Bill Wiltse, along with Roberts who was also victorious in the pursuit race. Semi-feature honors went to Jack Beduhn.

### Logan Cops Win Over Stellar Field

April 19, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Johnny Logan of Charlotte drove his powerful supermodified to victory in the 25-lap feature race on the fifth-mile track Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway after setting fast qualifying time of 15.65.

A crowd of approximately 1,000 fans, who braved drizzling rains, saw Logan out-speed such strong competitors as Silas Thompson of Belding, Johnny Roberts of Wheeler, Buck Havens of Flint, Dick Carter of Breckenridge, Jim Born of Kalamazoo, Bill Wiltse of Grand Rapids,

Nolan Johncock and Frank Fuhr of Hastings.

Heat race winners were Carter, Johncock and Thompson with the programs fastest qualifier, Logan copping the fast-car dash event. Wiltse took the pursuit race in which Glen Rockey of Muskegon escaped serious injury when his race car caught fire.

### Ende Sets New Record With Feature Win

April 26, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Hard driving Harold Ende of Holland roared to victory in the 20-lap supermodified feature race on the half-mile track Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway before an estimated 3,000 fans.

Johnny Roberts forced Ende to set a blistering pace and establish a new track record for the 10-mile distance by running bumper to bumper until Roberts careened off the concrete retaining wall at the eight-mile mark and dropped out of contention.

Glen Rockey of Muskegon was a car length behind the main event winner followed by Dick Carter of Breckenridge, Jimmy Rinner, Bill Wiltse, Buck Havens of Flint, Jack Nelson of Greenville, Nolan Johncock of Hastings and Dale Vischer of Holland.

Heat race winners were Carter, Nelson and Havens, who also won the accident-marred semi-feature event. Rockey captured the fast-car dash event and set a new eight-lap record in capturing the pursuit race. Jimmy Nelson of Flint set a new one lap standard turning the fast large oval in a 25.10 second dash.

### Glen Rockey Scores First Feature Of Year

May 3, 1958 - Berlin Raceway - Glen Rockey of Muskegon drove his Buick powered Smitty's Bever-

age Special to victory in the 30-lap supermodified feature race on the fifth-mile Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway. An estimated 2,800 fans saw the port city speedster outduel Johnny Roberts of Wheeler to gain his first main event victory of the season.

Bill Rider was third followed by Jack Nelson of Greenville, Bill Sherman from Marne, Bud DePau of Muskegon, Jack Beduhn, Jack Sanborn and Gus Bray of Muskegon. Heat race winners were Dave Fryling, Rockey, and Jack Sanborn who also captured semi-feature race honors. Mort Anderson of Greenville copped the pursuit event along with the program's fastest qualifier of 13.76, Jimmy Rinner capturing the fast-car dash.

### Glen Rockey Wins Again At Raceway

May 10, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Hard driving Glen Rockey of Muskegon warmed up for Friday night's big-car race by roaring to victory in the 10-mile supermodified feature race on the half-mile track Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway before a crowd of more than 3,000 fans.

The Port City speedster registered his second consecutive main event victory by threading his powerful supermodified racer through a 25-car field, forging ahead of pace setter Ralph Baker of Saugatuck on the eighth-lap and going on to win by a quarter mile margin.

Following the winner were Bill Wiltse, Ralph Baker, Jack Nelson of Greenville, Jimmy Nelson of Flint, Harold Ende of Holland and Johnny Johnson. Dale Vischer of Holland and Ende escaped serious injury when their cars crashed on the sixth lap of the event.

The fast-car dash win was taken by Arnie Knepper along with a heat race win. Other heat wins were taken by Cotton Farmer and Jim Hemmings.

### Roberts Big Weekend Race Victor

May 17, 1958 — Berlin Raceway — Johnny Roberts of Wheeler celebrated his most productive and lucrative weekend in racing by crossing the finish line a scant car length ahead of Glen Rockey of Muskegon on the big half-mile to win the action packed 10-mile feature race for super-modifieds Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway. Bill Wiltse captured third place.

Jack Nelson set fast time in qualifying with a 26.00 lap and followed it up with a win in the fast-car dash. Heat race winners were Jack Sanborn, Dick Carter and Bill Sherman. The semi-feature race was taken by Dutch Walters.

Roberts scored his second main event triumph in two days before 2,800 fans by winning the grueling 15-mile AARC sprint car main event Friday night

The strictly stock cars ran on the fifth-mile track with Mort Anderson winning a heat race and setting fast time. (*There was no information on feature results.*)

### Berlin Races Rained Out; USAC Midgets Are Set At Berlin

May 24, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Two of the leading race drivers in the country, Gene Hartley of Indianapolis, Indiana and George Amick of Venice, California have filed their entries to compete in the USAC (United States Auto Club) midget auto races on the Berlin Raceway's one-half mile track, Thursday night.

A star studded field, sprinkled with Indianapolis 500 mile veterans, will compete in the 15- mile main event, a 30-lap feature race.

Early entries have been received from Don Branson of Champaign, Illinois, Lloyd Ruby of Wichita Falls, Texas, Norm Hall of Cincinnati, Ohio, Rex Easton of Springfield, Illinois, Johnny Kay of New Britain, Connecticut, Bill Homier of Los Angeles, California, Bob Wente of Dallas, Texas, and national champion Clark "Shorty" Templeton of Seattle, Washington.

The all-Offenhauser eight-event program will have warm-ups at 6:30 p.m., time trials at 7 p.m. with the first heat race set for 8:30 p.m.

Saturday night's supermodified racing program at Berlin was washed out by rain, after rain also shortened Friday's schedule. Bud Meyering and Roger Joneson were winners of semi-feature events Friday in supermodified competition after Harold Ende, Elmer Lovett and Dale Vischer captured heat races. In strictly-stock

car competition Duane Millheim won the feature and Jim Flannery and Gordon Gibbens took heat races.

Bon Knight was hospitalized following a crackup in one of the semi-features. His car bumped Dick Carter and spun off the track. He was reported in good condition Saturday.

### George Amick USAC Midget Victor

June 5, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Little George Amick, who drives like there's no tomorrow, roared away with most of the honors and all of the hearts of the fans at the midget racing program at Berlin Raceway Thursday night. The midget racing program was sanctioned by USAC, (United States Auto Club.)

Amick, a short 33-year-old Californian who won the Rookie of the Year Award with his second place finish in the Memorial Day 500 at Indianapolis, was the outstanding star in a disappointingly small field of drivers which performed before approximately 3,500 chilled fans.

He won the 25-lap feature race, one heat event and established a new record for the half-mile Marne oval of 75.9 miles per hour in qualifying trials.

The field of ten cars-limited

by a tug-of-war between two Grand Rapids area promoters, a mix-up in the United States Auto Club scheduling and previous arrangements for many drivers for other races this weekend-put on a good midget program, one of speed and class.

The best of the field was Amick. who walked away from the rest once he grabbed the lead; Gene Hartley, the young veteran of midgets and Indy 500 cars; Johnny White and Cotton Farmer.

Hartley, who used to race midgets at Bigelow Field in the late 1940's, won the first heat race in a walk away. White, a hard charger from Detroit took the second heat, Amick the third, by a half a lap, and Farmer, the fourth.

Amick never was challenged after he once grabbed the lead in the 25-lap feature. He pushed his snarling little Offy past Buddy Cagle on the third lap and built his lead the rest of the way. Cagle, White, Farmer and Hartley dueled for second. White spun out midway in the race when he locked horns with Hartley and was out for the evening. Finishing second to Dick Carter of Breckenridge in the regular feature event, halted in the 14th lap due to an accident to Duane Knoll, Rocky gained a big share of the \$6,175.00

purse. Johnny Johnson took third

Tommy Lane of Muskegon, Harley Green, Curly Moody, Don Ward, Duane Knoll and Roberts crashed into the concrete retaining wall in the feature. Bill Sherman escaped serious injury when his car catapulted over the wall during a heat race and was demolished. Sherman and Lane were hospitalized.

Heat race winners were Bud Rider, Gus Bray of Muskegon, Meyering and Ralph Baker with Harold Ende of Holland and Junior Shearer of Kalamazoo victorious in the semi-

A lion's share of the large cash purse and an additional \$170 dollars in lap prizes was won by the Wheeler speedster. The championship classic was marred by accidents that wrecked the cars of Gordy VanderLaan and George Roberts, both escaping serious injury.

Both main events were run under the caution flag when accidents to Gordy VanderLaan, Eddie Vander-Laan, Jack Smith, Norm Brown, Jack Caswell and Bill Cowper of Galesburg blocked the four cornered oval. Gordy VanderLaan and Cowper required hospital attention.

was running second, spun from the race and out of contention on the 44<sup>th</sup> lap of the event. Roberts set fast time of the night with a 24.61 lap. Heat race winners were Wiltse, Carter and Farmer, who also copped the fast-car dash. Semi-feature race winner was Jack Caswell.

### Johnny Johnson Victorious At Berlin

### Roberts Takes Mid-Season Championship

July 19, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Hard charging Johnny Roberts of Wheeler roared to victory in the 25-mile, mid-season championship race for supermodifieds Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

A crowd of 5,000 saw the defending champion overtake pacesetter Bill Wiltse on the 11th lap of the grueling 50-lap event and stave off Johnny Johnson, his brother, George Roberts, Wally Sanders, Ralph Baker and Gordy VanderLaan for the victory and a lion's share of a \$2,600 purse.

Point leader and top favorite in the classic, Glen Rockey of Muskegon was hospitalized when his racer blew a tire and slammed into the retaining wall during the qualifying time trials. Heat race winners were Bud Rider and Johnson with George Roberts victorious in the crash-riddled second heat in which cars driven by Burr Krupp and Chuck Grano were wrecked.

Strictly-stock car heat race honors went to George Folk and Joe VanderKooi with Bob Clover copping the main event. Doug Lang and George Folk followed Clover in the feature. Clover set fast time with a 14.97 lap.

### 7,500 See Les Snow Win MARC New Car Race

July 25, 1958 - Berlin Raceway - Les Snow a giant man with a

baby touch on a steering wheel won the 100-lap late-model stock car feature race sanctioned by Midwest Auto Racing Club (MARC) at Berlin Raceway Friday night before approximately 7,500 spectators.

The biggest crowd of the racing season in West Michigan saw the burly 205-pound Snow, from Bloomington, Illinois, lose the lead twice, then recapture it for first place over Jack Shanklin who finished four-car lengths behind. Snow, driving a light blue 1958 Chevrolet had to thread his way through at least three mix ups in the big 28-car field.

The race was run under the caution flag three times from the 77<sup>th</sup> lap to the 88<sup>th</sup> lap. One three-car pileup in front of the main grandstand spread shattered glass and parts along the first turn. The cars ran under the yellow flag as it was swept up. Finishing behind Snow and Shanklin, a veteran driver from Indianapolis in a '56 Ford convertible, was Dave Hirshfield of Chicago.

Two members of the 500-mile Memorial Day race lineup were in the starting field Friday night, and two other "500" veterans watched from the sidelines.

Jerry Unser, the man who went over the wall at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway during the tragic accident that claimed the life of Pat O'Conner, was in a duel with Snow throughout most of Friday's race. He was penalized a lap, however, for making repairs while under the caution flag and thus was bumped back to second place.

Bill Cheesbourg, another "500" starter, was one of the heat race winners at Marne Friday night, but failed to challenge in the feature. Dick Rathmann, the man who sat on the pole in the "500," attempted to qualify two cars but engine troubles kept him out of the race. Ed Elision, another front row driver, blew an engine during qualifying and was unable to secure another ride.

In addition to Cheesbourg, who hails from Phoenix, Arizona Bob Pronger, driving a '58 Cadillac, captured the checkered flag in one of the heat races. Bobby James won the fast-car dash in a duel with Snow. Shanklin took the pursuit event.

Unser took over the lead from Snow, who started on the pole, on the 33rd lap. Then Darel Derringer, of Indianapolis, Indiana, took over on lap 50. Snow regained first on the 60th lap and held it the rest of the way.

Starting 11th in a 25-car lineup, Rockey threaded his way through the field forging past leader Neil Burson of Kalamazoo on the 14th lap and won going away. Following the winner were Johnny Roberts and George Roberts of Wheeler, Harold Ende of Holland, Burson, Wally Sanders, Ralph Baker of Saugatuck, Bob Knight, Bill Wiltse and Gordy VanderLaan. VanderLaan outdrove Rockey, Wiltse, and George Roberts on the one-half mile track to cop the fast-car dash with Junior Shearer of Kalamazoo victorious in the semi-feature. Rockey had the fastest time of 26.07 in qualifying time trials.

Heat race winners were Stan Miller of Grand Haven, Carl Busse and Baker.

Ron Cech set fast time of 17.24 on the fifth-mile track for the strictly stock cars. Art Crouch and Elmer Lovett were heat race winners. Ed Bannon won the 15-lap feature followed by Mick Ferguson and Bob Cole.

Officials reverted all finishing positions to the previous lap with George Roberts of Wheeler given second followed by Knight, Ende, Bill Wiltse, Wally Sanders, Ralph Baker, Dick Seymour, Bud Meyering and Bill Sherman.

Heat race winners were Gus Bray of Muskegon, Jack Beduhn and Wiltse. George Roberts outdrove VanderLaan, Ende and Rockey to win the dash event. Dick Seymour captured the semi-feature. Johnny Johnson set the fast qualifying lap of 24,94.

Bob Clover of Muskegon was victorious in the strictly-stock car feature race which saw Joe VanderKooi flip and roll four times but escaped without injury. August 9, 1958 – Berlin Raceway George Roberts of Wheeler stamped himself a strong contender for next week's state championship race by roaring to victory in the accident marred, 20-lap, ten-mile supermodified feature race Saturday night before an estimated 3,800 fans at the Berlin Raceway. Roberts also claimed fast qualifying time of the night of 24.58.

The hectic main event, in which Norm Brown's racer severed a light pole putting out a portion of the lighting system, saw Ralph Baker of Saugatuck set a blistering early pace until overhauled by Harold Ende of Holland on the 13th lap.

Roberts, seeking his first feature win of the season, stormed into the lead four laps later for the win.

Bill Wiltse was third followed by Johnny Johnson, Chuck Neal of South Haven, Bud Wilson of Dexter, Johnny Roberts, Wally Sanders, Dick Seymour of Kalamazoo, Larry Lavery of Saginaw and Leo Caldwell of Maumee, Ohio. Jack Smith escaped serious injury when his race car crashed into the concrete retaining wall and was demolished.

The grueling title event, run on the Marne ovals fast, one-half mile track, saw Johnny Johnson, who drove one of the finest races of his career; hold the lead for 43-laps. Johnson held off the challenges of Bill Wiltse, George Roberts, Glen Rockey, Harold Ende and Gordy VanderLaan.

The Anderson, Indiana speedster swept from sixth place to victory in the 30-lap sprint-car feature before approximately 4,200 spectators at Berlin Raceway. It was his third straight Berlin feature triumph. Johnny Roberts had fast qualifying time of 24.46.

Alspaugh, who took over the lead from Johnny Ward on the sixth lap, beat Bill Wiltse of Grand Rapids, Leon Clum of Wapakaneta, Ohio and Jimmy Nelson of Flint. He also shared heat race victory honors with Bud Tinglestad of Dayton, Ohio and Dick Carter of Breckenridge. Glen Rockey of Muskegon won the fast-car dash and Clum took semi-feature honors.

Johnny Roberts, winner of two sprint car races earlier this season, spun out on the fourth turn during the 20th lap while challenging the leaders. Rockey went out on the 24th lap under similar circumstances.

### Knight Posts 1st Win In 2 Years At Berlin

August 23, 1958 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Knight roared to victory in the accident-marred, 20-lap 10-mile supermodified feature race Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway, before a crowd of 3,000 fans.

Knight, in scoring his first main event victory in more than two years, forged ahead into the lead on the sixth lap and was never headed. Following the winner across the finish line were Gordy VanderLaan, Glen Rockey of Muskegon, Bud Meyering, Harold Ende of Holland, and Ralph Baker of Saugatuck.

A new track standard was established by George Roberts of Wheeler who whirled around the half-mile circuit in 23.77 seconds, erasing the record of 23.93 set by Jimmy Nelson last season. The new record is 79.88 miles an hour.

Born, winning his first feature race at the Marne track, seized the lead early in the race, lost it to Johnny Johnson. Born regained the lead and withstood the challenge of Bob Knight for victory. Following Born and Knight were Johnny Logan, Bob Clover, Gus Bray, Gordon Johncock, Sam Sessions, Frank Fuhr, Wally Galeski and Nolan Johncock.

Fast-car dash honors went to Dick Carter with heat race wins to Bob Clover, Dick Carter and Ralph Baker.

Art Crouch picked up the feature victory in the 15-lap strictly stock car division followed by Bob Arthur, Dick Stewart, Ron Schipper, John Tafel, Don Ward, Dick Peck, Bob Deephouse and Joe Castle. Heat winners were Bob Deephouse and Dick Peck. Art Crouch took the fast-car dash with Joe Castle taking fast time with a lap of 14.59.

### Dick Carter Blasts To Berlin Win

Easton's condition was reported as "fair" by hospital officials Saturday afternoon, but he was slipping back into unconsciousness from time to time after being brought to the emergency ward unconscious Friday night. Hospital officials said his condition at times was near the critical stage.

His car rolled over four times after vaulting the racer of Jim McWithey, of Anderson, Indiana whose powerful machine spun out of control in the third turn of the third lap of the 15-mile feature race on the half-mile dirt track.

In vaulting the McWithey car, Easton's racer started to flip endover-end, then rolled over four times. His shoulder harness broke and the 24-year veteran of racing was pitched onto the hood of the battered machine which wound up on its wheels.

Easton was Midwest midget champ in 1954 and 1958. The 5-9, 190-pounder and his wife, Helen, have two daughters, Marlene, 16, and Connie, 9.

He started his racing career in midgets at Chicago in 1935. Other drivers whose cars were knocked out of the race in the pile-up were: Tommy Hinnershnitz of Oley, Pennsylvania; Leon Clum of Akron, Ohio and Bobby Grim, Indianapolis, Indiana, the 1959 "Rookie-of-the-Year" at the big 500-miler.

The crackup was the second this week for Easton, who was driving with ribs heavily taped from a pileup last Sunday in Langhorn, Pennsylvania

Winner of the feature race and a purse of \$1,395 was Jud Larson of Tampa, Florida.

Johnny Roberts of Wheeler finished second, Don Branson of Champaign, Illinois third, AJ Foyt fourth, Bud Tinglestad fifth, Van Johnson sixth, Ed Elisian seventh, Joe Barzdo eighth, and Dick Carter ninth.

field on hand.

Turning in the fastest time of the evening at 22:49, Nelson went on to capture the fast- car dash, the fast heat and the action packed 20-lap feature for supermodifieds.

Last week's feature winner, Dick Carter, was sidelined for the evening when mechanical troubles plagued him during the fast-car dash.

The feature lined up with Eddie VanderLaan bringing the field around for Dick Zimmerman's green flag. Seconds after the start, the red flag came out as ten cars tangled up in the first turn. However, all racers stayed upright and there were no injuries. Eliminated in the pile up were Duane Knoll, Johnnie Johnson, and Rich Senneker.

The race resumed with Nelson charging up from his ninth starting spot to take the lead from Vander-Laan on the third lap. Vander-Laan and Nelson staged a tremendous two-car duel that had the fans on their feet as the two speedsters traded the lead several times. Vander-Laan then was sidelined with mechanical ills. Johnny Logan then gave Nelson a stiff challenge for the lead, but failed in his bid. Nelson flashed home the winner in 7 minutes, 53 seconds. Jack Smith took third, Jim Murphy fourth and Chuck Partello fifth.

Wally Sanders picked up the checkered flag for winning his heat race.

Nelson, in the accident-marred event, moved fast from his ninth starting spot and became involved in a fracas which sent Johnny Logan into the wall and Dick Carter momentarily off the track. Logan returned in Jack Smith's Double oo. Chuck Partello then decided it was his turn to rest when his #51 was forced out because of front-end alignment woes. Carter didn't last long in his re-try as he, Ken Miller and Elver Harrington spun-out on the first turn sending Miller to the hospital with a broken arm.

Bill Cox then briefly left the race but returned to end up in fifth place. Johnny Johnson, who had been plagued by car troubles all evening and Bill Marshall, spun and cracked up on the second turn.

Only seven of the original entrants were around when Nelson, followed by Eddie VanderLaan, Muskegon's Duane Knoll, Johnny Logan in the borrowed 'oo', and Kalamazoo's Bill Cox, crossed the line in that order.

A new fast-car dash record for the supers was put in the Berlin books when Jimmy Nelson streaked across the finish line ahead of Carter, Logan and Knoll in a blistering 1:08.41. In the two super heats Elver Harrington and Jimmy Nelson copped the wins.

Johnny Johnson of Grand Rapids running over the wheel of another race car. vaulted end over end in the second heat, Duane Knoll of Muskegon suffered a broken axle hitting the wall in the same event and after the six-car crash Carl Schalow of Lansing halted the main event when a sheered wheel sent his race car spinning in front of the pack causing a wild melee. All drivers escaped serious injury.

Fast qualifying time was set by Duane Knoll at 22.66. Jim Murphy, Don Champlin, and Duane Knoll were winners of heat races.

Perennial winner Rich Senneker of Grand Rapids flashed across the finish line two car lengths ahead of Jack Vilwalk of Muskegon and Paul Weisner of Holland to win the 15-lap sportsman stock car main event.

The sportsman dash was well matched and a close race. Bill Thurkettle came in for the win just in front of Ken Sutton and Bud Meyering, who were second and third for the event.

Fred DeLong paced the field for the win in the first sportsman heat, and LaVerne Koenes pushed Ron Merkins all the way in the second heat, but Ron was the victor.

The super-stock feature was stopped when Roger Six rolled over several times coming out of the second turn. Paul Weisner carried the flag for the win, followed by Bob DePauw, and Busscher.

## Dick Carter Fatally Injured At Berlin

August 14, 1965 – Berlin Raceway – Over 36 supermodifieds and sportsman timed in on a balmy Saturday night at Berlin Raceway's half-mile mile track.

Dick Carter of Breckenridge took the win in the supermodified dash, and also the third heat. Rich Senneker took the sportsman dash win in a time of 1:11.90 just: 01.5 slower than the super mod dash time of 1:10.40. The heat wins went to Bob Knight, Laverne Koenes and Carter. The third heat race was stopped when Duane Knoll pulled on the front stretch with an injured forehead and was taken to the hospital for treatment of an injury received from a rock hitting him in the forehead.

Bob Knight chauffeured his #C1 for the fourth heat win, with Jim Weller second. Knight stepped into Duane Knoll's #7-11 and in his first ride in the car eliminated the field in the pursuit race.

What started out to be a routine main event for Dick Carter of Breckenridge ended in tragedy on the 15<sup>th</sup> lap as he collided with another car going into the first turn. It wasn't known, only suspected, to what extent Dick's injuries were at that time. It was learned later that he was gone, the victim of a broken neck.

Jim Murphy of South Haven went on to win in his roadrunner #62, thus giving Jim his first feature win of the 1965 season.

## Knoll Wins – Murphy Hurt At Berlin

Paul Weisner in his flying 'o' lost a wheel which flew into the parking lot. Duane Knoll took the win with Mort Anderson on his bumper for the second spot followed by Bob Knight and Rich Senneker.

The heat wins went to Meyering, Koenes, Knoll and Moody. Rich Senneker drove in the evening's events with his foot in a cast.

## Berlin Stages Last Show On Dirt Half-Mile

who was attempting to pass, to also spin. Hegner put on a burst of speed and nosed past Edwards for the win, leaving Edwards in second spot.

The supermodified feature was an exhibition of driving skill, and Duane Knoll who started at the rear of the pack worked through traffic for the win followed by Jack Smith, Rich Senneker, and Laverne Koenes.





In the late 1950's and early 1960's Berlin Raceway had two drivers who lived near each other in Breckenridge and Wheeler, Michigan. Johnny Roberts and Dick Carter were close buddies and, in fact, Roberts helped Carter get into racing by building his first stock car for him. They treated each other like a brother.

But that's where the similarities ended. Personality wise, you could not find two people more different. Carter had a great sense of humor while Roberts had a rather serious side to him. Carter was always the "hired Gun" driver for car owners, while Roberts mainly built his own race cars to drive.

The two racers differed 180 degrees apart in their driving styles. Dick was always on the gas running just as hard as his car would go one-hundred percent of the time. He would come into the fourth turn of

Berlin Raceways dirt half-mile completely sideways running up high on the dirt cushion. John had an entirely different way for getting through Berlin's fourth turn. He's back the car down and he was so smooth that he would put the front tires of his super modified in the same spot on each and every lap. He became known as Mr. Smooth.

The one way that John and Dick were alike is that they were big time winners. From 1957 through 1965, Carter won twenty-four super modified features on Berlin's dirt half-mile and Roberts picked off eighteen. Robert's was almost fatally injured in 1959 at the Ionia Fairgrounds in a crash and took the 1960 season off due to his injuries and seldom raced at Berlin after that.

Johnny Roberts won the Mid-season champion-ship race at Berlin Raceway in 1957, 1958 and 1959.

Dick Carter won Berlin's Season Championship race in 1957, Spring Championship race in 1961, and the Tri-State championship race in 1963.

The ends of their racing careers were completely different. On August 14,1965, on the way from Breckinridge to Marne, Dick met with a USAC (United States Auto Club) midget car owner and put together a deal where he would drive a USAC midget for a couple of upcoming races. It would be his first step up in the USAC midget and sprint car circuits, which would hopefully lead to a ride in the Indianapolis 500.

That night he raced at Berlin Raceway, where he was the track record holder, and set fast time, won the fast car dash, his heat race, and was leading the feature when on the 15th lap, he ran over the right rear wheel of a lapped car in turn one. Carter took a flip and when rescue workers reached him, he was dead of a broken neck.

Dick Carter and Johnny Roberts have both been inducted into the Michigan Motor Sports Hall of Fame. Two race drivers with different personalities and driving styles reached the top of their sport at Berlin Raceway.

### Era of Supermodifieds — Paved Track

t the end of the 1965 season Chet Mysliwiec looked at the success the Grand Rapids Speedrome had once they paved their halfmile track. At the same time, Berlin Raceway had seen the car count going steadily down, along with the fans in the grandstands. He refigured his track from a half-mile dirt and built a new paved .438 mile track.

Duane Knoll won the last feature on the dirt track on September 6, 1965. The following year of 1966, Bob Smith from Ohio won the first feature on the newly paved track. The supermodified drivers were Duane Knoll, Eddie VanderLaan, Art Bennett, Johnny Logan, Wayne Root, Johnny Benson, Jackie Lindhout, Eldon Schrader, Nolan Johncock, and Jim Eberstein.

Who at that time would have guessed that as the midgets had had their day and then died out, now it was also true of the supermodifieds. Auto racing was now going in a different direction again.

A new type of race car came on the scene called semi-late model stock cars. As time went on they evolved into the present day late models. During the 1966-1967 seasons, convertibles were allowed to compete. Some of the racers who excelled in those days were Bob Senneker, Rich Senneker, Bob Carnes, Tom Marks, Randy Sweet, Herb Kirts, Johnny Benson, Gene Eding, Rick Knotts, Gail Cobb, Ken Sutton, and Jim Adema.

As the years moved on, the late models became more sophisticated, faster and expensive. Some of the drivers who competed at that time were: Ed Howe, Bob Senneker, Eddie VanderLaan, Johnny Benson, Randy Sweet, Terry Senneker Sr., Rich Senneker, Rick Knotts, Butch Miller, Tom Maier, Bob Carnes, Bob Sensiba, Gail Cobb, Jim Dyke, and Fred Campbell.

Berlin Raceway had such a good reputation to race on that it drew many notable drivers such as Earl Ross from Ontario, Canada. Ross went on to

race with NASCAR and won the Cup race at Martinsville Speedway in 1974.

The '80's late models saw drivers such as: Fred Campbell, Bruce VanderLaan, Gene Eding, Mike Vansparrantak, Ed Howe, Dick Harrington, Bob Sensiba, Bob Holley, Jack Gritter, Tom Martin, Chris Orr, Tom Martin, John Grega, Dave Sensiba, Jeff Finley, Tim Steele, Joe Bush, and Gledis Frye. On June 21, 1980 Berlin Raceway ran the first ART-GO race in Michigan.

The '90's late model racers saw Bob Holley, Fred Campbell, Joe Bush, Chris Orr, Dave Sensiba, Jack Gritter, Scott Presley, Johnny Benson Jr., Tim Curry, John Jutila, Joe Mazie, Terry Senneker Sr., Scott Baker, Randy Sweet, John Grega, Bruce Vander-Laan, Rob Lewis, Tim DeVos, Ken Warner, Randy Sweet, and Brian Wiersma.

The years of 2000 up to the present brought out drivers such as Randy Sweet, Lee Anderson, Chad Blount, Tim DeVos, Greg Zimmerman, Tom Thomas, Fred Campbell, John Grega, Joe Bush, Leroy Magoon, Dave Stehouwer, Johnny Benson Jr., Al Marcott, Ross Meeuwsen, Terry Senneker Jr., Brian Campbell, Terry VanHaitsma, Tim Yonker, Caleb Bisacky, Chris Anthony, Scott Thomas, Steve Needles, Ray Clay, Alec Carll, Monte Tolan, Chris Koslek, Brian Bergakker, and Jordon Dahlke.

In the year of 2011 there were two classes of late models. In addition to the outlaw late models a new class of super late models was introduced. The super late models had bodies similar to street cars. It reached the point where the outlaw late models were being phased out and the super late models were the weekly top division at Berlin.

One of the ways to measure the success of Berlin Raceway is to look at the race drivers who got their start at Berlin and then launched their racing careers on the national level. Norm Brown who went racing sprint cars and Indy cars with USAC. Bob Senneker, with ASA. Butch Miller, with various divisions with NASCAR. Jake Sprague won a championship with

the truck division in NASCAR. Mike Garvey went on to being a full time racer with the southern stock car groups. And Johnny Benson Jr., who went on to becoming an ASA champion, and season champions in the NASCAR truck division and then added a Cup win to his laurels.

When Chet Mysliwiec began racing at the Marne Fair Grounds in 1951, he had to lease the grounds from the Ottawa County Fairgrounds. So each new promotor had to purchase the existing lease. The covered grandstands that were there from the old horse racing days were mysteriously burned down on July 8, 1973. In the 1980's the track was repaved.

In 2001 the Whitecaps purchased the lease from the Mysliwiec family. The Whitecaps put in new restrooms, upgraded the sound system, constructed a new catch fence, and built new party areas.

In 2008, Mike Blackmer purchased the lease from the Whitecaps, built new make-ready shoots and tech area.

In 2011, the lease was purchased by DBD Ventures, led by Don DeWitt. In 2012, the track was covered by dirt to host the World of Outlaws Sprint cars in September. The track has been converted to dirt in the fall each year since then. In 2014, new grandstands were purchased from Michigan International Speedway. A Press Box and suites were constructed on top of the grandstands. A full service bar was built under the grandstands. In 2016, the track became a NASCAR sanctioned home track. 2018 found Berlin Raceway doing away with heat races with each division of cars running two full features.

Currently, we find Berlin Raceway as being the fastest, most competitive paved short track in Michigan. So enjoy the current racing, hold the past in reverence, and look expectantly towards the future in whatever form it manifests itself.

I leave you with this thought: "I know of no way to judge the future, but by the past."

In qualifying time trials, Norm Rust of Novi, Michigan set a track record of 17.90. Bob Smith took wins in the fast-car dash and a heat race. Benny Rapp of Toledo won the other heat race.

In the super-stock car feature it was Bob Senneker taking the win. Along with his feature win, Bob set a track record for semi-late stocks with a lap of 19.38, he then went on to win the fast-car dash and his heat race, which gave Senneker a clean sweep for the night.

Following Senneker in the feature was Glen Tanis, Bob Signor, Ray Lockwood, Johnny Johns, Mile Praag, Fred Britton, and Jack TenBrink.

Johnny Johns picked up the win in the remaining heat race.

### Veteran Benny Rapp Takes Berlin Feature

April 16, 1966 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran Benny Rapp of Toledo, Ohio took the checkered flag at Berlin Raceway Saturday night in the supermodified ranks by defeating Buddy Stewart, Johnny Logan, Jim Murphy, Wayne Harrington, Bill Heeney, Oscar Fay, Rich Senneker, Bob Smith and Curly Moody.

Norm Rust started the program off by running a lap of 17.50 for fast time and also eclipsing his record from last week of 17.90. Bob Smith was the fast-car dash winner and won his heat race. Bill Heeney took the win in the pursuit race and cap-

tured the other heat race.

In the super stock division it was Paul Weisner grabbing the win followed by Ray Lockwood, Bob De-Pauw, Ron Laban, Duane LaCombe, Dick Hurdlebrink, Bill Lazarus, Carl Newman, Russ Chapman and Ralph Lawrence.

Glen Tanis set fast time of the night with a 20.18 lap and then took the win in the fast-car dash. Along with that Tanis also won the pursuit race. Ray Lockwood and Ralph Lawrence took the heat race victories.

### Harold Smith Hustles To Victory

The cars of Curly Moody of Grand Rapids, Wally Sanders, Elver Harrington of Kalamazoo, and Norm Rust of Novi were knocked out of the race in a first lap melee at the starting line. Following Smith was Tom Pruner of Fort Wayne in second in the grueling event followed by Johnny Logan of Charlotte, Benny Rapp of Toledo, Rich Senneker of Grand Rapids and Rocky Fisher.

All drivers escaped injury during the second heat as the cars of Mort Anderson of Greenville, Bob Knight of Grand Rapids, Bill Heeney of Howell and Todd Gibson of Columbus, Ohio crashed. Pruner went over the bank during that event.

Fast qualifying time of the evening went to Norm Rust with a lap of 18.09. Rust went on to capture the fast-car dash. Todd Gibson took the pursuit race while Benny Rapp and Jim Murphy were victorious in the heat races.

Paul Weisner of Muskegon emerged the winner of the 25-lap semi-late model stock main event when Jim Martin of Fort Wayne, Indiana and Bob Senneker of Grand Rapids hit the retaining wall while challenging for the lead one lap from the finish line. Senneker went home \$535 richer as he also won the fast-car dash followed by Gail Cobb of Grand Rapids, Dick Dunshee of Kalamazoo and Jim Adema of Grand Rapids.

The first heat was won by the eldest Senneker, Rich, in a loosey-goosey #44 chased by Don Vander-Molen and Buck Jones of Kalamazoo. Hmmm, all little Dutch Boys! The second heat saw Ray Barnard in #62 the winner of Toledo's big race Wednesday night pushing Max Hiscock across the finish line with Jerry Murphy hot on their bumpers.

The third and fastest heat brought the fans to their feet as Don Oldenberg of Hessville, Indiana staved off the wild onslaught of Jim Adema and track favorite Bob Senneker to win by inches with the crowd roaring for more.

The feature was a well fought race for the first 75 laps as Gail Cobb kept nipping at Senneker's tail at a breath taking pace only to be sidelined with tire problems. Gail was the only charger to leave the race and return to carry on where he left off.

There was only one accident and that was in warm-ups when Daniel Boone tried to trap Ivan Wolf's car in the second turn. Jerry Van Dyke spun on the backstretch and Ken Sutton was sporting blistered tires most of the last 50 laps for a ninth place finish. 

### Lindhout Returns To Victory Lane

May 13, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Jackie Lindhout of Grand Rapids out of the winner's circle for more than a year roared to victory in the accident-marred 20-lap feature race for supermodifieds Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Norm Rust of Novi was second followed by Buddy Stewart of Grand Rapids, Art Bennett of Battle Creek, Jim Eberstein of Kalamazoo and Johnny Logan of Charlotte.

The hectic main event was halted on three occasions. Jack Nichols of Sturgis slammed into the concrete retaining wall and his car caught fire. Racing was again halted on the seventh lap when Bill Beard of Portland, Rich Senneker of Grand Rapids, and Logan tangled and blocked the track. Johnny Benson of Grand Rapids brought out the yellow light on the ninth lap when he shot off the race track and into the trees while challenging for the lead with all drivers escaping injury.

Bob Senneker of Grand Rapids returned from the hospital after flipping a supermodified four times during qualifying in time to win the 20-lap main event for semi-late model stock cars.

Pace setter Don VanderMolen tangled with Senneker while challenging for the lead and spun into the concrete retaining wall. He was not injured. Heat race winners were Jim Weller, Jerry VanDyke, Don Vander-Molen, Ivan Wolfe, Dick Stemmler and Jackie Lindhout. Pursuit honors went to Rich and Bob Senneker with fast-car dash events won by Bob Senneker and Benson. Eddie Vander-Laan slammed into the concrete retaining wall during the second heat race and did not compete in the supermodified main event.

### VanderLaan Takes Third Feature At Berlin

May 20, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – With over 30 supermodifieds and about 30 semi-lates, Berlin was the spot where the action was Saturday night. The fastest supers were all Grand Rapids boys: Johnny Benson, Eddie VanderLaan, Rich Senneker and Jackie Lindhout. They finished in that order. The fastest stocks were Bob Senneker, Dick Hurdelbrink, Gail Cobb and Bob Fellows.

Senneker won the dash with Cobb and Fellows right on his tail. The first supermodified heat went to Mort Anderson over Eldon Schrader, driving Denny Scheid's #46, and George Neff. Terry Sinke drove head on into the wall - severe damage to car, slight damage to driver. The second heat went to Joe Chance with Norm Rust, Anderson and Johnny Logan trailing. Heat three was VanderLaan's despite efforts of Lindhout and Benson. Heat four went to Schrader. Jim Greslev held off VanderLaan and Benson to take the pursuit. VanderLaan took his third feature with the following behind him: Benson, Lindhout, Anderson and Art Bennett in Jim Eberstein's usual ride #85. Jim was called home mid-race as his wife was about to have a baby!

The semi-late stock heats were: Bob Sensiba, Jim Weller and Jim Rowley, topping the first heat and Senneker, Cobb and Bissett taking the money in the second heat. Senneker took the pursuit race, Senneker has vet to be beaten in a feature, although Cobb, Gene Eding, Joe Elenbaas and Jim Weller were in there trying. A multi-car pileup had Bob Young and Bissett at either end of Rick Knotts #21, shortening it considerably. Dale Talsma spun to avoid the others and hit the front end of Jim Dyke's new #26. Dyke has been doing a fine job in his first stock ride. Jerry Peloquin also did a roll-over inside the backstretch but escaped injury. First appearances of the season were made by supers #92 with Curly Moody at the wheel and #99 with Chuck Partello driving. The stocks added Bill Rake in the #11, Max Hiscock in the #24 and Talsma in the #99 to their ranks.

Tough luck of the week went to Cy Fairchild who had two rides and two engine failures and no racing. A popular visitor to Berlin Raceway was fatally injured in an Ohio highway crash. Bob Smith, driver of the orange #66 – the Lawless Chevy – died May 6th at age 29.

In their dash Vander-Laan took the checkered flag. Benson beat out Eberstein for second and Senneker spun out in the infield. The stock dash was Bob Senneker's over Jerry Spear, Gail Cobb and Bob Fellows.

The first supermodified heat flag fell to Dick Stembler in Hub Becker's unique #44 — the super with the driver and engine side by side. Curly Moody and Gordy Bissett followed. The first stock heat went to Denny Harris in a new machine. Paul Howell, Dwight Smith and Lyle Erl in the Circle #7, were new faces at Berlin.

Duane Knoll, Bill Beard, Buddy Stewart and Ken Crampton were the leaders in the second supermodified heat. Bob Patrick won a battle with Dale Talsma for the second semilate stock heat with Ron Laban and Gail Cobb also up front. The third supermodified heat honors went to Jackie Lindhout over VanderLaan and Benson. The third semi-late stock heat found Jim Weller, leading Glen Tanis, Jerry VanDyke and Mel Gillette in the #11 to the checkered flag.

Supermodified heat one found Len Guernsey out front of Sonny McHenry and Jim Murphy. Semi-late model heat one went to a new face at Berlin, Jim Fulton in the #129, Leo Havens and Steve Bauer next.

Second supermodified heat money went to Joe Chanz, Art Bennett and Jack Smith. Jim Rowley bested the second semi-late stock heat. Glen Tanis and Ken Sutton tied for second. This was Ken's first appearance of the season. This year's #1 is a pretty deep blue and white machine and it looks like it will become as competitive as the red #1 of 1966.

### Veteran Johnny Logan Takes Berlin Win

June 3, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – The race driver's kind of driver Johnny Logan of Charlotte, caught race leader Mort Anderson of Greenville on the tenth lap and went on to gain a car length victory over Jim Eberstein of Kalamazoo in the 20-lap feature race for supermodifieds Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Johnny Benson of Grand Rapids was third followed by Jackie Lindhout of Grand Rapids, and Rich Senneker also of Grand Rapids. Highly regarded Eddie VanderLaan of Grand Rapids, was forced out of contention on the 19th lap due to mechanical difficulties while running in fourth position.

The supermodifieds ran their whole program with only one yellow flag. Sounds peaceful enough but there was plenty of wild shuffling. Johnny Benson was the fastest qualifier, besting Jim Eberstein, Jackie Lindhout, and Johnny Logan driving Pete Webster's very competitive Bingo #151. Joe Chanz was the third fastest qualifier but broke his drive shaft and was done. In the dash, Logan got around Lindhout for third. Lindhout had the brand new Behnke Express Special - owned and built by Rex Olmstead – out for the first time. Color is still red but the number is changed to #66.

The first heat was tightly contested and ended with Rich Senneker, Art Bennett, Norm Rust, Buddy Stewart, and Eldon Schrader snaking past the checkered flag bumper to bumper. Heat two was a hard fought duel with Eddie VanderLaan the victor over Logan and Mort Anderson. Four cars finished the pursuit race: VanderLaan, Logan, Lindhout, and Eberstein.

The feature was the end of a long dry spell for Johnny Logan. He really

made a splash, coming from ninth to take the lead early in the race. He survived challenges from Eberstein, Benson and Lindhout.

Bob Senneker made it six wins in seven attempts by roaring to victory in the 20-lap main event for semi-late model stocks. Senneker was relegated to the rear of the 22 car starting field after spinning out on the sixth lap attempting to avoid an accident that blocked the track.

Heat race winners were Rich Senneker, Mike Janose, Jim Rowley, Bob Morgan, Lyle Earl and Vander-Laan. Benson, fastest of 63 qualifiers, won the dash event with pursuit race honors going to VanderLaan and Bob Senneker.

Mike Janose took his first win at Berlin in heat one. Kenny Sutton nearly had him when his engine went sour and he settled for third behind Lyle Earl. The second heat win went to Jim Rowley. Jim Weller and Bob Sensiba also shared in the loot.

Heat three was a wild one with lots of good drivers, good machinery and action. There seemed to be a battle going on for every place. Near the end, Jerry Spear — who's been down on his luck lately — had to be towed back to the pits. The survivors of the fast paced race were Bob Morgan in the Red Baron, Gordy Bissett, Bob Fellows and Jim Dyke. Earl, Janose and Tom VanEns took the money in the consolation feature.

The feature had the crowd paying attention! Senneker tangled with Bob Fellows and spun. Glen Tanis and Bob Patrick spun to miss Senneker and they all got to restart at the rear of the field.

In response to the question of what does MARC Times stand for, M.A.R.C. stands for Michigan Auto Racing Chronicle. Now you know the rest of the story.

"The Little 500" at Anderson Speedway at Anderson, Indiana had a number of Berlin Raceway drivers represented. Cy Fairchild relieved Darl Harrison and captured the checkered flag. Benny Rapp, an Ohio boy who often appears here was fifth. Rocky Fisher was 12th, Bob Seelman

was 13th and Art Braithwaite was 20th.

### Bowsher Wins USAC Late Model Race

June 9, 1967 - Berlin Raceway - The USAC (United States Auto Club) late model stock cars put on a memorable show with Jack Bowsher running off with the top honors. Bowsher had run into trouble at Soldier's Field in Chicago and didn't finish repairing his '67 Ford until afternoon. He then drove to Marne, arriving last and turned in the fastest qualifying time. Bowsher is no stranger, he ran with John Marcum's super stocks last year. He led a fast 100 laps that did the USAC rookie credit. As of June 5th, Bowsher was fourth in the point standings behind leaders Parnelli Jones, Mario Andretti, and Don White. If he can run with names like those, he should be destined to go far.

After Bowsher the fastest qualifiers were Don White in a '67 Charger, Al Unser also in a Charger and J.C. Klotz in a '65 Plymouth. The dash was run inverted and finished with White in the lead, then Klotz, Unser, and Bowsher, just inches apart.

The first heat win went to Unser, followed by Bowsher, Jim Martin, Eddie Meyers, and that familiar face from Wheeler, Johnny Roberts. Heat two was taken by White, Norm Nelson, Klotz, and Tom Jones.

The 100 lap feature was run in two parts with the fastest car on the pole. After 12 laps, Rollie Hinke hit the wall with his Chevelle. Bowsher, White and Unser were running one, two, and three while Bay Darnell had moved in front of Klotz for fourth. After 30 laps Dave Hirschfield's suspension gave out and he went into the infield. Seven laps later Jones spun and was hit by John Martin. The first half ended with Bowsher holding the lead over White, Unser, Darnell, and Klotz.

Seven laps into the second leg,

Roberts spun out. Nelson passed Klotz to take fifth. Don White really dogged Bowsher whenever they were closed up, but Bowsher managed to pull away from him each time. For the last 43 laps, Unser, Darnell and Nelson ran nose-to-tail with each trying all of his tricks to move up. On the very last lap, Darnell got out wide on the backstretch, slid along the wall on turn three and ended with his back end to the wall on turn three to end the three-car fight for third. Bowsher led White, Unser, and Nelson past the finish line to end some really fine racing.

### Spring Championship To Benson

June 10, 1967 - Berlin Raceway - Rain was threating again and everyone was trying to get the racing program in ahead of the weather. 33 supermodifieds qualified, including the return of Oscar Faye of South Bend, Indiana, LaVerne Koenes, "Little Dutch", formerly of the sportsman class, Ed Otten, Bill Heeny and Gene Bell. Johnny Benson turned a 16.81 for fast time, the record is 16.70. Jim Eberstein, Eddie VanderLaan and Johnny Logan, in Bingo #151 again were next. The fast-car dash had Benson winning, followed by VanderLaan, Logan and Eberstein.

Thirty-nine stocks were on hand for their Spring Championship with some newcomers: "Dinky" Delton of Belding, Ron Brabbon of Allegan, Al Lewis of Middleville, and Larry Bird. Bob Senneker had fast time, followed by Jerry Spear and Gail Cobb with identical times and Bill Rake. The dash ended in that order.

The first supermodified heat was wild. As I saw it, Ted Otten tangled with George Neff, who spun. Norm Rust appeared to go over a wheel then across Otten's hood and into a violent series of rolls and long bounding end-over-end flips. He was taken to Butterworth Hospital where

he was doing well Sunday morning in intensive care following surgery. His well-built car held up well. Ted Otten's brand new car rolled and was badly bent but Ted was okay. Neff and Koenes went off the backstretch also but were able to restart. Red Parkhouse spun and was nudged off turn one by Bell. He retired to the pits. That left Curly Moody the winner after leading most of the race. Jack Smith, Bell, Neff and Merl Mudler completed the field.

Supermodified heat two went to Joe Chanz with Fay and Rich Senneker sharing the loot. Supermodified heat three saw a tremendous driving job by Benson who set a new track record for eight laps while coming from last to first. Logan and VanderLaan were next in line. In the pursuit, Benson and Logan eliminated lots of cars in short order. Benson got Logan and went after Nick Rowe, the last remaining car. It was no easy task, but Benson got around Rowe for the win.

The supermodified feature was going along fast and smooth with Joe Chanz well into the lead when Dick Stemler spun out on turn one. In bringing out the vellow flag the flagman either accidentally dropped it or a car blew it out of his hand onto the track. Some cars slowed and some did not and confusion resulted in Benson, Eberstein and Cy Fairchild spinning on the backstretch. They restarted at the rear of the field. There was a bit of action a few laps later when Mort Anderson bumped a tire and spun into the infield. The runaway tire caused Bill McClure to roll once. Drivers were fine, cars were out of it.

Meanwhile, Benson displayed his record-breaking form by passing car after car until he caught and passed Chanz with two laps to spare. Following Benson were Chanz, VanderLaan, Eberstein, Logan and Knoll.

The semi-late models, not to be outdone, also put on a dazzling show. In the first heat, Tom VanEns bumped Dwight Smith who rolled onto the wall, took the fence down, came down on the track and as the dust settled the car's body very slowly tipped up, over and onto the track in front of Smith in his naked roll cage. Weird? You had to have seen it. Anyway, Leo Havens went on to win over Lewis and Jack Lovett. Jim Rowley took the second heat with Lyle Earl and Jim Dyke behind him. Watch that Dyke, fans, after five rides he has shown some real capabilities.

Gail Cobb set a new record in the stock third heat. He was well ahead of Bob Sensiba and Ron Laban. In the consi, Lyle Earl bested Dale Bergakker and Steve Bauer. Then it was intermission and a chance for the fans to unwind. As the cars were lining up for the 50-lap feature the pits suddenly started emptying out the pit-gate and we expected to see the rhubarb of the year when suddenly it dawned on us that he sky had opened up without warning and was dumping buckets of water on the backstretch, the pits and then the exposed fans. End of championship feature for this week, it will be held June 17.

### Two In A Row For Benson At Berlin

June 17, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – The good news from Berlin is that Norm Rust was released from the hospital from last week's crash.

Johnny Benson's fast time retained his pole spot in the supermodified dash. Jim Eberstein was again second. Eddie VanderLaan had third fastest time and Jackie Lindhout was fourth, but Lindhout got around VanderLaan for third place in the dash.

The fastest of the semi-late models was Bob Senneker followed by Bill Rake, Jerry Spear, and Gail Cobb. The dash event was Senneker's with Spear and Cobb next as Rake went wide on the first lap and had to take fourth.

The semi-lates provided some real surprises! The first heat was run

nonstop, although Russ Brant hit the guard rail on the main straight. "Dinky" Delton hit the outside wall in front and Mike Janose spun into the infield between turns three and four. Surviving the action to grab the money were Denny Harris, Terry Schmid (with a brand new #69) and Andy Schutt.

The postponed 50-lap Spring Championship feature was run next. On lap seven, Lyle Earl spun out and Jerry Spear pitted with troubles. The caution flag came out again on lap 13 when a drive shaft was removed from the track. Bill Rake pulled off the track, so I would guess that he owned it. Spear came back out. On lap 18 Glen Tanis hit the wall at the pit gate. After 25 laps the leaders were Senneker, Cobb, Bob Fellows, Don VanderMolen, Bob Sensiba and Jerry VanDyke. On lap 24 Sensiba threw a wheel and there were 12 cars left. On lap 42 Jerry Spear hit the wall in turn four. All through the race Cobb was breathing down Senneker's neck. On lap 49 Senneker and Cobb came up behind a slower car in turn three. One went over and one went under and the wrong choice was made by leader Senneker. Cobb came around first and took the big trophy. Senneker was second ahead of VanderMolen, VanDyke, and Jim Dvke.

The second heat was so full of #1's that it took some concentration: there were three #1's, C-1 (Jim Adema's first stock appearance this year) and 01. Betsy Ross's pride (USA-#1) took the win driven by Tom Mark. The car is red, white and blue with gold stars. Bill Massuch of Lansing was second in #01, Rick Knotts in a new #67 – the "Dog-patch Ford" was third and Jim Rowley was a smashing fourth. He hit the wall just past the finish line.

The third stock heat went to Senneker, then Cobb, VanDyke and Sensiba. Heat four went to Jerry Peloquin with a new car, new number – 3 – and a new color – red. Tom VanEns spun twice. The second time he caught Ron Merkins and spun him. Neither was able to restart.

The regular feature for these boys was barely started when Senneker spun in turn three on lap three. All cars got by him except Knotts. Both cars retired. Gail Cobb got the lead and kept it for his second feature win of the evening. Bob Sensiba gave Cobb some competition. This is another boy who has been improving steadily for over a year and is getting into the money. Jim Dyke was battling Don VanderMolen and Fellows for third when he spun into the infield leaving VanderMolen third and Fellows fourth.

Back to the supermodifieds.... The first heat went to Curly Moody over Bill Beard. The second heat win went to Mort Anderson. Ken Crampton and Jack Smith also shared the loot. Heat three went to Nick Rowe—who was probably trying to get away from the charging mob behind him. It was full of thrills down to the finish. Lindhout took second, VanderLaan was third and Johnny Logan was fourth. Ken Crampton had enough lead built up so that Benson couldn't catch him in the pursuit race.

The supermodified feature was restarted after Duane Knoll spun on turn four on the first lap. Art Bennett spun into the back infield on the fourth lap. Buddy Stewart spun off turn one on lap eight. The following lap, Jack Smith spun on the third turn and Stewart spun to miss him. He didn't succeed and Smith retired to the pits. Bennett spun again into the infield on lap 11. The remaining laps were without caution flags. Crampton led about half way when VanderLaan and then Benson got past him. Benson got by VanderLaan for the lead and onto the checkered flag despite threats by VanderLaan and Crampton who were behind him. Lindhout was fourth and Eberstein fifth-

The midget pilots put on a display of precision driving preceding the feature. 14 cars followed the pace car single file, doubled up, four abreast and back to doubled up to start racing. Quite a sight! About 12 laps into the feature, Tenney and Merle Bettenhausen spun on the

third turn. Both were able to restart. Tommy Copp had stretched out a nice lead. When the caution flag drew the field up close, Wente, Meachum and McGreevy sailed past Copp. Then Kenyon passed Copp and Meachum to join in a hard-fought duel with Wente and McGreevy for the lead. Kenyon got out front and stayed there until Wente saw the white flag come out. He passed Kenyon in turn one, took the checkered flag and won the trophy. Kenyon settled for second, McGreevy third and Gary Bettenhausen fourth.

The wild scrambling these boys do, it seems incredible that only two caution flags have been thrown in the last three appearances of USAC midgets!

As members of USAC, we receive the USAC News which lists upcoming events and purses to be paid. It showed that Berlin's promoter paid well above average purses to both the USAC stocks and USAC midgets. Even so, it seems hard to induce the cars to haul this far north.

### VanderLaan Takes Berlin Feature

June 24, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – The last two events for the semilate models had the crowd on its feet. The pursuit race was rare—five cars spent half the race nose-to-tail, unable to change position, Jim Adema's new car seems to have been built well and he really put his foot in it to stay ahead of the fastest four stocks: Gail Cobb, Bill Rake, Bob Senneker and fastest qualifier Jerry Spear. The fans applauded in delight after this display of racing as its best.

Tom Marks really tore up the pretty USA# l when he and Jerry Peloquin tangled on the third lap of the feature and headed for the fence in the field off turn one. Spear had built up a comfortable lead when Scott Presley spun on lap 11. The caution flag drew the field up tight. Senneker had to work to nose out Spear on the

last lap after chasing him for nine laps to the checker. Spear deserves a tremendous amount of credit for the performance he turned in. The finish was so close that we were buzzing over the result of the first two positions and neglected to note who followed! Cobb took third.

The supermodified consolation race was definitely won by Eldon Schrader. He worked himself thru the pack and passed leader Len Guernsey. Bob Carnes in the #40 spun out. On the restart, Guernsey was the leader (they always restart as they were running the previous complete lap, for scoring purposes) and Schrader just got around him when Duane Wilson hit the wall. Guernsey regained the lead and Eldon passed him again! No doubt, Schrader was glad to see the checker fluttering in his face. Guernsey, Peloquin and Les Lemmon followed.

The super feature had gone five laps when Jackie Lindhout spun and Gordy Bissett spun to miss him. Both restarted. On lap 13 Jack Nichols and Bill McClure touched and McClure spun into the inside of turn four and was done. The next lap Knoll apparently blew a radiator hose on the #7-11 and tangled with Art Bennett. Bennett, driving "The Stripteaser" #6 was able to continue. One lap later, Les Lemmon spun out. Eddie VanderLaan passed leader Mort Anderson midway and kept the lead to the flag. Anderson was a close second followed by Johnny Benson, Bennett, and Nicholas.

Heat race winners were Bob Seelman of Lansing, Jim Pierce of Hastings, Dale Hill of Grand Rapids, Dale Bergakker of Holland, Jerry VanDyke, and Bill Rake of Muskegon. Johnny Logan of Charlotte, the fastest of 84 qualifiers, won the supermodified dash.

### Logan Takes Second Feature At Berlin

The stock feature was won by Bob Senneker followed by Tom Marks, Jerry Spear, Ron Laban and Bill Rake.

### Berlin Feature To Mort Anderson

July 8, 1967 - Berlin Raceway - The supermodified feature was the scene of the action: on lap one Duane Knoll spun the #44, Bob Seelman in #51, Dick Stemler in #14, Jerry Peloquin in #98, Wayne Root in Mark II, Buddy Stewart, and Gail Cobb all spun and avoided each other. Only Knoll was hauled away. On lap nine, Joe Chanz headed for the pits in a shower of sparks from something dragging. For the next five laps, Johnny Benson challenged leader Eddie VanderLaan wheel to wheel. The duel ended halfway through turn four when Benson's front tire and VanderLaan's back tire touched. VanderLaan swapped ends and slid into the wall nearly head on. VanderLaan-apparently unconscious—coasted across to the inside of the track in front of the field of cars. Jim Eberstein couldn't miss him. Jackie Lindhout took a wild ride over someone's wheel and stopped halfway down the front shoot. Benson declined a checkup. Lindhout and VanderLaan did go in for checkups. Rich Senneker spent the remaining laps trying unsuccessfully to get around leader Mort Anderson. Bill McClure and Ken Crampton took third and fourth.

In the fourth semi-late heat, the leader (a newcomer whose long name we couldn't make out) was black flagged for running well over his qualifying time. This is a fair ruling, though seldom used. We overheard several remarks approving of this and wishing it was used more frequently in both divisions.

In the second heat of the semilates, Scott Presley spun broadside and was hit by Leo DeLavern and Bob DePauw who were out of the race. Andy Schutt also spun, but without mishap. Dale Bergakker copped the win. Palanquin's last second surge gave him second over Jerry Strotheide.

In the fast semi-late heat, Glen Tanis and Terry Senneker Sr. spun into the wall on turn three. Leader Bob Sensiba held off Jerry Spear and Bill Lake until the last lap, then had to settle for third.

The consolation race for the semi-lates was restarted after Strotheide threw a wheel on the first lap and Mike Janose lost it and headed straight for flagman Jimmy Meyer. Jim made the right decision on how to escape and suffered only a sore arm from a spill taken trying to stop short of the car. (Don't think flagman and car touched, but it was too close for comfort!) On the restart, newcomer Ora Rugg and Schutt got together and left the track on turn one. Bill Thurkettle in #31 and Ron Merkins-back in his stock #7 followed. Only Merkins restarted. Another final spurt gave Jim Davis the win over Lyle Earl. Norm Aspinal and Jim Dyke followed them.

The semi-late feature's thrilling

moment was when Peloquin threw a wheel and caught Ron Laban between himself and the wall. Laban's car was seriously damaged. Bob Senneker continued his winning ways followed by Jerry Spear, John Bliss, Terry Schmid and Jim Adema.

### Rich Senneker Wins His First SM Victory

July 22, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – Even the warm-ups were spectacular: supermodified Len Guernsey hit Don VanderMolen causing both to lose their rear wheels and fuel tanks as they crashed into the wall. The whole fourth turn was engulfed in flames. The drivers escaped unhurt.

The dash for both the supermodifieds and semi-lates were run without change in position. Supermodifieds: Johnny Benson, Jackie Lindhout, Nick Rowe, and Mort Anderson. Semi-lates: Bob Senneker setting a new track record of 18.68, Jerry Spear, Gail Cobb and Glen Tanis.

A driver of the first semi-late heat was disqualified by the 1/2 secand rule (if a driver runs more than a ½ second over his qualifying time, he is disqualified). This rule should be appreciated by the drivers and fans alike. It prevents drivers from "sandbagging" (running slow in time trials getting a front position, then flying away with the race) and gives the fans a chance to see honest competition between equal cars. This is not really a new rule. I understand Hartford has been using it for some time. At Kalamazoo last Sunday, the first 3 cars in 2 different heats were disqualified. This should put an end of charges of sandbagging. The heat then went to "Dinky" Dalton, inches over Jim Rowley and then Roger

On lap four of supermodified heat one, Chuck Partello in a red #72 did a "wheelie" after touching the wheel of a car that had slowed in front of him. He slid off the backstretch with a tie rod apparently broken. On the white flag lap, Duane Wilson got broadside on the track. To miss him Dick Stemler slammed the wall, as did newcomer Jerry Watson in the red and white #44. Both cars were badly damaged. Jerry Peloquin spun, but missed everything. Johnny Logan won his heat. The second heat went to Bill Beard, Logan and Cy Fairchild in the #40 supermodified. The fast heat and the pursuit both went to Jim Eberstein, with Rich Senneker and Benson closely following.

The second heat for semi-lates was won by Bob Sensiba over Lyle Earl and Ron Laban. Ralph Baker showed the fans how he often looked in years past, carrying the checkered flag after the third semi-late heat. Bob Senneker and Bob Patrick were also in the money. Gail Cobb hit the wall, putting his car out for the evening. Jim Rowley won the consolation feature over Bob Carnes new gold #42, Paul Howell, and Al Lewis.

The feature was Rich Senneker's

first supermodified feature win. He had a long string of wins in lesser divisions with his last win on August 7, 1965, I believe. Rich had built a half-lap lead when Gene Bell and Jack Nichols tangled on lap 18. With the field closed up by the yellow flag, Benson was right behind Senneker and was still right there when the checkered flag came out for five white cars in a row. Rich Senneker—the deserving winner, Benson, Eberstein, Ken Crampton, and Logan.

The stock feature went three laps when five or more cars suddenly scattered all over the track. Bob Sensiba, Dale Talsma, John Bliss, and Fred Britton restarted. Jim Adema hit the wall. Jerry Spear worked thru the pack to the lead. Senneker followed and gave chase. Gaining the lead, Senneker spent several laps with Spear just off his rear bumper. On the last lap, Bob, and his brother, Terry Senneker Sr. tangled briefly, sending Terry off the track. Spear grabbed the lead and his first feature win of the year.

More than 80 cars were on hand again, enough for plenty of competition!

Ron Laban had his new machine painted much like the old #87. Tom Marks came in last with the USA-#1 back together but not yet painted. Bill Minch had a new #9 stock out, but got in a tangle and must repair it before painting. Other new stocks: Phil Elliott of Fruitport in #42, E.R. Bud in #38 and Bill Cobb in #254.

One driver many looked forward to seeing—Joy Fair—had a breakdown halfway to the track and couldn't make it on time to qualify. Those we did get to see were: Ed Howe of Beaverton #100, Mike Ab-

biehl of South Bend, Indiana #100, Mickey Katlin of Clio #122, Moose Myers of Ft. Wayne, Indiana #0, Bob Kohlmeyer of Ft. Wayne, Indiana #82, Bob Meyers of Flint #85, Dave Sorg of Ft. Wayne, Indiana #38, Gene Benn of Elkhart, Indiana #980, Dick Clark of Dowagiac #2211, Fred Robinson of Ft. Wayne, Indiana #5, Roger Edwards of Kalamazoo #30, Bill Jackson of Detroit #08, Tom Wible of Ft. Wayne, Indiana #82, and Dick Dunshee of Kalamazoo #66. A big field of 53 qualified before a capacity crowd.

The dash was inverted for this race. Sorg started on the pole followed by Tom Marks, Bob Senneker and Dunshee,—the last three separated by 1/100 of a second between them. Marks passed Sorg for the win.

Jim Adema took the third heat over Gail Cobb, Terry Schmid and Dale Talsma. The fast heat checkered flag fell to Moose Myers, Howe, Katlin and Bill Rake.

The consolation event went to Adema, Schmid, Denny Nyari and Jim Dyke, putting these cars into the 100-lap feature. On the last lap third place Abbiehl hit the wall in turn three and fourth place Bob Sensiba blew a tire in turn four making for a surprise ending.

Bob Myers took the semi-feature win from Ron Merkins, "Dinky" Dalton and Edwards.

The feature started with 24 cars but hit a snag on the first lap when Howe got broadside on the backstretch and was hit by Bob Fellows who was immediately behind him. Bob Fellows led from the pole position for three laps and blew an engine on turn three scattering cars everywhere. Bill Rake and John Bliss were towed back to the pits. The green flag came out to 14 cars led by Terry Senneker Sr. On lap 18 Dale Bergakker blew a radiator hose and went into the front stretch infield. Glen Tanis spun but restarted. Terry drove to a smooth and steady feature win-his first Berlin win-followed by Jerry Van Dyke, Bob Sensiba, Jim Rowley and Andy Schutt. Gail Cobb's car was out with rear end troubles and Jerry Spear broke a traction bar.

The semi-late dash was started by Spear and Don VanderMolen with matching times, Bill Rake and Schmid. On the second lap, Vander-Molen spun and Rake had no place to go but into him. The race then went to Spear over Schmid. Steve Bauer

World 300 in Mobile, Alabama. Mort had many fans at Berlin having raced here for many years—first in the old stocks and then as one of our top supermodified drivers. The colorful Mort will be missed by drivers and fans alike and we send sincere sympathy to the Anderson family.

Les Lemon, on furlough before a trip which appears to end in Vietnam, took the first supermodified heat from hard-driving Jerry Peloquin and Eldon Schrader. The fast heat for supermodifieds was stopped on the first lap when Jack TenBrink spun coming out of turn three, Johnny Benson and Jackie Lindhout spun, but were able to continue. Bill Mc-Clure, and Jim Eberstein,—as well as Ten Brink-were unable to continue. Eberstein hurt his wrist and some ribs in the shuffle. Eddie VanderLaan won the heat over Buddy Stewart in #56 and Jim Pierce in #2.

The fast-car dash was won by Benson—with a qualifying time of: 16.96—VanderLaan, Lindhout and McClure followed. There were no changes of position. Joe Chanz was the third fastest qualifier but did not run the dash due to mechanical troubles.

By the third lap of the feature, Johnny Logan had come from fifth into the lead, despite Pierce's constant challenging, until lap 18 when he dropped out with rear end trouble. Johnny Benson took over the lead to win. VanderLaan followed and Pierce was third.

Fastest qualifier of the more than 40 semi-lates was Jerry Spear with an: 18.80, winning the dash with Bob Senneker second and Don VanderMolen following. This was truly a fast dash—one lap was run 3/100 of a second faster than the one lap track record!

The pursuit also set a new record, with the win going to Bob Senneker, a hair's breadth over Dale Talsma and Spear. The semi-late feature was restarted on lap three after Jim Rowley and Scott Presley tangled and restarted. On lap seven, three cars tried to squeeze into the space of two, spinning out Bob Carnes. Jerry Rose has rebuilt the red #12 supermodified that was demolished on the Fourth of July. It looks the same and will carry #2 from here on out.

August 12, 1967 - Berlin Raceway - The Michigan State Championship for semi-late model stocks went to Dick Dunshee. With the fastest qualifier on the pole, Dunshee with the fast time took the lead and was never headed. But he was not without competition. For the first 16 laps, Tom Marks, Ed Howe and Jim Adema followed him only inches apart. Ed Howe took over second and Tom Marks never quit trying to regain it. It was an exciting race to watch with Dunshee, Howe and Marks flying around that track for the last 30 laps very close together. Those boys really put on a show! Bob Hegner spun out on lap 18. On lap

30 Ron Laban spun out on turn one and coasted from the middle of the track toward the inside. Dale Fogle a newcomer to Berlin in the convertible #31 tried to go under Laban but the two hit as Laban coasted inward. Both were finished. When the green flag came out the order in which they were running was as follows: Dunshee, Howe, Marks and Jim Adema being challenged by Don VanderMolen and Dale Talsma. They ran the 11 laps to the checkered flag without anyone able to change position. Dunshee won the \$500 and the trophy. He said the race was "hard all the way."

Johnny Benson, Joe Chanz, Eddie VanderLaan, and Johnny Logan were the fastest four qualifiers in the supermodifieds. In the dash while the others were fighting to hold or improve their positions, Benson built up quite a lead running a couple laps close to the track record. VanderLaan got around Chanz for second.

The feature had gone five laps when Jerry Peloquin (who has been doing a fine job in the supermodifieds) apparently broke a tie rod when he hit a tire and spun. Benson made it look simple as he worked his way through the pack and into the lead for the feature win. He was followed by Jim Gresley, Jackie Lindhout, VanderLaan and Art Bennett in the #2, Logan and Chanz.

In the second semi-late heat Harvey St. John spun on lap three and hit a tire, tossing it into the path of Bob DePauw who hit it and rolled over and into the wall, losing his front wheel. On the restart, Andy Schutt got crossed up and Rick Knotts, Jim Rowley and Dale Bergakker tangled trying to miss Schutt. Rowley, Bergakker and Knotts were out of the race. Coming out of turn four on the last lap, Dick Aspinal in fourth place spun. Steve Bauer hit Aspinal, but came on through to take second to Jerry Riddle, an old timer at Berlin who last drove on the dirt track here. Leo DeLavern was third. Four cars lost wheels in this race!

On lap two of the third semi-late heat, Fred Britton lost it at the end of the backstretch and hit a tire. Terry Schmid hit the tire and lost one of his own. On the last lap Bob Patrick blew an engine and hit the wall. Several cars had troubles getting thru the oil and Paul Howell slid into Patrick. Gene Eding won over John Bliss and Glen Tanis.

Eight laps into the fourth heat Dale Talsma, Bill Rake, Howe, VanderMolen and Adema tangled on turn three. Rake hit the wall and was done for the night. Howe hit Rake and was done for this race. Gail Cobb built up a big lead and took the win over Fogle, Marks and Dunshee.

On the second lap of the semi-feature, Schutt bounced off the wall and hit St. John who took a wild ride along the front wall. Someone blew an engine at the same time and Danny Clelland, a newcomer, spun into the infield. Leader Aspinal blew an engine on lap eight. Knotts in second slowed down with Aspinal, giving the lead to Schutt. Knotts kept his second and Al Hagen was third.

## Benson Has Clean Sweep At Berlin

September 2, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – The Michigan State Championship for supermodifieds was won by Johnny Benson "The White Tornado" who led from pole position thru both 35-lap halves to the checkered flag. Shirley Carter presented him with the trophy.

The championship race went 13 laps when the #7-11 spun on turn two and restarted. On lap 24 Nolan Johncock driving the #6 "Strip Teaser" hit the wall on turn four and rolled onto the track. Rich Senneker had no place to go but nearly got stopped before bumping Johncock. Senneker spent the rest of the leg in the pits and Johncock restarted. At the end of the first half the leaders were: Benson, Eddie VanderLaan, Jackie Lindhout, Harold Smith of Dayton, Ohio in his first appearance this year, Duane Knoll, and Ken Crampton.

The second leg went quickly and smoothly for 25 laps, then Wayne Root, who had moved up well and was running sixth came out of turn four, seemed to have mechanical trouble and hit the inside guard rail hard. He wasn't hurt, but the car was. One lap after the restart, there

was a multi-car scramble on turn one involving Merle Mulder, Harry Chapman (a newcomer driving the #58), Don VanderMolen (his first supermodified ride?) in the yellow #7, and Lindhout who was challenging for second when the track became blocked and he left it to miss the other cars. Starting at the rear Lindhout went two laps and broke a radius rod, taking the front axle out from under his car inside turn three. The race was not halted. The checkered flag dropped to Benson, VanderLaan, Knoll, Smith, Nick Rowe, and Johncock.

The only other supermodified race was the consolation event, which went to Rowe, driving the roadster #20 (formerly #14). Bob Seelman was second and Buddy Steward was third.

At least 40 supermodifieds were in the pits but troubles plagued several of them.

We had a big field of semi-lates—over 40. Don VanderMolen had hot time—just .008 off the record. Jim Adema was second, also in the 18 second bracket, but broke a crankshaft after the dash. Gail Cobb and Randy Sweet competed in the fast-car dash which finished: Cobb, Adema, VanderMolen and Sweet. Tom Marks also qualified well then broke a piston and was unable to race.

Heat one was won by Ralph Lawrence ahead of George Neff-formerly of supermodifieds in the new #1, and Al Hagen. Jerry VanDyke took the second semi-late heat from Paul Howell and Bob DePauw. Midway thru the fast heat, Jim Dyke the leader, and Cobb, trying for the lead, tangled, spinning Dyke out. Cars scattered all over the track but all were able to continue. Cobb took the lead and went on to win over Bob Senneker and Glen Tanis in their heat race. Smoking Randy Sweet took the pursuit over Don Vander-Molen. Dyke was third place finisher.

Andy Schutt won the consolation event in his new car. "Dinky" Dalton and Paul Howell also finished in the money. Senneker solved whatever problem had slowed him down earlier and took the feature win. Gail Cobb was second and Jerry Spear third.

Other than those already mentioned the newcomers were: Norm Gardner in super #76 and Gary Rauser in stock #5.

## VanderLaan Wins Controversial Feature

September 4, 1967 - Berlin

Raceway - The big Labor Day show
had lots of excitement: the racing, of
course, Chet's famous fireworks, and
Gordy Johncock and his Indy car on
hand. Gordy's comment on being
here was "Kind of makes me wish I

was back here running with them."

The fast-car dash in both divisions ended with three cars running. Johnny Benson was first with by far the fastest time. Wayne Root was second fastest. Rich Senneker and Ken Crampton completed the dash lineup. Benson, Senneker and Crampton finished in that order. Root spun and retired to the pits.

Bob Senneker, Don Vander-Molen, Randy Sweet and Dale Talsma were the fastest four semilates. Vander-Molen spun and Sweet couldn't miss him. Sweet was towed back to the pits, leaving Senneker, Talsma and Vander-Molen to finish the dash.

In the semi-lates the second heat began with a four car pileup on turn three. Jim Rowley, Bob DePauw and "Dinky" Dalton were retired. Bill Thurkettle was able to restart. Jim Dyke took the win over John Bliss and Thurkettle. The fast heat was nearly two seconds faster than usual, with Tom Marks setting a new record. He was trailed by several cars that were also making pretty good time. Gail Cobb was second, Bob Fellows third, then Jerry Van Dyke, Talsma, Jim Adema and Senneker.

Just after the green came out in the consolation race, Greg Ponchahar hit Roger Borst in the side and they locked and left the track. Both were done for the night. A few laps later, Bill Lauer—a newcomer—slammed the front wall head on. Luckily, he was not hurt. The win went to Rick Knotts; Jerry Spear was second and Garv Russler third.

Tom Marks had the feature locked up when the caution flag came out on lap 22 for a spin out. With the field drawn up tight again, Marks had to hold off Senneker for three laps before the checkered flag dropped. Cobb and Adema were third and fourth. In the first supermodified heat, Merle Mulder, Leon Dunn and Ron Merkins tangled on the white flag lap. The win went to Arnie Mortimer, Duane Wilson and Jimmy Murphy.

The supermodified feature aroused some controversy concerning the rule covering the repair of cars during red flag delays. On the 13th lap, the race leaders were Benson, Eddie VanderLaan, and Jim Gresley. Jerry Peloquin spun in front of Buddy Stewart on turn four. Jack Nichols hit Stewart and then was hit hard by two other cars. Others in the nine car tangle were Cy Fairchild, Curly Moody, Don VanderMolen, Larry Gathman, Crampton and Bob Goorhouse. VanderMolen and Moody restarted as did Crampton after some repairs. Leader Benson and also Jackie Lindhout also did something on their cars. On the restart Crampton went to the rear of the field in accordance with the rule which penalizes drivers who work on their cars under red flags. Benson and Lindhout who had taken up their original positions were told to fall in at the rear, but elected to drop out of the race. Moody and VanderMolen later dropped out of the race which ended with VanderLaan the winner followed by Knoll, Johnny Logan, Nolan Johncock and Gresley. On the management's side of the controversy it must be said that the rule is the fair method of insuring each driver of equal opportunity. On the driver's side there seems to be no objection to the rule as long as it is applied to all drivers at all times. Perhaps a posted

set of ruled or distribution of printed rules to all drivers would help.

Newcomer Jerry Watson did a good job of handling the latest of Hub Becker's unique race cars. This #44 is an offset roadster with a 333 Chrysler power plant.

## Another Clean Sweep For Benson

September 9, 1967 - Berlin Raceway - The Season Championship for semi-lates was about the most competitive racing we have seen all year. It was a real fight to the finish! The race was restarted when Gail Cobb and Jerry Spear tangled on the first lap putting Spear out of the race. On Lap 35 Denny Nyari, the Hoosier Hotshot, blew an engine and hit the wall. He had been running fourth. On lap 55 John Bliss hit the wall. Jerry VanDyke lost a wheel on the caution flag. At the restart, Tom Marks picked off the lapped cars between himself and leader Bob Senneker in short order and took up a position just off Senneker's bumper. On lap 71 Marks captured the lead and Senneker followed by inches. On lap 90 coming up on slower cars Senneker got a break and grabbed the lead again. The nose-to-tail battle continued. Marks and Senneker came out of turn four together and Marks won the drag for the checkered flag. These two put on a tremendous show!

The pursuit for semi-lates was also wild. On the third lap cars were coming out of turn four three abreast. Jim Dyke was high and touched the wall. Amazingly good luck, on the other hand, was riding with Johnny Benson In the supermodified feature on lap five things happened so fast coming out of turn three, that they are hard to describe. Apparently someone got crossed up to start the melee. Curly Moody slid into the wall and thru the fence and out into the field in back of the third turn in flames! When help got to Moody, he was out using his fire extinguisher! Incredible...The only unbent part of the car seemed to be the roll cage. A lot of credit is due the builders for making a car which can survive a terrific crash and keep the driver safe. Benson worked himself up to the lead and held on for the feature win.

Berlin Raceway is the home track for some excellent competitors. Some of our boys were in New Bremen, Ohio, qualifying for the big race Saturday afternoon and broke the track record a few times and got back to race here at night. Ambitious? Duane Knoll broke the record in the #92. Jackie Lindhout broke Knoll's. Knoll went out and did the same, as I hear it. Then Benson went out and really fractured it. Benson came back and took the feature followed by Knoll in the #7-11.

ant note: Eddie VanderLaan's car is back in running shape. Quite a feat! He put in a few practice laps, but came too late to qualify and couldn't race. One "really big show" remains for supers this season. Watch for the results of the Oswego International Classic, they should include several Berlin regulars, also October 1st, at Illiana Speedway.

The semi-lates will run a solo program next Saturday night. A Michigan State Invitational with a 75-lap feature.

During warm-ups five cars were involved in a tangle. Bob Goorhouse was treated for a fracture of a small bone in his right arm. Duane Knoll, Nick Rowe, and Bob Fellows came out of it okay, but Senneker's car was damaged in the rear. It was repaired in time to qualify.

The supermodifieds ran thru their races smoothly until the feature. On lap ten Johnny Benson spun and Ken Crampton spun to miss him hitting the wall. Benson restarted. Casey Jones blew an engine, caught fire and hit the wall on lap 17. Benson hit the wall to miss Jones and bent up the frame under the #21. Jack Smith spun and restarted. Eldon Schrader had the night's tough luck. After doing a terrific job out in front of our fastest machinery, a pickup truck pulled into his path on its way to aid Jones. Schrader slammed on his brakes and sheared off a spline in the in-out box and was done. Jackie Lindhout worked up into the lead and held off Jim Eberstein, Jim Gresley, Johnny Logan, Bob Seelman and Nolan Johncock (last two so close that either could be the fifth-place finisher.)

The first semi-late heat was halted on the third lap when Greg Ponchahar spun into the back infield. On the next lap Ed Senecal nudged Tom Carl, who spun out. One lap later Senecal spun on turn one, as did Fred Britton. On the restart, Senecal did a replay and retired. Someone had spilled oil all over the track and the safety crew applied "soak-up" to most of the track. Surviving the troubles were Terry Senneker Sr.,

Rick Knotts, Britton and Max Maxim, making his second appearance in the red convertible #48.

The real battle was waged in the third semi-late heat. The win went to Jerry VanDyke followed inches apart by Gail Cobb, Don VanderMolen, and Jerry Spear or Jim Adema for fourth ( too close to call it). There was terrific competition all the way.

The semi-late feature went three laps when Gordy Bissett spun. Fellows hit Bissett and then Scott Preslev spun, and slammed into Fellows. Drivers okay, cars not so. Bob Senneker dumped an engine and slid into the wall midway thru the race. Denny Nyari hit the wall to miss Bob and lost a wheel. (Nyari is a fine competitor, but his luck hasn't been too hot at Berlin. Hope he keeps trying.) On the restart, VanderMolen, Spear and Tom Marks were the leaders. The race ended in the same order. VanderMolen was pretty happy about his first feature win of the season.

Odds and ends: Bill Lauer had a new green #4 semi-late out, Dick Butler made his first Berlin appearance in the #427 stock, Buck Jones drove a stock #4 which we hadn't seen before and Dave Weiland drove the #11 stock which he and Russ Feringa have put together. Buck Havens drove the yellow #71 supermodified don't think either have been out earlier. Anyone looking for a good supermodified? Rich Senneker's Weller Auto Parts car #57 is for sale.

It's been a good year a fairly safe year for supermodifieds. Now for a little rest before they start rebuilding and improving for next year.

## Berlin Interesting Facts

September 23, 1967 – Berlin Raceway – One more week before the blues set in, fans. Berlin's stock program was postponed to next Saturday Night.

It was interesting to me, to look into the number of cars and drivers

Berlin has had this season. I'll share what I learned with you.

My record of the supermodifieds shows 100 different drivers of 82 different cars. Did you ever imagine there were so many? The most versatile driver was Cy Fairchild, who piloted six different supermodifieds, and one semi-late this season. Jim Pierce and Duane Knoll also were in six cars. The number two was on the most cars—the numbers under ten were the most popular. The drivers names started with every letter but Q, U, X, Y & Z with names starting with S being the most popular—13 of them. Can you name them?

My records may not be exact, but they are close. The only serious injury was Norm Rust's ten days in the hospital. Five other drivers received treatment and four went in for check-ups and were okay. There were 22 race programs for the supermodifieds.

Of the 23 programs run so far for semi-lates, there were 169 drivers of 163 cars! Nearly all drivers drove only one car, a few drove two. It seems incredible, but the only injury I recall was Moose Myers for treatment of his eye. Bob Senneker was checked over, but that was involving a supermodified flip. The most popular car number was #11 (Seven of them) followed by #1 (five of them). Multiples of the same number was used 20 times (like 11, 22 or 777). Driver's last names begin with every letter but I. U, X, Y & Z. Can you name 22 drivers with the last name starting with S? This should give you something to do during the snowy months!

In last week's "Down the Shoot" column, Lefty wrote a fine tribute to one of Berlin's stock pilots. We couldn't agree more that Don VanderMolen is truly a credit to this sport.

Thanx! And Most of all to the silent half of this pair, without Karl's help, we wouldn't have made the first deadline!

Spear was driving a beautiful race on his way to breaking another record-when a wheel broke. After 70 laps, he took the car off turn two and was done. Another frustrating experience-they've dogged him all year. Maybe next year...

Gail Cobb, also right up there, dropped out and the fans, as well as some drivers, were wondering who was leading the race. The checkered flag came out to a happy Bob Senneker. Bob Fellows put on a terrific show driving the #74 to 2nd place. Don VanderMolen, Jerry VanDyke and Bob Sensiba were scored next. 75-laps non-stop is a long race!

This may be Bob Senneker's last

semi-late race at Berlin. His #84 was put up for sale. In talking to him after the race, we learned that he has a stock car "in pieces on the garage floor" that will be put together this winter to take him into racing with U.S.A.C. (United States Auto Club) next season. Bob says it's "a different type of racing". It's also a big step and we wish him well.

The dash was won by Vander-Molen over Spear, Bob Senneker and Marks. In the first heat, Ron Merkins tangled with Greg Ponchahar and hit the wall. Both were out of the race. Paul Howell was the winner, beating Rich Butler and Leo Havens. Bob Sensiba won the second heat over Jim Weller and Bob DePauw. Bill Thurkettle, really moving, took the fast heat win, followed by VanDyke, Bob Senneker, Marks and Jim Dyke. The fourth heat was an unusual

"dead heat" between Bob Young and Howell. Havens was third, blowing an engine after taking the checkered flag. Mechanical troubles hit Dyke coming down for the starting flag in the pursuit. Terry Senneker Sr. led from the pole to the win. Brother Bob almost got him at the flag. Marks and Spear followed him.

Thirty-seven cars braved the cold for the season finale. John Anderson brought a sharp red Chevelle #13 in from Detroit, but it developed troubles in warm-ups. Paul Yooker made his Berlin debut in his pretty yellow #411. LaCombe brought out a new #94. Rich Senneker drove the yellow #44.

The top 20 stock drivers in the point standings were honored and given cash and beautiful trophies. Tom Marks was named "Rookie-ofthe-Year"—he certainly earned the honor. Another rookie who did a fine job was Jim Dyke. The wildest ride of the evening was taken by Bill Minch. He was having handling troubles in qualifying. On the second lap he hit the wall and slid towards the cars headed for the cars in line to time in. Fortunately, he stopped short of them.

Berlin now has continued the outer wall past the new first turn bleachers about 65 feet along the outer edge of the turn. (And no one tried to find out how sturdy it was—surprise!)

Can't put it off any longer, the final deadline is fast approaching and we must bid you farewell for this racing season. Goodbye and God Bless. We'll see you in April, from Berlin's Bleachers.





Eldon Schrader was the guv who showed the other supermodifieds the shortest way around the track. He took the win over Buddy Stewart and Art Bennett in heat two.

The fourth stock heat had plenty of action, on lap four. Lee Paauwe lost it coming out of turn two, going into the infield, then across the track taking Bill Rake off turn three and into the mud with him. Rake then got out, but Paauwe had to leave his car out there until intermission. Needless to say, there was a wee bit of moisture in the low areas. With an unnecessary rainstorm, and the winds accompanying it, it shouldn't be too far out to guess that the majority of the fans had spent some of their afternoon cleaning up debris from the storm. The track was unscathed but there was a lot of water standing in low places like off the backstretch.

Bill Minch had built up quite a lead on the restart; Minch continued to lead despite challenges from Bill Thurkettle. Ed Britton was third. Minch has a nice-looking car and the driver has been improving steadily this year.

The stock pursuit had the crowd on its feet. Gail Cobb's car was really running well and he pushed it hard. Starting on the pole Cobb led all the way to the flag where Bob Senneker beat him by inches. Cobb and Senneker thrilled the fans with a three-lap duel which ended when Bob found a little more horsepower for a final surge breaking the ten-lap record again. (The record has been broken numerous times this season.)

During the supermodified feature, caution flags came out for Jim Eberstein on lap 13 when he hit the first turn wall, on the restart when Davis spun on the front shoot and on lap 17 when Ken Crampton lost a wheel on turn three. We never did find out if they were able to retrieve it-it went off the fairgrounds onto the private property where the property owner seemed to think the name of the game was "finders' keepers"! Eldon Schrader copped the loot again with Lindhout second despite challenges from Johnny Benson who had to settle for third. Jim Gresley piloted Eddie VanderLaan's new mount to fourth and Jim Murphy was fifth in a sleek new car.

Jerry Spear took the lead in the stock feature and held it through lap 14, on which Bill Thurkettle and Jim Leonard got into trouble on the front straight. On the next lap Rich Senneker got around Spear. On the 16th lap Dick Dunshee hit the front wall and crossed the track in a shower of sparks. Two laps later Cobb hit the tire opposite the starter, on the white flag lap. Minch spun into the back pit entrance. Meanwhile Bob Carnes had made his way to Rich's bumper. With the checkered flag coming closer, Carnes got around Rich to take the win. Spear was third followed by Tom Marks, John Bliss, Johnny Roberts (back with a new orange paint job this week) and Ron Laban.

The fans saw ten events with a lot of competition and action.

## Veteran Johnny Logan Wins Over Tough Competitors

July 4, 1968 – Berlin Raceway – Berlin's holiday program complete with fabulous fireworks and three very accurate skydivers, moved along smoothly and quickly with lots of excitement furnished by 25 supermodifieds and 38 semi-lates.

The fastest four supermodifieds were Johnny Benson, Jackie Lindhout, Bill Beard and Eldon Schrader. Schrader got off to the lead, Beard got by him, when Eldon blew an engine and dropped out. Beard set a new record with his win over Lindhout and Benson. I noticed Schrader had a belly pan which kept the track clean and safe. We vote for incorporating this into the list of required equipment as some tracks now require.

The semi-late dash featured Bob Carnes with fast time, Bob Senneker, John Bliss and Dick Dunshee, in inverted order. Senneker worked himself into the lead and staved off Carnes in the drag for the flag by a couple of feet. Dunshee and Bliss followed.

The first supermodified heat got off to a poor start as Jim Murphy spun and scattered Jerry Peloquin, Oscar Faye and Jim Gresley. Only Faye failed to continue. On the second try, they completed the heat without incident; Larry Gathman took the green stuff with Murphy second and newcomer Preston Beck in the Ford-powered #20 third.

The first semi-late heat was a fans delight! Would you believe three stocks abreast in each of the four turns? Then newcomer Len Maxwell hit the wall and Steve Bauer hit the wall and burst into flames. Both were okay but Bauer's car really looked sick on the front corner. Al Hagen was leading with Jim Leonard making a bid for the lead when they tangled. Leonard retired, but Hagen stayed in to take third. Ron Busscher was the winner and Ron Keech runner-up.

The supermodified pursuit was hairy when four supers came into turn two parallel and all got thru! Benson bested Duane Knoll with Gresley third.

The stock pursuit set a new record for Rich Senneker who beat Carnes to the checker with Tom Marks third.

Duane Knoll took the second supermodified heat over Benson and

Lindhout while Nolan Johncock took the second semi-late heat over Thurkettle and Johnny Logan. Gail Cobb won the third stock heat followed by Rich Senneker and Marks.

The consi was a see-saw battle between Leonard and Dick Aspinall until Aspinall dropped out. Leonard got the win over Rick Knotts and Hagen who has been doing some rougher-than-necessary competing.

Nineteen cars started the supermodified feature with Knoll leading. On the ninth lap, Lindhout got past him and Johnny Logan followed him thru. These two battled for seven laps with Lindhout driving a beautifully smooth race until he had a flat tire. Rough luck! Logan took a well-deserved win, holding off Benson, Jim Eberstein, Knoll and Art Bennett. Ed Angle, a newcomer from South Bend, Indiana, crossed the finish line in flames, which were extinguished promptly.

Gail Cobb led the field for more than 10 laps in the feature until Rich Senneker got by him. Three laps later brother Bob Senneker caught up and passed Rich. One lap before the white flag Ed Britton spun on the front straight, trapping Carnes who slammed the wall. Rich also hit the wall. Rough break for both drivers who were coming on strong. Bob Senneker won going away; Cobb, Marks, Logan, and Bliss were next in line. New faces: Jerry Strotheide making his '68 debut in Dale Bergakker's usual ride: Rich Butler in a new maroon #47 and Denny Comai in #26.

## Lindhout Beats Stout Field For Feature Win

July 6, 1968 – Berlin Raceway – The Mid-Season championship for semi-late models started with 23 cars in the order of point standings. Tom Marks was on the pole with Bob Carnes leading on the outside. The Senneker brothers with Rich on the inside formed the second row. Randy

Sweet and John Bliss the third row, Gene Eding and Ron Laban next, and Gail Cobb and Bill Rake were in row five.

Jerry Spear dropped out on the first lap with mechanical difficulties, he later returned, but was still having problems. On the second lap Eding dropped out in a shower of sparks with a broken idler arm. Carnes had grabbed the lead. Rake blew a tire and hit the turn one wall busting a frame. On lap 14 Harvey Sytsma broke a hub and hit the front wall, wiping out the front end. On the restart leader Carnes dropped out with a broken axle, leaving the leader Sweet followed by Marks, Rich and Bob Senneker. Sweet piled up a sizable lead. Rich spun on the backstretch on the 34th lap and rejoined the pack at the rear. Two laps later, Bob Senneker passed Marks to take over second spot. Sweet took the checker well ahead of Bob Senneker, Marks, Cobb and Bliss. A beautiful trophy was Sweet's reward - as well as more than \$500 for his evening's work.

Twenty-one cars ran the thrilling supermodified feature in practice for their Mid-Season Championship event next week. Jim Eberstein led the first six laps in Casev Jones' usual ride after his own was badly damaged in an earlier tangle. Nolan Johncock led for six laps until Jackie Lindhout managed to get by for the lead. Johnny Logan who had been running in a tight knot with Lindhout, Johncock and Benson, dropped out. Benson spent several laps trying to get by Johncock and succeeded on the last lap. Lindhout took the win well ahead of Benson and Johncock. Eberstein took fourth and Art Bennett fifth.

In the semi-late fast heat Johnny Roberts led three laps before dropping out. Jerry Spear held the lead for seven laps when Bob Senneker nailed him at the flag. In the pursuit Spear was leading, but Sweet nosed ahead at the flag. It just wasn't Jerry's night.

A new track record of 18.14 set by Ed Howe the night of the Midwest Invitational race was duplicated by Randy Sweet in time trials. Bob Carnes later timed in at the record time also. Dick Dunshee and Gail Cobb also timed in the low 18's.

In the semi-late dash Sweet, Cobb and Carnes came out of the third turn three deep, Cobb and Carnes bumped and Carnes on the outside hit the wall reshaping the frame. Cobb continued with a shortened tail, taking third behind Dunshee and the winner Sweet.

The supermodified dash was similar in that two cars tangled, one badly damaged and the other able to continue. Eberstein hit the front wall hard avoiding Logan. On the restart Logan moved into second place ahead of Lindhout. Benson from the pole kept it out front for the win. New faces in the stocks were Keith Bussing in #13, Max Hiscock in #2, and Gene Page of Lansing in the #63, a tiger-striped '63 Comet.

## Crash Stops Berlin Races

July 13, 1968 – Berlin Raceway – The tragedy of the past weekend at Berlin is past and yet will not soon be forgotten. Our hearts go out to those involved. The Berlin Raceway is extremely safe, as safe as any track can be made. The wall is high on the front straight and the fence above it is also high. Only a freak combination of circumstances could have brought about the incident.

On the 21st lap of the 30-lap Mid-Season Championship for supermodifieds a car careened into the wall as it neared the middle of the front stretch, climbing the wall and tearing down a long length of fencing. Some of the car's parts were thrown into the stands.

It was a horrible sight for those who actually saw the mishap; however a hard fought battle between the first three contenders up front had had most of the spectator's attention. The race was called complete at the time of the accident. John Benson Sr.

was the winner with Jackie Lindhout and Eldon Schrader next.

There is so much we ache to say and so little that will come out on paper. Please remember in your prayers all those who suffered from the mishap in so many ways.

Prior to the feature race many exciting races had been held and deserve mention. Rich Senneker set a new record for the stock dash at 1:33.05; Bob Senneker with fast time of the night was second, Bob Carnes third. There was no fast-car dash for the supermodifieds on their championship night.

During time trials Dale Larson lost it coming out of turn four and hit Steve Bauer's car, which was sitting in the make-ready shoot, in the rear, pushing Bauer into Len Maxwell's car, and Maxwell into Mel Gillett. Larson really spoiled his nice machine; Bauer's car received a terrific blow and had severe damage. This was the second time in two weeks that Bauer's car came out a loser through no fault of the driver! Gillett's car appeared unhurt and Maxwell later raced his machine also. No one was hurt in the four car accident.

Eddie VanderLaan was on hand and timed his car in, although he didn't drive it in the races. We are glad he is able to get behind the wheel again. Dale Talsma had a beautiful new red #99 on hand. Glen Andree drove the new yellow #7 and Gordy Lyons piloted the red #3. Tom Marks had his new USA #1 Chevy out trying to maintain his lead in the point standings. The stock feature was cancelled.

Johnny Benson was declared the winner for supermodifieds at Berlin Raceway Saturday night in a race cut short when a car driven by Duane Wilson fatally injured two spectators after hitting the high retaining wall and fence. (Within a few days a third person died from the crash).

The semi-late model feature was postponed until Saturday night July 20 when it will be run in conjunction with a regular race card of semi-late model stock cars closing out the Berlin Fair.

Heat race winners were Jim Eberstein of Kalamazoo, Duane Knoll of Muskegon, Bob Sensiba of Middleville, Jerry Spear of Battle Creek, Johnny Logan of Charlotte and Rich Senneker of Grand Rapids.

Pursuit honors went to Jackie Lindhout and Bob Senneker, both of Grand Rapids.

## **Berlin Tragedy Facts**

July 13, 1968 – Berlin Raceway – This report is being written in an effort to straighten out the poor reporting of that tragic accident on July 13<sup>th</sup> at the Berlin Raceway, and in so doing, try to quell some false rumors that have cropped up from said reports.

First of all the management at the Berlin Raceway had asked me to thank the many nurses who were watching the races and really did their best in a time of need, also the many drivers and owners who helped with the injured. They would also like to thank the Bell Telephone system and the wonderful woman who assisted for 2-1/2 hours with emergency calls. The lady wouldn't give her name, just simply said "Thank you sir, we're only trying to do a service". Thanks to all of you wonderful people who helped and thanks to you fans who staved back out of the way and kept your cool.

If any of the injured has lost articles, please call them at the track or the Mysliwiec home, as the police department has turned in many personal items. Those fans that were kind enough to loan blankets and haven't received them back please get in touch with the track also and you will be reimbursed.

The accident started in the supermodified feature on about the tenth lap when the supermodified running in next to last place lost control of his car coming out of the fourth turn. He was running approximately 75 m.p.h.

The car was driven by Duane Wilson of the Portland, Michigan

area. The car hit the wall flush with both right hand tires, causing a bouncing reaction, on the track, then up again into the fence, this time with a rolling motion, shearing off the steel fence supporting pipes at the cement wall. The car continued moving towards the grandstand until it hit the starter's stand where the car's body was knocked onto the track.

The rear end of the car sheared off and was hurtled along the front rows of the reserved section, sending 29 people to the hospital. Twenty-two persons were admitted to Butterworth Hospital and seven at St. Mary's. At this writing two persons have died and six remain hospitalized, five are in critical condition with lacerations and head injuries.

The accident was terrible enough, but then you get some weird reporters on the radio and in the papers with conflicting "eye witness" reports. These sensationalists on radio and in the newspapers have compounded an unlikely accident at a racetrack which is one of the safest, in a section of the grandstands where injury is very improbable.

These same inconsiderate asses that don't give you the time of day unless you cut off your right arm for some blood.

Well I don't belong to this bigdeal type of reporting set. I don't believe in it. These reporters who exploit every drop of blood and gore they can think off to add to the horror of an unavoidable accident are probably the same flowers who have never been to a racetrack and their most hazardous sports coverage comes from ping-pong, chess and golf tournaments. Their biggest hazard being an ice cube too big to swallow or maybe get an olive caught in their nose. These same sensationalists are the ones who come on like gangbusters every day saying: "Howdy folks, well there was a helluva wreck out on the highway, killed a guy (that you think is yours), who was driving a car (that sounds like yours) and had three kids in the car (yours??), but we're sorry we

can't tell you who they are, but, just remember music lovers, we scared you first".

This scare method of reporting was highly in evidence Saturday night, with a few of the FALSE reports as follows:

"Race car knocks down judge's stand supports and spills people screaming to the ground and continues into the grandstand to injure 150 persons, 50 of them critically."

Quite sensational, but entirely and stupidly false. In the second place the race car never went into the stands, it was into the fence for approximately 30 feet, shearing the steel posts at the base. Most of the injuries were caused by the rear end rolling up in the strong cyclone fencing, and from other people falling or being thrown into each other. There was no fire, there was no panic, just disbelief. Other reports told of a race car of unbelievable speed using exotic fuels traveling at 140 miles per hour plummeting into the throngs of horrified spectators. Unfortunately for most of the injured people, they were unaware of the presence of the car until impact, as he was well behind the pack, and most eyes were watching the lead cars.

Let me tell you, I, for one, am sick and tired of this way-out, stupid reporting, and I think the entire country ought to complain to their congressmen until a change is put into effect controlling the drivel that some gore-loving, fact-ignoring reporters (so called) are scaring everyone with. It's up to you, John Q. Public. Are you getting tired of being terrified into listening to your radio? Well do something about it...NOW!

## Sweet Wins Two Late-Model Features

Although there were no caution flags thrown, it was a wild race which was won by Randy Sweet over Jerry Spear, with Rich Senneker, Tom Marks, Bob Carnes, and John Bliss following. The evening took a heavy toll on machinery. Nearly all of the top contenders suffered mechanical difficulties during the evening. Bob Senneker's car went up in a cloud of smoke which eliminated him before he got a chance to race, rather an anti-climax after his win at Hartford's Michigan Dirt Championship Race the night before.

Although there was no dash, the fast time deserves mention since Sweet shaved 8/100's off the record! A record of: 18.06 is going to be tough to break!

The night was very Sweet, in fact. (That's a pun!) The second feature also went to Randy and that 289 Ford. The action-packed event had to be completely restarted after a multi-car tangle on the first lap. Don VanderMolen, Jim Leonard, Gene Eding and Dick Aspinal were eliminated. in the #8 made his Berlin debut. You have probably heard about the calm thinking of Johnny Benson which perhaps averted further tragedy last week. You may not have heard that A.J. Stehouwer, the pit steward, ran across the track and grabbed a red flag to stop oncoming cars after the accident. Hats off to Ade, too!

We thought you might like to know more about drivers who are always in there trying, but don't get publicity because they haven't carried the checker in a feature. For a start, we talked with Gene Eding: We learned that Gene, his wife, Ellen, and son Terry are Wyoming residents. His #64 car is owned by Rodger TerVeen and Doyle McKenny handles the wrenches. In his second year of racing late models, Gene's goal is "To win a couple of features." He races for the fun of it, and wishes some other drivers wouldn't take it quite so seriously. At the Mid-Season Championship, Gene and John Bliss were tied for sixth in the point standings at Berlin. Gene had steadily improved and we predict he will achieve his goal of winning a feature one of these nights. By the way, Gene is growing a beard again and on him it looks good! In the winter, Gene shoots skeet in two leagues as a hobby.

We hope to continue these little "interviews," if you readers approve. Let us know who you would like to "meet" in the future?

## Rich Senneker Ends Hot Dry Spell

July 26, 1968 – Berlin Raceway – The MARC Times Invitational Friday night at Berlin Raceway brought out some of the finest super stocks in the Midwest, with Joy Fair taking the fast time at 18.07, one 100th off Randy Sweet's track record.

John Mangnus took the first heat over Bill McClure and Duane LaCombe. George Cooper bested Butch Fedewa and Jerry VanDyke in the second heat, with Rick Knotts fourth.

John Anderson came from the rear to win the third heat over Bob Sensiba, Gene Benn and Ed Britton. In this heat Larry Knowlton blew a tire, hit the wall and burst into flames, which proved hard to extinguish, Larry's car was demolished, but he is okay.

The consi started innocently enough, then Lyle Earl sailed his "Woodshed Special" off the third turn on the eighth lap. Tom Bartlett blew a tire, just missing the wall. On the 12th lap the race was stopped when John Anderson lost a wheel, crashing into the third turn wall. John was taken to Butterworth Hospital with broken ribs and a punctured lung. This was a real heartbreaker as John had moved from the rear of the pack, passed 19 cars and was moving into third spot when the wheel went. George Cooper of Dearborn took the win followed by Gene Benn, Sensiba and Butch Fedewa.

Fair led the 100-lap feature from his pole start. The caution was out on lap 20 when Don VanderMolen spun into the infield, and two others tangled briefly in turn three. After setting a blistering pace for 32 laps, Joy dropped out with a broken axle. Randy Sweet led for one lap before Bob Carnes passed him, and one lap later Sweet and VanderMolen's engines blew simultaneously, the race was halted to clean up the oily track.

On the 42nd lap Rich Senneker took the lead from Carnes. Tom Marks, who had been moving up, dropped out smoking. By lap 60 John Bliss and Harold Smith of Dayton, Ohio had moved into contention, but Smith left on lap 76. The fast paced 100-lapper took its toll of engines as Joe Ruttman dropped out early, Mickey Katlin was in and out, and Ed Howe dropped out as did Tom Maier, Ray Barnard and Denny Nyari. The big names were on hand but didn't finish in the high pay bracket. For 58 laps Carnes dogged Rich Senneker in spite of a blistering front tire. Coming out of the fourth turn, Carnes made a last attempt to pass inside; Bob

skated, brushing Rich's bumper, Rich bobbled but kept charging for the win. Carnes spun, hitting the guard rail infield and finished second. Jerry Spear drove a fine race finishing third. Danny Byrd was fourth, followed by Johnny Benson, Bliss, Bob Senneker, Gene Eding, Dick Dunshee, Gail Cobb, VanderMolen and Harold Smith.

Rich Senneker won the \$1,500 first place money, driving a beautiful race as did all the many fine drivers who attended. A large hand goes to the mechanics who are the unsung heroes in these grueling fetes of man and machinery.

Lindhout was third and Eberstein fourth.

Jack left a married daughter, wife and three children at home, he was a good competitor and a credit to the sport, we'll miss him. Talsma and Benson were next in line. All the drivers were exhibiting top form. making the race a joy to watch. It was Senneker night, though, with Rich taking the dash and pursuit, as well as setting a new track record, and Bob winning the main event, not bad.

David Wiley, the lad that assisted flagman Jim Meyer is hospitalized in Bronson Hospital, Kalamazoo, with injuries received in the accident on July 13. His operations are over and he will be put into leg-hip casts soon, then eight more weeks will be spent in the hospital. Wouldn't you like to drop this guy a card? He will be 11 years old on August 2nd. I think, let's all remember him with cards.

Making their Berlin debut for this season were Terry Schmid in Russ Dodge's #69, Windy Harter in the red #2 and Hal Isbell in the yellow #26.

To continue our little "interviews," this week we talked with John Bliss. He and his wife Sue are from Grand Rapids, John is 25 and works in the office for General Motors and spends a couple nights

a week playing golf and plays on a baseball team. He also drives late model Chevy stocks by the way! His car #89 is owned and serviced by Bob Kars, Rog Rozema and John himself. He has raced for three years and has yet to win a feature, although he is coming steadily closer. John is currently 4th in the point standings for Berlin and Kalamazoo. With the tough competition this year that's no mean feat!

John is working toward his goal of a feature win; finishing 20<sup>th</sup> last year in points, his fourth place currently is an outstanding improvement. Good luck J.B.!

All drivers escaped serious injury.

Heat race winners were Les Scott of Livonia, Strickland, Arnold, and Cy Fairchild of Saginaw.

August 10, 1968 – Berlin Raceway - The Michigan State Champion Stock Car Driver is Bob Senneker again this year. With the fastest time of the night, Bob sat on the pole and held the first slot from green to checker. He drove well and withstood strong challenges by Tom Marks for more than 20 laps. Some of the drivers were unhappy due to an incident involving the use of the yellow light. There were no caution flags thrown when Don VanderMolen spun in the early laps and Johnny Benson spun on lap 22. Both were able to restart. The big problem for the drivers came about

when someone hit the switch for the yellow light briefly then returned the green. Those of who saw the yellow slowed - and some were passed by those who did not see the brief light change. Coming from fifth John Bliss held down third most of the race until Randy Sweet surged even with him at the finish line. Although called a dead heat, Sweet was later given third and Bliss fourth. Bob Carnes was right behind for fifth. Following this race, the point standings show Marks still leading Bob Senneker, Bliss, Sweet, Carnes, Gene Eding, Rich Senneker, Gail Cobb, Jim Leonard and Dick Dunshee.

The 17 supermodifieds on hand had driver changes in every other car. Benson was quickest. The #17 driven by Bill McClure was next, the #14 qualified by Jim Eberstein was third and Eldon Schrader was fourth. In the dash, Benson bested the others, leading Schrader, Eberstein and McClure past the flag.

The fastest four stocks were Bob Senneker, Benson, Sweet and Carnes. Carnes was on the pole for the dash and kept it out front to beat Benson, Senneker and Sweet.

Jackie Lindhout, his own car disabled, drove Sonny McHenry's new ride # 24 to a win in the first heat. In the second heat, Art Bennett, Schrader and Benson dueled for several laps for second until the #B17 spun and the caution flag closed up the field. Benson made a grab for the lead on the restart and he was persistent in his attempts, but Eberstein was ahead at the flag. Benson was right behind as were Bennett and Schrader. In the superomodified pursuit Benson eliminated the entire field. Ken Crampton was the last to go and drove a good race. Eberstein was third.

The thriller of the evening in the semi-lates was the pursuit race. After seven laps Carnes was leading Bob Senneker the only other car left. For three laps Carnes held Senneker back but only inches back. Don VanderMolen was third in the money.

In the supermodified feature, Bob Fellows hit the tire inside turn four on lap 13. The next lap Jerry Peloquin spun and Sweet spun trying to avoid him. Sweet restarted (in Larry Gateman's usual ride #85). Ken Crampton and Duane Knoll in second had built up a sizable lead before the caution flag. On the restart Benson and Eberstein moved up, with Benson copping the lead. Crampton kept second, Eberstein took third with Knoll, Lindhout and Bennett following.

Ron Melton of Lansing made his Berlin debut in a blue supermodified #35. Ron Laban and Gene Eding switched machines with Eding getting to pilot the new hemi in the former #87 when they got the bugs worked out. Laban was running in the old #64 when a wheel problem sidelined him. Jerry Strotheide brought out a new #21 and Bill Thurkettle a new #31. Jim Dyke drove the blue #11. Just keeping track of who's on first was a feat!

To change our routine a bit we'll fill you in on a driver this week that is at the top: Tom and Karen Marks and their son make Kalamazoo home base. Tom owns his own car and he handles the engine as well as the driving. Rog Edwards built the car and handles the chassis and running gear problems. At 26, Tom has nine years of racing behind him! Most in drag racing (in fact, all the way to the national champion, hence the number USA#1) and the last two years in racing in late models. He was "Rookie of the Year" last year and points leader this year. Racing is his living, his hobby & his goal. He is eying the NASCAR circuit. He has found checkered flags very hard to capture but runs consistently with the leaders and has the edge on the trip to Florida offered the Berlin and Kalamazoo point leader. Always a competitor to watch we wish Tom success in his pursuit of that elusive checker!







April 19, 1969 – Berlin Raceway – The opening race of the 1969 season Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway was attended by the largest opening night crowd in memory. The pits were also well filled. We counted 36 semi-lates and eight hobby stocks. Looks like everyone's rarin' to go!

The semi-late dash set a new record at 1:30.84. Despite a strong challenge by brother Bob, Rich Senneker got the win. Bob settled for second, Denny Nyari and Johnny Benson followed.

From the pages of history flashed the winner of the hobby stock dash. A 1955 Hudson Hornet, battered but unbowed warming the hearts of us old-timers as Ray Lockwood, himself no newcomer, roared to victory. Second went to newcomer Dave Cutler. Dave is the son of well-known race car owner Doug Cutler. Dave went on to win the feature for hobby stocks, after setting fast time for the night. This feature was a preview of the action the hobby stocks will be providing as their ranks grow. One car hit the tires inside turn one, throwing them out onto the track. Race leader Lockwood hit one and was forced out of the race two laps later. Art Harvey in the new Superior Builders #56 was the next leader. Then he spun and lost valuable time. Cutler was right on Harvey's tail and had no trouble keeping ahead of the pack for the remaining laps. Harvey settled for second and newcomer

Bud Wright in the #6-pak was third.

The third semi-late heat was notable for the eagerness of the drivers to get racing. Bill VanPeenan (in Tom Marks' old car) hit the tires inside turn one and was eliminated. Former super mod chauffeur, Herb Kirts of Elkhart, Indiana, held off Danny Byrd of Detroit, newcomer Jerry Makara of Westland and Bob Fellows in the new U-Haul Special.

In the fourth semi-late heat, Ed Hage of Ypsilanti hit the third turn wall, finishing the car for the evening. Gary Fedewa and Ralph Baker staged a duel which ended when Baker came out of the final turn ahead and won the drag race for the checkered flag. The consi race was exciting: old timer Harvey Redder spun on the backstretch, then Howard Hud hit the front wall and the car was ready for extensive repairs. Another duel between Baker and Fedewa developed, but this one went to Fedewa, as did the checkered flag. Dave Mulder in a robin's egg blue #97 was third and Phil Shroad was fourth.

Rich Senneker broke the track record for one lap qualifying with a sizzling: 17.78 as he shaved 4/100<sup>th</sup> off the old record.

The first semi-late heat started out like a wreck 'em derby. Ray Lockwood and Lyle Earl got crossways in turn four leading the race. Bob Schippers went over Lockwood's hood, into the wall and skidded out into the middle of the track minus one wheel. On the restart, Dick Dunshee came flying up thru the pack and owned the race. Troy Butler, Andy Schutt and Lyle Earl followed Dunshee past the flag.

In the first hobby stock heat, Fred Britton started last and ended up first. In the second hobby heat Dave Cutler went from last to first in one lap. Terry Schmid, a newcomer to hobby stocks, worked thru the pack and gave Cutler a run for his money, almost catching him at the flag, Cary Peoples was third. (Do some of you fans remember Cary's dad, Dick Peoples?)

In the hobby pursuit race, Schmid and Cutler showed how closely matched the cars were, Cutler chased Schmid for several laps but was unable to gain the lead. Britton was third.

In the hobby feature, Schmid again was breathing down leader Cutler's back when a tire disintegrated with 1/4 of a lap to go. Schmid saved second, Peoples was third, then Art Harvey and Ben Wright.

Those hobby stockers are the wildest! Three abreast is common for them and four isn't uncommon. Last week it turned out successfully, but this week the guy on the high side tried to move the wall out a bit, it didn't move, so Rusty Corwin will have some repairs to make.

Johnny Benson really blistered the track, setting a new track record in the pursuit race for the semi-lates which chopped 5.5 seconds off the old record at 3:02.06. Benson was the winner by more than half a lap, Ed Howe, Bob and Rich Senneker followed, staging their own duel.

The semi-lates were rarin' to go in their fast feature. It was restarted twice as the eager pilots hurried after that green stuff. Benson started ninth, got the lead, and flew away from the competition. Bob Senneker was second, half a lap back. New pappy Bob Carnes was third and rapidly closing on Bob Senneker until a bad tire slowed him up. Howe, Bob Fellows and Jerry Spear were next across the finish line. Benson's blistering pace took him past every other car except the two behind him.

The ranks of the hobby stocks grew this week with the addition of Joe Niewiek and Glen Poel. New in the semi-lates were former supermodified ace Eddie VanderLaan, Bill Rake, Harry Sabo and Jim Daniels.

The problems began on the pace lap, as the drivers had been charging for the green flag too hard. In an attempt to force a slower start, the pace car pulled back onto the track: after the green did not come out, there was some concern up front about hitting the pace car, but the bulk of the field slowed down without incident.

At the rear, Jerry Peloquin, John Bliss and Bill Massuch spun to avoid the pack slowing in front of them. When they did get the green, the race was fast, but smooth. Rich Senneker was leading with brother Bob and Bob Carnes following bumper-to-bumper. After several laps of these three dueling for the lead they came upon slower cars on the 24th lap. Bob Fellows blew a transmission; Carnes went low and grabbed the lead while Rich and Bob went high

Carnes held his lead the last four laps for the win. Benson was second, Dick Dunshee was third and Ralph Baker fourth. Howe and Anderson followed. About eight cars finished although 20 started!

In the hobby stock division, three-time winner Dave Cutler found some strong competition. Ken Sutton brought out a new car and bested Cutler in their heat race and the pursuit. In his second night out, Terry Schmid ran away with the feature. Fred Britton, Cary Peoples, and Cutler followed.

Those hobby stockers really put on a show, they seem to think nothing of running into the turns four abreast it's something to see!

We had a large field of cars, about 37 semi-lates and 15 hobby stocks. New hobby stocks this week were Jim Soba of Midland, Leo Havens, and Kenny Sutton the fastest qualifier of the night. New for this year in the semi-late stocks are Moose Myers of Ft. Wayne, Indiana, Jim Leonard of Otsego, Ed Rood and Jim Fulton of Lansing, Gene Eding of Wyoming, Ron Chapman of Fruitport and Lavern Brunner, of Illinois.

After the races last week, we talked with newcomer Herb Kirtz of Elkhart, Indiana. In his 12 years of racing, Herb has run midgets, super-modifieds, and had a couple of rides last year in flying stocks. Herb owns the white #50 Chevelle with the patriotic red and blue, and seems to have made the transition from super-modifieds to semi-late stocks with ease. The smiling little fellow with the curly red hair may find himself closer and closer to the front of

the pack with a bit more experience as a super stock chauffer.

## Rich Senneker Does It At Berlin

The first heat for the semi-lates never made one lap before Ron Chapman hit the south wall. The first heat for the six's included Ron Bursma's car losing a wheel in turn two. Undaunted, he brought the car past the flag for fourth.

The semi-late feature took the highest toll in equipment in some time. The twenty cars got in four fast laps before Bob Senneker and Andy Schutt bumped, spinning Schutt in front of several cars. The cars of Herb Kirts, Schutt and Ron Laban suffered a good deal of damage. Ed Howe joined the rear of the pack on the restart with some badly crumpled sheet metal. The next few laps were smooth and fast with Johnny Benson flying up from 15th to a nice lead when he uncorked an engine and retired. Lots of old timers are coming back to race with us. We look forward to seeing McClure compete and of course fans will be watching Norm's comeback after his brush with death last year in an Indy championship car. We're glad he's back in the game. Good Luck, Norm! Might mention that Norm was honored in pre-race festivities when he was given Goodyear tires, racing boots from Neil Miera's Shoes and money from his sponsor WLAV and Berlin Management.

One face which will be missing from here on in will be that of our illustrious starter, Jimmy Myer. In addition to being a fine showman, Jim is a nice guy and will be missed by fans and crews. We wish Jim lots of luck, too!



## Bob Senneker Wins Berlin Opener

April 26, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – A full house was on hand Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway for the opening night of racing. The weatherman treated us real nice and there were 73 cars to compete in the twin bill for the late model stocks and the hobby stocks.

Bob Senneker roared across the finish line first in the late model stock main event. Despite the many caution flags (or because of them) it was a very exciting race which saw Jerry Spear and Rick Knotts spin in front of the pack and thanks to the fine field of experienced drivers there were no injuries and damage was slight to equipment.

Bob came from the middle of the lineup of the 20 fastest qualifiers, and forged past pace-setter Ed Howe of Beaverton on the 23<sup>rd</sup> lap and went on to win the first feature race for late model stocks of the 1970 season on the .438 mile asphalt oval.

Gene Eding of Grand Rapids chased Howe's '68 Olds across the finish line for third followed by fellow townsman Ron Laban, Dick Dunshee, Rick Knotts, Jerry Spear, Andy Schutt, Scott Presley and Jim Roberts.

Terry Senneker Sr. held the honors for the fastest out of 73 qualifiers to start the events, but finished third in the dash behind winning Ed Howe and brother Bob who was second. Rick Knotts chased the trio across the finish.

Buddy Stewart, Bob Fellows and Jerry Spear took late model heat race wins and Gene Eding notched the win in the pursuit. Spear also claimed the win in the semi-feature event.

Terry Schmid of Grand Rapids won the 20-lap main event for hobby stock cars after regaining the lead from Muskegon's Paul Weisner just three laps from the finish.

Paul Weisner took the fast-car dash with Dave Cutler eliminating the field in the pursuit. Heat race winners were Don Ross, Graydon Bodell and Terry Schmid. John Jutila won the semi feature for the hobby stocks.

Jerry Makara of Detroit was wrecked when he became involved in a four car melee that knocked out the cars of Bob Morgan of Lansing, Scott Presley of Grand Haven and Bob Sensiba of Middleville.

## Gene Eding Picks Off Berlin Win

May 2, 1970 - Berlin Raceway - A fine field of cars was on hand at Berlin Raceway Saturday night and an awful lot of brave fans withstood the cold weather in the low thirties.

Gene Eding, driving a 1964 Chevelle, turned in a very fine driving performance, taking over the lead about one-third of the way thru the late model main event and came over the finish line first. Eding had built up quite a lead until the cars of Bob Fellows and Rick Knotts tangled together in turn four which brought out the yellow flag.

On the drop of the green flag, Bob Senneker and Ed Howe were right on Eding's bumper, but failed to get around Eding's flying blue #64. Senneker took second and Howe a very close third. Rick Knotts took fourth despite the spin in the fourth turn and Jim Aldrich came home fifth. Filling out the top ten were Terry Senneker Sr. (minus a right front fender), Ron Laban, Tom Marks, Eddie Vander-Laan and Buddy Stewart. Donnie Roberts blew an engine while running second with his pretty red #6.

During practice Jerry Spear blew an engine and Dick Dunshee blew a right rear tire and hit the wall, sidelining their cars for the night. Eddie VanderLaan spun in time trials and hit the wall but they managed to fix the car and run the remaining events.

Ed Howe had fast time for the late model stocks at 17.72 but Bob Fellows took the honors in the fast-car dash over Bob Senneker and Rick Knotts.

Bob Fellows is really getting that Ford around the track in fine shape. Very smooth and level headed. The cause of the tangle with Rick Knotts was Bob's steering box was binding up and he retired to the pits shortly after in the main event. Seems like somebody would like to sponsor either that pretty#51 of Fellows or Knotts' sharp #21 Chevelle.

Tom Marks won the fast late model heat with his brand new car not even painted yet, over Gene Eding and Terry Senneker Sr.

Bob Sensiba won the second late model stock heat over Donnie Roberts and Gary Fedewa. Clarence Cook hit the wall on the front shoot and sustained front end damage.

The pursuit honors also went to Eding of Grand Rapids with Bob Fellows and Rick Knotts chasing him across the finish line.

The hobby stocks put on a wild and wooly show with Paul Weisner of Muskegon taking the honors in the main event. Jim Westfield. Kirk Norman, Art Harvey and Tom Finkbeiner chased Weisner across the finish line. On the first lap of the main, Dick Nichols of Muskegon hit the wall coming out of turn four and did several side snap rolls down the front shoot. He got out of the car all by himself a little shook but not injured. Terry Schmid dropped out of the main while running third. Paul Weisner passed pacesetter Jim Westfield halfway thru and held on for the win.

Terry Schmid had fast time with an 18.87 in the hobby stocks but Paul Weisner took the fast-car dash with Schmidt and Fred Britton finishing in a dead heat for second.

Scott Francisco beat out Butch Potter and John Jutila to win the first hobby heat. (I believe this was Francisco's first race.)

The second hobby stock heat was hectic, Dave Cutler came thru for the win over Weisner and Westfield. On the first lap, Bill Minch spun with Graydon Bodell hitting him. On the complete restart, Minch spun again, taking out cars of Britton, Duane Cottrell and Schmidt, who slid into John Holloran.

John Jutila won the third hobby heat over Mike Smith and Bob Blouw.

Schmidt won the pursuit with Tom Finkbeiner and Paul Weisner chasing him across the line.

## Bob Senneker Wins Berlin Feature

May 9, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – The weather was beautiful and despite the tornado watch at Berlin Raceway, it was a fantastic show Saturday night. Another full house was on hand to watch the twin bill of late model stocks and hobby stocks.

Bob Senneker driving a 1969 Chevelle roared past Bob Fellows on the twentieth lap to win his second feature win of the season. On the eighth lap of the feature Tom Marks, holding down a strong third, spun in the first turn and the cars of Ron Laban and Terry Senneker Sr. hit him. Randy Sweet also spun to avoid them. Tom Marks' brand new, freshly painted USA#1 was eliminated with considerable damage as also was the car of Ron Laban. At this point the race was red flagged for clearing of the track, which took away Bob Fellow's tremendous lead. On the restart the field was pretty well bunched up again. On the tenth lap, Duane Knoll, making his first appearance at the track this year, spun in turn two down to the inside of the track. Thereafter, the race ran as smooth as glass, with the exception of Dick Dunshee, who spun off the track in turn three doing some damage to the right side of his car, but continuing in the race. At the finish line, right on Bob's bumper was Bob Fellows and Ed Howe. Donnie Roberts and Rick Knotts rounded out the top five. Sixth place went to Eddie VanderLaan with Gene Eding, Terry Senneker Sr., Jerry Spear, and Andy Schutt filling out the top ten finishers.

Ed Howe posted fast time of the evening with a 17.63, but lost out to Dick Dunshee in the late model dash. Bob Senneker finished second over Howe and Gene Eding.

Bob Fellows took the checkered flag first in the fast late model heat over Rick Knotts and Eddie Vander-Laan.

The winner of the second late model heat was Buddy Stewart, beating out Gail Cobb and Jerry Spear.

Gail Cobb, making his first appearance of the year, took the third late model heat over Harvey Redder and Al Leversee. The cars of Jack Trumbla and Buddy Stewart got chummy coming out of the fourth turn eliminating both cars for the reminder of the evening.

The pursuit was a very good race. The competition was so close that there were still six cars running at the finish out of ten starters with Bob Senneker doing the eliminations. Donnie Roberts took the win over Tommy Marks and Ron Laban.

Terry Schmid took the honors in the hobby stock feature to nail down his second win of the year. Kenny Sutton, making his first appearance of the 1970 season, finished fifth, after being involved in the first lap mix-up.

Paul Weisner took fast time for the evening in the hobby stock division with a 19.06, and also won the hobby dash over Jack Drolema, Terry Schmid, and Jim Westfield.

Tom Pennington, non-qualifier, took the first and the fourth hobby heats. He arrived too late at the track to qualify. Following Tom across the line in the first heat was Sid Hill and Hassen Seid. In the fourth heat, Herb Mann and Dan Ross got second and third.

Duane Cottrell, making his first appearance of the year, took the second hobby heat over Scott Francisco and Terry Schmid.

Butch Potter took the third heat by beating the cars of Jack Gritter and Bob Billings.

Terry Schmid won the pursuit race for the hobby stocks over Paul Weisner and Dave Cutler.

Glad to see all the new cars and veteran drivers appear at the track. Randy Sweet made his debut with his pretty #77, yellow this year. Harvey Redder in his red #1 made his first show of the 1970 season.

## Bob Senneker Nails Third Berlin Feature

May 16, 1970 – Berlin Raceway

- Hard-charging Bob Senneker drove his pretty blue '69 Chevelle to his third late model stock feature win of the season Saturday night at Berlin Raceway. Paul Weisner won his second hobby stock feature of the season in the rough and tumble hobby stock main.

Dick Dunshee set the fast time of the evening for late models with a 17.72 clocking and Dave Cutler was the fastest hobby stock, with a time of 18.97.

The late model stock dash was won by Gene Eding over Dunshee, Terry Senneker Sr. and Eddie VanderLaan. Weisner won the hobby stock dash over Dick Nichols, Cutler and Terry Schmid.

The first two hobby heats were won by Sid Hill and Jim Leonard. Bob Billings drove an impressive race to win the third hobby heat in only his second week of racing. The late model heat winners were Jerry Spear and Gail Cobb.

The pursuit for the hobby stocks was won by Weisner with second taken by Cutler, followed by Leonard and Ken Sutton. Johnny Benson was the winner of the late model pursuit over Tom Marks, Ed Howe, Terry Senneker, and VanderLaan.

The hobby stock consolation was won by Butch Potter in a good race over Tom Pennington and Mike Smith.

Dave Cutler won the hobby stock beauty contest in his pretty blue J & D Motors sponsored '66 Chevelle.

The hobby stock feature was a honey. The first caution of the event was put out to check on Gordon Bodell, who went off the backstretch on the first lap. May 23, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – John Anderson, the 1968 MARC Times Rookie of the Year, did a beautiful job of driving his blue '68 Chevelle to victory in the 30-lap late model feature Saturday night at Berlin Raceway. Cary Peoples, in his first appearance at the .438 mile track this season, turned in an equally sensational driving performance to win the hobby stock main event.

Ed Howe was the fastest qualifier in the super stock division at 17.75 and Paul Weisner set fast time for the hobby stocks at 19.04.

The excitement started early in the evening when Rick Knotts and Gail Cobb tangled during warm-ups, bending sheet metal, but both were able to race. 1969 track champ Rich Senneker was out for the night when the engine blew on his new Ford ride.

Terry Senneker Sr. was home first in the late model dash with Bob Senneker and Gene Eding hot on his heels for second and third. Ed Howe was a distant fourth. Cary Peoples led all the way to win the hobby stock dash over Terry Schmid, Weisner and Dave Cutler.

Bob DeVries, Jack Drolema and Jerry VanDyke were the hobby stock heat winners, and John Anderson and Clarence "Cookie" Cook won the late model heats.

The rerun hobby stock pursuit was won by Weisner, chased over the finish by Cutler. This week's hobby stock pursuit was won by Drolema with Cutler second again as Art Harvey came in third.

The late model stock pursuit got

a bit sticky when Knotts' hood flew up and he hit the large tire in the infield, eliminating himself and Ron Laban from the race when the rest of the pack passed them. Jerry Makara, the 1969 Rookie of the Year, took the win over Tom Pennington, Don Ross and Tom Finkbeiner.

May 30, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Eddie VanderLaan of Grand Rapids, taking advantage of a two-car crash that sent race leaders Terry Senneker Sr. and Randy Sweet of Grand Rapids into the concrete retaining wall in the first turn on the 19<sup>th</sup> lap, drove his 1968 Chevelle to victory in the accident-marred 30-lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Following VanderLaan across the finish line were Ron Laban, Gene Eding, Johnny Benson, Denny Nyari, Tom Marks, Jack Trumbla and Andy Schutt.

Art Harvey of Grand Rapids successfully evaded a mass pile-up of 13 cars and went on to win the 20-lap main event for hobby stock cars. Terry Schmid of Grand Rapids was second by two feet and Dick Nichols

was third by less than a car length as they roared over the finish line in a tight bunch. Bob Clover was fourth.

Heat race winners were Hassen Sied of Kalamazoo, Schmid, John Halloran of Otsego, Terry Senneker, Johnny Benson, and Jack Drolema of Grand Rapids.

Paul Weisner took the hobby stock dash win over Jim Leonard, Dave Cutler and Bob Billings.

Bob Senneker pulled his fourth late model feature win out of the hat by starting way back in the field and forging by pacesetter Bob Fellows on the last lap. The race was red flagged on the seventh lap when Bill Thurkettle spun in the third turn while running in the rear of the pack, then Randy Sweet hit him and Scott Presley went into the wall. Randy escaped serious injury but the car sustained considerable damage. The race was restarted and the cars of Ron Laban and Gene Eding tangled in turn one sending both cars into the wall. Several drivers spun to avoid them, thus eliminating the cars of Rick Knotts, Terry Senneker Sr., Eding and Laban. June 20, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – Saturday evening at Berlin Raceway saw Ed Howe of Beaverton in his '69 Chevelle, win the Spring Championship for the late models by a car length over Bob Senneker of Grand Rapids.

Howe started in pole position by virtue of the point standings and led all the way in the 40-lap event. Bob Senneker tried every way possible to pass Howe but failed to do so and settled for second. Gene Eding and Ron Laban spun off the track on the third lap. Also involved in the melee were Johnny Benson and Harvey Redder, who were able to restart. Top contenders Bob Fellows and Bill VanPeenan dropped out early in the race. Filling out the top ten finishers were Jerry Spear, Rick Knotts, Terry Senneker Sr., Bob Sensiba, Don Roberts, Johnny Benson, Jack Trumbla and Al Leversee.

The late model dash was won by Gene Eding over Bob Senneker, Howe, and Rick Knotts.

Dick Wesler was victorious in the first late model heat, beating out Terry Senneker and Gail Cobb. Bill VanPeenan beat out Eddie Vander-Laan and Eding to take the second late model heat.

## Howe Breaks Track Record And Wins Feature

June 27, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – Well, another beautiful night of racing at Berlin Raceway Saturday evening in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Track records were broken and the races were wild and wooly.

Mr. Ed Howe did it again, winning the main event in the late model division and smashing the track record.

Howe won the 30 lap main event over Jerry Spear and Bob Senneker. Jack Trumbla jumped into the lead from the start with Terry Senneker Sr. taking over on the fifth lap. Terry hung on until Eddie VanderLaan took the lead on the 12th lap. Bob Senneker then took the lead on the 22nd lap with Howe in hot pursuit. A couple of laps later, Howe passed Senneker and was never headed. Filling out the top ten were Howe, Jerry

Spear, Bob Senneker, Rick Knotts, Bob Fellows, Johnny Benson, Eddie VanderLaan, Terry Senneker, Bill VanPeenan and Tom Marks.

Ed Howe toured the oval on his first lap of qualifications with a 17.42 second lap. This broke the old record of 17.56 seconds held by Bob Senneker. On his second trip around, he came back with a 17.37, a smashing new record.

The late model dash was also taken by Howe over Bob Senneker, Rick Knotts, and Gail Cobb, making his first appearance in the dash this year. During the race, Howe stopped the clocks in traffic running at 17.48 seconds.

Johnny Benson beat out Bob Fellows and Tom Marks to capture the first heat event in the late models.

Dick Wessler won the second heat event for the late models over Donnie Roberts and Eddie Vander-Laan. Harvey Redder spun off the track with no damage.

The 12-lap consolation race was won by Wayne Moseler over Joe Pease and Denny Hilliard.

## ARCA 200 To Ramo Stott

July 3, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – Current leader in the season's point standings, Ramo Stott of Keokuk, Iowa drove a 1970 Plymouth to victory in the 200 lap ARCA (Automobile Racing Club of America) national championship stock car race Friday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Iggy Katona of Willis, Michigan was second in his 1970 Dodge followed by early leader Andy Hampton of Louisville, Kentucky in a '70 Dodge, Paul Wensink, John Sellers, Larry Ashley, John Early, Norman Martin, Tony Trinkle, and Bob Thomas.

The yellow caution light was brought out on four occasions by cars spinning out of control with Wayne Trinkle of Jefferson, Indiana and John West of Louisville, Kentucky escaping serious injury after being wrecked on the very first lap of the 200-lap speed chase.

Ramo had the lead from lap one through eight with Hampton setting the pace until lap 86 when Ramo again took over. A lengthy pit stop for fuel on the 130th lap cost Hampton any chance of winning and relegated him to third.

## Fourth Berlin Feature To Ed Howe

July 4, 1970 – Berlin Raceway – It was a cold and hectic night at Berlin Raceway Saturday night with 79 cars qualifying for the holiday show.

Eddie VanderLaan took the fast-car dash win in the late models followed by Bob Senneker, Bob Fellows and Terry Senneker Sr. The hobby stock dash was halted when Dave Cutler spun in the fourth turn. The next lap, the other three leaders spun between turns three and four bringing Cutler back in the lead and taking the win over Terry Schmid, the only other finisher as Bob Clover and Paul Weisner retired from the race.

The first hobby stock heat was halted twice for spins and tangles involving first six cars, then three. Leo Havens took the win over Frank Swarten and Jerry Longnecker. The second hobby heat needed no yellows but there were spins again between turns three and four. Bob Clover kept out of trouble to win over Jim Leonard who was right on his bumper. Cary Peoples and Art Harvey followed.

The first late model heat was a fast one with no yellow flags. Jerry

Eddie Vander Laan spun in turn three while running a strong third and had to go to the rear of the field on the 56th lap. He managed to finish seventh. Ed Damer lost it on the front chute and did a reverse spin in turn one. Very fine driving by all the drivers who missed him.

John Mangus hit the front chute wall on the 14<sup>th</sup> lap. Howe took over leader Johnny Benson on the 18<sup>th</sup> lap. On the 25<sup>th</sup> lap Jerry Spear spun in turn two.

Rounding out the top ten feature finishers behind Howe were Benson, Eddie VanderLaan, Terry Senneker Sr., Gene Eding, Tom Marks, Bob Fellows, Spear, Bob Sensiba and Jack Trumbla.

Howe posted fast time with a 17.51 circuit on the .438 mile asphalt and Bob Senneker was right behind him at 17.54. Bob was sidelined for the night with heating problems.

Flywheel the clown waved the

# Fair Captures Berlin Opener

April 17, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Joy Fair drove a '69 Chevelle to victory in the accident-marred 30-lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Rich Senneker the '69 point champion was second followed by Bob Fellows, Jerry Spear, Jim Aldrich and Eddie VanderLaan. The race was halted on the 26th lap when race leader and winner apparent, Bob Senneker, became involved with the spinning car of Donnie Roberts and was rammed by Bob Voelker. Senneker was knocked out of the race and Voelker was hospitalized. Tom Colella running a close second to Senneker cut a tire in the melee and finished seventh.

Terry Schmid outdrove Jack Drolema and Larry Johnson to win the 20-lap main event for six hobby stock cars.

Heat race winners were Schmid, Herb Mann, Colella and Fellows.

Pursuit honors went to Fellows, Bob Senneker, Jack Drolema, and his father, Harry Drolema. Fast car dash honors went to Jerry VanDyke and Fair.

Bob Senneker was the fastest of 55 qualifiers with a 17.95 second dash around the .438 mile Marne oval. Schmid was fast qualifier in the hobby division with a time of 18.93.

#### Bob Senneker Berlin Winner

April 24, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Bob Senneker of Grand Rapids kept his sensational winning streak going by roaring to victory in the keenly contested 30 -lap feature race for late models Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Senneker made it by driving his 1969 Chevelle past race leader

Eddie VanderLaan and was never headed.

The race was stopped when Bob Fellows' engine blew on the front stretch early in the race and he spun into the first turn wall, taking Bill Massuch with him. With the cars behind trying to avoid the crash, several other top drivers were eliminated from the main event including Rick Knotts, Don Biederman and Rich Senneker.

The caution flag waved twice more in the hectic race, first when Mike Eddy spun off the backstretch and again when Ron Laban hit the third turn wall.

Earl Ross, of London, Ontario, Canada, escaped injury as his car sheared the right front wheel and caught fire on the last lap of the hectic main event.

Last week's feature winner Joy Fair chased Senneker across the finish line for second place followed by fast qualifier Ed Howe, Johnny Benson, Jerry Spear, Eddie Vander-Laan, Don Roberts, Kirk Norman, Earl Ross and Butch Miller.

The hobby stocks put on their share of the action as Tom Drolema spun sideways down the front stretch at the drop of the green in the 20-lap main event. A great amount of driving skill prevented any damage to the hard chargers. The only caution flag came when Phil Stempfler spun off the backstretch.

Terry Schmid chauffeured his #69 Mustang to his second consecutive victory chased by Paul Weisner, Harry Drolema, Larry Johnson, Bob Billings, Jim Westfield, Dick Sarber, Jack Drolema, John Jutila and Tom Vanderlind.

The late model fast-car dash was a thriller with Bob Senneker just acing out Fair by inches at the finish with Ed Howe under the same blanket. Spear was fourth. In the hobby stock dash Schmid took the win over Weisner, Billings and fast qualifier Jim Westfield.

Eddie VanderLaan copped the first heat over Donnie Roberts and

Bob Fellows. Eldon Byler topped Earl Ross and Johnny Benson in the second heat.

The pursuit went the full tenlaps as VanderLaan snared the win chased by Roberts and Howe.

The multitude of hobby stocks racers on hand made up four exciting heat races. In the first heat Bob Bliss bested Jack Gritter and Jerry Longnecker; Larry Johnson outdrove Weisner and Jack Drolema for the second heat victory and Harry Drolema bested Dick Sarber and Jutila in the third heat. Gritter took the fourth heat triumph chased by Joe Pease and Longnecker.

Jerry VanDyke used the entire ten laps to win the pursuit over Billings, Schmid and Westfield.

Track champ Ed Howe was the fastest of 65 qualifiers with a 17.95 second dash around the .438 mile Marne oval.

#### Donnie Roberts New Winner

May 8, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – There was another new winner in the late model feature Saturday night at Berlin Raceway as Donnie Roberts drove his '68 Chevelle to victory. Terry Schmid kept his win streak going in the hobby stock division as he won his fourth consecutive main event.

The late model dash was a fast one as Jerry Spear took the win over Ed Howe, Bob Fellows and fast qualifier Rich Senneker. The hobby stock dash was equally fast as Bob Clover set a new track record for winning the event in 1:33.50, chased over the finish line by Bob Billings, Paul Weisner and Harry Drolema.

Jim Buck charged from the rear of the pack to win the first hobby stock heat by a fender over Glen Bradley and Joe Pease. Schmid jumped into an early lead in the second heat to win handily over Bob Sensiba and Cary Peoples. Bob Fellows led the way to the checker in the third hobby stock heat which was under the caution twice, first when Dick Sarber and Jack Gritter tangled on the front stretch sending them both airborne into the guardrail, and again when Mike Sherrington crashed into the front stretch wall. Don Ward took second in this hectic event ahead of Sarber.

The fourth hobby stock heat was also under the yellow when Dan Ross spun into the fourth turn wall, ripping up the rear of his car. 11 cars started the event but only five finished as Dave Cutler took the win over Bob Blouw and Jerry VanDyke.

The first late model heat was a good fast race and Jim Aldrich took the win over Donnie Roberts and Ed VanderLaan.

The caution was out twice in the second late model heat, first for a one car tangle on the backstretch and again when the Fedewa brothers, Gary and Butch, spun in turn three. Mike Eddy took the win over Eldon Byler and Bill Massuch.

Bob Clover came from the rear of the pack to win the hobby stock pursuit, eliminating the entire field, while five cars finished the late model pursuit as Johnny Benson won over Rick Knotts, Ed Howe, Bob Fellows and Rich Senneker.

The hobby stock semi was under the caution three times, first when Sarber spun in front of the pack, again when Jim Buck got into Fellows, sending him sideways into Mike McKenna. McKenna's car climbed onto the first turn wall, but all drivers escaped injury. The final caution came when Buck tangled with Glen Bradley on the front stretch. Don Ward took the win followed by Larry DePas, John Jutila and Larry Conley.

The hobby stock feature wasn't without its thrills as Terry Schmid and Jack Drolema tangled going into the first turn, scattering the pack with Bob Bliss and Weisner hitting the wall. Blouw and Harry Drolema tangled in turn four, bringing the second yellow. Schmid came from the rear to win over

The late model feature had its first caution flag on lap 17 when Howe and Knotts touched briefly and Knotts spun on the backstretch. #### Howe Scores First Win Of Year

May 15, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Defending track champion Ed Howe of Beaverton scored his first main event victory of the season by driving his 1969 Chevelle to victory in the hectic 30-lap feature for late models Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway, earning \$705 for the win.

Five caution flags marred the fast-paced event. The first yellow was thrown when Harvey Sytsma spun on turn two early in the race, a few laps later the yellow came out again when Bill Ivens spun in one. Eddie Vander-Laan and Ron Laban were running side by side, leading the pack when they touched, Vander-Laan spinning low and Laban going high and into the first turn wall.

The fourth caution flew when Mike Eddy spun in the first turn as several others spun to miss him. The final caution period in the hectic event came when Eddy and Kirk Norman were battling neck and neck for eight spot with the leader Howe about to lap them. Howe ducked under the duo in the third turn, Norman and Eddy spun high and into the retaining wall. No injuries resulted from any of the accidents.

Johnny Benson picked up second place followed by Donnie Roberts, VanderLaan, Rick Knotts, Rich Senneker, Bob Fellows, Jim Aldrich, Norman and Ivens. # Benson Breaks Berlin Drought

May 22, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Johnny Benson brought two years of frustration to an end by driving his 1969 Chevelle across the finish line first in the 30-lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Benson's first trip to the winner's circle in two seasons was worth \$650. Donnie Roberts was second by four lengths, followed by defending track champion Ed Howe, Bob Fellows, Eddie VanderLaan and Eldon Byler.

Cary Peoples forged past race leader and fellow townsman Larry Johnson on the 19<sup>th</sup> lap and went on to win the 20-lap main event for hobby stock cars. Bob Bliss was third, followed by Terry Schmid and Paul Weisner.

Benson captured \$880 in prize money by forging past race leader Kirk Norman of Kalamazoo on the 11th lap and staved off Donnie Roberts and Ed Howe for his second main event victory of the season. Eddie VanderLaan was fourth followed by Bob Fellows, Norman, Eldon Byler, John Anderson, and Harvey Redder. Bill Ivans required hospital attention after being involved in a four car melee on the 21st lap involving the cars of Terry Senneker Sr., Eldon Byler, and Anderson.

Bob Clover outdrove Bob Sensiba, Paul Weisner, and Cary Peoples to win the 30-lap main event for hobby stock cars.

The first lap crash casualties were Rick Knotts, Larry Witt and Bob Morgan being knocked out of the race; John Mangus, Johnny Benson, and Eddie VanderLaan were able to continue.

Eddy gained his first main event victory of the season after inheriting the lead on the 21st lap on a restart and staved off Rich Senneker, Bob Fellows, VanderLaan, Jerry Spear, Kirk Norman and Ron Laban for the win. The race was halted on the 21st lap after pacesetter Bill Massuch and point leader Benson, running side by side tangled, with both cars veering head on into the concrete retaining wall. Both drivers escaped injury.

## Howe Takes Berlin Holiday Show

July 5, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Ed Howe and Bob Sensiba were the big winners Monday night at Berlin Raceway in their special Independence Day racing program which included stunt man Jim Wagner's "Leap of Death" act and a T-bone dynamite crash.

Herb Kirts led the first five laps of the late model feature before Howe took command. The caution flag was out when Mike Eddy spun on lap ten and again on lap 13 when Jim Dyke spun in turn four. Bob Senneker, driving with a broken wrist, was the fastest qualifier with a 17.87 second dash around the .438 mile oval and finished on Howe's bumper for second place in the feature. Johnny Benson was right behind Bob for third with Joy Fair fourth, as they finished the 40-lapper looking like a fast-car dash. Eddie VanderLaan was fifth followed by Bob Fellows, Rich Senneker, Rick Knotts, Herb Kirts and Terry Senneker Sr.

It was Howe's second consecutive win in his '70 Chevelle, and he became the first driver to ring up three feature wins in 1971.

The first caution of the race came when Joe Pease spun in the second turn. The second was when Mike Johnson went into the wall coming out of turn four, rupturing his gas tank. This was Benson's sixth win at Berlin this season in his white Chevelle #21.

The hobby stock feature was stopped on the second lap as Jack Gritter, running third, spun into the front stretch wall, triggering a ninecar pileup which saw Tom Drolema go airborne over Paul Weisner's car eliminating cars of Gritter, Weisner, Drolema, Art Harvey, Terry Schmid, John Bliss and John Jutila.

August 14, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Race veteran Johnny Benson of Grand Rapids behind the wheel of a 1969 Chevelle forged past race leader defending track champion Ed Howe of Beaverton, on the 51st lap and went on to win the second 75-lap segment in the 21st annual Michigan State Invitational race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Bob Senneker was second followed by Howe, Joe Ruttman, Bobby Allison, Jim and Donny Roberts.

Ed Howe set the early pace in the first 75-lap segment with Benson coming from sixth starting position in the 24-car line-up into the lead on the 52<sup>nd</sup> lap of the .438 mile Marne oval and was never headed. Howe was second followed by Joe Ruttman, Bob Senneker, NASCAR ace Bobby Allison, Rich Senneker, Ricky Knotts and Duane Knoll. NASCAR driver Friday Hassler from Chattanooga, Tennessee finished 12<sup>th</sup>.

Benson's win was worth \$3,309, Howe \$2,448 and Bob Senneker, \$1,500 in the \$15,000 posted prize money. Bob Bliss scored his first major win of the season by out-driving Bob Sensiba, Tom Drolema, Paul Weisner and Bob Blouw. #### Benson Takes Seventh In A Row

August 21, 1971 – Berlin Raceway – Grand Rapids racing star Johnny Benson kept his sensational winning streak intact by driving a 1970 Chevelle to victory in the 30-lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Benson rang up his seventh consecutive main event victory of the season by coming from deep in the line-up and forging past race leader Jimmy Roberts of Coleman on the 16th lap and went on to score his tenth win of the season. Defending track champion Ed Howe of Beaverton, was second followed by Roberts, Bill Massuch of Lansing and Donnie Roberts of Saginaw.

Gene Eding of Grand Rapids flashed across the finish line less than a half a car length ahead of Bob Clover of Muskegon to win the hectic 25 lap main event for hobby stocks cars. It was Eding's fourth win of the

Heat race winners were Ricky Knotts and Kirk Norman of Kalamazoo, Larry DePas and Bob Fellows, of Grand Rapids, Cary Peoples, of Muskegon, Bob Sensiba, of Middleville, and Jerry Spear of Battle Creek. # Howe Takes Berlin Opener

April 15, 1972 – Berlin Raceway – Ed Howe and Gene Eding were the big winners in Saturday night's opener at Berlin Raceway, with Howe taking the 25 lap late model feature, and Eding victorious in the hobby stock fast-heat, pursuit and 20-lap feature.

The hobby feature had to be restarted when Tom Drolema went off the backstretch on the first lap. After several spins and tangles, Eding took the win over Paul Weisner, Bob Bliss, Bob Minch, Mike Johnson, Jack Gritter, Phil Stampfler, Art Harvey, Gary Barnes and Dick Sarber.

Eighteen cars started the late model feature, but only nine finished. On the sixth lap Kirk Norman spun out in turn three and Harvey Redder hit him, flying off the backstretch. Jim Roberts spun out on the ninth lap but kept going. On the 21st lap Jim Aldrich and Eddie VanderLaan tangled going into the first turn wall, with Rick Knotts and Bob Senneker spinning low and hitting each other. All four of the cars were eliminated, giving the lead and the win to Howe. Rich Senneker was a close second chased by Bill Massuch and Mike Eddy. Jimmy Roberts was fifth followed by Butch Fedewa, Kirk Norman, Bob Schippers, Herb Mann and VanderLaan.

The late model dash was a quickie as Rick Knotts took the win over Rich Senneker, Johnny Benson and Bob Senneker in one minute, 32:15 seconds. Bob Bliss won the hobby stock dash over Sarber, Eding and Dave Cutler.

In the first hobby stock heat Ike VerHoeven crossed the line ahead of Jim Terrill and Phil Poortinga. After two restarts Gene Eding took the second hobby stock heat ahead of Weisner, Mike Johnson and Sarber.

VanderLaan won the third late model heat over Knotts, Bob Senneker and Redder. The fourth heat for hobby stocks was action packed. Ron Bursma stuffed his car into the first turn wall on the green and was taken to the hospital for a checkup. Several cars were eliminated before Bob Fellows took the win over Stampfler, Gary Barnes and Jerry Longnecker.

The fifth heat late model victory went to Jimmy Roberts as he topped Fedewa, Ron Laban and Terry Senneker Sr. Eding eliminated the field in the hobby stock pursuit with Gritter, Johnson and Bob Bliss taking second thru fourth honors. The late model pursuit had the crowd on its feet as VanderLaan and Bob Senneker eliminated the field and continued their duel for four speedy laps before Bob took the win in a slingshot move at the checker. Bill Massuch and Rich Senneker were runners-up.

The hobby stock consolation win went to Denny Holtzlander ahead of Frank Sawitzsky, Longnecker, Phil Gress, and Terrill.

#### Bob Senneker Tops Berlin Feature

May 20, 1972 – Berlin Raceway – Bob Senneker of Dorr behind the wheel of a '72 Chevelle turned in a sparkling driving performance to win the 30 lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at the Berlin Raceway.

Senneker coming from his 16th starting position in the 20-car lineup, forged past race leader Bill Massuch of Lansing on the 18th lap after Massuch had led all of the initial laps.

Senneker, once in the lead was never seriously challenged and finished almost half a lap in front of the pack.

But it was not an easy win, however, as Bob had to avoid the tangle caused when Jim Aldrich spun on lap six and was hit by Jerry Spear for the first caution of the race. The second yellow flag was an advantage to the charging Senneker however when Scott Presley hit the fourth turn wall. Senneker was able to put slower traffic between himself and the faster cars after the restart.

Jim Roberts and Eddie Vander-Laan crossed the finish at the same time for a dead heat for second place followed by Rich Senneker, Ed Howe, Bob Carnes, Massuch, Johnny Benson, Danny Byrd and Ron Laban.

cars, but after two restarts and four caution flags for various spins and tangles, only 12 finished, with Jim Greenwood taking the win over Don Ward, Duane Cottrell, Mike Bird and Stempfler.

June 3, 1972 – Berlin Raceway – The late model feature saw Johnny Benson take the checkered flag over Eddie VanderLaan, early leader Ed Howe, Bill Massuch, Rich Senneker, Donnie Roberts, Bob Senneker, Jerry Spear, Ron Laban and Rick Knotts Saturday night at Berlin Raceway.

In the hobby stock feature fast qualifier Dave Cutler came in for his first feature win of the year in a hard-fought battle over hard-driving Paul Weisner and Terry Schmid. They were followed by early leader Gene Eding, Cary Peoples, Bob Sensiba, Bob Bliss, Tom Drolema, Mike Johnson and Don Ward. Bob Billings finished with a bang as he crossed the finish line and crashed into the front stretch tires. He was shook up but okay.

Johnny Benson won the late model dash over fast qualifier Bob Senneker, VanderLaan and Spear. Paul Weisner took the hobby stock dash over Cutler, Schmid and Johnson.

The race, run in two 50-lap sections saw Johnny Benson of Grand Rapids lead for the first 50-laps, Byrd for the next eight, Benson again until the 88th lap when Byrd forged into the lead and the win. Benson was second, followed by Bob Senneker, Ed Howe, Eddie VanderLaan, Tommy Maier, Bill Massuch, Jim Dyke, Denny Miles and Gary Fedewa.

Southern racing star LeeRoy Yarbrough was the 30th fastest qualifier and did not run the main event that was limited to the 20 fastest qualifiers. He did finish second in a heat race behind John Mangus however.

Bob Fellows won the first heat over Denny Harris and Phil Spencer while Mangus topped Fellows, Terry Senneker Sr., Harris and Clarence Cook in the semi-feature event.

Terry Schmid of Sparta outdrove Gene Eding, Paul Weisner, Dave Cutler and Jack Gritter to win the hobby stock main event. Heat race winners in the pony car hobby stock division were John Jutila, Weisner and Ivan Richardson while Cutler won the fast- car dash and Schmid took the pursuit.

June 24, 1972 – Berlin Raceway – Paul Weisner of Muskegon had his 1969 Camaro in top working condition as he won the 75-lap Spring Championship race for hobby stocks Saturday night at Berlin Raceway and Johnny Benson drove his 1971 Chevelle to another feature victory in the hobby stock 30-lap feature.

Harry Drolema the fastest qualifier in the hobby stocks took the early lead in the hobby stock feature from his pole position start, but Weisner took over on lap 13 and was never headed.

The first caution of the race came on lap four when Dick Nichols spun off the backstretch, the second yellow came on lap 35 after Don Ward and John Jutila tangled in the second turn. Dave Cutler had worked his way up from 20th starting position and was passing Cary Peoples for third position when Cutler spun and dropped to the tail of the pack again as the yellow flag waved for the final time in that event on lap 53.

This final caution closed the pack on Weisner but he held on for a welldeserved win followed by Bob Sensiba. # Tri-SAC By Laura Devlin

dream of a few racing enthusiasts grew into an asphalt open-wheeled racing club that spanned a decade. The dreamers, from Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio, met in December 1971, at Union City, Michigan and convinced several others to join their efforts, and so Tri-STATE AUTO CLUB, INC. was born.

The dreamers, Jim and Clay Satison of Indiana, Ed Wurster, Marv and Jerry Carman, Larry Bible, Dick Jones, Duane Spangler, Bob and Joe Psurny, and Dean Best of Ohio, with the help of others set up the first year's rules and regulations. Jim Satison was elected President and Race Director for two years. Laura Devlin from day one till its demise in 1982 served the clubs reporter. She also served as Secretary for the 1980-81 season.

The first year, 1972, was short on races, 9 in all, but not on spirit or enthusiasm. The entire purse per race was \$1,500 with 10% of that going to the feature winner. Engine size was limited to 308 cubic inches for v-8's and none for 6 cylinders. Wings were not allowed. The first race was held at Avilla Motor Speedway. Tri-SAC set up points not only for drivers but also for car owners and for the first few years trophies and money were presented to the top 16 of each, then later cut to the top ten of each.

The first point champions were driver Marv Carman, and Ed Wurster, owner of Marv's #55 wedge.

Thirty-eight cars ran in 12 races in the '73 season. The racers traveled to Avilla, Butler, South Bend, Stuben County, Berlin Raceway, Galesburg and Hartford Speedways. Duane Spangler took the driving championship in the #92 of Urbie Durnwald.

Fred Seltenright of Marshall, Michigan became President of the club. These were growing years for the club. Wings were allowed and a tire rule came into effect. Purses rose significantly. The club traveled to more tracks including Mt. Clemens, Owosso, Dixie and Kalamazoo. The club got its feet wet in the promoting game at Ft. Wayne's Baer Field. Seltenright was crowned 1974 champ with Frank Belaires of Marshall the top owner with the Max Dowker built #82 roadster.

Tri-SAC went international in '75 by going to Delaware, Ontario for Saturdays and Kalamazoo on Sundays. Big Bob Psurny became the first driverowner champion in his #23 red CAE Sprinter. Hank Wise, of Kalamazoo became the first and only Tri-SAC driver fatality in a fiery crash at Kalamazoo Speedway.

Don Hey, Bryan, Ohio, was given the Race Director's headaches by President Dean Best. Chet Mysliwiec, owner of Kalamazoo Speedway, leased the Kazoo track to Tri-SAC. He did a terrific job and the club ran every Sunday evening from May thru September with open-wheeled supermodifieds, street stocks, and some late model shows.

There were over sixty cars in membership in 1976. Dean Best was driver-owner in his blue #29 sprint car sponsored by Kalamazoo Motor and Transmission.

New looks in roadsters were in for the '77 season. Wing size rules and mufflers came into effect. Max Dowker built his radical roadster and put Sammy Sessions behind the wheel to win the title that year. Harry Stickney of Girand, Michigan was President.

1978 saw cars as far as Canada to Chicago compete every weekend. Dowker put Jerry Carman in his roadster to take the championship.

Sam Sessions was elected President for '79 and big things were planned for the club until Session's untimely death in a snowmobile accident on December 17, 1978. Jerry "Ozzie" Osborn, Michawaka, Indiana became the new leader. The club went to dirt with shows on Friday nights at Ionia Fairgrounds, but cars began to fall off that

year. Mike Shaw of Marshall, Michigan was the '79 owner-driver champion.

Seltenright took the president's job again in 1980. Max Dowker built a new Titanium Roadster and a new era of racing began of ultra-light materials for race cars. Veteran Butch Fedewa drove the Dowker-Bob Soltow Jet Engineering #1 to every Tri-SAC to every win, winning the championship for 1980.

Kalamazoo Speedway was leased to the club in '81. With five rain dates in a row, the unbeatable team of Fedewa-Dowker-Soltow, the economy of the area and high traveling expenses of the racers

seemed to keep the count of cars from returning, which in turn kept the crowds away.

Veteran Wayne Landon drove his #83 roadster to the 1981 championship. Dick Lee presented Landon with an oil painting of his car at the annual and last banquet in Howell, Michigan.

The club was forced into bankruptcy and sadly Tri-SAC was disbanded. There are the fond memories of the members who became a family with campouts on weekends sharing the joys and sorrows, the ups and downs of open-wheeled racing.

During those ten eventful years, Tri-SAC meant speed, stars and cars that always pleased the fans.

## **Berlin Raceway Media 1973**

## Howe Takes Berlin Opener

April 14, 1973 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Ed Howe of Beaverton kick-started the season at Berlin Raceway by roaring to victory in the 30-lap late model feature race in his '71 Camaro.

Jimmy Roberts led the initial eight laps of the event before Howe took over and went on to stave off challenges by track champion Johnny Benson for the win. Dave Mulder was third followed by Rick Knotts, Jimmy Roberts, Jim Aldrich, Gary Fedewa, Bill Whittington, Lance Norris and Herb Mann.

Bill Minch of Muskegon crossed the finish line only inches ahead of Jack Drolema to win the 20-lap hobby stock feature. This event was the wildest of the night starting with a restart for a spin in the first turn right after the green was thrown. The caution was displayed three more times; first when Rick Kowalczyk hit the fourth turn wall and again when Tom Drolema and George Jewell tangled on the backstretch and again right after the green was thrown from that melee when Tom Drolema was on the front straight, running half-speed waiting for the pack to fall in at the tail. The green was dropped and all front runners had to scatter to miss Tom. As a result Norm Stuck and Art Harvey collided, hitting the front wall demolishing both cars. Fortunately no one was injured in any of the accidents.

Gene Eding was third followed by Tom Drolema, Gail Cobb and Don Rand.

Ed Howe was the evening's fastest qualifier at 17.45 on the .438 asphalt and literally shot to the lead at the drop of the green in the late model dash winning over Rick Knotts, Dave Mulder and Johnny Benson. Bob Sensiba topped Jack Drolema, Don Rand and Norm Stuck in the hobby stock dash event.

Ivan Richardson won the first hobby stock heat by several car lengths over Cobb and Kowalczyk. Bill Minch won the fast heat in that division ahead of Bob Bliss, Stuck, and Phil Poortinga won the third hobby stock heat.

Fast qualifier in the hobby stocks Jack Drolema passed every car to win the pursuit with Minch and Eding runners-up, while Dick Nicholas won the hobby stock consolation event ahead of Pete Senneker.

Butch Fedewa aced out Eddie VanderLaan and Terry Senneker Sr. to win the first late model heat as the field came to the finish line in a pack with Knotts and Benson side-by-side for fourth and fifth spots in a good fast race. Jim Roberts won the second heat in that division ahead of Gary Fedewa, Norris and Mann in another close finish. Butch Fedewa carried his second checker of the night as he won the pursuit ahead of Terry Senneker, Jim Aldrich, Dave Mulder and Ed Howe.

## Howe Victorious Again

May 5, 1973 – Berlin Raceway – Beaverton ace Ed Howe laid shambles to a top-notch starting lineup and roared to victory in the 30-lap late model feature at Berlin Raceway Saturday night.

Using his third different car, this time a '72 Camaro, in gaining his fourth consecutive feature win, Howe started 16th in the 20-car field, forged past leader Bob Senneker on the 11th lap, and was never headed for the remainder of the action-packed event.

The feature was restarted after Eddie VanderLaan spun in front of the pack while challenging for the lead on the first lap. The caution flew on lap four when Dave Mulder got sideways going thru turns three and four, Ron Laban and Harvey Redder

spun and half the pack joined in the ensuing melee with Mulder having to exit one lap after the restart. The caution flew again briefly on lap eight when Rick Knotts' hood sailed off as the pack thundered down the front stretch. For the remaining 22 laps it was just good fast racing with Howe taking the checker first chased by Bob Senneker, Johnny Benson and Rick Knotts crossed the wire side-byside with Benson taking third spot by mere inches. VanderLaan was fifth followed closely by Rich Senneker, Jim Aldrich, Terry Senneker Sr., Bill Bielby, and Jeff Bloom.

Jack Drolema won his second consecutive 20-lap late model main event in a fast paced event that was slowed only once when Bob Bliss spun early in the race. Dave Cutler was second as Don Rand edged Jack's brother, Tom Drolema, at the wire for third place. Gail Cobb was fifth followed closely by Bob Clover, Gene Eding, Mike Dixon, Dick Sarber and Terry Schmid.

Ed Howe was the fastest of 77 qualifiers with a record breaking 17.06 second dash around the .438 mile paved oval, breaking his own record of 17.19 seconds set in 1970. He followed up by winning the late model dash ahead of Rich and Bob Senneker and Bielby. Jack Drolema was the fastest qualifier in the hobby stocks and topped Rand, Bill Minch and Dave Cutler in the fast-car dash.

In other late model preliminaries Bill Whittington topped Butch Fedewa and Roger Herp in the first heat. Eddie VanderLaan bested Jimmy Roberts and Bloom in the second heat. Butch Fedewa bested Whittington and Clarence Cook in the non-qualifiers heat. Johnny Benson won the pursuit ahead of Knotts and Howe.

In hobby stock prelims the first heat was wild with a restart for a four car tangle and two cautions: when Phil Stampfler hit the inside guard rail and another car spun on the backstretch. Phil Poortinga finally took the win ahead of Dick Nichols and Dan Cutler. Dave Cutler topped Dixon and Clover in the second heat. With one lap to go in this event, Tom Drolema and Bob Billings, battling for the lead, tangled going into the second turn, Billings went over Tom's wheel and went airborne and several front-runners crashed behind the duo. The third heat was restarted after Jerry Jarema hit the third turn wall. Mike Bird took the checker chased by Steve Brown and Joe Pease. Gail Cobb won the pursuit ahead of Clover and Jack Drolema.

The consolation race continued the wild action with a seven car crash on lap two and another caution needed when Joe Pease tapped the front wall. Peter Pater won the event chased by Poortinga, Jim Terrill, Dan Cutler and Brown.

### Howe Again At Berlin

May 19, 1973 – Berlin Raceway – Veteran driver Ed Howe in another new "Green Hornet" Camaro, finished just the day before, won the 30-lap feature race for late model stock cars Saturday night at Berlin Raceway, his fifth of the season. Jack Drolema in a '71 Mustang topped the hobby stock field to win the 50-lap hobby stock Spring Championship.

The only caution during the late model feature occurred when Bob Senneker went flying off the back straightaway. Following Howe across the line were Rich and Bob Senneker (with Bob doing a fantastic job coming from the rear of the field), Jim Aldrich, Bill Bielby, Butch and Gary Fedewa, Scott Presley and Johnny Benson.

Gail Cobb finished a car-length behind Drolema in the hobby stock championship race with Tom Drolema third followed by Bob Clover, Don Rand, Gene Eding, Bill Minch, John Jutila, Terry Schmid and Mike Dixon. Four caution flags marred this event.

The hobby stock consolation was taken by Jerry Longnecker over Dan Cutler, Don Ward, Mike Johnson and Rick Kowalczyk.

Bob Senneker was the late model dash victor, finishing ahead of Howe, Bielby and older brother Rich, while the hobby stock fast-car dash went to Gail Cobb over Bob Clover, Dave Cutler and Bill Minch.
